"The conduct of the government towards the Central Argentine Railway has been established every one; it has allowed a lone internal injury to the credit of your country here, and it persisted in will ruin it in this manner. Not even the most insignificant enterprise with a 7 per cent. government guarantee could be floated in this market to-day, if the law be passed."

Verily this is a pretty state of things, with our government houses full of schemes and projects, and petitions for concessions for every imaginable enterprise. Waste paper and crushed most formal compromise civilized nations can enter into this day, and because the people were right, the government wrong, and Congress sinned.

CORDOBA. Gold quartz crushing in the department Cruz del Eje. Gold mining is not less and perhaps more subject than other things to the mutability of human affairs; individually the undertaking at present commented upon forms no exception to the dogma. In the first article of the above heading it was stated with regard to the machinery which should have been placed some days before, had not an occurrence of a vexing nature intervened. When most of the necessities were sent from Rosario, the headquarters of the capitalists interested in this concern, the band to connect the steam-engine with the machine was not forwarded. A Scotchman, who had been selected to go to Cordoba either to wait the arrival of the band from Rosario or get one made. So many days elapsed without the return of the messenger that at last the manager decided to go to Cordoba. Meanwhile reports of the murder of a foreigner on the road reached the district; whether such a crime took place or not the Scotchman was not the victim.

It appears he obtained a band and started on the return journey, but near the high pass over the first Sierra on the shortest road to the quartz gold-fields, he was overtaken by the Evil One. His Satanic Majesty successfully tempted the miner, who left the leather band with some people at a spot called Reduccion, telling them he had returned to Cordoba for something he had forgotten. There he departed by sea again after his first departure by several persons, and afterwards followed up to a French house in the town, where a French house in the town, where a sum of money and Mexican saddle, were not discovered. A more vigorous search was not made, as it was deemed of more importance to commence work without further delay; the manager with the recovered band at once returned to the scene of his labours, making a very rapid journey on horseback.

When the machine was first started the quickly repeated shocks caused by the falling stampers were so severe that after an hour's work crushing was discontinued as the collapse of the frame-work was imminent. Algorroba was at once hewn, of which timber beams were fashioned and placed laterally to strengthen the framework. The work recommenced August 3rd, and an energetic manager stated that he was provisional adjustment to keep the machine at work, and that an entirely new timber would be erected. This machine was originally in the Cordoba Exhibition, whence it was withdrawn by permission.

When sent there it was stated to be capable of crushing ten tons of quartz per diem. Theory and practice are often at variance; the result is the machine has on some occasions with difficulty been made to crush half that amount and the average daily work has been much less than 5 tons. At first the quartz before being broken up small to throw into the battery was burnt; it is believed this has been abandoned without disadvantage. Very little time elapsed before the discovery was made that gold was lost. A fact easily verified by one with no knowledge either of mining or machinery, by simply taking a handful of the ore, wherein minute particles of gold were discerned. The loss may have resulted from the coarseness of mesh of the wire sieve, through which the crushed quartz, dashed from the action of the stampers, or from defective amalgamation. The latter view of the case probably was taken and decidedly acted upon, as a second amalgamator was constructed. The first one made on the premises was made out of a log of algarroba hollowed out, in which worked a revolving drum of the same material. The great permeating power of mercury is a well known fact mentioned in most elementary works of science, and that permeation of quick-silver is entirely prevented by the use of iron vessels. By some it was considered that the escape of quartz into the amalgamator could be stopped by lining the vessel with sheet iron nailed together; the joints being packed with cotton, and as that was thought it could not, and as that was the course adopted, the latter sawdust would have been disintegrated by such mishaps such is not the case in this instance; notwithstanding these inconveniences, the confidence of the gold quartz miners is unabated, they hope run high, and the partial success up to this point, is only an incentive to renewed exertions. It is almost superfluous to say that the crushing has no relation to the richness of the quartz, with which all those in the neighbourhood are quite satisfied, in so far as their individual claims are concerned.

OUR CREDIT ABROAD. For the first time the packet brings us unfavorable news of Argentine credit abroad. Hitherto the quotations of our stocks, the notices of the Plate in the English papers, and the general tenor of the mercantile correspondence received from Europe, all spoke to the high credit of the Republic in the ex-

terior, and the very excellent stand of the Argentine name; the first money markets of the world; but the Duro's mails bring advices which, unpleasant though it be for us to speak of, it is our duty towards the public and the country to publish.

