THE MISSING CITY OF BOSTON

RUPTURE BETWEEN GREECE AND TURKEY.

Liston June 20th. The Bourbon and Orleans princes have promised Thiers that they will not interfere in politics for 2 years.

A French loan of 100 millions sterling is being arranged, to get rid of the Prussian army of occupation. The Orleans princes were well received at Versailles.

Ex-emperor Napoleon is again able to walk out; he intends publishing a manifesto.

The Italian Government intends moving the capital from Florence to Rome on July 1st. A coolness prevails between Antonelli and the French Minister.

Mr. Gladstone is quite recovered. Prince Arthur also, who joins the artillery at Aldershot.

The Emperor and Empress of Brazil, after 2 days' stay in Portugal, started by rail for Germany.

President Grant signed the Alabama Convention at Washington, and then started for Longbranch, for 2 months vacation, after which he is going to visit California.

The New York papers are vexed with the Canadians for censuring the Alabama Convention.

Berlin 17th. Triumphant entry of the army, 1600 officers and 38,700 men of the Guards, besides other detachments, representing 300 batts.

Brandenburg gate illuminated, Statue of Victory 500 electric lights.

Paris 18th. Review of 100,000 troops postponed. Assembly about to ordain Prussian system of military service through France.

Prince Napoleon is likely to be elected for Corsica. Government seems about to remove to Paris.

Versailles 17th. It is untrue that the Italian Government has requested that the Count of Harcourt be recalled from Rome.

London 16th. The Emperor of Germany closed the Reichsrath on the 15th, declaring he believed the peace would be lasting.

The new French loan will be for 80 millions sterling at 5 per cent. Communist placards in Paris say the city will be again set on fire.

The Turkish Government refused to receive Fricompi as Grecian Minister. Diplomatic relations are broken off.

Neither Thiers nor the Orleans princes assisted at the Diplomatic banquet yesterday.

London, 16th. Prince Arthur reviewed the Military School at Kensington. A meeting of sympathy for the Pope was held in Dublin, under Cardinal Cullen.

The labouring classes in London are short of work. Last week 135,000 persons received out-door relief, but this was 24,000 less than same period last year.

New York. Governor Dunn refused the request of the Foreign Consuls at New Orleans, and hanged two Spanish sailors for the murder of another sailor last year.

LONDON LETTER.

June 8th, 11 p.m. Of the Communist leaders, Pyat and Descluze are still at large. Assi, Groussot, and Rochefort await their trial at Versailles.

The indiscriminate slaughter of the rank and file of the Paris National Guard has ceased. The city to a certain extent has resumed its ordinary ways, its gaiety only repressed by the unusually cold weather which we experience also in London.

and by the restrictions placed by the military government on certain public amusements.

The week has passed in gathering what authentic details we could as to the amount of life and property destroyed in the fatal days of the last throes of the proletarian rule.

The number of the popular party killed has gradually diminished from sixty to twenty thousand; and the number of the troops from five to two thousand.

The number of foreigners in the Communist ranks has also been grossly exaggerated. As to the British subjects, there is scarcely one authenticated name except that of a Miss Kerol, the 'chere amie' of the editor of the official journal. You will be right for once if you convert this young lady's name into Carrol.

The extent of damage done to the public buildings is sufficiently serious, but much less than reported; and the Times correspondent fairly admits that many of them must have been sacrificed, not from pure incendiarism, or even fanatical notions, but for military purposes of defence, as amongst the buildings destroyed are the theatres Porte St. Martin and Lyrique, the two theatres of the people; but they happened to command an important barricade.

On the other hand, the churches in the neighborhood have been left untouched; the only church injured is St. Eustache, which was struck by a shell, and the roof ignited. The Madeleine is unharmed, but there is great destruction of private property in the neighborhood, particularly in the Rue Royale, which was one of the strategic points of the Commune, and leading to the Place de la Concorde.

The two buildings destroyed more or less are the Hotel de Ville and the Finance Ministry.

