MANIFESTO OF THE MUNI-

CIPALITY.

TO THE CITIZENS OF BUENOS

AYRES.

The new Municipality of Buenos

Ayres is sensible of the immense res-

ponsibility of its office, but feels no

uneasiness except such as arises from

its want of means and imperfect or-

ganization. If the necessary elements

were at our disposal the enormous

task would still be as nothing. We

want those revenues which should of

right belong to the Municipality, and

then we should be able to meet every

requirement in a suitable manner.

Meantime everybody knows that

the Municipality has always been, and

still continues to be, under the finger

of the Government. Everything that

pertains to the order and health of

the city is thrown on our shoulders,

while our revenue and resources have

been crippled and embarrassed except

in times of danger when too much la-

zitude was sometimes given. As if

proper steps and organization can be

adopted in a panic!

The Municipality should depend

solely and exclusively from the citi-

zens, whose interests we are supposed

to protect, and means should be al-

ways at our disposal not merely for

the ordinary wants of the city, but

also for pressing emergencies. And

who can deny that the citizens have

always evinced the readiest co-opera-

tion, or doubt that they will continue

to do so. Nevertheless it is not in

moments of danger that such co-opera-

tion can be available, unless measures

have been taken previously. The

disastrous epidemic shewed this only

too plainly. The terrible lesson then

given to us demonstrated clearly that

the physical laws of health can never

be violated with impunity, and that

we had relied with foolishness too

long upon the admirable climate and

pure air of the Pampas.

Through our own neglect we have

vitiated everything and poisoned the

very air of Heaven. But how can

this be remedied all at once, with our

feeble efforts? Especially when we

have not even enough money to pay

our daily wants. The sanitary im-

provements that are called for will

involve immense labor and outlay; the

means at our disposal are insignificant.

The Municipality is head-over-ears in

debt, time presses, and yet we can

hardly undertake the simplest and

most urgent reforms.

We have to combat not merely the

filth of the city in all its bearings, but

also the moral corruption which sur-

rounds us on all sides. Let the citizens,

then, be convinced that the Muni-

cipality is powerless, and can do nothing

even for the most pressing require-

ments, without the co-operation of

each and all of the inhabitants.

Follow citizens! your interests are

at stake, if you would guard yourselves

from wholesale ruin. Put your shoul-

ders to the wheel and give us confi-

dence; in this way you will drive off

the bug-bear which is now driving

Europeans from our shores, and earn-

ing for the River Plate a name of pes-

tilence.

We have faith in Divine Providence

and in what we can ourselves do. We

intend at once to suspend all unhealth-

ful industries and put the city in a

clean condition. But it is not enough

for us to order this or that measure to

be carried out; it is necessary that

the neighbors in every 'cuadra' make

themselves health inspectors, and

every man be on his guard to see that

sanitary precautions are adopted both

in his own house and that next door.

What can the Board of Health do, if

the citizens will not themselves have a

regard for their health? We are go-

ing to do everything that the Corpora-

tion can do, but we want the cordia-

assistance of every man in the city.

We must then boldly face the two

enemies before us—the filth of the city

and the moral corruption that prevails.

Unhappily the epidemic came again

let it not be said that it was brought

our own culpable neglect. If the

Municipality can only count on the

individual co-operation of all parties

we are sure to achieve everything. It

is alike the interest of rich and poor,

for if we do not all join, heart and

hand, another crowning calamity will

befall us all.

Counting on your co-operation we

have re-organized the public service

and undertaken all that is possible



would bear re-arranging, uniting at the same time in a single legislative act the dispositions successively made. (A. des M., 1870, first part of vol. xvii, referring to official documents: Report of Engineer J. Ichon, page 43 and following.)

We have not been able to find among the documents we have here the said law of 1810; but various official publications, of which we give some in continuation, we think will suffice to show what we wish to be appreciated and adopted by the Legislature of San Juan, viz:—

That grants (concesiones) of mines should no longer be limited to the Ordenanzas de Mejico, imposed by the Kings of Spain during the last century, but should consist of whatever laws [reinas y mantos] be discoverable within a certain given circle, the plan of which were to be submitted to the proper and competent authorities, who should refuse, modify, or grant, according to the guarantees offered by the petitioners, after the necessary formalities.

