First—Bills and obligations with good signatures are discounted on conventional terms.

Second—Money is advanced on mortgage and other securities approved by the Manager.

Third—Accounts current are opened with Merit.

Fourth—Other parties who may prefer depositing their money in a safe account, may do so, and watch their money grow up to an amount previously estimated, on conditions established for such class of operations.

Finally—Money is received in account current, and being interest from day to day, which is accumulated in favor of the depositor, every three months the depositors being allowed to retire at any time, by means of cheques, part or the full amount, as they wish, when the quantity of bills and obligations is such as to require the depositors to be paid in full, in which case forty thousand dollars of bills are required to be given to the Treasury of the Bank.

Fifth—Bills or letters of credit are drawn and taken on Montevideo, Rosario, Sta. P. de Salto, Oriental, Paysandú, Tacuarembó, and other places in the Brazil, England and France, as also on other places, of which notice will be given hereafter.

Finally, the Bank undertakes and executes all legitimate transactions within the orbit of banking operations, and the establishment is always open from 10 a.m. till 3 p.m.

THE TRIUMPH OF RIGHT.

The vote of the House of Deputies on last Saturday has settled the Capital question. The President's veto now stands, and the bill goes over for another year. It speaks much for the good sense of Congress that in such a thick atmosphere of political prejudice there was a sufficient number of members to sustain the veto.

Congressmen must have seen that the whole feeling of the influential portion of the community was opposed to the mad scheme of removing the capital to such a shocking spot as Villa Maria. Even in the provinces themselves the measure was ridiculed; for we find that Rosario, which may be regarded as the real capital of the Upper Provinces, turned out 'en masse' to celebrate with fireworks and illuminations the President's veto.

It was well known in every circle that the members of Congress had met this year fully resolved to settle the Capital question one way or the other. To oppose the majority was therefore idle, and the only possible way to defeat the proposed removal was to suggest a ridiculous compromise, which met with an universal public sneer.

It is difficult to imagine where next our legislators will think of moving to, but as we have a year's grace, and the map of the Republic is large, there will be little difficulty in selecting some more convenient spot than Villa Maria. The defeat of this bill at this session suggests the idea that the capital will always remain in Buenos Ayres, inasmuch as it will be next to impossible to get Congress and the Executive to agree on a site, and to overcome the veto it is equally impossible to get the majority required by law; thus the capital question will prove like the prayers for rain by the Congregationalist clergyman, who advised his parish that as soon as all his parishioners were of accord he would pray for rain. They never, however, could be all found of the same mind; hence the efficacy of the rev. gentleman's prayers was never put to the test.

The chief regret that is experienced about this capital question is the immense waste of public time which its discussion causes every session. Congress is now about to adjourn, and yet the President finds it necessary to extend the time allowed by law, in order to pass certain bills, which of right should have been despatched in the first week of the session.

There are piles of projects on the table of the house that should have been discussed this session, but which must now stand over until next year. In this respect the country is a loser by the eternal debates on this capital question. The result of the bill this year settles one point, however, and that is, that if the capital has to be removed it must be to some of the cities of the Republic, and not to the deserts wilds, such as Villa Maria.

We congratulate the country on the vote of the House last Saturday night, it shows after all the admirable working of the Republican safety valve; so long as knotty questions are thus decided, the reign of law and order in the country is guaranteed, and revolution and civil war are things of the past.

FIVE MILLIONS TO SPARE!

When Dr. Varela published the prospectus of the last loan in London he put down 14 millions for the Railway to Tucuman, but now it is arranged between the Government and Congress to make the line on the narrow gauge at a cost of 8 1/2 to 9 millions. Here we find an unforeseen difficulty to arise, namely that there will be 5 million dollars, or one million sterling, without any definable purpose. Minister Dominguez has solemnly declared that not a dollar of the London loan shall be applied to any other end than those expressed in the programme of Public Works.

