transandine railway to be allowed to be made from the province of Aconcagua until after the expiration of twenty years, to be counted from the day the entire line is opened for traffic. Importation duty free of all articles required for the line, exemption from all fiscal and municipal dues, and exportation duty free of bullion to the amount of \$2,000,000, in payment of articles required for the line. Land belonging to private individuals to be declared of public utility. Fiscal land and the use of public roads to be conceded free of charge. Government guarantee of 7 per cent. on the outlay, calculated at \$41,000 a kilometer, after deducting from the gross receipts 45 per cent. for working expenses. The guarantee to take effect from the day the entire line is opened for traffic, and to continue in force for twenty years. The government to have the right of purchasing the Chilean portion of the line, at any time after the expiration of ten years from the date of its conclusion, at the rate of \$41,000 a kilometer, and 20 per cent. additional as indemnity. When the net income exceeds 55 per cent. of the gross receipts, the excess to be handed over to the government in repayment of disbursements, if any, made no account of the guarantee. If traffic should be stopped from any cause for three months, the payment of the guarantee to be suspended until traffic be resumed. Government to have the power to appoint an auditor of accounts, either 'pro tem' or permanently, the salary of said auditor to be paid by the company. The Government to have the right to take part in the formation of the tariffs of fares and freights, when the net income of the line shall exceed 12 per cent. on the capital. In the event of the direction and administration being established in a foreign country, a 'directory with ample powers to be appointed in Chile; and if the line be constructed by a joint-stock company the laws relating to such associations to be complied with. In any case the accounts of the company to be kept in Chile, and dividends to be paid, free of charge, to shareholders in this country. The periods of time and their duration beforementioned, to take effect from the day the concessionaires give notice to the government that they have entered into a contract with the Argentine government for the construction of the transandine section of the line. All disputes or differences between the government and the company to be settled by arbitration, one arbitrator to be named by each party, and in the event of their not agreeing, they shall be empowered to name a third, and the three together shall decide the question submitted to them, and from their decision there shall be no appeal, either diplomatic or of any other kind. In the event of the two arbitrators not being able to agree with regard to the appointment of a third arbitrator, he shall be appointed by the Supreme Court.

MONTEVIDEO.

STANDARD Office, Thursday, 14th.

The French Minister, M. Jules Dozani, returned yesterday from a short trip to the Uruguay; he is said to express himself much pleased with the progress observable in the little towns along his route. The same opinion is repeated on all sides, that if peace can be maintained for six months, the onward march of the country is secure. Meantime the history of B. Oriental has been so troubled for many years that confidence can hardly be yet said to begin to take root.

Three of the leading editors in Montevideo (and editors here are synonymous with politicians), Messrs Bustamante of the Tribuna, Jose P. Varela of La Paz, and Dr. Ramirez of the Siglo are said to have agreed on a fusion list, comprising some members of the various parties, which they will pledge themselves to support in the coming elections.

To-morrow's steamer from B. Ayres is expected to bring down Messrs. Juan Carlos Gomez, Jardin, Mezquita, Costa and others who have been some years absent from their native country and possibly expect to figure in the political circles now in course of formation.

The party formerly known as Blancos are said to be so dissatisfied with the turn affairs are taking that the Tribuna speaks of a special mission, in the person of Dr. Legena, to the Argentine Government, to declare that they mean to signify to Pres. Sarmiento that the compact of 1872 has not been religiously fulfilled as they were led to expect from the guarantee of Argentine mediation. The same paper tells us that Pres. Gomez yesterday sent an aide-de-camp to Dr. Legena to beg an interview with him, and when the latter came to the Government house he was escorted with the President for over an hour.

Among the numerous Cabinet changes which rumor circulates twice a day, in the present transition period, it is stated that the Minister of Finance persists in resigning, and that his portfolio has been offered to Don Tomas Villalba, who saved Montevideo from bombardment. Last night it was again rumored that Dr. Velazco consents to remain in the Finance Department. The resignation of Dr. Julio Herrera-Obes has been accepted, and among those likely to succeed to the post of Minister of Foreign Affairs is Dr. Alejandro Magariños Cervantes. According to La Paz the Secretary of Foreign Affairs at London communicated to Dr. Perez Gomez that Her Majesty's Government could not receive him, owing to the suspension of relations by Mr. McDonnell, H.M. Charge d'Affaires.

