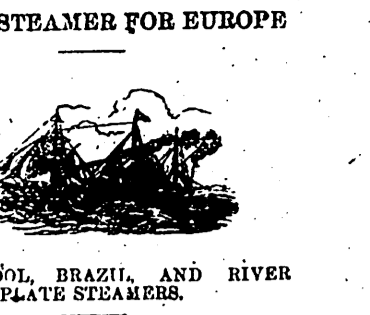

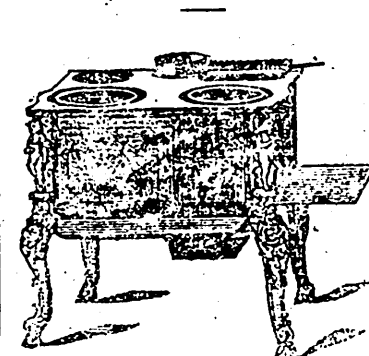

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convicted or accused of murder. The circumstances of the different cases are of almost every degree of atrocity, but those belonging to the two which occurred this week are marked by so savage a recklessness and such utter contempt of law that the most careless among us cannot escape the consideration of the question whether the first of human rights, the right to life, has the least protection in this community. In the first case two men, who had been friends, quarrelled upon so trivial and common a cause as their rival attentions to a young woman, and one of them, after letting the sun go down upon his anger, proceeds to shoot the other the next day, while he is sitting quietly in his room, like a dog, as he threatened that he would. The other is still more remarkable. Two men, who had never seen each other before, meet in a crowded thoroughfare, as thousands do every hour in the day, and after a wordy altercation, almost as common in such encounters, one of them draws a pistol and deliberately shoots the other (dead in his tracks), as they call it in the semi-barbarism of frontier life, where there is no law. Any one who walks or drives in the streets of this city may be called upon at any time to expostulate against encroachments upon the right of way, and it may be the fate of any of us to meet with one of these armed ruffians on a dray or in a wagon, on some slight provocation will not have the slightest hesitation, or compunction in settling a trifling dispute by swift murder. Is there no remedy?

"Either we have reached that point in the development or perversion of human character where there can be no restraining power of law, or else our laws are so defective that they utterly fail in the prevention of crime. To suppose the first is to assume that man is absolutely depraved, and that the highest civilization is only to be reached at the cost of developing in a portion of the community the merely savage instincts. If this be not true, and we should be very reluctant to accept any such theory, then the fault is in society, in its neglect to make the law sufficient for the protection of all its members.

"This is clearly the fact. There is no safety to life among us in cases where men's passions are liable to be aroused, because there is no certainty in the law. It is an axiom among those who have given most thought to the subject that it is not the possible severity of punishment, but its absolute certainty, that is most effective in suppressing crime. The man who premeditates a crime, or whose unbridled passions may betray him at any moment into its commission, is not restrained by the consideration that at some time he may possibly be hanged or imprisoned for life, but by the constant or instant reflection that the crime will certainly be followed by speedy punishment. Society is governed by habits of mind. What we need for the protection of life is the habitual and universal conviction that the crime of murder is punished with absolute certainty and unerring promptitude. The twenty-six men in the Tombs pass month and years there in tranquillity so long as they reckon upon uncertainty and delay. They grow haggard when they hear that the car-hoek murderer, or any other convict, is to be certainly and speedily hanged. It is the fault of the administration of the law that their habitual mental condition has not previously been of this character, which would then have acted as a restraining influence to prevent their becoming criminals.

"The nearer the pace of justice in this city approaches that of the Provost Marshal the safer will life be among us. Whether the punishment for murder be death or imprisonment for life, the community must be made to know that manslaughter will inevitably be followed by an immediate trial, and the trial, on conviction, by immediate and certain punishment. The machinery of the law is out of gear. Instead of six and twenty men confined through the law's delay at once on charges of criminal evidence there should never be more than two or three in jail at one time. A few days or a few weeks at most, only, should ever intervene between the commission of the act and its absolute, unerring punishment or the acquittal of the accused. Why should there not be a Court having exclusive jurisdiction over all assaults endangering life or resulting in death? Such a Court might consist of five Justices, holding office for seven years, with a Grand Jury devoted entirely to its business, meeting once a week to consider and report indictments. Two of these Justices might sit every day in separate courts to hear and try cases, and the whole Court could sit once a week, on a stated day, to hear appeals from the rulings of a single Judge. When four of the five Judges agree their decision should be final and without appeal, except to the Governor of the State. All other courts should be prohibited from any interference with either the process or the action of the Criminal Court, and execution should follow conviction in that court within twenty days or even a shorter period.