He certainly never foresaw a surplus of a million sterling in one item alone, and we suppose he will be ready to give a little latitude to his declaration, by admitting the expediency of devoting the surplus to works of public utility similar to those in the programme.

Five millions patacones, wisely expended, may be made productive of much good. It is true we wasted 40 millions in the Paraguayan war; per haps we could not help it. And even the Entre-Rios revolution has cost us a pretty round sum. It is, however, now time to begin investing the public money to better purpose, and with 5 millions to spare a number of useful purposes crowd upon our mind.

The first and most natural suggestion is, that as the Provinces are going to reap most of the benefits of the new loan, while the people of Buenos Ayres will have to pay most of the interest and amortization, the best thing to do with any surplus is to improve and beautify the capital.

The city of Buenos Ayres owes everything to private enterprise, nothing to its rulers. It has not a decent public building except such as the old Spaniards have left, or such as owe their origin to joint-stock companies. It has no People's Park, no promenades, no proper edifices for hospitals, Prisons, Poor Asylum, Emigrants home, &c. &c. It has, in a word nothing that becomes a wealthy and enlightened city of 200,000 souls.

The provincial Legislature has just passed a beggarly loan of 10 million dollars for city improvements, when 3 times that amount would not have been too much. Meantime householders and property-owners are so miserably that they grudge even the 10 millions recently voted, and we have knowledge of certain parties who are now living in Europe on the rents of their houses in Buenos Ayres and who write to their friends here opposing any fresh taxes, or loans, or expenditure for city improvement. So long as the landlords, and especially absentee landlords, get their rents to live on they care very little about anything else.

Under these circumstances it is manifest that Buenos Ayres can never expect to become a clean, healthy or handsome city, unless the National Congress and Executive devote some portion of the public moneys towards the improvement of the capital. It is, moreover, the only regular in their power for the hospitality which Buenos Ayres affords them. Hitherto they have looked on as spectators at 3 destructive epidemics which have carried off one-fourth of our population.

The foreign residents of Buenos Ayres pay more than half the taxes, and whether as proprietors or artisans have almost rebuilt the city. But the National Government has done nothing; it has not presented a single project (except the unlucky port-scheme)

for the improvement of the city; it has made no provision for immigrants, but thrown them upon our shore pêle-mêle. Congress has always considered Buenos Ayres and its local requirements as beneath the notice of an enlightened legislature. And when an epidemic appears these legislators from the Upper Provinces keep 1000 miles away and leave us to our fate.

MR. HOPKINS' SCHEME.

Commercial and Political Considerations in favor of the Argentine Republic.

The commerce of the River Plate with Brazil is against her as mine to her, she taking ten, and returning in her productions only one [a]; the balance is paid in gold and silver. True political economy so legislates as to equalize as far as possible the debit and credit sides of international commercial transactions, when it is impossible to have the balance on your own side. This commerce is exclusively made up of articles of first necessity among men, such as timber, coffee, sugar, spirits, rice, tobacco, &c., all of which can be produced of better quality at the head waters of their own noble streams; and floating down from thence so soon as the way is open for them, they would also be cheaper in price. If the exchanges would still be against the Argentines, it would be entirely compensated by the constant increase of traffic expenses through such a great distance of their territory, and by the ramifications of commercial activity through a thousand channels, in such wise that the whole of this commerce might be figuratively called Argentine. Yet, again, any balance against us would be paid to people of our own language, formerly of our own political family, and still of our own political constellation, and who then—not till then—would be struggling hand in hand with us, to the greater perfection of the Republic, which, by the bye, it sadly needs.

It is not too much to assert that the advent of Bolivia in the Rio de la Plata would still all jarring passions, and make the Republic evermore too strong to fear any rival interests or hostile political intrigues. A unity of material interests will do more to restore harmony among brothers than all the civil commotions since the world began—and it is a great deal cheaper to spend money in railways than in civil wars. Then the unseen hand of secret foes will lose its power for harm, and untold millions of foreign capital, with its skilled labor and varied machinery, will make the deserted shores of our rivers to 'blossom like the rose.'

