THE RIO GRANDE'S Mails. The splendid French mail steamer Rio Grande entered port early yesterday morning...

It is asserted that the various European Governments are endeavouring to arrange among themselves some joint action as to the recognition of the new Spanish Government.

Señor Castelar has received advices from Berlin that the Prussian Government will recognize the Republic immediately it receives the Circular despatched announcing its establishment.

Switzerland will also recognize it immediately. The Gazette of to-day says that for the united bands of Saballs and Bosh and other Carlists have been beaten at Santa Pau, in Catalonia.

The civil Governors of the provinces have been appointed. A circular of the Minister of Justice to the Presidents of the Tribunals points out to them the necessity of strictly administering justice, and of reforming the organization of the judicial power and the civil and criminal procedure.

The Imparcial says the attitude of several of the chief Conservatives, and the meeting of the heads of the party held the day before yesterday, lead to the supposition that the Constitutional party are working shortly to resuscitate the claims of the Prince of Hohenzollern.

In to-day's sitting of the Assembly Señor Castelar, replying to a question, said Señor Olazoga had rendered eminent service to the country in his quality of Ambassador to France, and he would support him at any cost.

Sr. Castelar denied that the Congress at Washington had rejected a resolution congratulating the Spanish Government. He read a despatch from Mr. Fish to General Sikes, stating that the American people see with pleasure the proclamation of the Spanish Republic.

If the proposal before Congress to congratulate Spain was not adopted, it was because the Standing Orders did not permit of its adoption. The debate on the Bill for the abolition of slavery in Porto Rico continues.

Sr. Alonso spoke to-day in favour of the Bill.

Mr. T. Alsop, Brazilian Emigration agent, Leanington, sends us the following letter, just received by him from the Brazilian Consul-General at Liverpool:—

"Sir.—The prevalence of unusually severe hot weather in Brazil during the present summer season brought on an incursion of the yellow fever at Rio de Janeiro, when the temperature rose to a very uncommon degree.

From this circumstance the Imperial Government wisely determined to order me to suspend sending emigrants there until the hottest months shall have passed, in order thus to prevent some of them perhaps falling victims to that severe scourge.

"I accordingly beg of you to stop the departure of the families that may have desired to start during this and the two following months, until a second advertisement shall be issued to that purpose, should they still persist in their intention to emigrate thereto.

This determination of my Government is suggested, as you will perfectly conceive, by their solicitude for the safety and welfare of the emigrants themselves.

"It is gratifying to me having to state that the Imperial Government, on account of the letters published here from some emigrants in the colony of Cananea, and to which I called my Government's attention, has despatched a high commissioner to the said colony, charged with instituting there a strict inquiry, so as to ascertain to what extent the complaints and accusations contained in those letters may be justified, and to have righted, what may have been wrong in the matter.

The Government, at the same time, has provided measures for any complaints and representations of the immigrants easily reaching the Minister of Agriculture in future.

The emigrants who went last December by the Edinburgh Castle, have been taken to the Colony of Assuaguay, where, I am informed, they feel satisfied. In conclusion, I have to thank you for the exertions you have made for directing good and eligible emigrants to our colonies, to the advantage thereof, and of the emigrants themselves; and I cherish the hope that the incident which took place with regard to the complaints of the immigrants at Cananea, and to which I called my Government's attention, may not prejudicially affect the emigration in general.

I remain, Sir, yours sincerely, M. Carneiro de Mendosa, Brazilian Consul-General, Liverpool, Feb. 18th."

Mr. Alsop remarks with reference to this letter that as there are two commissions of inquiry into the alleged mismanagement of colonial matters at Cananea, it will not be necessary, at present, for him, or the proposed commission from this country, to proceed to Brazil to make such inquiries.

News has been received here that an insurrection has broken out in Bissau.

The Marquis d'Avila declared to the Cortes that it was necessary to adopt measures for the preservation of the independence and institutions of Portugal.

Windsor Castle, Feb. 20. The Queen and Princess Beatrice drove out yesterday afternoon, attended by Lady Churchill.

Their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess Christian dined with the Queen last night. The Earl and Countess of Granville, who arrived at the Castle in the afternoon, had the honour of being invited.

Dublin, Feb. 20. Lord Listowel was this day invested as a Knight of the Order of St. Patrick, at 3 o'clock, in the Throne Room in Dublin Castle.

In the evening the Knights were entertained at dinner in St. Patrick's-hall, along with numerous guests.

After the health of the Queen had been drunk, His Excellency proposed the toast of Lord Listowel, who would, he said, occupy a worthy place among the men who had been Knights of that Order.