In France all concessions of mines are made by decree of the Emperor or chief of the Executive power, that is, after deliberation by the Council of State, and careful investigations; especially a report made by the Prefect and General Council of the Department, and the Municipal Council of the locality where the neighbours and other persons interested in the matter are heard, together with the Mining Engineer of the Department, an Inspector General being sometimes sent expressly by the Minister of Public Works.

No fixed extent or form of country is adhered to; the surface is measured in square metres, hectares, and kilometres [note at end], but under certain circumstances the grant only refers to what is termed the "trifondo," that is, to the veins of ore which may exist in the bowels of the earth. So that the concessions include all mineral substances, of the class expressed in the decree, obtainable by regular underground works. As to ores in veins and lodes only the surface, in such positions as to be extractable by light of day [a la cila abierto], they are in some provinces left to the owner of the soil, with the proviso that the taking out of the ores in this way do not impede, either for the present or future, the extraction by subterranean workings of those to be found in depth.

The contribution payable to the owner of the soil is fixed at the outside at 10 cents of a franc per hectare [superficial], equivalent to about a quarter of a Bolivian real per square cañera annually.

By the special decree, or a subsequent one, if petitioned for by those interested, an arrangement may be made in favor of the owner of the soil, by which the estimated value of the royalty can be made payable in one sum at once or paid off in various instalments.

There is no difference in the conditions for grants, whether for coal, iron, or other mineral substance, as we shall show below, making the following extracts from the reports presented to the Senate and Legislative Corps in 1869 under the title of "Exposé de la situation de l'Empire" &c. [A. des M., Laws and Decrees, 1869; pp 92 and 93; and 1870, p 1 and following]:

The 1st of January, 1868, there were under consideration 112 petitions for grants, viz: 39 for coal and other combustible, 30 for iron of different sorts, and 43 for other mineral substances.

#### EDITOR'S TABLE.

We publish in another column the manifesto which the Municipality has addressed to the citizens of Buenos Ayres. This document sketches the situation with commendable candour and fidelity, exhibits the unexceptionable intentions of the Corporation and confidence in itself to carry them out, while admitting that Providence and the Provincial Government alone know how the necessary funds are to be raised. However, if the inhabitants of this city attend to hygienic rules "chez eux," while the Town Council keeps an active watch over public sanitary arrangements, it is within the bounds of possibility that we may have no special disease or increase in the average mortality of the city during the coming summer.

The temperature changed violently on Thursday night. About 8 o'clock it began to blow, and at midnight a stiff, cold "pampero" sent clouds of blinding dust though the streets. The thermometer yesterday was 12 degrees below its mark on Thursday, but the weather was fine and healthy. There is but little sign of rain, however, and the anxiety of sheepfarmers is daily on the increase.

We wish to call the special attention of our country subscribers to an important sale of Rambouillet rams, to come off on Thursday next the 28th inst., under the direction of Mr. Nazar, the well known auctioneer. The animals to be disposed of are some of the best bred in this country, being of the famed Cabaña of Mr. Wilfred Latham. The reputation of the breeder guarantees the condition of the animals, and we learn from parties who have recently inspected them that it is impossible to find in the River Plate rams better adapted to the present wants of wool growers. We therefore advise our camp friends not to miss the sale. The Superior Tribunal has issued an order that the "escritorios" who hold the keys of any of the houses closed during the plague shall attend, to open them on any day the police require, in order that they may be at once fumigated and disinfected. No excuse

whatever will be taken from the notaries, not even that of "urgent private affairs," though it is well known that some members of the guild have lately had a good deal of very private occupation on hands.

The regularity observed for some time past in the starting and arrival of the trains on the Western Railway is subject of satisfaction to the travelling public. Not so long ago trains half an hour behind time were by no means unusual, now 'tout cela est changé.' We understand this improvement is due to the energy and ability of Don Enrique Peña, the new Traffic Manager, who, although very young, is evidently up to the work, and the right man in the right place.

We feel great pleasure in saluting our quondam colleague Don Juan Cruz Varela, who arrived from Europe in the packet, is now in Montevideo, and may be expected here to-morrow.

