It is no exaggeration to say that few cities in the world are progressing more rapidly than Montevideo, and if its trade, commerce and population, go on increasing for the next ten years as since 1863 down to the present, those who live until 1883 will, in all human probability, see here a seaport rivaling New York in tonnage, and a city with several hundred thousand inhabitants.

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place kept sac ed and surrounded with a handsome railing as a kind of park, the property of the British community.

Outside the cemetery is a large space of ground which might be sold for building purposes, worth about 60 to 80 thousand hard dollars, and this would not only suffice for purchasing a site for a new cemetery, but leave a large balance that might be given to the British Hospital.

Communication by water, too, is likewise deficient and expensive, notwithstanding all the natural advantages of the country in this respect.

It would be difficult to suggest, as a general rule, the amount of money needed to enable a new comer to start in sheepfarming on however moderate a scale, and an attempt at indication would only mislead intending immigrants.

In this manner only can a settler safely hope for a yearly return of interest, at a rate varying from 10 to 15 or 20 per cent. in prosperous years; thus enabling him, at the end of four or five years, to recover his original capital—in sheep; having meanwhile acquired sufficient experience of the country and his business to warrant the prospect of ultimate success.

The demand for such settlers, however, is not great; and, on the other hand, few of those of the class in question command the requisite means.

One of the most shocking cases of official inhumanity it has ever been our lot to hear of was brought under our notice yesterday.

A hard-working, industrious, intelligent and sober man may, in a comparatively short number of years (Note 34, Appendix), better his position considerably, by getting sheep lent to him on shares, and dividing the produce and increase with the owner of the estancia, (Note 35, Appendix) or estate, in exchange for his services.

Her Majesty's Government has, on more than one occasion, found it necessary to warn intending emigrants to these States of the danger they would incur, due to the insecurity of life; these warnings gave great dissatisfaction to private individuals who had an interest in attracting English and German settlers hither, and brought forth statements in denial in the press of this country as in that of England.

The Argentine Government, likewise, took offence at these notices, interpreting them as unjustifiable attacks upon the morality of this nation, which they contended, in criminal statistics would bear comparison with any European country, England included, losing sight of the fact that the accusation bore, not specially on the proportion of crime, but on the utter impunity with which the most notorious outrages and assassinations are being daily committed, such impunity being the result of a loose and improper administration of an already defective criminal code; the corruption and ignorance of the inferior judicial authorities, especially in the rural districts; and the total absence of an effective, honest, and properly-organized police, of prisons, penal settlements, and all the other instruments, in fact, requisite to execute and vindicate the law.

It is this condition of things which has been so long tolerated, and for which no remedy has been attempted by those in authority, that is now denied; yet crime has lately gained such monstrous proportions, and appears so deeply rooted, that the most appalling murders cease to excite attention, and are accepted, if not excused, as an unavoidable evil.

MR. MACDONELL'S REPORT.

REMARKS ON THE RIVER PLATE RE-PUBLICS AS A FIELD FOR BRITISH EMIGRATION.

IV.—THE OBSTACLES TO BE ENCOUNTERED AND THE SUCCESS TO BE ANTICIPATED.

Strenuous endeavours have been and are being made, principally by foreigners, to open up this vast territory by means of railway enterprise, but this, as yet, affords but a very meagre threat of intercommunication compared with the extent to be traversed; and though the future of this Republic hinges mainly on these undertakings, yet such is the narrow spirit of jealousy of which foreign activity in counters at the hands of certain members of the Government and but too many of the more influential natives, that they are far from receiving that support and encouragement they deserve.

The grand boulevard 18 de Julio promises to be, indeed it is probably already, the finest street on the Continent, and building sites are in such demand that only last month a proprietor refused an offer of 100 per square vara for a lot in Plaza Cagahicho: this is equal to nearly 50s. per superficial foot, a price which will astonish readers in Europe, who fancy that Montevideo is a place like Cape Town or Tangier.

The enormous growth of Montevideo trade and resources. For the last six or eight months the duties collected here run for £200,000 to £120,000 a month, or over. Even in the short month of February, with a suspension of business during Carnival and the political commotions of Presidential election, the receipts were 510,000 fs. When we add to mind that the whole revenue of the Argentine Republic in 1863 was less than six millions dollars per annum, and is now 18 millions, it is only fair to conclude that the revenue of Montevideo in 1883 will be close on 20 millions.

Again, if we look to railways we find that in 1863 the Argentine Republic had barely 30 miles of railway, and now boasts nearly 1,000 miles in actual traffic or approaching completion: Montevideo has more than 40 miles open to traffic, and if the proposed branch lines be completed within ten years there will be a network of 900 miles all converging on the city.