He was sure they would join with him in rejoicing that the name of Listowel was for a second time upon the lists of the Order of St. Patrick.

Lord Listowel, in returning thanks, said he was exceedingly obliged for the kindness with which His Excellency had proposed his health, and for the courteous manner in which he had alluded to his period of service in the Guards. He thanked those whose present hearty for the gracious manner in which they had received his name.

Washington, Feb. 20. A delegation composed of coloured persons was received to-day by General Grant. They asked that the belligerent rights of the Cuban insurgents should be recognized. The President replied that he would do all that was possible, consistent with his public duty.

Additional correspondence has passed between Spain and the United States respecting Cuba, but it will only be published when demanded by Congress.

Sr. PATRICK'S SOCIETY. FIRST ORDINARY MEETING.

On Thursday evening the first ordinary meeting of this society was held at 48 Reconquista; some 50 members present. The chair was taken by Mr. E.T. Mulhall, one of the Vice Presidents of the Society, and the meeting at once resolved itself into committee for the despatch of business.

The Secretary read the letters received, which were ordered to be published. The following matters were brought before the Society, discussed and passed—

1. To instruct Mr. Evans of Montevideo to send up to Buenos Ayres by the first opportunity the two Irish Emigrants arrived per Gaelic and detained in Montevideo by quarantine, and to inform him that this Society will defray all necessary expenses attending same, furthermore that it being represented that these two Irish emigrants are destitute of resources, this Society will pay for their board and lodging in Montevideo until they can be sent on to Buenos Ayres.

Moved by Mr. Director R. H. Murray, seconded by Mr. Director H. Murray and passed "nem con."

2. That all clergymen of English speaking communities in the River Plate, without any religious distinction whatever, be elected Honorary Members of this society. Moved by the Director Rev. J.B. Leahy, seconded by the Secretary Rev. W.M. Walsh and passed unanimously.

3. That a committee of three, consisting of Messrs. T. Duggan, Thos. St. George Armstrong and E.T. Mulhall be named to take steps for the renting of a convenient house for this society, within an area of 8 squares from the Captania. Moved by Mr. Director Davis, seconded by Mr. Director Lowe and passed unanimously.

4. That a committee be named of four directors consisting of— Mr. R. H. Murray, Mr. Frank Davis, Rev. J. B. Leahy, Mr. F. X. Pippet,

To devise a form for the diploma of membership, and to report on same at next meeting: moved by Mr. Director Denny; seconded by Mr. Director Gamble.

5. That a donation list be herewith opened for all parties to make whatever donation they may think proper to this society, said list to be published at the end of each year; it being distinctly understood that no member is required to give any more than the annual subscription set forth in the bye laws; but the treasurer and directors in the country are authorized to receive whatever donations parties may think proper to give over and above said annual subscription, and to sign receipts therefor: moved by Mr. Director Nicholas Lowe; seconded by Mr. Vice-President Duggan; passed unanimously.

The following gentlemen having applied to become members of this society were duly elected:—

His Excellency Dr. Don. Nicolas Avellaneda, Minister of Education. Sr. Dn. Ernesto de las Carreras. Sr. Dn. Juan Antonio Fernandez. General Alexander Tait. Mr. Joshua Negretto. Mr. Charles Ackerley.

The meeting then adjourned to Thursday, 27th inst.

LONDON LETTER. (Our Own Correspondent). Feb. 20th.

By last mail you will have received an abstract of Mr. MacDonnell's "Remarks on the River Plate Republics."

I now send you the report itself, in case a copy has not yet been sent to you from the British Legation.

Mr. Le Bailly, a judge of the Jersey Royal Court, and chairman of the Mercantile Union Bank, which recently suspended payment, was yesterday brought before a police magistrate at St. Helier's on a charge of having appropriated Sardinian bonds to the value of £5,000, which had been entrusted to the bank for safe custody.

A remand for a week was granted, and bail was refused.

Mr. Joseph Xavier de Ligardi, aged 44, who, I believe, inherited £400,000 from his father's business, and who lives in a fine house at Lancaster Gate, was brought before the Lord Mayor, on a warrant, in the custody of Detective Sergeant Webb, to answer a charge of having obtained by false pretences from Messrs. Glyn, Mills & Co., bankers, of Lombard-street, the sum of £12,000, with intent to cheat and defraud them.

The hearing excited very great interest, and the justice room was densely crowded.

Mr. Richard Mullen, solicitor to the London Bankers' Protection Association, conducted the prosecution; Mr. Straight appeared as counsel for the prisoner.