Argentine credit is not what it was in England. There may be some who will attribute this to a tightening money market, a rise in the bank rate, or a speculation of the bears on the London Stock Exchange. But the wind blows from an entirely different quarter: Argentines have themselves and only themselves to blame for the decline of their credit abroad. The extraordinary legislation of Congress with respect to the Central Argentine Railway is the sole and absolute cause of the injury.

ANOTHER NEW SUBURB. Of all the wise sayings with which our language abounds, there is none better understood, certainly not more universally complied with, as the wholesome old motto, "that when we

can't remove the evil, the best way is to remove ourselves." In this country the motto appears to have been little known, and still less acted upon. Unfortunately, the evil existing in the last few years will have continued the most enthusiastic Argentine that even most have evils from which it is desirable to keep as conveniently far as possible, since the authorities, from inability or otherwise, make no effort to remove them. With a strange disregard for the common rules of cleanliness, the people of this great enlightened city have lived from year's end to year's end heedless of the ordinary means of preserving health.

ON 'CHANGE. Mr. Barneater, the well-known wool-broker, made two very splendid sales to-day, 10,000 lbs. of Orizabal wool from the estancia Martin Chica, San Antonio, the property of Messrs. George Bell and Son, at 70s. and 71s. in the latter case there were some sales at after hours at the closing rates, at which prices there are buyers.

RAILWAY FROM CORDOBA TO TUCUMAN.

PROPOSAL TO BE SUBMITTED WITHIN 5 MONTHS.

The Government of the Argentine Republic, as authorized by law of Congress 12th Oct. 1871 for the construction of a Railway from Cordoba to Tucuman, calls for proposals for the same, to be sent in before 2 p.m. on the 30th of March 1872.

Sealed proposals will be received at the office of the Minister of Interior, and will be opened in presence of the Minister and the interested parties on the day and hour above mentioned.

The proposals must be subject to the following conditions: 1. The line will be about 542 kilometers long, and must be built on a gauge of one meter, in strict conformity with the plans and surveys of the Government Engineers, which may be seen at the National Engineers Department, 32 Calle Belgrano.

The Inspecting Engineers to be appointed by Government for insuring the proper execution of the works will be empowered to prohibit the use of materials which they may consider unfit, and the contractor must attend to their suggestions, and follow the detailed specifications they give him, both as respects materials and the execution of the work.

2. The line must be finished in every part, stations, rolling-stock, &c., within 4 1/2 years from the approval of the contract.

3. The contractor obliging himself to pay a penalty of 25,000 hard dollars a month for any delay; the dollars a month for any delay; the Government further engaging to pay a premium of 10,000 hard dollars for every month finished before that time.

4. The execution of the works shall be arranged so as to enable the line to be delivered in sections which the Government shall have the right to open to traffic whenever it sees fit.

5. The contractor shall oblige himself to keep the line and annexed works in good order for 12 months after completion.

6. Parties sending in proposals must specify how they would receive payment, whether directly from the National Treasury or through a banking-house in London.

7. No proposals will be received exceeding 14,127 hard dollars 50 cents per kilometer, besides the interest at 7 per cent on the capital employed for the interval between the actual outlay and the date of payment, which will depend on the form and manner of payment to be agreed on.

8. The contractor shall lodge in the Provincial Bank of Buenos Ayres or other bank at the choice of the Nat. Government the sum of 100,000 hard dollars as a guarantee for the proper fulfilment of the contract and this sum is not to be withdrawn till 12 months after the delivery of the whole line, on the Government declaring that the contractor has fulfilled all his engagements.

9. The Government always reserves to itself the right of selecting what proposal it thinks best for public interests, or rejecting all of them if necessary, so that no presentation of proposals creates no particular rights to any of the parties interested.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

We were favored yesterday morning with a note from H.E. President Sarmiento, enclosing a generous subscription in aid of the suffering people of Chicago.

Buenos Ayres has so recently required and received similar aid from all parts of the world that we have no doubt the initiative taken by the First Magistrate of the Republic will be promptly responded to by all classes and nationalities in this city.

The increase of traffic on the Billinghurst Tramway line to Flores on Saturday and Sunday last was something unprecedented.

The demand for seats at all points of the line completely overpowered the resources of the company, and had the number of cars been doubled or trebled we doubt if the public could have been satisfied.

At the Rivadavia station the crowd was greatest all day long, and hundreds had to give up their intended jaunts through the impossibility of finding room in the carriages.

At one time there were fifteen carriages crammed to suffocation, waiting at the station named till they could be sent to their destination, while the crowd looking for seats increased every moment.

The public travelling from town complained greatly of the change of carriages at the Rivadavia station and the consequent confusion and delay there.