"By such summary proceedings almost all criminal cases would be settled within fifty or sixty days, and the great defects of uncertainty of punishment and delay of trial under the present system be remedied. The moral influence upon the minds of all classes, cannot, we think, be questioned.

"We do not, of course, mean to say that the remedy we propose is the only one, or that a better one cannot be found. But it is useless to go into spasms of horror and indignation over every fresh murder, and cry out at the

depravity of human nature and the want of protection to human life. What we do want is practical suggestions to meet a state of things that has become appalling, and we make this one, believing that the root of the evil is in the laxity of the law that provides neither certainty nor promptness in the punishment of crime."

The Forgery discovered on Saturday in the city will rank among the most skillful attempts to prey upon the complex organization of modern commerce. It is not isolated fraud committed by an ordinary gang of Forgers for the sake of a few hundred pounds. It is as elaborate a conspiracy as was ever concerted at New York to gain the command of a railway or the bullion market, and must evidently have been carried out by men of considerable acquaintance with commercial affairs and commanding a large capital. The manner in which the plot was laid indicates the possession of very complete information respecting the management of business in the city. The object was to get forged bills discounted. Now, the Bank of England exercises very great caution in admitting new customers to the privilege of obtaining discount. Any person who desires to open a "discount account" must be introduced by one of the Directors, and, consequently, very careful inquiries are made into his respectability and solvency. It is highly probable that the confederate of a gang of Forgers would be able to procure sufficiently satisfactory recommendations to induce the Bank to grant him discount accommodation. But the Bank has a branch in Burlington-gardens, which does an entirely different kind of business from the parent establishment in the city. It is intended for the convenience of gentlemen and ladies and West-End tradesmen who might find it inconvenient to journey to the city in order to transact their occasional business. It is not, therefore, ordinarily concerned with the large Bill transactions of city commerce, and in consequence is less bound by strict regulations in dealing with any business of that nature which might accidentally be brought to it. The conspirators must have been aware of this, and they laid their plans for approaching the Bank of England by this weaker portion of its defences.

The person, accordingly, who is now being sought by the Police, commenced by opening a deposit account of the ordinary character with the Western Branch of the Bank. For this purpose he would need only an introduction by some customer, and the only evidence of solvency the Bank would require of him would be the deposit of a sufficient cash balance. This was, of course, forthcoming, and constituted part of the capital with which the scheme was carried on. Of course, all the money thus invested would, it was expected, ultimately be recovered; but the gang must have been well supplied with funds in order to afford to keep a large sum of money invested, as it were, in the speculation. The manager of the plot was in no hurry, and took care to gain a good footing before he ventured on his ultimate enterprise. He behaved for some time just like an ordinary customer of good resources. He drew upon his balance and renewed it, but kept it always at a good figure. After a while he deposited some bills. They were good and genuine bills. Still he was careful not to be hasty, and he continued his transactions with the bank until he had acquired the reputation of a person engaged in legitimate commerce, and thoroughly trustworthy. At length the moment came for the presentation of the forged bills. They were discounted without hesitation, and the authors of the fraud had, to all appearance, succeeded in safely pocketing about a hundred thousand pounds. Some of the money, it appears, was invested in United States Bonds, so that to the last they might avoid the appearance of doing anything unusual. They are said to be Americans, and what more natural than that they should desire bonds of their own country? All these arrangements were masterpieces of ingenuity and patience. But the bills themselves must have required the greatest amount of labour. In the first place, many of the large firms upon whom the bills purported to be drawn are in the habit of using a peculiar kind of paper, with certain water-marks and printed matter. All this would have to be imitated, and, as the bills were drawn on more than one firm, there must have been several such imitations. There remained the drawing of the bills and affixing the signatures, and each bill must have required a series of feints in successful forging. Some bills were backed by several acceptors, so that there might easily be as many as half a dozen signatures on a single bill; yet the bills were so perfect that not one of them was questioned on the ground of the acceptances not appearing genuine. The plot had, to all appearance, a success which its consummate skill and patience deserved. The money was obtained. The bills were drawn at three months' date; no further inquiry was likely to be made about them until they fell due, and the forgers would have ample time for placing themselves far beyond all risk of capture. But it is rarely that these conspiracies are not marred by some utterly gratuitous oversight, and the execution of this scheme was marred

