ST. PATRICK'S SOCIETY.

FOURTH ORDINARY MEETING.

On Thursday evening the Fourth Ordinary Meeting of this Society was held at the provisional rooms, 48 Calle Reconquista.

The Chairman in calling the meeting to order handed 200 mps. to the Treasurer, received that day from Mr. Gibson, of Glasgow, who had just arrived from Scotland, and who offered his fullest sympathy to the cause, and hoped to see the Irish emigration to the Plate again as in former years.

The Chairman also stated that at a recent celebration in this city he met the Minister of Education and some of the principal Argentines of Buenos Ayres, all of whom expressed their readiness to help the St. Patrick Society in every way possible towards founding emigration from Ireland to the Plate.

As far as he, the chairman, could find out, the whole feeling of the public was in favor of the Society, and if there is any opposition to the Society, and if there is any opposition to it by it springs from parties ignorant of its bona fide aim and drift.

The business of the meeting was then begun by the Secretary reading the minutes of the last meeting, the correspondence received (at foot hereof), and the donations received from the following gentlemen:-

Hanson, B. Ayres " 133

J. Quenell " 1000

Mr. Nicholas Lowe on the reading of his letter remarked that no political significance should in the least be attributed to the pamphlet which the Society is about to publish.

Whether Mr. McDonnell had written his pamphlet or not, the Society would probably publish this paper, it being the aim of the Club to do everything to foment Irish emigration, and scarcely any better plan could be suggested than the publication proposed.

The chairman then addressed the meeting on the business of the night. As regards the reply or counter statement to Mr. McDonnell's pamphlet, the Committee had been industriously occupied for the last fortnight gathering figures and facts, and he the chairman believed that very shortly the paper would be ready to be read. Another important subject for the meeting to-night is the question about a house. Spite of the untiring exertions of a very active employee who has spent days and weeks going up and down the most central streets, a proper sort of house for this society had not been found; either the rent was too high or the house was too small. In the meantime this difficulty about a house is a check, and perhaps it would be better under the circumstances to extend the limit of 3000 mps per month, as a good reading room for our members, where they could sit, and meet, and chat, and find the papers in a positive and absolute necessity.

Mr. Dennehy considered that the society could not be too prudent in this matter, and that to take a fine house, large rooms, and incur heavy expense before first we could see our way clearly, he considered would be an error. He believed that most of the members were aware of an opposition got up to this society, and coming from a quarter little anticipated. He, therefore, considered that it would be most wise for the society to husband all its funds, and avoid the heavy expense of a house.

Many of the members spoke to the question, and after a prolonged discussion it was resolved to direct the committee to use its best exertions towards finding a suitable house, and meanwhile to be content with our present quarters.

The next question for the meeting was that of emigrants' passages.

The Chairman stated that availing of the presence of one of the owners of a regular steam line between the Plate and Glasgow, he applied to Mr. Donaldson to know his lowest terms for all passengers brought out by this society. Mr. Donaldson entertained the application with much pleasure, and stated that his line would be at the service of the society for such a purpose; and in view of the increased passenger traffic the society would create, he was prepared to arrange on the basis of £12 for adult passengers. As the society had already intimated £10 as the passage money which it was prepared to pay, Mr. Mullhall, next addressed the following letter to Messrs. H. A. Green & Co. on the subject, and received the answer hereunder:-

Lambaré, Flores Road, B. Ayres, April 14th, 1873.

To Messrs. Henry A. Green & Co., Gentlemen,

I have the pleasure to inform you that a Benevolent Society has been formed by the Irishmen resident in the River Plate for the purpose of fomenting Irish immigration to these countries. This society is called the St. Patrick's Society and counts amongst its members not only all the wealthy Irish estancieros of the Plate, but men of other nationalities who have kindly joined the cause. With a view therefore to carry out one of its primary objects the society is anxious to make such arrangements with some ocean steam line for the carriage of all immigrants brought out by this society as will prove mutually beneficial to the society and the steam company.

As agents of Messrs. Lamport and Holt of Liverpool I have the honor to

address you requesting that you will communicate with them on the subject. The society purposes naming an agent in Dublin and paying £10 sterling passage money for every adult immigrant.

I have the honor to be Gentleman, Your humble servant, EDW. T. MULHALL.

