FOREIGN AFFAIRS DEPARTMENT.

Dr. Tejedor has presented his report to Congress; it contains little that is new or of interest, and makes no mention whatever of the all-important question of British claims in Entre Rios.

"Last August I was named Minister of Foreign Affairs, and since then I have twice had to do duty as War-Minister.

"The protocols of June, 1869, between the Allied Powers and Paraguay are still before Congress; and I now submit the new protocols on the same matter. The first part of these negotiations was so happily arranged that it is probable the whole business would have been in like manner concluded but for the premature recall of the Brazilian plenipotentiary.

"The war in Banda Oriental has given us much trouble, and the assassination of Gen. Urquiza may be said to have arisen from his attempt to prevent filibusters crossing from Entre Rios to that country. We have at times removed refugees to the interior of the country, and they have applied for relief to the law-courts. It is necessary for Congress to define a rule in such matters, since the Republic and its neighbors are continually in collision.

"The Extradition Law with Chile requires the notice of Congress, since it has a clause that the demand of the resident Minister is enough to authorize the arrest of a supposed criminal and his detention for 6 days, till evidence be brought for his extradition, failing which evidence he is to be put at liberty. This arrest, by our laws, is unconstitutional, unless a prima facie case be made against him. A similar treaty with Bolivia allows 6 months for production of evidence; but it is different as regards Banda Oriental, and in the proposed treaty with Brazil the requisitions for arrest may be made by the Minister, Consul, or military authorities of the frontier.

"The amended Extradition law of the British Parliament (9th August 1870) as presented to me by H. M. Chargé d'Affaires to ascertain our views as to making a mutual law of this kind, lays down 'that in the U. Kingdom an order for arrest may be issued under the seal of any of H. M. Majesty's Secretaries of State to a justice magistrate, expressing the motive for such order, which, moreover, can only be given on such evidence as would justify the arrest of the party if the crime had been committed in the British Dominions, in the Colonies such requisition for arrest may be authorized by the Consuls and Governors, without any order from a Secretary of State.'

"Hence it appears that the arrangement with Chile goes further than all others, and beyond the limits of our Constitution.

"Our republic is represented in foreign ports by Consuls, some of whom have no income whatever; others barely enough to pay for pens, ink and paper. They are nearly all foreigners, and cannot properly represent our interests abroad. It would be well if they were all Argentines, in receipt of proper salaries, and obliged to reside in the cities to which they are appointed.

"The troubles in Banda Oriental have called for our efforts to mediate between the belligerents. We had wished to get Brazil to join us in the

matter, but the Brazilian Cabinet declined doing so unless at the request of the Oriental Government. We have, therefore, been slow to meddle in the question.

"Diplomatic relations with foreign Powers are so necessary that, in spite of the cost, we have resolved to keep our Ministers abroad, merely suppressing the Chargé d'Affaires at Montevideo, and putting in his place a Consul General. Foreign Powers are represented here by Resident Ministers or Chargé d'Affaires, though their presence is hardly necessary, for we arrange all questions with the utmost benevolence, and there is not now hanging over a single reclamation of those that were pending last year."

CENTRAL URUGUAY RAILWAY INAUGURATION TRIP.

On Sunday at noon a special train left the Montevideo terminus of this Railway, situated in Calle E. Negro, for Las Piedras, to inaugurate the new section of the line which has been finished to that town. The day was remarkably fine, and the station or terminus was thronged. The State coach was gaily decked out with flags, and barely accommodated all the guests. The line runs right across the tail end of the bay, the waters being shut off by a granite breakwater, a work apparently of considerable cost and mighty duration; the reclaimed land has yet to be filled in, and even this part of the work looks of stupendous magnitude.

About a league from the town is the old terminus, which has now a somewhat shabby appearance. The road runs through a very fine broken country; the hill tops are capped with windmills and smiling quintas.