Think that, even with the inadequate resources at present at the company's command, there is room for and the possibility of some immediate improvement in the traffic arrangements.

The double line from Almagro to Flores will be completed in a month, and will give greatly increased facilities to the managers; meanwhile, on Sundays and holidays the carriages from the city should run through to Flores, only stopping at Rivadavia to change horses and take up any passengers there may be room for.

We had news of the Transandean Railway expedition yesterday; The party started last week from Chilivcoy, where they met with most vexatious delays in procuring horses, oxen, carts, etc.; but all ended well, and they set out prepared to meet friends or Indian foes. The late rains have proved most favourable to the expedition, as the country is covered with new grass, and there is no danger of a scarcity of either pasturage or water for a long time to come.

Mr. Crawford and his party were in the highest spirits, and felt confident of success. Some of the land auctions on Saturday and Sunday went off remarkably well, others fell flat.

At Palermo Srs. Amanabar & Co. realized a splendid profit for the owners of the Costa quinta, most of the lots offered selling from \$150 to \$80 per vara front, and the house at \$180,000 m/c. Some of the lots were withdrawn by order of the Municipality, but the sale was a decided success.

this season's traffic; it is to be hoped that diligence will now be used to place them all in position as soon as possible. They are constructed on a new and simple system which will allow most of them to be put up with but a trifling amount of masonry.

Notwithstanding our repeated notices that scandals of any kind are never acceptable to our columns, a number of "constant readers" appear to think that the "Cordoba Scandal" possesses interest for the general public and our subscribers. We cannot think so, and had yesterday the pleasure of converting into paper dollars about 200 letters on the subject, which we sold as waste paper.

Such shall be the fate of all future communications on the subject of which the public are not unaccustomed to a little tired.

The Flores road has jumped to the position of the Rotten Row of Buenos Ayres since the Billinghurst Tramway opened. On Saturday and Sunday last from noon till eve a continuous stream of tramway cars, elegant equipages, cavaliers and amazons rolled to and from Floravia.

All the "beau sexe" seemed to have turned out in their newest "toilettes"; and as we gazed on the moving panorama from beneath the shade of an acacia in Tara Hall, it required more than one shebang cocktail from next door to support us while taking note of the passing crowd and the truly wonderful "get up" of the feminine portion of it.

Such toilettes! "Coudrissantes" is a mild term to apply to them. Gypsy bonnets, gored piqué skirts; "knickerbocker" pants; less full than formerly; suits of Mazarine blue flannel &c. passed in review before us for hours.

We remarked that pale cuir-colored suits of "eau" linen are now the "correct thing," topped by hats à la Watteau, or better still à la Wattef. Mand-Muller hats are also very much in vogue.

About 2 o'clock p.m. we procured a telescope to aid our vision, and discovered that the richest lace is again becoming the rage, no doubt to the intense satisfaction of husbands, papas and others who have to pay the piper and the "modiste". Neckties are now all worn sailor-knot fashion, bows being decidedly "mauvais-tout"; the most fashionable colours are fishermen's green for blondes and "Fron Fron" buff for brunettes.

Yelvet round the neck is discarded for Etruscan gold necklaces, the same almost as the new Abyssinian ornaments. We had neither time or inclination to remark the gentlemen's make-up, so busy were we taking the foregoing notes.

The day was dusty and most of them looked like travellers. Many stopped at the "Shebang Arms" to taste the new drink. We heard yesterday that the Italian organ grinder had turned up on Sunday night at Dairy Hall, Flores, having found his instrument after three day's search.

A subscriber at the partido 9 de Julio writes to us under date 6th Nov.: "A short time ago notice was received from the cañique Calfeucurá that ten Indians had started for this on a plundering expedition."

A sharp look-out was kept, and one of the marauders taken prisoner in the neighborhood of Fortin San Carlos. The garrison was commanded by Teniente 1º José Maria Sosa. The savage was accompanied by a white woman, said to be the daughter of a foreigner in the 25 de Mayo, whence she was led into captivity at the tender age of two years.

They passed here the day before yesterday, when I had an opportunity of observing them closely. He was as heavy and brutal as any of his race, his face quite disfigured with scars and tattooing. She looked about seventeen, with an exceedingly fresh and fair complexion and bright golden hair; I would suppose her to be of Scotch or German descent."

Mr. A. H. Grieben favored us yesterday with a copy of his pamphlet on German immigration to this country. We are entirely with the author in his views, chiefly in his recommendation that agricultural colonies should never be located on the Indian frontiers, or at points distant from easy communication with markets.

