Rio Janeyro, Dec. 17. The amended Extradition treaty between Brazil and the Argentine Republic was promulgated yesterday, the ratifications having been exchanged on the 30th ult., as signed by Ministers Tejedor and Magalhaes at B. Ayres. The original treaty dates back to Nov. 16th 1869, having been concluded here by General Paunero, the Argentine plenipotentiary. Subsequently a hitch arose in the interpretation of how to deal with fugitive slaves who had committed crime in Brazil and taken refu ge in the Argentine Republic. the protocol of August 1872 solves the diffi-\_eulty in this manner.

1st. Runaway slaves who have committed crime are to be delivered up, the same as ordinary criminals, if accused of a crime which Argentine or Brazilian law tréats as felony.
2nd. After undergoing the punish

ment if found guilty, or on acquittal, the Brazilian Government, at its own expense, sends back to the Argentine Republic the said runaway slaves.