Some uneasiness was reported to have been caused yesterday in the Ministry of the Interior by several stalwart campmen, with 'shillelaghs' under their arms, being observed walking up and down for some time opposite the National Government House. Many people supposed they were about to "interview" Dr. Velez, but no such audience took place up to a late hour.

Nilsson, the celebrated singer, is now making a tour in the United States, being paid at the rate of 100,000 frs. a month, or nearly £50,000 a year. Not many years ago her occupation was that of an itinerant singer in the streets of Stockholm.

Mr. John Hannah, whose name will always remain conspicuously connected with the full development of sheep-breeding in the River Plate, is about to return to his native land. This announcement will be received with regret by Mr. Hannah's legion of friends, who will join us in wishing him a pleasant voyage to 'home, sweet home' and many long years of health to enjoy the independent fortune which he has won by his abilities and industry. Letters from the partido of Navarro announce that district is in a very disturbed and uncomfortable state owing to the number of bad and dangerous characters allowed to wander about by the authorities. Within the last ten days eight murders were committed, without anything been heard of the perpetrators.

Lady Blanche Noel, eldest daughter of the Earl of Gainsborough, who lately eloped with an Irish gentleman named Murphy, her music master, is now moving in fashionable circles in New York, to which port the runaway couple took steamer passages from Liverpool immediately after marriage. The gentleman has succeeded in obtaining the appropriate appointment of organist to the Church of Holy Innocents' in New York.

The land auctions advertised for to-morrow are more numerous than on any day since the land 'furore' set in. At San Martin, Flores, Belgrano, Almagro, Floresta, &c., &c., "manzanas" and plots of more or less value and extent will be put up for sale by the best known auctioneers of this city. Our advertising columns contain full particulars of most of the lands to be sold, hours at which the express trains start, where "no refreshments" repel "flaneurs," and where "arrogant lunces" may be had for the asking.

The French packet Giroude entered port yesterday morning, but there was most unnecessary delay in the delivery of her mails, which were not distributed till a late hour. If the authorities were a little more active the formality of fumigating the mails might be got through in one-tenth the time now wasted in that operation, or in some other way, probably with the view of impressing on the public that the sanitary precaution has been excellently well taken.

The Santa Fé Government has marked out a new district, to be called Melincú, between the Puntas de Melincú and Sepulturas. The Italian settlers at the San Carlos Colony gave a grand banquet on the 12th inst. to the Italian Vice-Consul, Captain of the Port, Juez de Paz, and other local celebrities. The affair passed off in the most brilliant manner.

Considerable alarm was caused in Santa Fé last week by a passenger afflicted with small-pox being allowed to land from one of the river steamers. As yet the dread disease has not made any progress in the city.

The Zaconi opera troupe is making a tour of the riverine towns with considerable success. The company is at present in Corrientes.

A number of gentlemen interested in beef preserving assembled yesterday at the Belgian Consulate, 163 San Martin, to witness the opening of some specimens sent out from Belgium a few months ago. The samples were prepared in three different ways, viz: in tin cases, glass jars, and small barrels; having been packed more than a year since. The meat in glass jars, air-tight, came out in excellent condition, just as if cut from a newly killed animal. That in tins, packed all round with grease, was the same, preserving the look, smell and characters of butcher's meat, without the least trace of chemicals. The beef in barrels was bad, emitting a shocking smell; but Mr. Pecher thinks if more care had been taken in the packing, it would have turned out as perfect as the other samples, than which nothing could be finer.

DARD, as the most innocent looking cover he could select; but it wouldn't do; the hawk's eye of the Customs official penetrated the disguise, and the tickets were lost to the Buenos Ayrean public.

A 'luccion' is announced for to-morrow at Ensenada. We hear that some enterprising boat owners intend to run schooners up and down for the benefit of excursionists. Should the day be fine, the sail is an enjoyable one.

A tramway from the town of San Vicente to the station of the same name on the Southern Railway is spoken of, and the Board of the Railway in London, we understand, is being consulted on the subject.

The National Government is about to act on the supposition that the Cordoba Exhibition is worth seeing, and intends to give all its employees one week's holidays to permit of their paying it a visit. If so, chaos may be expected in all the Government offices on and after the 8th October next.