The principal witness for the prosecution was Mr. Bertram Wolchouse Currie, a partner in the banking firm of Glyn, Mills & Co. He said the prisoner, whom he knew, carried on business under the style of Francesco de Lizardi & Co., in Cannon-street, London, on the 3rd of February, the bank being then under considerable advances to the prisoner, he called at the banking-house and saw witness. He had before that been continually pressing witness for fresh advances of money, he representing that large sums were due to him from brokers at the Baltic Coffee-house, and that the advance would only be required for a very short time. He placed a paper in witness's hand, on which witness afterwards endorsed £12,000, £10,000 of which witness meant that the bank had agreed to lend him that sum on the 3rd of February on the understanding that he would repay it on the 6th. The paper ran as follows:—£253 bags of cotton at 67s each, £4300; 1300 qrs. of wheat at £10s, £13,000; 11,895 hides, £14,000; total, £23,200."

The prisoner must then have asked for a specific loan, for on that day two sums of £2000 each were advanced him, he leaving certain documents as security for the £12,000. Among them was one in the Spanish language, purporting to be a bill of lading for 325 bags of cotton weighing (together with 101 kilograms) and shipped at Santander on the 23rd January to be delivered in London to the order of Messrs. F. de Lizardi & Co. He handed witness a piece of the 1305 quarters of wheat mentioned in the paper which he had previously shown witness, and quoted above. On the faith of that story and of the securities, witness's bank made the prisoner an advance of £12,000. The loan was not repaid them on the 6th of February, as agreed, and is still retained due to their house. On the 12th of February he called on witness more than once,

for the purpose of inducing him to honor his acceptances. With that view he showed witness a piece of paper purporting to be a valuation of his securities which the bank held, including, among others, the 1300 quarters previously referred to. The result was, that the bank honored his acceptances, and that the extent of four times the amount of his advances to him. On the following day the prisoner's firm suspended payment.

Evidence was given by other witnesses to show that the ship Anna Webster arrived in London towards the end of January last, and that the 2,234 sacks of wheat mentioned in her bill of lading were, within three days afterwards, delivered to Messrs. Home, Son, and M'Innes, of Mark-lane, corn-factors, by direction of the prisoner's firm that on the 27th January Home, Son, and M'Innes drew a cheque in favour of the prisoner's firm for £3000 on security of a deposit of a duplicate of the bill of lading, which cheque had since been paid by their bankers; that the wheat mentioned in the bill of lading had been since delivered to Home, Son, and M'Innes, and now lay at their risk at a wharf in Rotherhithe. At that time, therefore, the bill of lading was delivered to Mr. Currie on the 3rd of February, under the circumstances laid in evidence by him, it was wholly unnecessary to draw a cheque, that was all the evidence he proposed for the present to give. He was obliged to say that was not the only charge he should have against the prisoner.

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The Lord Mayor, after much consideration, said he did not, having regard to the large sum, £12,000, of which the prisoner was charged with defrauding Messrs. Glyn, Mills, and Co., and to the circumstance that another charge might be impending over him, feel himself justified in admitting him to bail, but he would make the demand as short as possible, namely, till Friday week.

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The company of Licensed Victuallers have resolved to move for a new trial in the case of Reade v. the Ad-vert. in which the verdict appeared to me so monstrously unjust.

The Earl of Carnarvon (says the Daily News) draw the attention of the House of Lords to the alleged sufferings of certain Warwickshire labourers who have been induced to emigrate to Brazil. Lord Granville could only say that inquiry is being made already into the facts of the case. Recently, various agencies have been making strenuous efforts to induce English and Irish labourers to emigrate to Brazil. In one case a Member of Parliament, and an author, was invited to write a book on the subject, and offered a "consideration" of so much per head on every emigrant he could induce to go out. All this may be fair enough on the part of energetic persons interested in the prosperity of Brazil; and there seems no reason why a race of colonists, able to suit themselves to a Southern climate, should not in time prosper there. But a Warwickshire peasant is likely, indeed, to find himself out of his element in a country where almost every condition of existence is strange and uncongenial; and where not even the prices of food are high, and the means of living very hard. What the Government can do in the matter is not very clear.

The following is the best of many paragraphs of the kind in the provincial papers:—

Another Brazilian emigrant has arrived in Warwickshire, who confirms the statement made by Stanton as to the treatment of English labourers. It is intended to hold another meeting at Banbury, when steps will be taken to secure a hearing for the returned emigrant. The Brazilian Consul at Liverpool says that every inquiry will be made by the Brazilian Government into the treatment of the Brazilian colonists.

In consequence of these rumours the Brazilian Government has given instruction to stop all emigration to Brazil from this country till official enquiries have been made.