The opinion of the citizens is no less remarkable, and may bear comparison with most cities of the Old or the New World. This is only a natural consequence of the relative industry of the people, as shown by the value of exports. Mr. Consul Munro, in his report to the British Government, shows that (with a population in the whole Republic barely reaching 400,000 souls) the annual exports exceed three millions pounds sterling; nearly £8 per head.

Yet all this industrial and commercial activity, all the material and statistical progress of Montevideo—its railways, tramways, costly buildings and Parisian suburbs—are the growth of ten years of a troubled period, from 1863 to 1873. Perhaps it would be too much to hope that we may now have ten years of peace. But, whether or not, we may be sure that in 1883 Montevideo will be the first port in South America, its buildings forming a half-moon of ten miles around its bay, its railways touching the Brazilian and Argentine frontiers, its revenue equal to what B. Ayres has at present, and its prospects the most flattering that any young country can desire.

TERRIBLE ACCIDENT IN RIO.

On the 27th ult. the city of Rio Janeiro was thrown into the greatest consternation by the rumour that the great division wall between the Arsenal and the Convent of San Bento had given way and fallen to the ground, carrying with it the various offices which rested against this massive and ancient wall. In an instant the whole population rushed to the scene of the disaster.

This great wall was regarded as one of the strongest in the city, and up to the leaving of the steamer it was impossible to obtain further particulars than the following—

At about 1 o'clock p.m., when the arsenal was full, and all the offices with their clerks, a rumbling noise was heard, and with a crash that might be heard at Petropolis, down tumbled this tremendous wall sweeping everything before it. The extent of this disaster can be imagined when it is known that three of the public offices of the Arsenal were attached to the wall, and that at the moment of the disaster these offices were open.

Two of the offices, the flag and harness offices, are completely buried beneath the ruins, whilst the third has one side completely torn away.

All the city authorities hurried to the scene to afford help and keep order, and luckily, owing to the great exertions of those around, some of the unfortunate were got out alive. Every one worked—merchant, broker, officer, clerk, noble, all toiled to extricate the beings supposed to be under the wall.

The latest list gives 13 killed and 30 badly wounded.

As yet there is no explanation given of the cause of this terrible disaster. Some attribute it to an earthquake shock. The wall seemed the strongest in Rio.

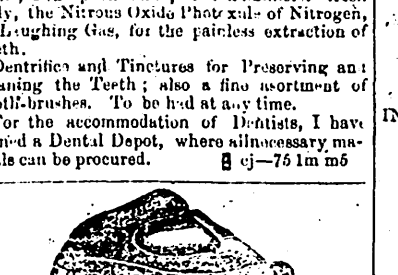

The ports of this Republic are closed against all vessels coming from Montevideo and Banda Oriental ports; and it seems probable that at least for a month this rule will continue in force.

The health of Buenos Ayres was never better. The season continues very wet, and the heat of summer has passed. The closing of the port against Montevideo has somewhat interfered with business, but trade is good, and in the city and suburbs there is much building going on to meet the wants of a steadily increasing population.

Exchange rules quiet, and very little doing. The rate on England is 48 1/2; on Antwerp, 5.17. National Bonds, 79 1/2.

MONTEVIDEO TEN YEARS HENCE.

It is no exaggeration to say that few cities in the world are progressing more rapidly than Montevideo, and if its trade, commerce and population, go on increasing for the next ten years as since 1863 down to the present, those who live until 1883 will, in all human probability, see here a seaport rivaling New York in tonnage, and a city with several hundred thousand inhabitants.

Owing to its advantageous position on the map of the World it is become of late the great port of call for the trade between Europe and the Pacific, which is every year increasing in a wonderful degree.

rapidly. Look at the suburbs of ten years ago. The Union village, barely five miles out, was sometimes inaccessible even on horseback, and bullock-carts were known to take several days going or coming.

In like manner Paso Molino and surrounding outskirts, now connected with the city by tramways and macadamized roads, are surpassing anything heretofore seen in South America for the elegance and lavish expenditure on the country houses about there.

The grand boulevard 18 de Julio promises to be, indeed it is probably already, the finest street on the Continent, and building sites are in such demand that only last month a proprietor refused an offer of 100 per square vara for a lot in Plaza Caganchu: this is equal to nearly 50s. per superficial foot, a price which will astonish readers in Europe, who fancy that Montevideo is a place like Cape Town or Tangier.

The Custom-House returns show more conclusively than anything else the enormous growth of Montevidean trade and resources. For the last six or eight months the duties collected here run from £100,000 to £120,000 a month, or over. Even in the short month of February, with a suspension of business during Carnival and the political commotions of Presidential election, the receipts were 510,000 fcs.

Yet all this industrial and commercial activity, all the material and statistical progress of Montevideo—its railways, tramways, costly buildings and Parisian suburbs—are the growth of ten years of a troubled period, from 1863 to 1873. Perhaps it would be too much to hope that we may now have ten years of peace. But, whether or not, we may be sure that in 1883 Montevideo will be the first port in South America.