The Tuileries is nearly a complete ruin. The centre and left pavilions are in the interior totally destroyed, but the new part of the Tuileries facing the river is comparatively unharmed.

Of the Louvre only the library was burned. The Montpensier wing of the Palais Royal is utterly demolished as well as the barracks behind the Hotel de Ville, and at the Chateau d'Eau. On the other side of the river a large amount of private property, as well as the public offices from the Palais de la Justice, at the corner of the Rue Dauphine to the neighbourhood of St. Sulpice, has been destroyed.

The Luxembourg is little injured, and the St. Chapelle and Notre Dame have entirely escaped the fire in their quarter. It is calculated that the loss of property occasioned by the combined Vandalism, fanaticism, wickedness, cowardice, and tyranny of the French of all classes will be about 20 or 15 millions sterling.

The British, who are beginning to swarm already into Paris, are disappointed at finding it not so interesting a ruin as they expected; and are much concerned at being driven quietly in a cab along the brilliant gas lit streets, and boulevards gorgeous with the unusual display of gold lace and military uniforms, and crowded with loungers as if nothing had happened, and flinging themselves bundled into their hotels without being asked to show their passports or red whiskers, or any other proof of their nationality. Their only satisfaction after they have dined and seen the remains of the Hotel de Ville and all that, is the smell here and there of chloride of lime, not mixed with another taint; owing to the extraordinary cold weather, no evil results have discovered themselves from the hasty burials of the insurgents dead or alive, or neither one thing or the other, as was frequently the case. A wholesome and corrective smell of burning is still very perceptible in the Rue de Rivoli from the ruins of the Tuileries and houses opposite. In the gardens of the Luxembourg, the Park Monceaux, along the quays, in the Rue Royale, the Obamp de Mars, and wherever there was hard fighting, or any likely place for a wholesale slaughter of prisoners the ground is turned up disagreeably, and the neighbours do not much care at present about investigations; but it must be done before the hot weather comes.

You will see in the papers a full account of the burial of Mgr. Darboy, the late Archbishop of Paris, who was shot on the 24th May. As he lay in state, he presented a ghastly sight. A bullet had entered the cheek, just under the eye, passing upwards to the

brain, and fracturing the skull. He was robed in full canonicals, with rings on his fingers and a mitre on his head, and the body gently raised so as to give a full view to the gaping crowd. We have received letters from Paris to-night, giving details of the funeral and confirming what the Times told us this morning in a telegram a column and a half long: It seems that the Paris 'bourgeois' had not gratitude enough to show more than wonted respect to the memory of the martyr to their cause; and, after all their afflictions, were yet too stiff-necked or too corrupt to bend the knee. The lower classes, of course, looked on sullenly, and in raw and drizzling weather, and with little stir and little crowd, the cortege wended its way to Notre Dame. It was not until the martyr's remains had entered the Cathedral, and the 'De Profundis' pealed from the choir, that the solemnity of the occasion was felt. I will not trouble you with comments on the political significance of this negative manifestation.

There are funny things brewing yet, and I shall have many opportunities of reflecting the surface hues of coming events.

To-day the great question of Monarchy or Republic is expected to be decided at Versailles. It is difficult to think that the republican can bear the discredit into which, justly or unjustly, it has fallen; and it will be only another example amongst many recent ones, of their impatience and want of tact, if the French Republicans allow themselves again to be made a cat's-paw for the contending monarchical factions.

It does not appear to be true that there is any fusion between the two branches of the Bourbons. The Orleans princes are content to have existing disabilities removed, and then to resign their seats in the Assembly; and they engage not to intrigue during the term of power of M. Thiers, who, it is supposed, in the meantime will prepare the way and make straight the path for their advent when the times are more favourable for a debut.

But it is doubtful if the Count de Chambord will be content with this arrangement, and it is quite certain that what Mr. Labouchere irreverently calls the 'elderly gentleman at Chislehurst' will not; and it is not impossible that in MacMahon and Ducrot he has influence as powerful as that of M. Thiers.

