

After all, everything about the Arizona diamonds seems fine. Denver, Col. October 21. There is no longer any doubt as to the discovery of diamonds in the Southern Colorado and Arizona. Several packages of stones have passed through Denver, and after reaching San Francisco have been proved to contain diamonds of the first water, together with other precious stones. A company of 100 men is organizing here, and already numbers over eighty, who will start in a few days, armed, equipped, and provisioned for a six months expedition. Another diamond district has been found in Colorado, nearly west of Denver, on the proposed extension of the Atchison, Topeka, and Santa Fe Railroad. An engineer's party left Pueblo on September 3, following the Arkansas River and Tennessee Creek, to the headwaters of the Piney River, down the Piney, Grand, Witte, and Utah rivers, and reached Salt Lake City on October 16. While passing through the portion of the Colorado range that is being attracted by the brilliancy of the stones found in this region, and without a suspicion of their being diamonds, quite a number were gathered as specimens. When arriving at Salt Lake City, and hearing of the Arizona diamonds, these specimens were produced and tested, and proved to be genuine diamonds. The belief is rapidly growing that the wealth of the Colorado diamonds will vastly eclipse her wealth in silver and gold. A road was quite a railway day at the Provincial Government House, and the Governor, Minister, and head clerks were nearly made blind over plans, projects, surveys and general engineering technicalities. Don Mariano Billinghurst and Mr. Robinson C. E. were the first to arrive, and held the ground till well into the afternoon. They deposited a bulk of full of plans for the Boston railway, which splendid undertaking may now be considered as in full sail. Between new roads, new railways, new tramways, in fact new everything, the Provincial Government is kept well into the collar, and it is scarcely to be wondered at that they have not time to attend to general camp wants. If they continue to be so overwhelmed a special Minister to attend to matters such as security for life and property, the arrest and punishment of malefactors &c., &c. must be named.

EMIGRATION TO PARAGUAY.
To the Editors of the STANDARD.
Gentlemen,
Having read the article which you have published in today's issue relative to emigration to Paraguay, and feeling that this, as well as other articles which have from time to time appeared in the STANDARD on the same topic, has been written under false impressions created by imperfect or interested and partial evidence, I am tempted to overcome the reluctance which I have always felt to appear in print, and to beg of you to publish these few lines, not doubting that, with the spirit of fair play characteristic of Englishmen, you will not refuse to "audire alteram partem."

INSULT TO THE PERUVIAN FLAG AT JAPAN.
By the Santiago from Japan very important intelligence from Japan was imparted to the Standard and Herald of the 31st, which full particulars taken from the Japan Herald of the 7th September. It appears that a Peruvian vessel, the Maria Luz, Captain Herrera, with coolies from Macao had put into a Japanese port in distress from damages received during a typhoon. While the vessel was undergoing repairs one of the coolies escaped on shore and said he did not wish to remain on the ship because he had been ill-treated. The Japanese authorities at the instigation chiefly of Mr. Watson, the British Chargé d'Affaires, insisted on enquiring into the case. All the coolies, 200 in number, were taken out of the ship and brought before the Court. The coolies were collectively asked what complaints they had to make against the Maria Luz, to which they replied—they were insufficiently fed, had no sufficient drink, and were overworked. Mr. Dickens, who acted for Captain Herrera, said in answer to this that no notice had been given to the Captain of any of these proceedings, and when the latter enquired on what ground his ship was detained he was met by a contemptuous refusal to afford him any information. As Captain in the position of such a ship he said he had a perfect right to maintain discipline on board, and with such men who had been mutinous since their departure he had only exercised such measures as were necessary to keep order. As to their being insufficiently fed their appearance disproved that. He (Mr. Dickens) considered that the Japanese could not institute any action against the Captain, and that on his advice the latter should retire from the court having the Japanese responsible for his detention and would ask that the Peruvian and the Portuguese Governments should hold them responsible. The Court objected to the Captain retiring upon which Mr. Dickens left to protest against the proceedings. Of the other coolies examined, some said they had been kidnapped, others that they did not want to go to Peru, not having had enough to eat &c.

Captain Herrera, at his examination, said he was an officer in the Peruvian navy. The Chinese on board were allowed all liberty consistent with discipline and safety. He had punished some of the ringleaders of a mutiny by cutting off their "queues." The coolies could not be considered as passengers, seeing their passage money was not paid, and could not therefore be allowed to leave when they liked. Notwithstanding all the explanations given by Captain Herrera and his protest founded on international law, that "any non-judicial offence committed at Macao or in Chinese waters or upon the high seas, on board the vessel, are not within the jurisdiction of any Japanese Tribunal." The Court rendered judgment condemning the Captain according to Japanese law to be confined in prison for ten days, but at the same time recommending him to mercy. The sentence had been approved of by the Foreign Office at Yeddo. It was then submitted to the Foreign Consuls for their opinion. They all expressed their dissent to the finding of the Court except the British Chargé who acquiesced in it.

CONSULS OF GERMANY, ITALY, PORTUGAL AND DENMARK SENT IN WRITTEN PROTESTS.
So the matter stood when Mr. Sevé, the Belgian Consul General left Yokohama on the 9th September. There is no doubt the Peruvian Government will act energetically in the case and demand with its ironclad satisfaction for such an outrage against her flag and citizens. The Japan Herald further states that Captain Herrera had commenced an action at the Sarsubashi against his coolie passengers for specific performance of their contract. The defendants who have all been joined in one action had six days given them to file answer to plaintiff's petition.