Mr. Grieben says that the present rise in the wool market cannot last, and that now is the time for proprietors of vast tracts of virgin land to sell them and yield them up to the plough.

Mr. Bateman's report on the paving and drainage of this city has been published. It is an exhaustive document which we would reproduce but for its great length and the extremely limited space at our command.

Mr. Bateman has drawn up a vast and complete plan for draining 25,000,000 gallons of sewage from the city daily, basing his calculations on a population double that which Buenos Ayres now possesses.

The utilization of the sewage he postpones considering, proposing to carry the drainage of the city to a point between Quilmes and the Boca, and there discharge it into the river at 900 metres from the bank, erecting a reservoir to hold it when high tides might carry it back.

At a few low points of the city pumping will be required to raise the sewage to the necessary level, but on the whole Mr. Bateman considers the position of Buenos Ayres admits of its easy and thorough drainage. His next reports will be on the water supply and paving.

The news from the Banda Oriental on Sunday was of an exceedingly warlike and exciting description, though many of our colleagues here and in the sister city continue to pat the peace negotiations on the back. Paysandu has been attacked, and, it is said, taken by the Blancos; Salto is still threatened, and Muniz reported to be marching on Montevideo, where some

excitement prevailed for a time on Saturday, as the trenches were ordered to be placed in a state to meet an attack. Things are evidently going from bad to worse on the other side of the river.

The schooner Amalia arrived here yesterday morning from Bahia Blanca after a fine run of 96 hours. The estancia of Señor Rufino had been swept of its horses in a night foray by Indians; as neighbouring foreign settlers were not disturbed the raid was evidently one of vengeance against the owner whose friendship with the late Comandante Llanos has provoked the deep animosity of the Indians.

A general storm however is evidently brewing. A despatch has been received from Calfeucurá announcing that from three to four thousand Araucanians having received a thorough thrashing from Chilean troops are crossing the Cordillera and coming down in force to this side.

The settlers about Bahia Blanca were anxiously awaiting reinforcements, and several Englishmen who had made arrangements to come up here by the América have from the threatening aspect of affairs decided to remain on their estates ready for any emergency.

We sincerely trust the Government having been forewarned is forearmed and that every effort will be made to prevent another addition to the long catalogue of frontier plunder and bloodshed.

terrible length of which has been increased in so many cases by official supineness and mismanagement. The Amalia brings a cargo of wheat, hides and other produce. Rain had been abundant and all the crops look well and promise splendidly.

One great inconvenience to those abroad after dark in Buenos Ayres is the difficulty in deciphering the names of the streets.

We have enough copying of the Great Republic in letter, but much too little in spirit. Were the municipal authorities to adopt the admirable plan in use in New York and other cities of the States by which at the corner of each square the name of the street is painted in black letters on the glass of the gas light a great public boon would be conferred at a very small cost.

Dr. Costa, one of the Commissioners appointed to decide on the merits of the machinery trials at Rio Segundo last January, has at last sent in his report. It is most carefully and ably drawn up, displaying a knowledge of the subject scarcely to be expected from a lawyer.

The Doctor is evidently a man of versatile genius and vast general information. He calculates that one man with a fresh team of horses every four or five hours can cut from one square and a half to two squares per day.

The man's wages \$30 m/c. per diem, the interest on the capital, support of animals, &c., in all \$45 to \$60 m/c, whilst in the present way it would cost at least \$250 to \$300 m/c.

We have not space to follow the Doctor through the intricate maze of figures and calculations, these alone suffice to show the importance of the subject in a land where labor is so scarce, dear, and uncertain. The learned Doctor's theory is that we should have machinery for every mortal thing, and we agree with him. The substitution of machinery for manual labour is one of the greatest blessings of the coming race; with them, we learn, no vexing disputes arise between employer and employed, everything moves along as certainly, as noiselessly, as smoothly as a steam-engine on its iron track.

For want of space we cannot here give the comparative working of each machine. Those of our readers who feel interested in the matter may learn all by referring to our issue of 13th last January, a few copies of which may still be had at this office.

In reference to Dr. Costa's able report, Mr. Alvarez de Arenales has addressed to him a highly interesting letter, published in the Nación, and which we recommend to all engaged in our rural industries. Mr. Arenales lays stress on the necessity of adding agriculture to our great staple industry of stock breeding, otherwise the result must one day be disastrous.

We have always preached this doctrine, but to realize it we want a Homestead Law for new arrivals, and an Agricultural Department in the Government House. This is the only proper way to go about the indispensable work.