Between them all, the prospects of France are indeed dismal: seeing that the Germans are still sojourning in her provinces, that she has an enormous debt to pay, and that the party of order now in the ascendant are not satisfied with domestic difficulties, but are absolutely threatening to arrange the affairs of the King of Italy at Rome, where the influence of the Vatican is at this moment recovering itself—a natural result of the burning of Paris.

Archbishop Manning, Pera Hyacinthe, the Archbishop of York, orators at Conservative banquets and cattle shows, and many serious-minded men of different shades of religious and political opinions, have all of them, in their several ways, improved the occasion; and I must not omit the 'colonels' in the House of Commons, who have even made use of the burning of Paris to bring legislation on the Atty question to such a dead lock that the Times, on the 99th occasion, to my personal knowledge, begins its leader to-day with Prince Albert's dictum, 'Parliamentary institutions are on their trial.' Well one remembers how the Times badgered the poor Prince Consort for that saying.

We expect the Emperor and Empress of Brazil in the Douro; but it is likely they will stay for a short time in Lisbon. The good people of Southampton are, however, as busy as bees making preparations for a reception suited to the Emperor's position in life, and, I think I may add, to theirs.

Your packet edition, containing a graphic account of the ravages of the epidemic in B. Ayres, has produced a painful impression here. The Morning Post has a leader on the subject. I hear that the subscriptions in this city have reached the enormous amount of £20,000. But we all want to know what is to be done before next summer comes upon you. Mr. Bateman's plans will require time to mature and carry out.

The account of the Tichborne trial I send you in a separate letter, and for general news I must refer you to the newspapers. I must draw the attention of your political readers, German as well as English, to the first article in the Fortnightly of this month. It is one of those satisfying and exhaustive impartial papers that appear once in a decade. Doing ample justice to the political morals and talents of Prince Bismarck, it shows clearly that if the war was technically commenced by France, it was virtually commenced by Prussia.

I have seen a specification of an engine which I think will be found very useful abroad. It combines all the features of a traction engine with the famed elastic wheels for hauling passenger or goods on common roads, and for ploughing also, with the addition of an ordinary cultivator, and is immediately convertible into a steam road-roller with a solid iron rolling surface six feet wide. It is also an engine for driving ordinary machinery, such as a threshing machine, portable flour mill, mortar mill, or stone breaker; and it has gearing and pumps for pumping water, and a crane in front

for hoisting weights. It is thus applicable to all the usual purposes of the contractor, builder, and agriculturist, and is clearly valuable for export on account of the number of uses to which it can be applied.

It is made in sizes from two and a half to twelve horse-power, costing from £180 to £500. The small size might be useful for irrigating quintas, cutting fodder, etc.; the eight horse power for ordinary farms; and the 12 horse-power for large farms, contractors' use etc. It has the advantage of being easily reduced in weight, by the crane lifting off the water and fuel tanks, before crossing lightly constructed bridges &c: I can recommend this engine to the notice of all users of steam power.

THE REVOLUTION IN SANTIAGO.

INTERESTING PARTICULARS. Santiago del Estero, June 29, 1871.

Messrs. Editors, I have seen in various numbers of the STANDARD articles on the 'Gran Revolucion' in Santiago, which made so much noise in the press some weeks ago, and thinking that an account of the events which have lately taken place here, and which are going to make much greater 'bull', may be interesting to you, I have determined to write you a short but true account of what really took place, and some of the causes which led to it.

From the very commencement of the administration of Sr. Montes, the legislative and executive powers have been in opposition; the first official act of Sr. Montes being the veto of a law passed by the Legislature.