THE POITOU'S MAILS.

Yesterday this much looked for Mediterranean packet entered port. She brings over 600 immigrants, and her latest dates from Gibraltar will be found highly interesting.

The riots in Turkey continue, and soldiers were being despatched from Constantinople. The Grand Duke Nicholas breakfasted with the Sultan, and conferred upon him the dignity of the order of Osmanli. Afterwards the Grand Duke started for Jerusalem.

The whole of the cab-drivers in Nice struck work yesterday. A very manifest tone of uneasiness pervades the Lisbon papers, it being feared that serious disturbances are impending in Portugal.

The telegram published yesterday, announcing that the troops under General Sanchez Bregua had on Wednesday attacked the insurgents in the Arsenal at Ferrol, anticipates the news published in the Spanish papers which arrived last night. It appears that the delay in commencing the attack arose not only from the general in command having determined to wait for further reinforcements, but also from the Municipal authorities having requested a truce of 24 hours in order to give the insurgents an opportunity of surrendering. This the latter declined to do, so the attack commenced. Another frigate, the Mazarredo, has been seized by the insurgents, who have destroyed material in the Arsenal to the value of many thousand dollars.

Rumours were current in the town yesterday that a revolutionary outbreak had occurred in Malaga, owing, we believe, to a report to that effect having been brought by the Richard Cobden, which arrived here from Malaga yesterday morning. The Maria, which arrived from the same port last evening, brings the news that the rumour was without foundation and that it arose from the discovery at the railway station of a waggon laden with gunpowder. His Excellency the Governor of Malaga, on hearing this, took precautionary measures at once by ordering the whole of the disposable carabinieri and civil guards to concentrate within the custom-houses, and the troops of the line to patrol in strong bodies throughout the city during the day and night. This measure of the Governor seems to have had the desired effect, and if any intention existed to disturb the peace, it was thwarted by these prompt precautions. As soon as the inhabitants learned the dispositions of the Governor they prudently closed their shops, bearing in

mind what happened on the 1st of January, 1869, when General Rojas, in order to punish some rioters, attacked the city and after a most obstinate and sanguinary struggle, in which upwards of 1000 persons were killed and wounded, took possession of it.

PARIS LETTER.

(Our Own Correspondent.)

October 8. It is no secret that M. Thiers is very weary of his office, and longs for that best retirement which is the friend to man's decline. It is not certain whether the income of his friends or the insolence of his foes fatigues him most. Atlas may have enjoyed carrying the world on his shoulders, but M. Thiers finds it no joke having to support France. If French politicians, like the scientific world and the metre scale, could boast their quarrel was only over the one thousandth part of a line, the difference would be one between twelveth and twelfth. But the Republic which was believed to divide us least is showing signs of dividing us most. Gambetta will have no death-bed penitents in his Radical Republic; he excludes them, as decidedly as Plato did poets from his ideal state. On the other hand, the Conservative Republicans will not march through Coventry with Gambetta. The future of the country is between two stools, unless the middle-classes form a new and a real social stratum, and take part in public life in an efficacious manner.

In 1849 M. Rouher startled the Assembly by describing the revolution of 1848 as a catastrophe. The 'not' lived, as such do only in France, and made his fortune. Let the extreme Republicans take care that September, 1870, be not similarly characterized. It would be well for all parties to remember what Lamartine said at the same period—"There are two names in history that the French Republic ought ever to be on its guard against: 'Monck and Bonaparte.'" Gambetta's his opponents are not far from abusing sections of society that are equally free to pay him back in his own coin, so do in the imreasonableness of his so doing. He cannot undo mine M. Thiers, whom France has elected, the Assembly ratifying the choice; and the ex-Dictator, and similar professionals, would be most patriotic by counselling their countrymen to cry out less for their rights and practise more of their duties.