Although Dr. Velez Sarsfield says the Central Argentine Railway 'ne vaut rien,' it is generally up to the mark in emergencies. The travelling restaurant which the manager has ordered to be fitted up for the accommodation of visitors to the Exhibition is a splendid affair. In addition to the most 'recherché' viands, and wines from mountainous Rioja, the 'blue Mollie,' the Tagus, and the Rhine, chess, backgammon, and other games will be provided, so that the moral and material man, or woman either, will be amply cared for. Three breakfasts will be laid every day at 9, 10, and 11 a.m.; as for the number of diners, we are afraid to mention them. Six 'plats' at the former meal and nine at the latter we think ought to satisfy the most arrogant appetite, whetted to its very fiercest capacity by the Pampa breeze.

All the aforesaid advantages are to be had for two and a half pats, which even Dr. Sarsfield will admit is cheap. The Provincial papers contain announcements of Indians and 'gauchos malos' wandering about the upper provinces on the various frontiers, robbing and murdering pretty much as they like. In Mendoza several outrages have been reported.

Advices from Fray Bentos report a great demand for wool up there. Buyers from Buenos Ayres are scouring about the camp; but the estancia owners are wary, and have not yet sold in any quantity, notwithstanding the large prices offered them.

The Prov. Government has further extended the time for payment of the Contribucion Directa to the 30th inst. Messrs. Rubio and Foley, the well known steamboat agents, have petitioned Government for a concession for a line of railway from the Plaza Once to the River Lujan.

The Bond market ruled very quiet to-day. Both bulls and bears seem to be brought to a stand. There was nothing sold cash. For Saturday 16,000 at 72. For September 30th 7,200 at 72. For October 25th 500 at 70½. But these sales, after all, are merely nominal. The market is in the most critical state. A large seller could drive prices down sensibly, whilst, on the other hand, a good buyer would at once drive up the market.

Exchange ruled to-day at 50½, at which rate there was a good deal done.

In Argentine Bank shares 5 sold at 8 per cent premium. City of Buenos Ayres Tramway shares, 80 sold at 15 per cent.

The auction of four squares of land on Sunday at San Martin, by Mr. Ramella, is attracting attention, through the advantageous situation of the land, which is very high, level, and immediately on the railway line.

The sale of the cattle on the estancia of Don Juan N. Fernandez is announced. It is one of the most important sales of the day, and has been concluded by Mr. Felix Pico, broker. The price paid for the cattle is 105, and the land—40 square leagues—has been rented on lease to the purchaser of the stock, Mr. Decoud. The total amount of this important sale is eight millions currency.

The telegram from Montevideo announced the sale of Mr. Prange's wool at 55 1/2, but we learn on good authority it is not the wool of the estancia that has been sold.

Col. Mateo Martinez, in order to save his stock from being swept off by the Blanco troops, has sold it all—3500 sheep at 81 cents, cattle 6 pats. mares 3 pats, pigs 4 pats.

In the South Market to-day 3000 capons were sold at 45.

The latest intelligence from the Havre wool market is as follows:—A fair amount of business doing, the manufacturers making daily purchases to meet their immediate wants. Montevideo wools chiefly sought for at an advance of 10 centims on the price at July auctions. Holders are very firm, and will not give way. Antwerp wools, 25,000 bales of all kinds were sold at an advance of from 10 to 15 centims. Stock at Havre, 5,000 bales Buenos Ayres, and 2,200 Montevideo.  
The Liverpool steamer Ariel is expected down from Rosario in a few days, she will take a full homeward cargo.  
The French mail steamer Sindh, having some slight damage in a storm after leaving Rio and stopped at Bahia to repair, but the damage was undervalued and was trifling.  
It appears now that there is not the least probability of Congress despatching one half of the business at present before the House this session, and as both Chambers will be closed within a fortnight, many of the most important projects will have to stand over until next year. The law authorizing the removal of the capital will not be voted by the Executive as appears by the statement of parties who have spoken with the President on the subject.  
The Provincial Government has extended the period for the payment of the Contribucion Directa or property tax to the 30th inst., this was most necessary, as owing to the crowd at that office hundreds had to go away daily without being able to get into the office in question.