By the Constitution of this province the ordinary sessions of the sala are for eight days, not counting feast days, which can be prorogued by the Executive 20 days longer; passing which period it must be called together in extraordinary session, either by a decree of the government, or by a petition signed by five deputies. This year, on the last night of the regular session, there was a dead-lock in the sala; and as neither party would yield, at midnight the regular session having concluded; the period established by law came to an end, but without concluding the business before it, or appointing the Permanent Commission, which during the recess represents the sala, and one of whose duties is to inform the Executive what members conclude their term of office, in order that the time for a new election may be appointed. Here the deputies are elected for two years; but one half of the members conclude each year. The time when the new elections usually take place came and passed, and the time was approaching when the representatives to the National Congress, who are also members of the Provincial Legislature, should go to Buenos Ayres, and still the Governor refused to call together the Legislature, without which there could be no Permanent Commission, and no election of deputies this year, consequently the province would remain without any legislative body, the eight deputies, whose terms of office are for another year, not forming a quorum.

Under these circumstances five deputies met, and called together the Legislature, which met on the 10th inst., elected a president, named the Permanent Commission, and closed the session. The Permanent Commission organized, advised the Executive of the fact, and the names of the deputies whose term of office expire this year, &c. To this the governor returned no answer. Such being the state of affairs, the sala of representatives was again convoked by an order of the Permanent Commission in extraordinary session, and met on the night of the 22nd, and informed the Executive of their organization. Not having received any message from the governor, who publicly said on various occasions that he did not consider the sala a legal one, but intended to do as he thought fit, the Legislature again met on the 23rd, at four, p.m., in secret session, and prepared charges against the governor, the charges being six in number, and in a few words are as follows:—

1st. For having unjustly imprisoned and ordered out of the province one 'Valentin Veron,' without his having been convicted by the legal tribunals.

2nd. For not having nominated 'en propiedad' the judges of the 'Camara de Justicia,' as the constitution requires; their appointment, as they now are, being subject to his pleasure, could only prevent the free administration of justice.

3rd. Of having abstracted from the 'Camara de Justicia' the charges brought against said 'Veron,' and of having torn them up.

4th. Of having suppressed all the public schools of the province, and used the money voted by the National Government for that object for other purposes.

Everything remains quiet, and if the National Government does not disturb it, I see no reason why it should not continue to do so.

AN EYE-WITNESS.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

We received yesterday the National Finance Minister's 'informe' for the year 1871, but as it is a matter of 300 pages, we require a day to digest it, and will comment on it to-morrow.

The Coquimbo's mails were delivered yesterday morning; also brought Lisbon papers to the 20th ult. Paris remains tranquil, but the insurrection still smoulders, and on the morning of the 17th of June all the dead walls and principal buildings in the city were found covered with proclamations by the Commune, declaring that the insurrection was not crushed, and that the work of burning Paris would shortly be renewed.

The French Bishops are promoting an agitation in favor of the restoration of the temporal power of the Pope, but the press in all parts of the country declares that France neither can nor will meddle in a question now forgotten by everyone. Turkey and Greece are squabbling again and the latter power has withdrawn its Minister from Constantinople. The new French loan, to pay off the war indemnity to Germany, was about to be launched in London; 2000 millions of francs at 5 per cent.

The Buenos Ayres correspondent of a London contemporary makes the following remarks, for which we beg to thank him very sincerely:—

'Your contemporary here, after the suspension of its publication on the 11th inst., made its re-appearance yesterday. And here I will avail of the opportunity to express the general appreciation of the marked ability and devotion with which this journal has been conducted throughout the event

6th. Of having misspent the money voted by the Provincial Legislature to enable the Governor of the province to be present at the opening of the National Exhibition in Cor'oba.

6th. For having spoken, against the Provincial Legislature, publicly denying its legality.

These were the charges preferred against Sr. Montes; but long before the Sala had closed its meeting his Excellency had fled. As I said before, the Sala met at 4 p.m., and at 4.30 p.m. Sr. Montes, accompanied by various of his friends, left the city on horseback and took the road to Cordoba. That night he reached an estancia called Blanco Corral, some twelve leagues from the city, where he passed himself off as a Cordobese.

