TRADE WITH ENGLAND AND FRANCE.

Great Britain does the largest trade of any country, with the Argentine Republic, representing 18 1/2 millions in exports and imports, against 18 millions for France. It is true that the imports from France exceed slightly in value those from England, but the difference is more than compensated by the greater exports from this country to England. A great contrast is afforded by the character of the trade of the two countries respectively as will be seen by the following table—

The articles we get from England may be put down as those of primary necessity and chief importance in a young country such as this, whereas our imports from France are either articles of luxury or such as we could easily produce in this Republic under a better economic system.

The balance of trade with England is more favorable than with France, the former country taking more than half the amount of her manufactures in R. Plate produce, while France hardly takes 44 per cent. in the game way. The surplus we had to pay England in 1870 was \$5 millions, while we had to pay France 7 millions. In this way again we find the trade with England more beneficial than with France. The exports show as follows—

Taking the two countries collectively England and France represent one-half the total export and import trade of the Argentine Republic, while Belgium stands for 11 per cent. of States 10, Brazil 6, Spain 4, Italy 3, Germany 2, Holland 2, and Chile 2, and to other countries 10 per cent. of the total. In another chapter we shall review these countries and show of what the trade consists.

ONE DAY LATER FROM RIO.

DATES TO 9TH INST. We have been favoured with late papers from Rio, and as the news is important we extract the following:— Nothing is thought of in Rio save the return of the Emperor. Every street in the city will be decorated, and triumphal arches erected in all the principal thoroughfares; the subscriptions raised are far more than is required. The demonstration promised to be the greatest affair ever known in Rio.

The Reform of the 9th publishes the official reception of Sr. A. de Andrada in Chile. Sr. Andrada, on presenting his credentials as minister, made a most friendly speech, whilst the President of Chile spoke in the most complimentary terms of the Brazilian nation, the first to-day in South America.

The awful ravages of an extraordinary epidemic at Buenos Ayres caused a panic throughout the Empire. The Diario de Gran Para gives the following:— The epidemic which has desolated Buenos is now decreasing in its intensity, still this once flourishing district is now almost a desert; thousands have been swept off; there is mourning and consternation in every house. Three districts—Portel, Molgredo, and Breves, which recently boasted of 5,000 inhabitants, have already lost 5,000 souls. Omeias and Currelino have also suffered much. Portel had 5,000 inhabitants, and has lost 2,400; Breves had 8,000 souls, and now has only 5,000. The whole country there is about one vast sepulchre; as yet there are no returns of the deaths at Omeias and Currelino.

A new line of steamers, by a French company, is started to run from Para to Rio. The Rio papers compliment Dr. Andres F. Lopez on his generosity in liberating a slave girl named Francisca.

The Reform states that it is generally said ex-President Mitre is coming to Rio as Argentine Chargé.

All the leading articles of the Nacion on the Paraguayan treaty are being republished by the Reforma, the opposition organ.

The following steamers were expected hourly at Rio—Santos, from Hamburg; Cosmos, Montevideo; Cassini, Liverpool; Garonne on 18th inst.; Olbers, 10th; President, 18th; Hippocampus, London, hourly; Kepler, 15th inst.

Sr. Oliveira Freire, a noted educator, has been raised to the peerage with the title of Baron Lavarede; he is a very distinguished man, and much of the Sarmiento school. Mr. Charles Henry Soares and Mr. W. L. Schultz, have both been decorated with the Order of the Rose, for services rendered to Brazil.

During the last quarter of 1871, the number of emigrants from Oporto to Brazil amounted to 1,328.

The exploration of the Vermojo has attracted much notice in Rio, and all the particulars of the expedition as published by the STANDARD have appeared in the Rio papers.

The steamer Parana, from the North-east parts of Brazil, had arrived down Rio for Europe and business brisk.

The social feat now celebrated by you with such effusion of a patriot's enthusiasm by the sandest philologist enlightened the most perfidious of Brazilian society. It had not to encounter the differences of castes, the aristocratic prejudices of the Greek and Roman republics, the false and egoistic ideas of the Ginos of Plato and Aristotle; but it was opposed by deep-rooted habits, by the organization of all our industrial labors, by the natural apprehensions of genuine interests of such value that all our public and private wealth is bound up in them.

On the 29th Feb. over 100 foreigners became naturalized citizens of Brazil.

The Diario Oficial notifies the public that the authorities have discovered numerous forged treasury bills in circulation; payment has been stopped, and measures taken to arrest the forgers.

News has reached Rio, of the unfortunate German expedition of 1869 to the North Pole; the crew of the Hansa escaped, and have arrived back at Copenhagen, but the steamer Germania, with all on board, has never been since heard of. A sailor at Rio states that she got ice bound, and every soul perished.

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The town of Leopoldina since the railway reached there, is showing great signs of progress, and is one of the most rising towns to-day in Brazil.

In Rio commercial circles there is great noise about the smuggling carried on, on the Banda Oriental frontier, and carried on on the largest and most systematic scale.

The attention of government has been called to it, and steps taken, and large deposits of smuggled goods exist at Santo Tomé, smuggled through at San Borja and Itaquí—at Sta Rosa and Restauracion, and at Rejas for Sta Victoria.

The whole frontier population is one band of smugglers who devote legitimate trade to the news of the rupture of peace negotiations in the Banda Oriental has caused a profound sensation in Rio, owing to the enormous losses of Brazilian settlers by this never ending war.

Brazil is determined to stop it, come what may, and will stand trifling no longer. Intervention may now be looked on as certain.

A great trade association, 873 members, has been formed in Rio; Pedro Americo, president. It is a mutual protection society, and its organization is significant.

The exports of Brazil keep daily increasing, and at foreign exhibitions numerous Brazilian products have taken the first prizes. There are now in Brazil two types found, and the Brazilians manufacture their own toys.

The German corvette Veneta when she entered Rio was received by the frondeurs with splendid demonstrations, and the firing along the bay was tremendous; she passed through a double line, The Bahiana, Belmonte, Itamaré, Henrique Diaz, Camano, Amazonas, Brazil, Vital d'Oliveira, and several other magnificent ships of the Brazilian navy, all manned their yards; the sight was a magnificent one, and completely astonished the Germans, who were quite unprepared to find such a maritime power in South American waters; and yet not one-fourth of the navy of Brazil was in the bay at the time the best frigate being down at the Plate. The German officers went ashore, and were well received, and stated that there were few vessels of the same make to surpass them in Europe.

The Vital d'Oliveira goes to the Cape of Good Hope. The Camarao and Dias go up the Amazon, to help the Peruvian and Brazilian frontier limit commission.

The Great Orient lodge (Masonic) of Brazil has just celebrated, the abolition of slavery by the most splendid manner, and presented to Viscount Rio Branco the Premier a magnificent gold medal. Viscount Rio Branco on the occasion made a memorable address; for classical eloquence it has been seldom surpassed, everyone in Rio read it with delight, and it is held as one of the loveliest specimens of humanity.

Many other speeches followed, closing with the Masonic Hymn. The session was raised, Visconde de Rio Branco giving the customary toasts to the Grand Orient of Brazil, to the Brazilian Nation and to all the masons spread over the world.