At the Paso Molino there is a station, and here we noticed a nice public park, crowded with the citizens of Montevideo who, for the most part, run out on Sundays and holidays in the tramway. The place looked from the train sweet, wholesome and nice; with a sigh we thought of poor Buenos Ayres that with all its wealth and population can boast of nothing of the kind—the beautiful shrubs and neat gravelled walks reminded us of Birkenhead park. We dashed over the bridge which spans the river; the road skirted the building plots of exploded Pomento Companies. On either side of the line we noticed beautifully cultivated farms, green leaves and old hedges. Pretty as is the country through which the Northern Railway of Buenos Ayres passes in the neighbourhood of Olivos and San Isidro, it is nothing in comparison with the country hereabouts. There is really a certain charm about the suburbs of Montevideo which not even the sad history of the country can rob; Nature has endowed the land with its choicest gifts, which its sons do everything to destroy. A smiling little station called Colon is our next stop. The station is trimmed with ivy and willows; there seems to be no town or village hereabouts, but quintas and farms and windmills are everywhere. As we emerge from this smiling but sequestered spot we come upon an open rocky country, rocks that cover the whole table land, starting up in the fields and high-ways, near farm-houses dot the country around; fields newly ploughed up—agricultural industry is obvious on all sides. Away up on the hill top is the village of Las Piedras; a few minutes more and we arrive at the station, which is pretty, well built and conveniently situated, being on the very edge of the hamlet.

Las Piedras is situated four leagues twelve miles from the city, and we made the run out in a little over half an hour. The townspeople of Las Piedras turned out en masse on the occasion, and met us with a very stiff salute of rockets and fire-works.

Mr. Senen Rodriguez, the general manager of the company, led the way, and we all proceeded to the Plaza, where we discovered immense 'carne con cuero' arrangements. The affair was entirely South American. Astride a barrel of beer, sat a gauccho, who helped every one 'ad libitum.' High above the beer barrel floated the begrimmed Oriental flag. Whether the people were Blancos or Colorados this deponent cannot say, perhaps they were both as the occasion offered; but now they were flaming red ribbons on their wide-leaved slouched hats, and seemed, as they crowded round the spits with the roasting meat, about the most adaptable people for a revolution that could be got together. Whether it was the dress or the smoking half-cooked meat, or the knives or the strange-fashioned attire of the crowd, but the people and the race seem to us to be degenerating, and fast, very fast, approaching the animal. Then when the 'carne con cuero' was over, came the 'sortija.'

We turned from the stupid gaping through to have a look at the church and town, and found subjects far more kindred to our tastes in our rambles.

Las Piedras is in every sense a smiling lovely village of the plain; where cleanliness and moderate independence seem to cheer the neighbouring swain. The village is clean as a Quaker town, and strongly reminded us of Baltimore, Ireland. Lime sand evidently abounded in the locality. The white wash brush seems to rule the place. The church is a splendid temple for so small a place, and appeared to us extravagantly large; but, after all, it is, perhaps, a small fault in a thriving prosperous village.

In the neighbourhood of Las Piedras is a vast reservoir, the splendid work of Mr. Newman, the engineer of the water-works, but we had no time to go to see it.

The town was thronged with Oriental officers, awaiting the arrival of the Vicar, Mr. Zoa Fernandez, and Don Juan Quevedo.

At three o'clock the special train started for town, crowded with passengers, most of the principal men of Montevideo having come out for the excursion. We stopped at the various stations returning, and arrived in the city at four o'clock, after a rather agreeable trip.

There is really nothing much to say about the railway; the fortunes of the line seem at last to be on the mend. Next packet will bring out £100,000 sterling for the road. Mr. Rodriguez has, notwithstanding all that has been said about him, proved eminently successful, and most of the moneyed men of Montevideo speak highly of his very successful negotiations in London. The line will now be continued on to Durazno: it runs through one of the richest districts of the Banda Oriental; and, beyond question, when finished will command a traffic very equal to that of the G. Southern Railway of Buenos Ayres. The works are now in the hands of Messrs. Waring Brothers, of London, and all have the fullest confidence in their ability to carry out to the letter the contract which they have entered into for the conclusion of the road.

LATEST FROM EUROPE. THE ASTARIE'S MAILS.