I thought that Santiago had been the last of its Governor for many a long day, when, much to the surprise of every one, on the morning of the 24th he rode again into the city. Now, every one thought, he has returned to answer the charges brought against him—for, according to the law, he ought to have presented himself that very day before the tribunal appointed to try him. But it was not so, and Sr. Montes affirmed that he had been brought back by force. Be that as it may, the truth is that he took his seat in the diligence, and at 1 p.m. publicly left the city, saying that he was going to ask the intervention of the National Government.

But his troubles were not yet at an end. A little more than two leagues out of the city he met a 'gendarme' who, it being a feast day, had leave of absence to meet his friends; and five of the peons of the 'mensageria' armed with revolvers, by order of the Governor attacked the 'gendarme' and took his horse and outlass from him. The man complained to the Juez de Paz, who ordered out eight men, armed with muskets, and stopped the diligence, demanding the restoration of the horse and outlass. These were refused, and a chasque was sent to the city to inform the Chief of Police what he had done and to

ful and trying mouths of the plague. We received yesterday from the Rev. Mr. Shields, of Fray Bentos, a list of the subscribers to his new church and schools there; the collection is a magnificent one, and speaks highly for the religious sentiments of the English in the Uruguay, and the energy of their respected pastor.

We perceive with pleasure that Mr. Peeler has obtained a contract for paving Calle Larga Barracas.

We call attention to the advertisement, in another column, of Miss Mary Mannhart, professor of music and languages, who has changed her residence to 173 Cangallo.

The Calle Belgrano Tramway, in connection with the Calle Cayo line, will be opened to the public on Sunday next. This line has been constructed with extraordinary rapidity, 35 squares being completed in 15 days. This result is due to the ability and energy of our friend Sir Narrow Gauge Robertson, Engineer of the line, who has left other tramway contractors quite in the shade by this feat. The trains will run every hour, from Sunday next, from the station in Plaza 25 de Mayo, and that in Calle Caridad.

The Santiago papers announce that the telegraph posts from the Littoral are now laid to within a mile or so of that city.

Another gunpowder outrage was perpetrated at Sr. Cazon's quinta late on Tuesday night. The man in charge was frightened out of his wits and bed about midnight by a tremendous report, which he proved to have been caused by the explosion of a bottle filled with gunpowder, and placed just under his window. He saw a man dressed in woman's clothes 'skedaddling' as he opened the door to look out.

Salvini plays Sullivan to-night at the Colon; it is said to be one of his best characters. Othello is not yet announced.

A large cargo of wheat from the Santa Fe colonies, and some Tucuman tobacco arrived in port yesterday.

A Spanish paper, in announcing the visit of the War Minister of Spain to the Bosphorus in a frigate, states that it is 82 years since a Spanish man-of-war was seen in these waters.

The report of the Indians being defeated on the Mendoza frontier turns out to be a 'canard.' The town of San Carlos was attacked and taken by the savages, many women carried off and several persons killed, the place being sacked from end to end. There was great alarm at Mendoza when this became known, and the citizens were arming in all haste.

We are asked to call the attention of the advertising public to the enamelled show cards of Mr. Llewellyn Jones, Welsh Consul, which we noticed some days back. They are made by Messrs. Johnson & Sons, London, and as specimens of lithographic art are unsurpassed and not expensive.

The Monitor de la Campana a well edited little paper at Exaltacion de la Cruz, in its last number, advises its readers and the country public to advertise largely as the surest road to success, and refers to Mr. Hesperidina Bagley, who paid the Tribuna alone \$100,000 m.c. for advertisements, the result being a tidy little fortune of three or four millions. The Monitor's scale of charges for advertisements is the same as that of the STANDARD.

The Royal Mail steamer La Plata will sail for Southampton to-morrow afternoon. Our Packet Edition appears to-day at noon.

Dr. Valentin Videla was elected Governor of San Juan on the 23rd of June; his opponent, Dr. S. Cortinez, only polled two votes.

There is a glut in the orange market at present, and the itinerant dealers in the article are in high spirits. Within the last three days half a million oranges have come down from various parts of the country, and large consignments are known to be on the way.