We beg to acknowledge receipt of your favor of to-day advising us of the foundation of the St. Patrick's Society and requesting us to communicate to Messrs. Lamport and Holt, Liverpool, your wish to contract with them for the carriage of all emigrants that this society may wish to bring out; by the Royal Mail Steamer Boyue leaving to-morrow we shall address these gentlemen, handing them copy of your letter, and will opportunistically communicate to you their reply.

Mr. Cowan rose and said that on behalf of Messrs. C. W. Benn and Co., the agents of the Royal Mail line from Southampton, he was prepared to say that the Royal Mail Co. will bring out emigrant passengers for the St. Patrick Society at the same rate as any other steam line plying with the Plate.

The subject of the diplomas was next discussed. Mr. Pipet informed the meeting that they were at last finished, and would be ready for the Secretary to-morrow.

Mr. E. Murphy suggested that the parties named to act as Directors of this Society be requested to notify the Secretary as to their acceptance of the post or not.

Mr. Lynch offered some well timed remarks.

Mr. Dennehy stated that some parties named were unable to act as Directors although quite willing to be members.

The chairman instanced the case of a millionaire Irishman who does not reside in this province, who will stand by the Society in every possible way, but who cannot act as Director, having left for Europe.

The Rev. W. M. Walsh, suggested that as small pamphlets were now published giving the bye-laws of this Society, it might be as well to let these little pamphlets get well circulated through the camp before taking any action in the matter—a suggestion which met with the general acceptance of the meeting.

The meeting then rose and adjourned to Thursday April 24th.

The following was the correspondence read:-

Nicholas Lowe, to his fellow Committee-men begs to recommend these suggestions to be embodied in our statement of the resources of the River Plate Republics, as a field for emigration.

That, as we are bound by our bye-laws to encourage and foster emigration to this country, we so fully convinced that it is a fit and proper thing to do, equally beneficial to the immigrants and the country that, this is a fit and proper field for emigration for colonists of our race, that, knowing this to be the case, we encourage people to come and actually do bring out our own relatives, and others [I have brought out seven (7) persons within the last twelve months, four (4) of them members of my own family, and this is only an example of other such cases known to me], and so reducing to practice our opinion of this matter.

That the great and vast majority of our countrymen like the country and climate after coming, that they amass fortunes in a shorter time than they could do at home or in any other country; that there are over one hundred names of depositors in the Bank in Mercedes from this Partido alone, that tradesmen become landed proprietors, and even laborers become opulent to an extent we do not hear of even in North America, and with a greater flow of immigration to these countries, greater results may be counted on, may, are sure, for the resources and the extent of them are all but unbounded. That, we enjoy the most freedom of industry, of religion and of person; that our persons and properties are as secure as are those of the natives here; that, when we are civil to them they are civil to us, and on the whole we live in good harmony; that many of our members become men of position and distinction; that, all offices under Government are open to our children; and that jealousy of foreigners is dying out in proportion as we amalgamate, and our votes are accepted for Municipalities, though not for Legislative Representatives; that whole districts of the country are passing into our possession; that land is easily transferred if required by it; and one paid for so is secure; that education for our children is becoming within the reach of all; that few of us would be willing to exchange our standing here, or leave it to return to our native country; and that instances are not few where those who have left this country have returned to it, and died here, grateful, happy, and esteemed.

"By this proposed purchase the Hospital will be placed in possession of wooden houses now standing on the land, suitable for the reception of patients in case of a recurrence of fever, and which, if specially built for the purpose, would absorb the greater part of the fever fund, so that the price which must be considered as paid for the latter is less than \$100,000 per square of 150x150 yards. Recent sales of land show that the value of the above would be \$300,000 to \$500,000 per square, it streets, in accordance with the Municipal plans, were opened; so that even without any general rise in the value of landed property, the purchase may be regarded as a very promising investment of the funds of the Hospital, even apart from the consideration that the general prospects of the country warrant the expectation of a progressive increase in the value of landed property.

The mails bring the following advice: "The doubts which have hitherto prevailed as to the population of Brazil are removed by a census taken on 31st August, 1872. It is now ascertained to number 10,093,978 persons, of whom 1,683,861 are slaves, and only 250,000 Indian or indigenous."

The mails from Montevideo, after much exertion by the agents, were allowed to be landed; but the steamer, with her cargo and passengers, has been sent back to Montevideo. Every possible effort was made to get permission for the steamer to enter. A petition was laid before the Municipality setting forth that five of the passengers jumped from the steamer to a launch; that the steamer had no communication whatever with the shore; that the Argentine Consul in M. Video had telegraphed to the same effect; but the Minister of War declined, and it was with the greatest difficulty that Messrs. J. P. Bay & Co., the agents, obtained permission to land the mails; they will be delivered in the morning.