Three large estancias in the west are now offered for sale in the market. The land is offered at a tolerably fair price, but the prices asked for the sheep are considerably over the market rates.

Mr. John Hannah, Mr. and Mrs. Welchman, and several other well known foreign residents will leave for Europe in the next English mail.

Mr. Amorin, the manager of the Maut Bank in this market, has left for Rosario on business connected with the branch in that city.

Several more sales of wool on contract in the Banda Oriental are reported. About Fray Bentos, Paysandu, and along the Uruguay buyers from Montevideo are making large contracts, the average prices paid being from 34 to 38 reales per kilo. But a few months ago good lots of wool in the district of Soriano were sold at 22 reales. For the same wool on contract now 37 and even 38 reales are paid, the wool deliverable on the estancia.

The Flores tramway, it seems, will not be ready for traffic on the 1st, owing to the great length of the line and the delay attending the pounding of the macadam well before the horses are driven over it. It is stated that no less than 200 new houses are now being constructed in the neighbourhood of Flores.

An experienced shipbroker is of opinion that the statement as to the great saving of freight to the farmers by the new system of washing wool is exaggerated; that as wool goes by measurement, washed or dirty wool will occupy much about the same space, and that in this country where water is so scarce and labor so dear, two primary articles, it will after all hardly pay the estancia owners to wash their wool outside, since for a tenth of the cost it can be better done in Europe, and more to the satisfaction of manufacturers. Some parties insist that the liquid used for washing the wool is simply what is termed potato water.

Mr. Wheelright is expected next month. The works of the Ensenada Railway are now being pushed ahead with vigor, and the people in Quilmes are in the greatest spirits at the near prospect of a railway.

The owners of the fine steamer Republica have entered into an arrangement with the manager of the Central Argentine Railway, whereby the train for Cordoba will take the passengers on immediately after the arrival of the steamer at the railway wharf. From the 1st of October the Republica will leave Buenos at 10 o'clock every Thursday morning, arriving at Rosario early on the following day. At 7.30 p.m. the train will leave Rosario with the passengers for Cordoba. Fare from Buenos Ayres to Cordoba and back has been fixed at 38 patacons first class; the tickets hold for a month. The Republica is well known as one of the fastest and finest steamers on the river.

The latest commercial and financial advice by the packet are as follow:—

An unusual degree of quietness has prevailed in the discount market, with an equally remarkable scarcity of first-class commercial paper. Rates are quoted in Lombard-street at 1½ per cent, and no demand for advances is proceeding from the Stock Exchange. Business at the Bank is almost nil. The stock markets have been very quiet, and the amount of business done has been unimportant. The funds have shown no change. As to foreign stocks, the tendency has been firm, notwithstanding the paucity of business. American securities have shown few or no special features, but considerable interest is manifested in the new funded loan offered in another paragraph. In British railway stocks the variations have not been great, but most of the changes have been of a favourable character. At the Bank, to-day, £78,000 in gold was received, while 19,000 sovereigns were taken out for Oporto. The Cauda will leave for the East to-morrow with £90,078 in specie. In the foreign exchange the rates on Paris were not quite so favourable to this country.

Consols remain unaltered, at 93½ to 93½, for money and account. Foreign bonds closed without change. In American securities the new Funding Loan was 3½ to 4½ per cent, but otherwise this market was featureless.

We understand that the success of the Seventy-five Million Dollars United States Loan, advertised in another column, is already assured. A Government which has within five years redeemed nearly 600 millions of the obligations created in the conduct of a great war, and which has at the same time largely cut down the fiscal burdens of the people, stands in a position to command the confidence of investors. The association of the house of Jay, Cooke and Co., with the negotiation of the loan is another circumstance that is not likely to be overlooked. It seems fitting that the banking house, which in the United States acted between the Government and the people during the war, should now be the medium for introducing a United States loan to the British public.

The wool market continues firm: staplers are careless about selling except at late advanced rates, but most of the spinners being well supplied not many sales are effected. The continued excitement in the wool trade is rendering the course of business here both for spinners and buyers very difficult to manage. They are all well employed to order, and we hear of orders that have run out, both in yarns and goods, being replaced at thankful advanced demand. In fact, no other course is open to them, as there is already the usual autumn scarcity of goods beginning to be felt.
