The payment of tribute by the Bue nos Ayrean Government is, according to our author, badly effected, and also at times abused by the Indians themselves; for he suggests that during the raid just mentioned the chieftain Rouque "probably played a double game, and whilst receiving rations and gifts with one hand, allowed his people to join the raid, and received plunder with the other."

Mr. Musters says :-"The liberality of the Argentines and the largeness of the gifts may appear surprising; and indeed the nomi nal value, as charged to the Government for these annual gifts to the Indians, is very great. I saw myself 1,000 head of cattle pass on their way to Rouque, and Cheoeque was expecting 1,200. The cattle were brought down from the Tandil by purveyors, whose business must be as lucrative as that of American army contractors; for the Indians are sometimes when sober, or oftener when intoxicated. in. duced to part with their newlyacqui red possessions for a mere trifle, and the cattle, reverting to the dealer's hands, thus do duty over again as a ration perhaps to the same Cacique.
