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that so long hung over the Interior, and most significant of all, the ready flow of foreign capital to our shores.

to carry out every scheme of improvement, are auspicious signs that cannot be mistaken.

The vast sums of British capital that have been poured into the country within the past few years are now bearing fruit.

There is money in the country, or easily to be procured, for every legitimate undertaking, no matter what its magnitude; and in saying this we say all.

Without the aid of foreign capital the country could not attempt the strides in advance that it is now taking.

But the People and Legislature have in this session of 1872 amply shown that "Forward" is their motto and their will; and there can be no doubt, that, in every legitimate enterprise foreign capitalists will be more ready than ever to help the Republic on its way to national happiness and prosperity.

The following is President Sarmiento's Message on closing the session:—

Messrs. Senators and Deputies, I have the honor to declare closed the Extraordinary sittings of Congress, which became necessary in consequence of the number of important bills lying over from the ordinary session.

Your labours this year have been as prolific as they were severe.

Rarely have laws of such grave importance been submitted to a deliberative assembly in this country as those for the reorganization of the Army and National Guard; the representation of the people on the basis of the Census; the creation of a National Bank; the construction of a Port at Buenos Ayres, whose commerce will be fed by lines of railway running from the Andes, and annihilating distance in every direction.

Time and their results can alone tell whether enterprises of such magnitude were required. But what cannot be denied, and what will prove our excuse if they do not realize your expectations in every way, or as quickly as you desire, is the unanimity with which you have sanctioned them.

In this respect public opinion follows rather the ideas and aspirations of the age than individuals; and those cannot be restrained as they are the reflex of the people's mind.

I must tell you that the magnitude of your task is on a par with the good name our country enjoys amongst civilized nations. This is attested not only by the high pecuniary credit which the Republic enjoys abroad, but by the Governments, the eminent men and public opinion of the nations in advance of us, and by the rest of America.

The opening of the Transandean Telegraph was hailed by the rest of the world as a great event, although it is nothing more than a part of the vast telegraphic system covering our territory.

Such approbation should serve as a reward for your labours, while moderating your aspirations, lest they lead us further than prudent warrants.

Tranquillity is maintained in the interior, in spite of some, as yet, intellectual attempts to disturb it. Our good name before the world and our present prosperity depend so much on its preservation that I cannot believe those worthy to be called citizens will ever sympathize with the attempts now and then made to disturb it, under pretence of seeking reforms which can never be obtained by such means.

Messrs. Senators and Deputies. You take with you to your homes the consciousness of having done your duty to your fellow citizens. You can assure them that the Republic is at peace with all nations, and that the Government will always do everything in its power that it may continue so.

MONTEVIDEO. STANDARD-Office. Friday, 25th.

Nervous people are a little uneasy down here by reason of the reported earthquake in B. Ayres and the rain-bomb round the moon seen at Rosario.

These are portentous signs which may indicate anything, although many of our readers throw doubt on the two phenomena, especially as nothing of the kind has been noticed here. Some of the local papers ascribe this to the fact that we go to bed here so early as to be unable to offer an opinion on what may be passing in the celestial or infernal regions at 1.21 a.m. They even insinuate that a second earthquake like that of Mendoza may have occurred up near the Andes, forgetting that if there had been any such "boulevards" the telegraph would have already announced it. As regards Rosario it is not strange, seeing the commotion which has taken place there, that the townfolk fancy they see strange things around the moon; they need not look so far, to see more than sober-minded people would care to notice.

The question of conversion, which means the redemption of the currency, engrosses attention among mercantile circles in Montevideo, just as the approaching elections absorb the anticipations and energies of the native political circles. The *Telegrafo* seems to say that the Government has been offered the million requisite to make up for redemption of the paper money, but that the Minister of Finance has some scruples on the subject lest private interests be damaged by a too sudden redemption. It is not easy to understand such extreme delicacy in the Government-house when the Executive has simply to carry out the law already passed, especially as the London Loan was known to have for one of its chief purposes the redemption of the currency. The fact is, that the Minister does not attach as much importance to a speedy solution of the matter as merchants and shop-keepers do. Meantime the Banks are under a spell, and until some solution be arrived at the public must suffer extreme inconvenience. The President, however, and his Ministers are regarded as good men and will doubtless relieve so stringent a state of affairs.

All the papers publish lists of likely candidates for the Legislature. One that is now before me contains the name of Jose P. Ramirez, Jose Ellauri, Juan M. Martinez, Margaritos Cervantes, Labrousse, Julio Herrera-Obes, Felipe Lacaeva, Charcarro, Francisco Perez, L. Blanco, A. Villalba &c., all probably good men; at least let us hope they are, in case they be elected. The newspaper articles on the elections are of a bitter description; these editors seem to think a newspaper is a kind of penny-trumpet for the peculiar use of the editor, instead of remembering the unfortunate public, who pay \$2 a month to read rubbish and groan internally.