The steamer Astarie, of the Glasgow line brings dates from Lisbon to the 22nd June. The general news is not of much importance; but the following summary is of interest—

The Daily News publishes a telegram from Berlin stating that fresh complications have arisen between the French and Prussian Governments, and that in consequence, the return of the French prisoners in Germany and the homeward march of the German troops have been simultaneously suspended. The Times Paris correspondent writes that the difficulty has arisen through the Germans objecting to the large garrison now in Paris, which, they say, greatly exceeds that stipulated in the treaty. No great importance is anywhere attached to this incident; nor is it thought the Germans have any just cause for complaint.

France is still far from tranquil, and there have been serious disturbances at Marseilles, the troops taking many prisoners. The French press condemns the attempt of the Bishops of Cambrai and Arras to raise fresh complications by soliciting the Assembly to interfere in favor of the Papal temporalities while the country is still prostrated through the effects of a disastrous foreign war and internal dissensions, and while a great part of its territory is still occupied by the conqueror.

The lower classes in Brussels have been making political demonstrations; at one time the riots assumed such a serious aspect that the 'Garde Civile' had to turn out and charge the mob with the bayonet; several persons were wounded and 60 prisoners taken. The Versailles Assembly has re-established the law on the manufacture and sale of arms.

The bill authorizing the new loan has passed the Assembly. An amendment to the bill was introduced and approved, for giving to Savings Banks depositors Government scrip for the amount of their deposits. On the discussion of another amendment Sr. Pereira declared that the Finance Commissioners were firmly resolved to always oppose any attempt to emit paper money.

The Courts-martial at Versailles have divided the prisoners into two classes for trial, viz., the leaders of all ranks, and the rank and file; it is thought the former will be severely dealt with.

The Germans are about to erect three fortresses of the first class on the banks of the Rhine; also several minor ones through Alsace and Lorraine. The plans were drawn up by Count Moltke and approved unanimously by the Council of War.

The political news from Austria show the peoples of that heterogeneous empire to be still exhibiting tendencies opposed to the consolidation of the nation.

On the Pope's anniversary the city of Madrid was 'en fete.' From every house flags, banners and flowers hung during the day, and brilliant illuminations were displayed at night. The disturbances reported were caused by a mob of 400 men and boys who marched through the streets crying 'down with the Pope,' 'put out the lights!' This crowd knocked down all the lamps and decorations displayed outside the churches, and sacked the houses of the Count of Santiago, the Countess of Berrios, and that of a well known banker. The Government laid the whole blame of these disgraceful scenes on the Municipality, and turned out that body 'en masse,' also several other high functionaries. In Barcelona there were also disturbances on the same day, but at no other places.

On the morning of the 22nd June his Majesty the Emperor of Brazil, accompanied by his august Consort, the Duke of Saxe, and a brilliant retinue, left Lisbon for Badajoz. The ftes at Lisbon during the sojourn of the illustrious travellers in that city were the most magnificent ever witnessed in Portugal, and cost an enormous sum of money.

The deaths from small pox in all parts of the United Kingdom are declining rapidly. In London the total mortality from the epidemic was 14,000 persons, and in Newcastle, Liverpool, Sunderland, and other places an average of five per 1000.

The census returns give the population of London on the 2nd of April last at 3,251,804, an increase in 10 years of 447,815 people.

Colonel Count Waldersee has been appointed German Chargé d'Affaires near the French Government.

LATEST TELEGRAMS. London June 22 (2 p.m.).

M. Thiers' speech on the financial situation has produced an excellent impression. Two hundred millions of francs will be annually laid by an amortization fund. It is believed the loan will be a great success.

The trial of Rochefort will commence on Monday.

The New Prussian Gazette says that the Berlin Government has brought officially under the notice of the Roman Court the attitude of the Catholic party in the German Parliament, and that Cardinal Antonelli replied in the most energetic terms that the Papal Government had nothing whatever to do with the matter.

The Italian Chambers have approved the bill for the reorganization of the army.

Paris 20th. The Government has authorized the re-establishment of the telegraph wires in the Department of the Seine et Oise. Communication will at once be resumed on all the lines in working order.

The Minister of Justice has issued a circular declaring that he will call for the dismissal of any magistrate who becomes a candidate for a seat in the Assembly.

The Left Moderate Republican party, in consequence of its late manifesto, has strengthened itself by 16 votes.

Daily News publishes a despatch from Berlin stating that fresh complications have arisen between Versailles and Berlin.

