At first sight the sum appears very large, but it must be confessed that when we examine the details it is evident Mr. Oldendorf means to endow the country with a first-class establishment similar to those of Hohenheim in Wurtemberg, Grignon in France, and sundry others in England, which were founded by the late Prince Consort.

The Director-general will be subject to a committee named by Government and hand in his report quarterly. The salary, £800 per annum, is fair remuneration for an efficient man, and none better than Mr. Oldendorf for the post, which we suppose is not incompatible with that of Chief of the National Department of Agriculture.

The Academy is to be for the 'upper ten,' who may have agricultural inclinations and the means to pay for a superior education with every comfort and luxury. A massive building, to cost 4 millions currency, will be erected in the middle of the park, having the usual class-halls, museum, chemical laboratory, library &c., besides dormitories and apartments.

The Agricultural School will consist chiefly of a model-farm cultivated by the pupils, who will be mostly of the middle class and have to pay nothing, accommodation being provided for 40. They will be under the immediate control of a mayordomo (salary £350 per annum) and a group of buildings will be erected near the present estancia house, consisting of the school, students' range, peons' tenements, fonda, workshops, stables for horses and cows, do for merinos and Lincolns, piggery, farm-yard and barns, machinery depot &c., which with steam-engine and pump will cost altogether 3½ millions. The land attached, to compose the Model Farm, will comprise 3,600 acres, viz:—

This line is much shorter than the former, and the highest point, at Portezuela de Barrancas Blancas, is 408 metres or about 1300 feet lower than the San Francisco pass. Of the Orquera line there would be 119 miles in Chilean territory, the rest in Argentine.

Either of these routes would place Rioja city within one day's journey of the Chilean port of Caldera, on the Pacific, and as the Cordoba Railway is about to be prolonged to Tucuman the next step afterwards will be to Rioja and the Bolivian frontier. The upper Argentine provinces would spring into great commercial activity if Mr. Wheelwright's tansandine railway from Rioja to Copiapo be one day realized.

Editors, manufacturers, farmers, and Congressmen are all at war on the subject which has attracted such attention that we find special reporters interviewing manufacturers and congress-

It is strange therefore that whilst Buenos Ayres has thrown Washington into such a ferment we here in the River Plate take the matter so quietly that not one of our colleagues has a word about the matter. We extract from the New York Tribune the following: it explains the American conservative view of the question, a view which has now lost much of its former popularity.

"In Congress already we begin to hear the mutterings of that storm that the enemies of American producers manage to conjure up so often as they think it practicable to strike a telling blow in favor of transatlantic producers. Among other interests attacked is the growing of wool. Free traders have told us during all the years of low prices of wool that the duties levied by the National Government on foreign-grown wool really depressed and lessened the prices obtained for our home-grown wool. This they repeated so often and so persistently that it is possible they may have convinced some of themselves of its truth. It is certain that it never deceived any wool-grower. Now, that the immense stocks of foreign-grown wool that were imported in anticipation of the beneficial effects of protection, and the raising of wool is fast assuming the proper place in the industry of the country, and prices of wool have become about as remunerating as of other agricultural staples, the cry in favor of free trade in raw material is raised in the halls of legislation at Washington. I need not inform the growers of wool that if it is successful it will be immediately fatal to them, and ultimately most disastrous to our whole country, and most beneficial to Australia and Buenos Ayres."

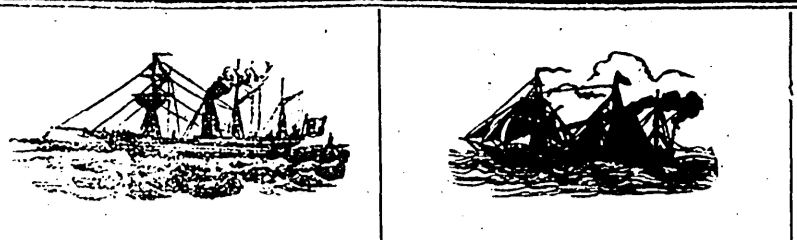

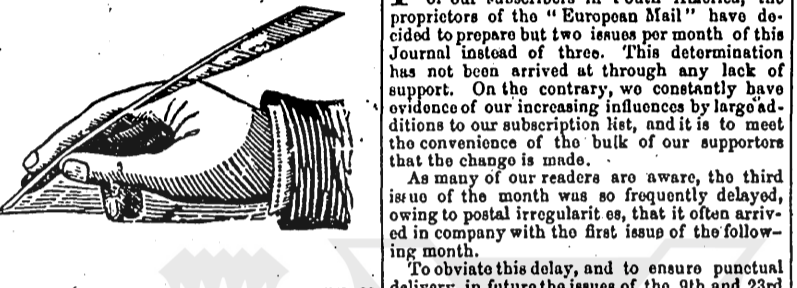
