



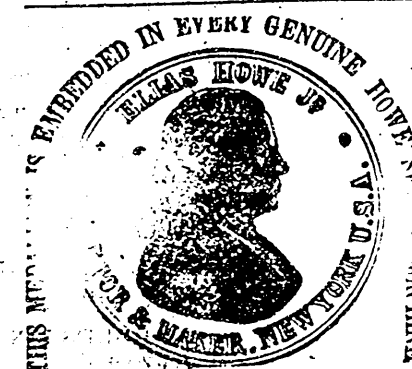

The John Elder's Mails.

Yesterday morning the Montevideo steamer brought up the mails per John Elder; the dates from Lisbon are to the 1th ult. We expect that by next mail steamer, the Boyne, our latest dates from Europe will be from the Island of St. Vincent...

London, Sept. 4th. After a somewhat lengthened sitting, the directors of the Bank of England decided not to make any alteration in the Bank rate...

The French Treasury has completed its arrangements for the payment of the last instalment of the war indemnity to Germany on the 5th September.

Coal is again rising. The Somerset collieries have declared an advance of two shillings a ton upon all kinds of coal.

The Paris journals publish some details concerning the reception given to M. and Madame Thiers and Mlle. Dossé by some three hundred French residents on the arrival of the Ex-President of the Republic at Lucerna.

Moulin, Sept. 3, Evening. The train conveying the pilgrims from Paris to Paray-le-Monial has not met with any serious accident...

The pilgrims, who numbered about six hundred and fifty, left Paris in a special train, which started at seven o'clock.

They reached Moulin at eight o'clock, and after a stoppage of only ten minutes their train started for Paray, where they would not arrive until ten o'clock.

At Moulin and Nevers the pilgrims sang hymns, and appeared to bear with great equanimity the delays of their tedious journey.

Paray-le-Monial, Sept. 3. The English pilgrim train stopped at Montargis this morning, to enable the passengers to breakfast, and arrived here at half-past seven this evening.

The pilgrims were met by the curé and many priests, and proceeded in procession to the shrine. A triumphal arch was erected in their honour before the parish church of Les Moines.

A number of masses will be celebrated at the shrine, and the pilgrims will devote themselves entirely to religious exercises.

In addition to the English pilgrims, there are several French bishops here, as well as Mgr. Gallston from United States, and Mgr. Mermillon.

The Discount Market to-day the supply of money was superabundant; yet the quotation for choice drafts was maintained at 3 to 3 3/4 per cent.

According to advices from Carthage the insurgent junta has issued a proclamation declaring that all incendiaries, robbers, murderers, rebels, spies, or deserters, shall be tried by court-martial.

Madrid letters assert that the municipality have hoisted the red flag on the balcony of the Town Hall.

A destination depot of 2000 carbines and seven cart-loads of ammunition, together with a quantity of petroleum, had been discovered in the Calle de

Montera, Madrid. The tribunals of

Mar (Valencia) and Hellin have demanded authority from Congress to prosecute eight other deputies, namely Felin, Carlos, Luch, Guillen, Cherna, Chrivella, Galvez and Alfara.

At Jimenez (Andalusia) the agricultural labourers persist in their demand for a division of landed property.

Francisco, who was formerly lieutenant to Santa Cruz, having ventured into the Carlist lines in arms contrary to orders, has been arrested as an outlaw, and lies under sentence of death by a Carlist court-martial.

At Vera the Carlists have carried off a number of women, who were chosen by ballot in the province of Biscaye for the purpose of making their uniforms.

The second number of El Cuartel Real appears with the heading of "Long Live Pio Nono."

Don Carlos is reported to be on his way back towards the frontier.

The Hamburger Nachrichten announce that the negotiations between the German and English Governments in regard to the common line of conduct to be adopted with reference to Spain, have resulted in a complete agreement.

Amongst others of the English Catholic Gentry in the pilgrimage to Paray de Monial are the Duke of Norfolk, Lord Dorset, Lord Stourton, Lord Edward Howard and the Ladies Howard, Lord Arundel of Wardour, Lord Walter Kerr, B.N., the Marchioness of Lothian, Lady Herbert of Lea, Lord Southwell, Admiral Jerningham, the Master of Lovat, the Hon. and Rev. Gilbert Talbot, the Right Rev. Dr. Vaughan, Bishop of Salford; Monsignore Weld, the Rev. Dr. Clifford, the Rev. Father Clifford, S.J., Colonel Gordon, Major Gordon, the Rev. -Tylee, one of the curates of the pro-Cathedral, the Rev.-Hussey, of Saffron-hill Church; and among the general wrong were four tenants from Lord Petre's estate, while among the pilgrims were Roman Catholics from nearly all the provincial towns.

Cholera is sweeping off thousands of victims in Hungary and other parts of Austria, and the inhabitants have fled from several towns.

The German press attacks the Government for dismissing Captain Werner of the Frederic Carl.

Victor Emmanuel is going to Vienna. A committee of Cardinals and Bishops has been named by the Pope, to revise the records of the Council of the Vatican, up to the date of the dogma of the Immaculate Conception.

