THE PALESTINE MAILS.

ONE DAY LATER FROM EUROPE.

Lisbon, Oct. 20th.

The London money-market is passing through a kind of crisis that is believed to be of a merely momentary character, caused by heavy withdrawals of gold, especially for South America, and there is every reason to believe that the Bank of England will raise its rate to 7 per cent. At all events there is no chance at present of any reduction from 6 per cent, and rumors are rife that it is intended to apply to the Bank of France for a temporary loan of 4 millions sterling. Some German houses of position have gone smash.

In the political world there is not much to note since the sailing of the Araucania yesterday. The rumors of Bismarck's illness, and that his physicians have ordered him to retire altogether from political life are regarded as mere inventions. Another Berlin conference is spoken of, to be held shortly between the representatives of Austria and Germany with a view to devise measures for checking the plans of the International association.

The protest by the Roman Catholic Bishops assembled at Fulda against the tyrannical measures adopted towards their church, after so many thousands of German Catholics had laid down their lives for the Fatherland, is producing a greater effect than Prince Bismarck had anticipated, and it is remarked that the framer of this able document is one of those German prelates who voted against the Pope on the Infallibility dogma. Most of the Fulda prelates are those who were looked on at the Vatican as the opposition.

Prince Napoleon is expected at Milan, from Switzerland, after his expulsion with his wife from French territory. Immoderations have occurred in Tuscany.

Cardinal Bonnechose, Archbishop of Rouen, has had a conference with M. Thiers on the return of the former from Rome. He says the Pope complains bitterly of the treatment he experiences from the Italian Government, but that he is resolved to remain in Rome and die in the Vatican.

From Austria there is no news of much importance. A bill has been presented to the Hungarian Chambers for the introduction of civil marriage.

The difficulty between Turkey and the semi-independent principality of Monte Negro is not in a way likely to lead to friendly relations. The Hospodar of Monte Negro sent envoys to the Sultan, but on their arrival at Constantinople they were denied an audience, on the grounds that the Sultan could not recognize the Montenegrin prince as an independent ruler.

No trace now remains of the Ferrol insurgents in the North of Spain, and the Republican party in the Cortes have repeated their indignation at the attempt.

LATEST TELEGRAMS.

London 19th, night. The sum of £226,000 was taken out of the Bank to-day for transmission to Brazil, via Southampton. The Bank rate will in all probability be raised to 7.

New York 14th. The funeral of Ex-servant Seward has been on a very grand scale.

IMPORTED FROM BRAZIL.

THREE DAYS LATER.

Rio Janeiro, Nov. 10th.

The British Minister, Mr. Buckley-Matthew, has written by order of Her Majesty to the Brazilian Government, thanking Viscount Itajuba for his earnest and patient labors at Geneva in the settlement of the Alabama claims; adding that Her Majesty trusts this friendly service will strengthen the amicable relations so happily existing between England and Brazil.

The Comendador Alves, of the well known coffee firm of Alves and Avalla, has died and left the charge of his property and children to Baron Mann and

Baron Melhon Souza de Andraday.

His property was considerable and will be divided among his 8 children, of one of whom Baron Mann is godfather.

Railway enterprise continues most active. The first call was paid last week on the new Northern of San Paulo, which is to connect with the Pedro II line of Rio Janeiro.

In Bahia also the engineer H. Wilson has been ordered to proceed to England for materials for the tramway from Bahia to Paraguassu, under the name of Central Bahia Railway.

From Amazonas there is news that the city of Manaus is about to be lighted with gas, and the Comendador John Wilkens had a great majority in the elections of that department. The Greek brig Ozora was lost on the Braganza reef, off Paris.

In all the Northern departments great rejoicings took place on Sept. 28th, anniversary of the passing of the Abolition of Slavery. Speeches and vivas to Viscount Rio Branco and Baron Cotegipe formed the leading feature.

Small-pox continues to prevail at Rio Janeiro and form a portion of the daily mortality list.

The Legislature of Niterohy is now busy with new bridges, subsidies to steam-ferries, canals, and such like works of public utility.

The weather is not yet very hot, marking only 71 Fahrenheit at 1 p.m. in the shade.

Three steamers are now anxiously looked for, the Tycha Brahe from Liverpool, Belgrano from Havre, and Norden from Hamburg. The only news the Palestine has brought of political importance is, that the German Government has adopted the Manser breech-loader, a new kind of needle-gun said to be a great improvement.

A telegram last night from Santos mentioned the departure of the barque Hamdredth with 1284 bales of cotton for England.