In its last number the Revista Medica Quirurgica says, "There is no change in the health of the city for the past fortnight; small-pox, rheumatism and colds are the prevailing diseases. All the special hygienic measures that were to have been taken by the Municipality have been pitched into the

waste paper basket as unnecessary. The storm over, everything in the way of reform is abandoned. Before long, another plague will sweep off the remainder of the inhabitants, destroy business, stop immigration 'in toto,' and make bankrupt the once joyous and fair capital of the Plate. There is no security of Municipal edicts on hygienic subjects, what we want is to have them strictly enforced."

M. Le Maistre presented his credentials to President Battle on Monday as German Minister to the Uruguayan Republic; a great many Germans and other foreigners were present at the ceremony.

The Montevideo merchants are complaining of the scanty accommodation afforded them for loading outward bound vessels; it is proposed to construct two new moles.

There is quite a rage in Rosario for tickets of the Popular Argentina, On Wednesday over 50 tickets were sold in a few hours. In other places up the river there is great anxiety to purchase tickets, and the Company would do well to appoint travelling agents for their sale, having permanent agencies in the large towns.

A morning paper announces that the Cordoba Exhibition will be opened on the 1st of October next.

The Princess Regent of Brazil has conferred the badge of the Order of the Rose on Mr. J. de Rocha, now in charge of the Brazilian Consulate in this city.

Through letters received by the Coquimbo, we learn that public opinion in England has completely changed in reference to the Tichborne case. The general belief now is that the claimant will be 'spun,' and the odds against him in the betting world are rising daily.

In announcing yesterday the intended departure for Europe of Mr. Wattell, Director of the Billingham Tramway line, we were misinformed. Mr. Wattell remains here to finish the works, which will be pushed on with all vigor to Flores. The total length of the Billingham Tramways is 15 miles, not 9, as we stated yesterday.

It is said that 'El Cejudo,' a drama by Don Luis Varela, will shortly be produced at the Colon Theatre, Salvini taking the leading character. The piece is being translated into Italian.

There is no further news of the progress of the peace negotiations in Bauda Oriental. There is a rumour of some influential parties in Buenos Ayres forming a Peace Committee to aid the efforts being made to stop the civil war.

The Spanish Minister, Sr. de España, has addressed a farewell note to the National Government wishing every prosperity to the Argentine Confederation.

The Prensa tells a story of the proprietor of a house in this city, who, tenant, a lady, wished to leave without paying her rent, but insisted on taking her furniture. The lady applied to the Commissary, who, happening to be a lady's man, inclined to her view of the case; but the landlord laid in a stock of provisions, barricaded the door, and when last seen was parading the 'sala' with half-a-dozen loaded Colt's revolvers lying ready on the table. Up to the present the police have acted in the belief that 'discretion is the better part of valor.'

The great Varela auction begins on Monday next, and will be continued on Tuesday and Wednesday. It is an opportunity for amateurs of fine arts and 'objets de vertu' which will be repeated with difficulty of making really valuable investments, and we have no doubt that during those three days Mr. Varela's residence will be the rendezvous of our leading collectors. The splendid furniture that is to be brought to the hammer at the same time is not less worthy of attention from all classes. Mr. Bpilhric in person will wield the auctioneering hammer on the occasion, and if anything could give additional interest to the sale, it is the fact of its being confined to such able hands.

THE LECTURE ON THE MOUNT. Montevideo, July 10th, 1871. Dear STANDARD.

We are so grateful for small mercies in this city, that the large ones which you occasionally confer are really almost oppressive. The eagerness with which residents in Montevideo search through your columns for cakes, &c., is proverbial, and in your issue of Friday they will have found an article which 'leaves nothing to be desired,' either in point of rounded sonorous periods, or novel and striking remarks. The Banda Oriental gratitude will in this instance, perhaps, find outlet in the well-known given to the special whom you purpose sending. 'Ex uno disce omnes' and we venture to predict that he will display that aptitude for accommodating himself to the cock-tailing custom of the country evinced by typical riverine visitors in general, from calico customers to cricketers. He will then be specially qualified to extract beams from his entertainers, and we hope his gratitude may be commensurate with the favors bestowed.