German troops halted on homeward march, and return of French prisoners from Germany suspended.

Riots in Brussels; troops charged populace with the bayonet; 60 prisoners and several wounded.

Madrid, 21st. It is believed a Progressist Ministry will be formed.

Versailles, 21st. Assembly discussing loan bill; savings bank depositors to receive government stock. M. Pereira declares against paper money now and always.

London 21st, 2 o'clock. Times correspondent telegraphs that the grand review of the troops will not take place, as the German say the army of Paris is much stronger than stipulated by treaty.

The Comte de Chambord has published a proclamation giving the highest praise to Marshal McMahon and the Versailles troops.

Archbishop of Cambrai and Bishop of Arras want the Assembly to interfere in favour of the Pope's temporalities.

General feeling against interference. Many rioters captured at Marseilles.

BUENOS AYRES RELIEF FUND. COLLECTIONS IN BRAZIL.

The Diario Oficial of Rio Janeiro contains the following correspondence between Viscount Rio Branco on the part of the Brazilian Government and the Count of Bonfim, chairman of the Aid Committee for Buenos Ayres. It will be seen that the amount received was \$2,500 sterling, which we believe was as much as collected in the city of Buenos Ayres itself.

Whenever the history of the Plague of 1871 is written, a page in golden letters must be reserved for the purpose of recording the munificence of those friends who came to our assistance, in London, Rio Janeiro, New York, and last but not least, Montevideo.

The correspondence to which we allude is as follows:— To H. Ex. Viscount Rio Branco. Rio Janeiro, June 10th.

The B. Ayres Relief Committee has the honour to inform your Excellency that it has resolved in yesterday's session, seeing that the plague has almost ceased at Buenos Ayres, and as we are not likely to receive any more donations, that our task be now declared at an end; and before dissolving our body we beg to hand over the balance in hand, 24,304 milreis, with the annexed note for the Argentine Minister; at the same time requesting Barou Mauá, as treasurer of our body, to hand over in like manner, whatever sums may hereafter be received. And as your Excellency was the initiator of this charitable effort in favour of Buenos Ayres, which has found such enthusiastic support from all, we have resolved to inform you of the happy result; at the same time that we deplore a certain disagreeable occurrence which has prematurely obliged us to suspend our labours.

BRAZILIAN STATISTICS. The official reports just published contain valuable statistics, which give an accurate idea of the growing prosperity of the Brazilian Empire.

The population of the Municipality of Rio, without the suburbs, according to the census taken in April, 1870, was 235,381; namely—

The military colonies of Brazil continue a failure, owing in part to vicissitudes of administration, and in part to their location in wilds, without any provision being made to furnish an outlet for their products.

At the penal settlement on the island of Fernando de Noronha the number of persons on the 1st of January was 1709, consisting of—

The first rail of the Jundiaby and Campinas Railway was laid on the 12th of June.

In the city of Rio de Janeiro the mortality during 1870 was 10,214, against 8,688 in 1869. The deaths from yellow fever were 1117, from its breaking out in December, 1869, to its extinction in June, 1870.

Of the 10,214 deaths, 6587 were of males, and 3,627 of females; 8,200 were free, 1,940 slaves, and 74 unknown; Brazilians 6,206, foreigners 3,829, unknown 179. One hundred and five were of ages between 85 and 100 years.

From December, 1869, to March, 1870, 1307 seamen attacked by yellow fever were received in the hospitals, of whom 303 died, being a mortality of 23 per cent.

During the year 1870, 182,686 milreis was granted by the Government to furnish assistance to the indigent poor in localities afflicted by epidemics or famine.

During the same year the founding hospital received 601 children. The total number received in the house was 737, of whom 271 left, 137 remained, and 329 died, being a mortality of 44 per cent.

The Government telegraphic lines of Brazil have a total length of 2,080 kilometres. They are those of—

The Rio Custom-house returns for the fiscal year ending June 30th show receipts of 32,675,564 milreis, against 30,114,100 milreis in the preceding year 1869-70. Of the receipts of 1870-71, 25,568,282 milreis was from importation, against 23,572,572 in 1869-70; and 7,107,282 milreis from imports, against 5,541,517 in 1869-70. Comparing the respective halves of

the two years there was a decrease of 1,095,700 milreis from importation, and of 335,035 from exportation in the first half of 1870-71; but an increase of 3,005,269 from importation, and of 900,789 from exportation, in the second half of 1870-71.