The Great Southern Railway Sports came off at Temperley on Saturday with great success. Every event was well contested, and the 440 yards, which was run a dead heat between Messrs. Oxenford and J. T. Moore, was run again at the end of the meeting.

Mr. Oxenford, who was handicapped 30 yards, losing by about 7 yards. At the conclusion of the race the winner was cheered most enthusiastically, and the band, conducted by our old friend Mr. Ezeuzar, surrounded the tent, play the National airs, both of this country and England. There was a marked reaction in the Bond market to-day. Prices opened at 69 for cash, but there are no sellers at this price.

The Minister of Hacienda, Sr. Dominguez, did not leave for Cordoba to-day, as was expected, owing to the death of Sr. Cane, a near relative of the Minister, the trip to Cordoba has been postponed.

In Municipal Bonds to-day one sale, 30,000 at 88. This shows a still further advance in this security, which is owing to the great plethora of money.

Ten shares of the first series of the Popular Argentina company were sold to-day at the magnificent price of Two Hundred pesos per share; these shares are preferential or concessive shares, and hitherto have not been sold in this market—this sale gives them a quotation. Don Pedro S. means, the founder of the company, has sold his shares, the only concession made on its organization. Some sales of the other shares of this company, 100 pesos, have been made at 200.

The telegram from Montevideo gave the following: Genoa, Pampa, Valparaiso, Brown, Liverpool, as. Dantzi, Hamburg, Johama, Paper, 102. A large lot of wool resold at 41.

Some further contracts with the saladeristas spoken of. The Central Uruguay Railway to-day runs express with Directors, and a new station midway between Rivera and Canelones was opened.

A cargo of Chilean flour sold at 6 pats., and a cargo of American at 7 pats.

English Janey—transport Bonifacio. Exchange on England down to 160 francs, which caused in production; 400 barrels Trench's mts, 20 sh. gold; 200 bags rice, 92.

The wool markets continue flat; wools keep arriving freely, and buyers hold off. On the subject is to crowd the market with wool. One of the principal buyers to-day stated in the Plaza that wools are selling 22 centimes higher than the very highest market rates. It is very curious how some excitement amongst the local dealers. The bulk of the clip it is known has been bought outside, and small buyers who are now coming to the market with their wools, are obliged to sell at whatever the wool will fetch; this greatly injures the market.

A copious sale of wools to-day at 72, for which last week we have easily got 85. Prices, therefore, continue dropping, more and more. There is a heavy sale of wools with high rates of exchange, heavy freight, and every road in the country covered with bullock carts with wool coming in. The most judicious course for the moment is to hold off. There is a strong probability that the wool will be held for some time outside this year by wool holders have very judiciously affected the market.

The action on Saturday on the Flores Road adjoining the Billinghurst tramway station and one square from the Leoneso Station, gave very good results. These lands adjoining the splendid property of Mr. Juan Lavy, Montevideo. The lot sold was 182, varying from 70 depth, knocked down for \$150,000 m/c. per vara front. In Calle Piedal, at the same distance from town, a lot 25 varas front for \$50,000 m/c. per vara front.

The Vanguard from Liverpool is expected to-morrow (Paranáline). Money to-day was felt a drug in the market, nevertheless discounters betray little anxiety to put out their money. It is very curious that several stated that the Government proposes to lend four millions of pesos, but owing to the brisk state of trade and its great expansion, not even this large amount will be found to affect the market.

On Saturday the steamer from Uruguay came in bringing very alarming news from Paysandu. The Blancos under Aparicio were marching on the town, and the Custom House and public offices closed, everyone under arms, and scouts at all points looking out for the Compañías with reinforcements. Such was the state of the place on the 10th inst.

From Rosario we have the following commercial advices:—"The loss suffered by sheepfarmers has been very considerable. About 2 per cent. of the sheep of this department have perished, and the wool of the remainder will be somewhat deteriorated. But the high price of wool will more than make up for the loss. Fair estimate, the principal loss in this Province, between four and five hundred arrobas. Last year it sold for 17 reales Bolivian. The market is active, and Buenos Ayres houses have their agents in all parts of the country."

"Wheat crops in every direction in the Province are superb. Nothing but hail or continuous wet weather can now hurt them. The potatoes are also looking very well, and barley crops a yield of fifty bushels to the acre. The heavy rains in Cordoba will also have a great influence on the crops in that Province, and the probability is that wheat will sell at a low price, say 11 to 12 Bolivian reales the bushel, or say from 4s 6d to 5s sterling."

"The price of horned cattle still ranges very high, and they are very scarce. Beef is selling at three and four dollars the arroba, and no hope of a change for at least three months."