The science and patient investigation brought to bear upon the question are signs of the times, and although it might require not more than a Darwin to trace the development of the embellished Montevideo merchant, we presume that like him you premise a cocktail less Oriental, and we should like to have your correspondent's valuable views on this variety.

Although it would be difficult to withhold one's admiration of the bold inductions, heated judgement, impatient investigation, and muddled brain for reasons which nothing would induce us to reveal, we venture to think there will be people found to gainsay it, or times must be changed since the days when all the world and his wife were informed that the STANDARD Sunday lunch consisted of two cocktails and one biscuit at Belgrano. It might be that we consider that there is a trifle too much side, in the individual distinctions drawn between M. V. and B. Ayres. 'Sin embargo,' reasons are as plentiful as gooseberries, and everybody may choose one to his liking—thereby hangs a cock and bull tale.

COCKTAIL. GEOLOGICAL REMARKS. To the Editors of the STANDARD. Gentlemen,

I was much amused at reading in your issue of the 2nd the further reports of Mr. Bateman, more particularly where he informs the inhabitants of Buenos Ayres of a very important investigation he has made that he could scarcely believe it possible that South America, having amongst its various rocks different kinds of limestones and calcareous strata, did not possess some amongst them which would have the necessary cementing properties of mortar. He then goes on to state that he sent samples of various kinds and of the tosea which was found on the margin of the River Plate; these limestones and tosea he had analysed and experimented upon.

Now this important investigation of his and grand discovery of a 'mare's nest' is wonderful, for it happens to have been discovered about 100 years ago by Smarston in 1765, when erecting the Greystone Lighthouse, and was known even before this by the Romans and in the time of Vitruvius. The fact being that any calcareous rock containing clay forms by calcination hydraulic lime, and its setting depends on a chemical combination between the lime and the silica of the clay; and if from 10 to 15 per cent. of clay be present it possesses the property of solidifying under water. Portland cement is nothing more than an artificial hydraulic lime with a large percentage of clay in its component parts.

Some months ago I calcined this petrified clay, produced lime and portland cement, and hand you samples. Let any one take a lump, put it in the fire, let it remain there a few hours, then while warm put it into a small quantity of water: it will at once burst and fall to pieces, and is, in fact, lime. This needs a great deal of justification. Does it not mean 'simplication' instead of 'investigation'?

The sand of the River Plate, when deprived of animal and vegetable life, is really beautiful sand, and equal to coarse grinding emery for many purposes; and, as a clear proof to any one possessed of an nose, let them boil half a bucketful of the same from the beach, and they will at once discover one great source of cholera and yellow fever from the stench given off.

In the next report I expect another 'mare's nest,' telling us that the clays in and around Buenos Ayres will make good bricks. In this matter there can be no doubt, as good red, blue, or buff bricks, quarries, tiles, pottery, flower-pots, vases, &c., may be made, either plain or glazed, if some one of your enterprising gentlemen like to make them.

ON 'CHANGE. July 12th 1871. Ounces 400 Foreign 1243 Patentes 25 National Bonds 70

There was nothing done in bonds to-day, there were some few sellers in the ring but no buyers, holders refuse to give way in price and buyers refuse to pay the present high price.

The expectation of gold from Europe and the accumulation of capital in the banks, inspire the bulls with confidence that bonds will, before the week is over reach 75. Money can be had to-day at 8 per cent. on bonds at a value of 65.

It was said on 'Change' to-day that orders to buy have come out in the La Plata and Coquimbo, but as the market is weak and prices look down they have not yet been filled. In the liquidation sellers were offering at 69, and buyers of 67 1/2.

Exchange ruled to-day at 40 1/2 and this notwithstanding that some of the drawers this day reduced their rate to 40, a good deal was passed at 40 1/2.