by the inevitable flaw. The men who had exerted a skill, foresight and perseverance sufficient to ensure the unhesitating acceptance of forged bills could not escape one trivial blunder, which revealed the whole plot. They presented two bills in which the date of acceptance had been omitted. The whole calendar was at their disposal; they knew perfectly well that a single slip in the usual formalities would be fatal; and yet they fell into the folly of marring their whole scheme for lack of a date. Inquiry was, of course, made of the firm whose acceptance was thus undated; it was discovered that the bill was not genuine, and the whole series were then found to be forgeries. How much further the plot might have been carried it is impossible to say.

Thus a conspiracy which must have required months of work, the most patient ingenuity, sustained management, and the expenditure of a large capital, has suddenly collapsed "for lack of a nail," and the whole labour is lost. It is difficult to know whether to feel more surprise at the misdirected energy required for such a scheme, or at the evidence it affords of the dangers to which our elaborate system of commercial finance is necessarily exposed. Considering the millions which change hands day by day by the mere process of endorsing bits of paper, it is only wonderful that more Forgeries are not attempted. But it requires qualities quite out of the common to carry out a plot of this magnitude and elaboration. It was in the first place a speculation of the highest rashness. These men staked large sums of money on the chance of their being able to pass off successfully a complicated series of Forgeries. The same amount of money invested in a legitimate enterprise and applied with similar energy could not have failed to yield an abundant return. What is the perversity which drives men of these talents and opportunities into a career in which they risk everything on the mere chance that not a single element in their plan will fail them? It is not the work of an ordinary thief who might forge to obtain the immediate necessities of life. It is more like the desperation of gamblers—the class who have just been dispersed over Europe by the closing of the gaming tables on the Rhine, who find a pleasure in staking everything they have on a mere chance. The prompt discovery, however, will hardly fail to act as a severe check on similar conspiracies.

On Monday, 3rd March, by command of the Queen His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales held a Levée at St. James Palace. Amongst the presentations, we notice the Paraguayan Minister, also Dr. Leone Levi, F.S.A., F.S.S., Consul-General of Paraguay, by the Minister Plenipotentiary for Paraguay.

It is stated that Lieutenant-General Thiebault has been nominated Minister of War, and that his appointment will appear to-morrow in the official *Moniteur Belge*.

Rome, March 3rd. The *Observatore Romano* denies the statement published in the *Journal de France* that the Pope had written to the Comte de Chambord to persuade him to make some concessions in order to facilitate the agreement of the Monarchical parties in France.

The *Liberta* believes that it is probable that the Government will appoint a special commissioner to negotiate with M. Ozanne on the Treaty of Commerce with France.

Wiesbaden, March 3. According to official information, the Czar of Russia will arrive at Elms, to drink the waters, on the 1st of June, and will remain there until the 15th July.

Saratov, March 2. The Grand Duke Nicolas Constantinevich and his suit left here to-day for Nerkesan.

Constantinople, March 3. A protocol was signed on Saturday by Khalid Pasha, the Minister for Foreign Affairs, and by the representatives of England, France, and Italy, to terminate the abuse of consular jurisdiction in Tripoli, Africa, in lawsuits between natives and the subjects of the above Powers. Henceforth these suits will be tried according to the capitulations and according to the terms employed for the capitulations in other provinces of the Turkish Empire.

Washington, March 3. Mr. Boutwell has ordered the sale of \$6,000,000 gold and the purchase of \$3,000,000 bonds during the month of March.

The Senate has concurred in the resolution passed by the House of Representatives, congratulating the people of Spain on their efforts to consolidate the principles of universal liberty in the Republican form.

The House of Representatives has passed the Texas and Pacific Railroad Bill.

The 5-20 Bonds of 1862 called in for redemption embrace all the second and third series up to the following numbers:—\$50 Bonds, No. 1,201; \$100 Bonds, No. 4,752; \$500 Bonds, No. 3,000; \$1,000 Bonds, No. 5,733. The total of the Coupon Bonds called in is \$45,000,000, and of Registered Bonds, \$5,000,000. The interest ceases on the 1st of June.

The Madoc Indians have accepted conditions of peace. By the terms of the surrender the military authorities are to be moved to the reservation territory of Arizona or South California.