The Spanish Court has acquitted the Marillo, and released her. The shippers of cargo in the Northfleet are moving in the Admiralty Court to enquire as to the ownership of the Marillo, and the Court has ruled that interrogatories may be put for that purpose. The ship is registered as Spanish but there are doubts on the subject.

The Spanish Republic looks healthy and has been acknowledged by the U. States and most European Governments excepting the French Republic (?). Mr. Thiers is no doubt waiting for Castelar to ask his advice and assistance. The little man thinks it is his genius which has settled everything in France. He forgets it is the Commune which has settled everything and has aided him.

The Paris bourse was excited yesterday by the rumour that the Germans were to be paid off in June, and

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France would be free at that date. The rumour is to-day contradicted. The last milliard will be paid about October or towards the end of the year if political affairs go on smoothly in France.

The Lusitania arrived at Lisbon on the 18th, having accomplished her run from Rio under 16 days; her total time under steam from Valparaiso 29 days 20 hours, the shortest time on record.

The Brazilian Telegraph Co. had to refuse applications for subscriptions. No alteration to-day in Bank rate. Argentine stocks firm and in demand.

The weather yesterday was shockingly clammy. Another "buster" of rain cannot be far off. Every thing in the Standard Court yesterday from the barometer to the salt cellar portended wet (except the "lush" cellar which is dryer than ever).

We have been favoured with a copy of the "Revista de la Republica," a new scientific review edited by Messrs. Conteno, Belgrano and Rivadavia. Judging from the merit displayed in its opening effort, this publication has a very good chance of the success which we sincerely wish it, while saluting its young editors with all cordiality.

The Saint Patrick's Society held a meeting on Thursday night, which was most numerously attended. The clergyman of all denominations here and in Montevideo were unanimously elected honorary members of the Society.

Next Tuesday, Lady Day, will be a strict holiday at the Bank and Government offices, being a church feast of some solemnity. We take the following from a home paper:

There was very little movement in stocks to-day. Bonds opened and closed weak, but in the liquidation stiffened a little. There was nothing sold cash, but for the end of the month 180,000 sold at 92. For April 180,000 at 91.

Bonds closed buyers in the liquidation at close in quotations. In Exchange there was always something done to-day at 48 1/4. Bank rate, and 48 1/2 commercial paper. Fra. on Antwerp 5 1/2 to 13 do; on Paris 5 1/2 to 2 1/4.

There was a stir on 'Change to-day, when it was announced that wool sold this morning at 97 mls, and that samples were to be seen at the Standard office. The English steamer Caroline, about which there was so much anxiety, has reached a port in Portugal. She was detained 24 days at St. Vincent; she lost of coal; all the regular liners had to be served first.

The Asia is a magnificent steamer; she will be cleared by Messrs. J. P. Boyd and Co., and will sail direct from the port to Europe. The Corcovado brought out 166 passengers to the Plate. The financial and commercial advice for Rio Grande are pretty much the same as for Corcovado. Money has cheapened in London, and a lowering of the Bank rate is looked for.

The Galata has broken down and been obliged to put into Bahia. The Neva passengers that came out for Montevideo are still in quarantine, on board the French ponto-n Dumas. The Rio Grande has brought out 176 passengers to the Plate.

The Iris, Captain Shaw, has arrived from Concordia with full cargo and passenger list. It seems that, by some blunder on the previous voyage, the Iris was put into quarantine here and kept for 15 days. Rather a sharp business, as she only trades with the Entre Rios ports. Everything is quiet in Entre Rios, and business is represented as good. The little steamer Yarla brings the Gua-guaycho passengers to the Iris at the mouth of the Arroyo. The Iris sails this port (Inner Roads) on Monday morning for Concordia and intermediate ports. There is no news as to what is in the Uruguay. The river is falling rapidly.

It was rumored on 'Change that General Mitre and the Brazilian Minister, Baron de Aragus, will leave immediately for Paraguay, possibly in the Goys. The sooner this Paraguayan business is settled the better. In our quotations yesterday of Argentine stocks in the London market we quoted Commercial Bank shares at 22 premium. This might be understood, in 62 per share of 50 sterling, equal to 33 per cent. Rather a respectable premium this.

Another brilliant business in wheat was spoken of in the North market this morning. A large lot of wheat by rail came from Chivilloy; this lot is part of a lot of 6,000 fanegas bought outside three months ago at 145, and resold now for 190. The business gives \$270,000 m/c profit. The Saturno left this port yesterday evening for Montevideo crowded from stem to stern with passengers. She brought a large number down from Salto and took in here a still larger number. The five steamer Menelas, clearing from this port direct for Europe, on Monday, will be a most favorable opportunity for intending passengers.