The sale of the well known Buschenthal quinta in Montevideo was reported to-day, for the round sum of 210,000 pesos. The purchaser is Sr. Del Campo and another, who have made a present to the Government of the house and eleven acres around it, receiving in exchange a four years exclusive privilege of the Montevideo lottery. Government intends establishing an agricultural school there.

Mr. Lamas received to-day the bills of lading of materials for the Transandine Telegraph Co. shipped in London on board the Helen, that sailed on the 7th June for Rosario. These are the last materials of the line, and consist of 187 miles complete of telegraph wire and posts.

Most merchants being busy to-day with their correspondences for the mail, there was rather a poor attendance on the Bolsa.

The Gas Co. will declare no dividend this half year, the shares have fallen somewhat and are offering at 90.

The report of the National Minister of Finance is out: it is most carefully and elaborately got up and gives a truthful and comprehensive glance of the financial state of the country. Merchants and others complain that so important a report is not published in English. The total amount of National Bonds in circulation on the 31st of December, 1870, was 12,392,470 pesos fuertes. The Buschenthal debt, 2,048,941; Foreign debt, 1,921,224; Roads and Bridges Stock, 275,000; English loan, 188, 2,357,700; 11,652,790; Buenos Ayres Fondos Publicos, 6 per cent. and 3 per cent. amortization, 693,600; do. 9 per cent. and 3 amortization, 1,198,400.

English debt, 1824-6 per cent. amortization, 4,144,910; do. 3 per cent. amortization, 6,022,990. Total, 39,250,266.

This highly important report gives the contract, &c., between the Government and Messrs. Wanklyn and Co. for the negotiation of the six million loan. The Government, we gather from the Minister's report, proposes selling its shares in the Argentine Central Railway Company.

The mail steamer La Plata was in quarantine to-day, and as yet the gold for the Government has not been landed.

On the Bolsa there is a serious complaint about the robberies at the Custom House deposit. A man with some stolen goods under his arm was caught yesterday.

It was said on 'Change' to-day that telegrams from the States announce a fall in hides, but quotations 24 1/2 gold: nevertheless the hide market is very firm, and large sales to-day at 150-160 per peso, equal to 40 reales, or 26 cents gold in the States.

In the wool market this morning some new buyers were noticed. Prices are firm. Respecting the Don Diego, we are happy to say she suffered nothing by the collision. She was two days out from this port when she was run into.

The Andes will not sail till the 17th owing to the impossibility of getting her cargo on board, caused by the constant fogs in the river for the last week.

The London Board of Directors of the Northern Railway of Buenos Ayres have subscribed the magnificent sum of £250 for the Relief Fund of Buenos Ayres.

The following were the wool sales in the North Plaza to-day—

Consumption continues large and supply moderate, so that current rates are freely paid. Recent arrivals of Buenos Ayres mestic and merino are less wanting than the early ones which give additional strength to the quotations.

To-day 1,084 bales Montevideo were offered at auction at Liverpool, and all sold at fully 10 per lb. advance on April sales: there were buyers for England, Scotland, France, Belgium, and the U. States. Competition very active. The following prices were paid—

In the United States foreign wool is in great request to supplement a short supply of domestic. The price of manufacturers at present lags behind that of wool.

Shcep skins—We have an improved demand, and as at this season the supply of long-wooled skins decreases, prices have improved 1/4 to 1/2 per lb. In addition to our home buyers, some business has been done for export to France and to the United States. 24,000 skins will be offered at auction 21st instant.

Important transactions in wool. High prices obtained. Messrs. Patino, Arias, Corrales and Wobman and Man's sold some very fine lots at 470, 72, 74, 75 and 80. N.B.—At Plaza Constitucion and Estacion Buenos Ayres very good wools unsold. To-morrow an auction of 'Frutos del Pais' by Mr. Nizar at Coronado's Barraca at 10 1/2 am. Particulars later.