The port Royal Railway was completed to-day. This line connects the Atlantic with Augusta, Atlanta, and Nashville, and is the shortest route from the sea-coast to the Mississippi.

Paris, March 3, Evening. The French arsenals are now fully replenished and the losses occasioned by the late war are made good. The Bourse opened and closed very firm. The last quotation of Three per Cent. Rentes is 57f. 47c., or 32c., and the Five per Cent. Loan, 1872, 91f. 47c., or 26c., higher than Saturday.

10 10 P.M. To-day there was an interview between M. Thiers and Count Arnim. Brussels, March 3. The *Independence Belge* publishes intelligence from Berlin stating that the Government will propose to the German Parliament that the civil registers shall be transferred to the civil authorities. The Liberals will also shortly propose the introduction of civil marriage, and it is believed that the Federal Council will support these reforms.

Mr. MacDONELL'S REPORT. REMARKS ON THE RIVER PLATE REPUBLICS AS A FIELD FOR BRITISH EMIGRATION. (Continued.)

"The colonies on the Central Argentine Railway from their position, are the only ones deserving the notice of immigrants. Caracanal, from the nature of its soil and position, promises to hold a foremost place amongst them. The soil, a mixture of clay and sand, though it appears heavy, offers no opposition to cultivation; the grasses, too, are of good quality. The manner, however, in which the soil is at present cultivated must lead to its prompt exhaustion.

"Here, as in almost all the Argentine Colonies, everything depends on the administration; and though the central Colonies are equitably and intelligently directed their dependence weighs heavily on the immigrant.

"Wheat, maize, potatoes, which are the only marketable articles that can be cultivated, cannot be profitably produced, and still less offered in the market of Rosario, on account of the exorbitant railway freight; it is, besides, useless to attempt to raise fruit or vegetables, or produce milk and butter, as the natives do not consume such articles. Moreover, labour is expensive and scarce, and the heat so great that Europeans find it difficult at first to resist the climate and adapt themselves to the mode of living.

"Insects, the great plague of the country, are nowhere more numerous and destructive, and the droughts are so constant and severe, that farmers calculate only on one successful year out of five, two being indifferent, and two, utter failures.

"Consideration should be had too to the fact that, at these Colonies, production outvies consumption, and the surplus of grain invariably entails loss upon the cultivators, who must not look to Government to create outlets for this agglomeration of produce; the less so as the latter will never assist the colonist in meeting the difficulties of scarcity, cost of labour, and exorbitant price of transport.

"These considerations have led me to the conclusion that the Colonies of this Republic can never attain a higher development than that reached at present by the most successful of them, such success being only relative, and not likely to insure great prosperity or increase.

"Cattle rearing has in some cases been resorted to, especially at the Santa Fe Colonies; but the distance to which the herds are sent to pasture exposes them to the raids of the Indians. The constant droughts render sheep and cattle farming too precarious in the upper provinces.

"Apart from every other consideration, the mere fact of insecurity for life and property, and the utter indifference manifested by the authorities towards immigrants, should be reason enough to deter settlers from embarkment in this hap-hazard system of colonization."

The Colony of Frayle Muerto, or Belleville, not far distant from the station of the same name on the Central Argentine Railway, though not on the lands of the Company, was established by a number of Englishmen in 1863-64. This Colony deserves notice, inasmuch as it is the only serious attempt made by our countrymen to found a settlement in this Republic. [Note 17, Appendix.] This Colony has likewise been represented to the intending English emigrant as a success, being said to possess "the best agricultural machinery for the working of 5,000 acres of arable land, a large stock of sheep, and a number of horses and tame cattle"; and that "the forty or fifty farms composing the settlement are in a prosperous and flourishing condition."

steadily; not a year has passed that we have not been visited by some plague or other, in the shape of hail-storms, droughts, locusts, Indian raids, &c.

"No reliance can be placed on agriculture: sheep farming we have tried and failed in, and nothing is now left but to attempt the rearing of cattle. We might, perhaps, partially recover our losses in a few years, by placing cattle on our camps, where we can keep them fat all the year round; but so long as we are not secure from the constant inroads of the Indians, it would be most imprudent to attempt it. If nothing be done to protect us, I shall not remain in this country."