Paraguay stock fell 5/16 on the notice from the Emigration Commissioners. A River Plate merchant in England has favoured us with the following memo respecting River Plate matters talked of in England:—"All Argentine stocks and railways firm in London. The opinion upon Mr. Bateman's report to Sr. Agolo has been most favourably reviewed by his brother engineers, and all concur that there is no difficulty whatever, and that the Argentine Government cannot be in more efficient hands than Mr. Bateman's, as the reports by Mr. Reyrol looked upon with disdain, and believed to have been written with gross prejudice.

"The investors in London cannot make out why the Argentine Government will not guarantee the Rosario Railway; as if the government have any means it will pay 7 per cent.—the guarantee is really nothing. "Mutual Gas Co.—Mr. George Bower, the contractor, will charter a steamer direct for Buenos Ayres with 2,000 tons of pipes, machinery, &c. The men will come out in the same steamer and thus save quarantine.

"Several large merchants of Liverpool are desirous of running steamers of 400 tons and 800 horse power direct to Buenos Ayres, on 'y' touching at Vigo for emigrants, with additional supply of coal and fruit &c. "The steamers would be nearly 50 per cent. larger than the Royal Mail, and be fitted up much superior both for 1st class, and emigrant accommodation. No 2nd class would be carried. The voyage would be made in 20 days at most, and the outside to all that would be desired. Smoking room for gentlemen on deck with direct communication to the bar. Ring room with piano &c. for ladies on deck. Electric bells in cabins with improved lighting, so that passengers may read at night in their own cabins. Letters would be carried 3d per lb. and all necessary toiletries sold on board, such as perfume, tooth powder and brushes, combs &c. This business only requires a little assistance from B. A. merchants to be started; and would then be always free from quarantine, and double the number of passengers would be carried to and fro in 2 years."

"This morning two wagons with a new export entered the station. Manufactured blood from the saladores, said to be a most reliable article in Europe. On Thursday evening a heavy batch of Emigrant passengers just out of quarantine landed on the mole, they were all Basques and Gallegos and looked in good spirits. The Italian barque Atala has just entered with 123 Catalan emigrants. Some of the co-nists sent by Government to Europe last year have returned each with from 15 to 20 relatives, this looks well; they all go forward to the Santa Fe colonies; 66 emigrants to colonies were sent up yesterday.

The French mail steamer Rio Grande entered this morning. The mails were out at 4 o'clock. The German schooner Theodor, just entered at Montevideo, lost her Captain when four days out from Pernambuco. Died of yellow fever. The Brazilian steamer De Braz, down from Corumbá, brought 69 passengers and a good cargo. The trade with Matto Grosso is wonderful improving; some account sales show what can be done up there.

Last advices from Rio give exchange firm at 274. Sovereigns nominally at 9.160, but real price 8.800. Health bad. Business at a complete stand still. The next White Star steamer is the Asiatic, one of the finest steamers afloat, 3,000 tons, 400 horse power. The Government commission consisting of Admiral Muroto, Mr. Channing, M. Solor, and Mr. Ackerong, have examined the Vileta and report favourably on her for a quarantine steamer.

Some important changes in the position of River Plate produce have been noticed since 3rd inst: whilst hides in general were tending upward, a new decline has been established for wool at the auction which closed on 15th inst: tallow and sheepskins very dull, and trans-

actions in those articles show a considerable falling off on those of preceding fortnight—Hides—Stock list, Inst., Transit deducted, 49,900 hides against 108,200 same time last year. 77,800 in 1871 and 18,500 in 1870. Imports of fat last month, 88,800 hides against 124,900 same time last year, 211,000 in 1871 and 44,500 in 1870. Arrivals since list mail 46,700. Imports of month to date 46,700. Sales since 3rd,— 4,700 dry River Plate 13,000 salted 500 dry Rio Grande as set 5,700 miscellaneous 24,600 hides.

Stock, less transit and sales on delivery, but including arrivals to date, 384,000 hides, viz.: 14,600 dry and 13,000 salted R. P. Rio Grande, 10,200 miscellaneous and horse hides. The demand is fairly a tivo, but small stock on hand and high pretensions of holders, cause transactions to be somewhat difficult.

In consequence of favorable news received from English markets during early part of fortnight, importers showed little disposition to sell here, but they succeeded in establishing following on quotations of beginning of month, viz:— F. 6 for B. A. dry summer hair madero cow. saladero ox (winter hair). The first sale new season saladero ox was made a few days ago, as noted below; they have been received since, and are offered at £100 for the 20 and 32 k, and at £95 for the 32-40 k.