The news from Montevideo continues black and the fever looks as bad as ever. The telegram from Valparaiso, Thorwaldstein Santa Candida, Estanislao Barbadoss, Malvinos Genoa, Express. The total loss of the Italian barque Leonardo Vinci, on the Playa Santa Rosa is announced. Captain and crew saved. She was bound for California.

The Express brings half of the great Italian Opera Co. & he passed Montevideo in the morning. In Montevideo seven new cases of fever and 12 deaths. Business completely stopped.

Another important sale of Entre Riano wool was done to-day 7,000 arr. at 25 rs.: same buyer. A lot of Corrientine wool 15,000 arr. is offering in market, not yet sold, price asked 27 rs.

The Chilean mail has brought orders from Valparaiso for subscription for 500 shares of National Bank; this is really good news. We are happy to say that Mr. Courras of Montevideo is pronounced out of danger and coming round.

Respecting the rumoured loss of the Po there seems no truth whatever in the report. A sale of 10,000 cedulas at 9 1/2 reported for cash yesterday should have been marked for end of month.

The Copernicus question was the first on 'Change to-day; every one wanted to know what about the mails. It was announced at an early hour that the question would not be decided before half-past 11 o'clock. It seems that the who's hitch about this business has been a little too much zeal at the Capitania.

The National Bank question attracts much notice, and most parties are of opinion that the suggestion we threw out of naming an agent to place in London all the shares taken firm by the founders is the very best plan that could be adopted, otherwise the opening of this bank at the time proposed may not only prove difficult for the directors, but most inconvenient to the market.

The stringency of money continues, and call loans even with stocks as collateral were done to-day at 12 per cent; this shows the real tone of the market, furthermore it is difficult to negotiate small loans even with collaterals, and the brokers report large loans much easier than small transactions, the tightness of money affects everything, even city real estate, but it is the opinion of some of the most experienced men that the moment the health of Montevideo is restored and business resumed there will be an instantaneous let up in the market.

As regards the Calden's mails the impression is that they will be up on Sunday morning per Cutter. The rain this morning has chilled still further our produce market. The mud in both plazas half an hour after the rain began was astonishing. Everyone asks why these market prices are not paid, particularly the Once, but for such improvement we must await other men and other times. Produce keeps coming in more costive than from the camp, but this is due to the wretched state of the camp roads.

A very important question has just been decided by the Minister of Hacienda and Custom House authorities. It appears that through some oversight the cut-out duty of 2 per cent upon wool was omitted in the Custom House tariff book for the current year. The omission even the Custom House officials admit was an oversight. The question came up on the shipment of some bales from San Nicolas by Messrs. Brauch and Co. On a due examination of the matter the Minister decided that the customary rate of 2 per cent should be allowed, and the tariff book in this respect amended.

Mr. Antonio Casa, of Coruna, notifies the Argentine Minister that emigration from that port to the Plate is steadily increasing. 286 adult emigrants of both sexes sailed the previous month, and now the vessels Triunfada and Nemesis are loading in that port, and about to take another batch for Buenos Ayres. At Vigo there is also a vessel to go, the Maria Victoria, that will take out emigrants. The storms on the Spanish coast have been very severe, causing great loss, and they still continue.

The high tide at Ensenada are unprecedented, and even the oldest inhabitants state that they never knew the river to rise so before, these flood tides much interfere with the works going on down there.

Austrian meat trade in London has presented Messrs. Forb's and Co's meat samples, and pronounces them so excellent that he believes a very splendid trade is now opening in this branch in the country; Mr. Forb's informs us that he will soon begin packing beef; at present he is occupied solely with mutton, a very excellent supply of which he gets from Mr. Dillon's estancia, and now we understand meditates making arrangements with Mr. William McClymont of Canelas for a constant supply of horned cattle. This meat business looks at last taking shape. We have heard nothing from Mr. Kelsay who is working away hard and fast at Guelguaychub, samples are expected to arrive shortly.

All the tenants of the Alzaga house in Calle Reconquista have got notice to quit, this looks like business; we hear that soon the place will be in the bricklayers' hands. The corner in front is also about to be pulled down and a fine new house erected on the site. The old American church building is also to be pulled down and a new hotel erected.