The Rio shipments of coffee during the ended half-year were 1,253,656 sacks, against 804,043 sacks in the corresponding half of 1870. The coffee crop of 1870-71 was 2,018,007 sacks, against 2,104,490 in 1869-70.

Senator Jose da Silva Maia died on the 3rd at the age of 83 years. He was a member of the Liberal party.

The last news from S. Paulo say that severe frost had occurred throughout the province, so severe that a large block of ice was sent from Jundiahy to Santos, and it is feared that the coffee trees are again injured.

The Government telegraph service cost in 1870 282,000 milreis, which would be 135 per kilometre, or 5,641 each station.

The Rio Gas Company consumed in 1870 18,013 tons of coal, producing 4,132,200 litres of gas. Public illumination took 1,835,153,344 litres.

The gross receipts of the D. Pedro II railway during the year 1870 were 4,440,010 milreis and the working expenses 1,875,110, leaving a balance of 2,575,900, in 1869 the receipts were 4,325,816, the expenses 1,875,661, and the surplus 2,450,154.

The number of passengers in 1869 was 822,406, and last year 791,426. The diminution during 1869 was due to the existence of yellow fever in Rio.

The railways and tramways already constructed in the Empire have the extent of 812 kilometres, exclusive of the Paris and Alagaus tramways, namely:—

In the last year the cost of the post office service was 733,012,860; the loss, therefore, being only 33,914,680. In 1869-70 the correspondence summed 9,729 letters, of which 5,746,430 were received and 3,982,675 despatched. That passing through the Rio post office numbered 5,150,154 namely: 3,428,577 received and 1,721,577 despatched. The letters &c. posted in Rio numbered 2,883,511, of which 1,141,015 were for delivery in the city itself.—Anglo Brazilian Times.

The complications between Versailles and Berlin are a mere flash in the pan; the great German Chancellor affecting to think the army of Paris too strong. A whaleboat, with a number of fugitives from the field of Manantiales, and which is known to have sailed from the Oriental coast with those already arrived here, is thought to have foundered during the passage, as it has not been heard of.

Mr. Latorze's tramway line in Calle Cangallo is now being pushed on to Calle Rivadavia, whence it will unite in Calle Defensa with the Boca line.

The Tribunal of Paysandu when saluting the Capt. and officers of the redoubtable war-cockleshell, Coquimbo, states that, that famous 'skimmer of the seas' would compare favorably with the best men-of-war of foreign states.

Such is the rush of the public to hear the debates at each sitting of the Convention that the press reporters cannot do their work, in fact often cannot get into the Sala.

The corpse of Dr. Seforans, who died of the plague, was exhumed on Wednesday night at the Chacarita cemetery and carried off, it is not known where. The 'resurrectionists' have not been captured, but the men on watch at the cemetery on the night in question have been imprisoned for complicity in the affair.

The select Committee named by the Provincial Chambers to consider the 'salero' question met on Thursday, but came to no decision on the matter. The Finance Minister was present and, it is said, made some important suggestions.

We are sorry to observe in our obituary column the name of Mr. MacMillan, for many years most favorably known in Montevideo as manager of the house of Messrs. Brownell and Co.

The fifth rehearsal by the Philharmonic Society, together with the Amateur Orchestra, for the charity concert in favour of the poor and orphans, will take place to-night, at seven o'clock precisely, at the Coliseum.

The leading Irish residents in the camp, at present in town, are requested to attend this afternoon, at 2 o'clock, at the residence of the Rev. Father Leahy, in Calle Reconquista, for the purpose of considering the raising of a monument to the memory of the late Canon Fahy.

The Juanita arrived yesterday from Bahia Blanca. Respecting the 1200 bullocks lately captured by the Indians while on their way from Bahia Blanca to Patagonia, for Messrs. Aguirre and Murga, it appears that the savages waited for the 'tropas' at Romero, a few miles from the Fortin Colorado, and killed the peons, who had not time to escape, subsequently driving off the cattle. Bahia Blanca is on the 'qui vive,' as every day horses and mares are stolen here and there, and such thefts are invariably the precursors of an invasion on a grand scale.