"Madame Carolina Latorre de Mendez widow, aged 48 years" figures this morning in the list of yesterday's mortality. She is said to have died of grief for her husband, whom she has followed at only a brief interval to another and a better world. It speaks volumes for the virtues of both.

An excellent sign of the times is the use which the Government is now putting the caucuses to. This morning I saw a good 16-pounder, apparently new, being driven down as a street-post at the Aguada. The number of arms mounted in this position at M.Video is now as respectable as in the batteries of Cronstadt, and let us fervently wish that it will every day increase.

Yesterday the official inauguration of the Ferro-Carril Montevideo took place, the first rail being laid by Mademoiselle Maria Leovina Braga. It is generally known as Paso Duran-stramway, eleven miles in length, coming round by Buschenthal's quinta to Paso Molino. Mr. Robinson expects three steamers and a sailing ship this week or next, with materials from England, and thinks the line will be completed by June. The concessionaires are Srs. Dos Reis and other Brazilian gentlemen, some of whom were present, besides Srs. Gomez de Carvallo, Lojio, Castro, Moura, Paulsen, etc. At the lunch afterwards the STANDARD was toasted with some éclat.

The debut of M. and Mme. Piccolini at Solis was a great success, in the opera of Ruy Blas. To-night they give Faust. Mme. Cepeda is also a great favorite in Montevideo.

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to form a limited Company for establishing a Bank under the name of "Banco Nacional," the registered offices of which to be in the city where the national authorities reside, or in such city that might be declared the capital of the Republic.

2. The capital of the Bank to be twenty millions of pesos fuertes, in shares of a hundred pesos each.

3. The National Government will subscribe 2,000 shares payable in public fund of 5 per cent. interest, and 2 per cent. annual cumulative sinking fund, to be created especially for this purpose, and taken at par.

The promoters will subscribe 50,000 shares " 5,000,000 For public subscription will be received 13,000 shares " 1,300,000

4. The 5 per cent. allotted to the Government by article 32, and the dividends of its shares will be imputed to service and sinking fund of these public funds, and should there result an excess it will be also imputed to the sinking fund.

5. The subscription will be opened in all Provinces on the same day, designated by the Provisional Board of Directors and closed six calendar months from that date.

Should the shares subscribed in all provinces exceed the sum of \$13,000,000, the excess will be reduced "a pro rata" on the subscribers of more than 200 shares, until reducing the subscription to the authorized amount.

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6. The Board of Directors will designate the calls to be made on the shares.

7. The first Board of Directors will deposit the subscription money in the Provincial Bank of Buenos Ayres.

8. The business of the bank will be— To issue notes payable to bearer and on demand in the currency determined by National Law.

Discount bills and pagarés, receive deposits in account current at fixed dates or on demand.

Advance money to the National and Provincial Governments. Open credits to the Municipalities and private persons against security of public funds (National or Provincial) or of shares of industrial companies and enterprise, negotiable in the Exchange, or against such securities the Board of Directors may decide.

9. The Bank can neither lend money on its own shares nor buy them, nor take any direct or indirect share in individual operations, nor undertake any other business than those stipulated in the present law.

10. The Bank cannot buy landed estate beyond what is absolutely necessary for carrying on its own business, or that which the Bank might be obliged to receive in payment of credits due to it, with obligation to realize the same immediately.

11. The notes of the Bank shall bear the seal of the Republic, and shall be admitted in all public National offices, as long as they are convertible on demand.

12. The National Bank will be divided in two departments: the Emission Department and the Banking Department.

13. In the Emission Department an Inspector appointed by the Executive power shall have an intervention. The salary of such Inspector to be paid by the Bank.

14. The duties of the inspector will be— 1. Sign all notes to be emitted. 2. Watch that the emission is according to the present law. 3. Countersign the general account of the emission department.

15. The Bank is authorized to emit the double amount of its realized capital, with the obligation to keep a metallic reserve of not less than one fourth of the notes in circulation.

16. The notes of the Bank and the documents it will emit will be exempted of all stamp or any other tax that might be created on credit notes.

17. The bank will be allowed to open its operations after having realized a capital of three millions.

18. Before expiration of one year after the foundation of the Bank at least one branch office shall be established in any province of the Republic where 500 shares have been subscribed, and one year later such branch offices shall be established in all other provinces.

19. The branch-offices of the Bank house in the Provinces shall be also Savings and Deposits Banks.

20. The rate of interest the Bank will fix for its operations will be absolutely uniform for all kinds of persons, governments, or municipalities.

21. The money the Government receives in deposit, or all money having special application, will be deposited with the Bank and enjoy the interest allowed to other deposits.