The relations between the United States and Mexico are anything but friendly. The Mexican Envoy sent to Washington to ask explanations as to the passing of the Mexican frontier by General McHenry, has been obliged to return home unsatisfied.

Things are rendered still more serious by the law just passed by the Mexican Congress, and which prohibits any concession of privileges to American citizens.

The Mexican Government is to blame in the whole affair, and that Mexico is ungrateful for the States saving it from a foreign ruler [Maximilian], and has for years ignored the services rendered it by the United States.

Refuge continues to be given in Mexico to the Indians who plunder in Texas. The relations of the States with Canada are also 'condemned.' The late treaty between England and the States has deprived Canada of the right to import free fish caught off Newfoundland.

The Canadian agent at Washington has been unable to induce the U.S. Government to make a new convention on the subject, except on conditions which the Canadian Legislature alone can grant.

Further monstrous scandals have occurred in the New York Custom House. A Committee to enquire into the matter has been named.

Some of the Treasury officials have declared that there is connivance between the head officials of their Department and those of the Custom House. The frauds have been going on for years.

Advices from Cuba state that recent

inquiries into the alleged landing of arms by the American steamer Virginian prove that the report was a 'canard' got up to excite the American people.

The decree of Sr. Suer and Capdevila ordering that the property of rebels be restored to its owners has caused tremendous sensation.

UNVEILING THE VICTORY MONUMENT AT BERLIN.

Berlin, Tuesday. This morning the ceremony of unveiling the Victory Monument took place in the Königsplatz, and was the occasion of a grand military display.

Thanks to the courtesy of Major General Von Schwarzkoppen, military commandant of Berlin, I was favoured, as the correspondent of the Standard, with a reserved seat, commanding an excellent view of the proceedings.

All the arrangements were very tasteful, and imparted additional effect to the picturesqueness of the spectacle.

There was an octagonal pavilion erected for the reception of His Majesty the Emperor of Germany, Her Majesty the Empress, the Queen Dowager, and the Crown Princess Victoria, who were attended by their ladies of honour and gentlemen in waiting.

A stage between the pavilion and the monument was reserved for the court dignitaries, official personages, and the clergy. The latter were arrayed in black robes. The square was filled with troops, and conspicuous among them was the Guard Regiment, from Potsdam, with their conical hats, a relic of the days of the Great Frederick.

There were also the Dragoons, the Lancers, the Uhlans, the Grenadiers, the cadets—all of whom were in their places before the hour of ten had struck. By that hour, also, the Royal party, the official dignitaries, the clergy, and the military, had taken up their positions.

The Emperor arrived on horseback, accompanied by the Crown Prince, the other Princes of the house of Prussia, and the distinguished guests whom the event had attracted to Berlin.

Then followed the General Field Marshals, the General Adjutants, and other high military functionaries. The Emperor began with the cathedral choir singing from the roof of the Royal castle a portion of the hymn 'Sei Lob und Ehr dem chochsten Gott.' When two strophes had been chanted the troops presented arms, the Emperor gave a signal, and amid the beating of drums and the sounding of trumpets, and a general outburst of hurrahs, the scarlet curtain fell, and revealed the Monument of Victory. The Prussian hymn was sung, 'Heil Dir in Siegesfranz,' and the event was further celebrated by the discharge of 101 rounds of artillery and the pealing of all the church bells.

The venerable Emperor, on his black charger, rode up and down the square several times, and was everywhere greeted with unmistakable tokens of affection and enthusiasm.

The spectacle, favoured with splendid weather, was a magnificent one. The troops were drawn up on the ground with a good eye to military effect. The broad masses of colour, the motly uniforms glancing in the bright sunbeams, the flags and pennons waving in the wind, the group of ladies in light summer attire, all within the compass of the Königsplatz; the dark green foliage of the Thiergarten and the fine architecture of the palaces, which formed a striking background, combined to present at once a delightful and imposing scene.

Prince Bismarck and General Moltke were present, and were loudly cheered. A general review of the troops brought the ceremony to a close.

Though the occasion was strictly a military one, identified with Prussia more particularly, the day was, nevertheless, observed here and elsewhere within the Empire as a national holiday.

The interest allotted is at the rate of 1 1/2 per cent per annum, and considering that only during the latter part of the half year it has been able to avail of the high rates, it is of opinion that the result is satisfactory, and especially so if it is borne in mind that security is your committee's first object.

The accounts laid before you this evening will show that the total number of shares to date is 728 (an increase of 121 against last half year) held by the members in the following ratio:—

Owing to circumstances beyond his control the Treasurer Mr. W. Kay Brydges was compelled to resign his post, and was replaced by the next on the list of suppliers—Mr. James F. Brown.

The attention of Members is called to the great necessity of punctuality in the monthly payments at the proper hour and place, and recommends that in future Rule XI be rigorously adhered to.

In conclusion, your Committee urges upon you the desirability of each and every individual member using his efforts to extend the advantages of the association to his fellow clerks, many of whom, it is sure, are in ignorance of its existence, or entertain such erroneous ideas of its objects, that their entering more earnestly into the Committee urges upon you the propriety of entering in your books the names of the youths who are daily being enrolled on the numerous staff of British Clerks in this city.