The question of removing the capital is assuming a more important aspect, and it is now very generally thought that the advocates for removal will make out a better case this year than they have yet done. The phase the question is entering seems to have affected adversely the price of the public funds, which were very weak yesterday.

THE FINANCE REPORT. The following correspondence has been exchanged between Sor. Riestra and the National Minister of Finance: 36 Calle Artes, July 17th, 1871.

In your interesting Finance Report to Congress an error has crept in—no doubt inadvertently—in treating of the London Loan of 1828, and it is necessary to rectify it, lest those unacquainted with the subject should remain under a false impression. The Report gives to understand that when said loan was arranged in 1827, interest on the over-due coupons was included.

These Bonds bore no interest whatever, nor was the amortization obligatory for the first four years; from 1861 they bore 1 per cent.; from 1866 2 per cent.; and from this year (1871) forward they will bear a maximum interest of 3 per cent.

The Government reserved to itself the right to increase the amortization fund at any time—even before the Bonds began to carry interest—and making use of this privilege in a year or so after the arrangement of the debt, redeemed a large amount of these Bonds at from 20 to over 30 per cent., or in other words, for a third or fourth part of the amount of its debt for interest, which was reduced thus from £1,641,000 to little more than £1,000,000 sterling.

The fill in this securities, whether real or fictitious, is ascribed to various causes. Some regard it as an act of speculation with the bears, others say it is in account of the sinister rumors about the London loan; others again, and these are the most numerous, attach great importance to the capital question, which, at present, a cloud no bigger than a man's hand, may bring unforeseen complications. The destinies of Buenos Ayres, however, to go far to be affected in a serious manner by even the removal of the seat of government, if such be resolved on.

The danger of a recurrence of that summer's pestilence is likely to weigh much more heavily against this city. In every other respect it is admitted on all hands that the prospects of the Republic are most flattering. Hence it may be inferred that other causes than political ones have tended to the apparent decline in National Bonds. The liquidation for the end of the month will be very trifling.

As an instance of the wonderful development of trade relations between this port and foreign countries, it is worthy of note that no fewer than six Ocean steamers from Europe are expected in port to-morrow.

The French packet, 'The Birch,' 'The Good Hope,' 'The Astarte,' 'The Halcyon.' The news per French packet is anxiously looked for, and she is probably already in Montevideo, but as the telegraph wires are still cut, there are no advices.

The Cassini goes up to Rosario for cargo, and on her return, about the 26th, will leave for New York. The 'Bella' is posted to sail for Havre on the 27th, and the 'Halcyon' for port on the 26th.

The 'Good Hope' will, on her return from Rosario, about the 31st, leave for Bordeaux and Havre. The 'Astarte' leaves on that date for Antwerp and Glasgow.

Malist morning from Montevideo brought official details of the recent victory over the Blancos. People take little or no interest in such news, as there seems to little hope that any battle however decisive can in the present condition of affairs bring peace even for twelve months to that distracted country.

Regarding the lighting of Belgrano with gas it is believed that Dr. Oguiza's concession will prove a paying concern. Much obscurity prevails as to the fate of the Belgrano tramway concession, but it seems some navies are at present laying down rails from the Old Market (Calle Peru) under the impression that it is a line to Belgrano. It is at least true that the Old Market was the point indicated for the starting-place of the proposed line to Belgrano, but the general

public is not yet aware that the concession has been given to anyone. There is some talk of lighting Flores with gas, but this will probably be done by the Gas Co. of the new Co. at Almagro has taken no action in the matter. It is said the pipes will be laid down simultaneously with the Belgrano tramway, and that they have been ordered from Europe.

In exchange on London £50,000 have been passed at 93 1/2. The Treasury payments for the first week of July contain these among other items—610 fms. to the Telmora for printing the President's Message; \$5,250 to Mr. Christopherson for a bridge over the Salado; \$5,000 fms. travelling expenses for Senators and Deputies; \$5,000 to Santiago Diaz for diligence subsidies.