The Colonies of Villa Urquiza and San Jose, in Entre Rios, were founded in 1858-59, by the late General Urquiza, Governor of that province, and their comparative success is due to the unceasing efforts of the General himself to attract a suitable class of immigrants, in which all nationalities are represented. The progress of colonization and the interests of settlers in Entre Rios have been, however, most seriously affected by the late revolution, which followed the assassination of the General; and it is doubtful whether its political condition for some time to come will be such as to attract foreigners.

(To be continued.) ROUGH NOTES FROM MAGELLAN.

The very name Straits of Magellan is to the present for those few who have heard of it take an interest in this. Ultima Thule, a synonym for all that is dreary, rigorous and inhospitable. From the time of their discovery up to within a comparatively short period, the Straits have been a sealed book to the outer world of commerce and navigation, if we except the occasional passage through of some daring Yankee schooner with "notions" for the West Coast, a few sealers, and at long intervals a man of war on some surveying expedition; and whenever their existence has been recalled it has almost always been in connection with a scene of human hardship and suffering.

When the ill-fated Sarmiento in the time of Elizabeth planted the first colony at what is now known as Port Famine and sailed away to Europe, what sufferings the poor wretches he left behind must have gone through till death itself put an end to their existence. It was his fleet returning to Europe were captured by the English cruisers, the Spanish Government sent no provisions or relief of any sort to the unfortunate and when Drake passed through the Straits three years afterwards he rescued, in the last stage of distress 12 people who remained of the original colony of between three and four hundred, the rest having perished of cold and starvation. The poor wretches had wandered up and down the shores of the Strait as far as Cape Virgen and back again prolonging a miserable existence by shell-fish and berries, as long as possible, till one by one they dropped down on the beach to die. After a lapse of nearly three centuries the ill-fated Port Famine was again selected for the purpose of settlement, the Chilean Government about 30 years ago planting there a penal settlement, and penal it must have been, the inhabitants on several occasions having narrowly escaped the fate of Sarmiento's colonists, owing to the very irregular supply of provisions sent to them now and then in some sailing vessel from Valparaiso, and the privations suffered led to the revolt and massacre of the authorities by the Cambiases.

The Government determined upon a new settlement which was formed upon the present Sandy Point, and the infant colony has, since its foundation, been in danger on several occasions of starvation, managed to struggle on till escape was put in their power of such disaster one of the question. Now three lines of Ocean steamers pass through the Strait, giving an average of one arrival every three days at our little port. In addition to these a new London line and a Belgian one will, it is said, shortly commence running, so that it is probable that before the end of the year this remote point will be in almost daily communication with the Atlantic and Pacific.

A small party of us made an excursion to the Pampa, and found game of all kinds extremely plentiful. The guanacos cover the country literally in millions, and are much easier to approach than those of Northern Patagonia, but ostriches are not nearly so abundant and are much wilder than those near the Chapu and Rio Negro. The various lakes abound with the black-necked swan, Falkland and Straits geese, ducks, &c., and a species of woodcock, and large English snipe are also very abundant. The country near Sandy Point is thickly wooded, but at Cape Negro, about 15 miles to the northward, it assumes a park-like character with open glades of caput pasture watered by the little river Chabuenco, forming one of the choicest cattle and sheep runs in this part. It is not yet stocked, but will be doubtless in a short time. Reached this the open Pampas are passing. The country is mostly rolling and hilly, with here and there extensive plains and downs. The general character of the pastures is short and dry, but in the "cañadas" and valleys it is often most luxuriant, and from Sandy Point to the River Gallegos it may be classed as a fair average grazing country, which is not so rich as the fertile plains of Buenos Ayres is equally far removed from the stony, thorny deserts of Northern Patagonia. Surprise has been expressed by voyagers upon seeing numerous herds of guanacos and ostriches that such vast numbers could subsist and fatten upon the bare hills in view from seaward, but like most other countries Southern Patagonia shows its most unpromising aspect along the coast line, and the unfavorable impressions received are only corrected by examination of the interior.

The horses of the Indian traders from this place, although travelling almost continuously for weeks, get quite fat after leaving the over-stocked pastures round the colony, and the "vaqueros" or wild cattle districts, may be cited as showing how well the climate and country suit horned stock.

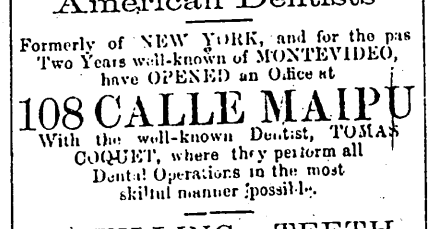