No wiser decree ever emanated from the hand of his Catholic Majesty than that which joined Alto Peru to the Vice-Royalty of the Rio de la Plata, for climate decided the question before him, in peopling the western water-sheds of the Plate, and not those of the Amazon. Had he followed it up by opening and peopling the route proposed by your memorialist, far different would have been the history of these countries. But if the ungovernable passions of men have changed all this, under the present light of commerce and civilization, which seeks not to cling to the past, but to educate the future, there is no reason why the most intimate commercial alliance, a true Zollverein, should not henceforward be the rule between Bolivia and the Argentine Republic.

The question of limits is the only one as yet unsettled between them, and certainly it is not too much to hope, and to believe, that under the aid proposed by your memorialist, these could be arranged in a few days. Bolivia would not refuse the Argentine agent who opened his hand to her in this wise, for the sake of a barren pride to possess a few more leagues of deserted country, to which, by the dictates of international law, she has no right. Between the resuscitation from lethargy to strong health, and a lingering, but sure, death, the choice is easy and certain. Again, in the late political changes in that country new hopes have sprung up for her people, that they will never again fall so low as during the last bloody dictatorship. Action and reaction being the invariable rule of all nature, now is the moment for success in these plans.

Along the line of the proposed railway, and on the lands conceded to it, would grow up flourishing towns and cities, cutting in two the barbarous Chaco by a line of modern industry. Thus has it happened with the Central Union Pacific Railway, in the United States, and so good has the speculation proved itself—first inaugurated by the Illinois Central Railway—with only reference to the lands, that it is fully proved that the existence of those roads creates more than sufficient wealth to pay their liabilities before they fall due; and already several hundred miles of the Northern

Pacific Railway, from Lake Superior to Oregon, are finished, whilst the rest is under rapid construction from both extremes; and the Southern Pacific Railway, from Texas to San Diego, California, is seeking its charter from the American Congress.

Then, again, you do much to bring back our brothers of the Banda Oriental to the great commercial alliance. If the Northern Railway of B. Ayres, and the project for wharves and the opening of the Arroyo del Capitan, at San Fernando, originated by your memorialist in the service of these same ideas, will give a secure port to the river trade destined to B. Ayres, a future railway to Figueroitas will bring to Montevideo, and throughout the interior, all those articles above enumerated as necessities, which she now takes from Brazil, thus releasing her for ever from the thrall under which she has groaned so long [b].

The grave lies unseen between us and the object which we reach after; where one man lives to enjoy the good he has in view, ten thousand are out off in the pursuit of it.

And thus it happens that one hope no sooner dies within us than another arises in its stead. But either by reason of their emptiness, or the natural inequitude of the mind, we have no sooner gained one point than we extend our hopes to another. We still find new inviting scenes and landscapes lying behind those which at a distance terminated our view.

A new era in paving came in by the substitution of wood for stone; its vast superiority in some respects is balanced by its defects. The wooden pavement seems to have been first used in Russia, afterwards in Vienna, New York, &c.

Cordoba, in Spain, was paved in 850 by Abdorrahman II, the fourth Spanish Caliph. And yet 1800 has passed, and B. Ayres remains a puddle. At Dijon, in 1391, 1424 paviers were employed. The clouds went on slowly accumulating in great masses in the west; 5 a.m. struck, when a dull yet frightful sound was heard far off to the westward. A minute afterwards the storm broke in an awful form. It began with a sound like the discharge of heavy artillery, with lightning. The Pampero wind swept over with unusual violence and fury, bringing with it a cloud of stones, such as never had been seen before. These stones were as big as goose eggs, fell everywhere, very few being as small as that of a pigeon. Houses, huts and roofs of all sorts, suffered terribly, some were knocked over, others unroofed, and all injured.
