The tin chimney is not suppressed yet, and it seems a doubtful point whether Lord Mayor Bunge or the bath-man will win. The tin business smoked away yesterday in a manner that would do honor to a Sheffield or Manchester factory.

There was terrible work at the elections in Chacabuco on Sunday last. The police fired on the people, and killed two persons, several others being wounded. There is great excitement in the partido.

One of the morning papers starts a rumor that President Sarmiento will shortly make another trip up the river.

A funny story was told us yesterday, the heroes being an Englishman, an Irishman and a Scotchman, all recently arrived. While strolling about the city on Saturday last, to see its beauties previous to starting for the camp, the trio stopped before a fashionable "magazin" in Calle Florida, attracted by a very pretty girl behind the counter.

We have papers from Paraguay to the 20th inst. There has been terrific rain all over the country; such a downpour has not been known in Paraguay for years. There is nothing about the expected revolution, but some resignations are spoken of.

The number of deaths in the city on Tuesday was only 14, a very low figure indeed for a city with nearly 250,000 inhabitants.

We have been requested by the Secretary of the new South American Club in London, to the success of which we have previously referred, to open a List at this office for gentlemen here wishing to inscribe their names as members.

The mails bring intelligence that that portion of the South American Cable to be laid between Madeira and Saint Vincent is now being shipped in England on board the Hibernia. This looks like business.

The Royal Mail steamer Liffey will sail on Saturday. Sixpenny stamps on letters by this vessel. Our Packet Edition, which requires no stamp, will be ready to-morrow at noon, and on sale at the Court and English libraries.

It is a long time since a genuine "foco de infection" of the Plague year has turned up. By dint of tremendous exertions somebody has discovered a house in Calle Salta that has been shut up for 2 years. He immediately erid Have and let loose the Salubrity Commissioners on the doomed premises.

The Young Men's Christian Association holds a Monthly Literary Meeting this evening. The programme is most interesting, and amongst the speakers we find those war-worn veterans of the Association, Starkweather, Martin, Miguez, Tallon, Hodgo, Liny &c. The proceedings commence at 8 o'clock sharp.

At a public gathering in Lawrence lately, one of the gentlemen present was called upon for a speech, and this is how he responded:—"Gentlemen and women, I ain't no speaker; more'n twenty years back I came here a poor idiot boy, and now what are I?"

The Quito papers announce the death of Professor Jameson, an English savant well-known in the Interior, as well as in Europe. His Synopsis of Equatorial plants is well-known to all botanists. Mr. Jameson enjoyed a pension of 100 pats monthly from the Peruvian Government. In 1869 he visited his native land, Scotland, after an absence of 50 years. A few days before his death the lamented savant embraced Catholicity, though he had been educated and passed his whole life in the Protestant persuasion.

We saw a letter from home yesterday to one of the Itape colonists which says that poor Mr. Billiatt is "distracted" at not getting letters. When first told of the awful situation of the colonists in Paraguay H.M. Government consented to remove them, but afterwards retracted and said that they could not spend the public money for such a purpose.

We had a telegram from Valparaiso yesterday which reached us in exactly four hours. This is splendid time, and proves the excellent management of the Transandine line.

A private letter from London by the Cordillera informs us that the South American Club is a most brilliant success, and concludes as follows. "Boyd Crawford, Mortimer &c. are thinking of going on the 10th. Crawford tells me he will only remain six months, and then return to finish up his enterprises."

The Cordillera brought the North American mails from Rio, and they were delivered yesterday. We had a letter from our old friend Sam Wheelwright, dated New York. Mr. W. is sorry to hear, had met with an accident and disabled his pen hand, but hopes to be able for a long letter by next mail. The New York Herald and Post contain long and flattering obituaries of the late Mr. William Wheelwright. The Panic is over, but the effect of it is still sensibly felt everywhere, and by every department of trade and commerce.

Everyone remembers Madame Gavotti, the contralto at the Colon, who ran away with young Gomez, the richest heir in this country, some years ago, her lawful spouse being still alive. This respectable lady has been trying ever since to get divorced from her husband, in order to marry the young millionaire. Her case has gone through every legal phase, and after many decisions for and against her, the Supreme Tribunal, from which there is no appeal, has declared her 'sposu' does not prosecute her for bigamy now he's a queer fellow; but, perhaps, he knew all about it.

On Saturday the first monthly party of the season comes off at the Lomas de Zamora Club-house. To our city friends who intend going we may remark that the last train from town leaves the Lima Station at 10.5 p.m. and the Plaza Constitucion at 10.20 sharp. The Committee, ably presided by Dr. Don Jorge Echeverria, will no doubt fully maintain the festive reputation of the Club.

We strongly recommend our subscribers to call on Mr. Hibbert, Stamp Master General, in Calle Florida, and ask him to show them the Prize engraving of the London Art Union for 1874.—The Dutch Travellers. It is superb, and cheap at £50. Every subscriber of one Guinea will receive, besides a chance of a prize at the annual distribution in April, an impression of a fine plate, Dutch Travellers landing fish at Egmont. Engraved in line by A. Willmore, after the Original by E. W. Cooke, R. A. The prizes include the right to select a valuable work of art from one of the public exhibitions, bronze vases and tazzas, a limited number of volumes of choice etchings by the Etching Club and other works produced especially for the Society.

The heat yesterday was appalling—90 Fahr in the shade. We need say no more, except that the cellar is 'seco'.

On Sunday Mr H Woods C. E. was presented with a magnificent album by his friends in Rosario, on his approaching departure for England. The album contained the portraits of all the C. A. railway employees and views of the stations. In the evening the employees gave Mr. Woods a grand supper at the Hotel La Paz.

The latest thing in the States in the lottery way is a young girl, 21 years old, and 'lovely as Venus, who offers herself as the 'premio mayor' in a drawing of 100,000 numbers of a potato each. If the winner does not wish to marry her, he will be paid 500 pats. In case a married man wins her, he will get the same money, which he is expected to give to his wife.

Further accounts of the earthquake at Mendoza on Monday were received by telegram yesterday. The inhabitants, remembering the awful results of the great earthquake, were struck dumb with terror. The shock took place at 8 o'clock in the morning, and lasted for two minutes and six seconds. On Tuesday there was another shock early in the morning, from south to north. Several buildings suffered severely, but no person was injured. The authorities were preparing for the worst.

Something new at last. Persons who ought to know say that a battle has been arranged to come off in Entre Rios before the end of the month. Viva!

RIVER PLATE MEAT IN LONDON.

At the London Tavern, a meeting was held to consider yet another proposal to deal with the question of the high price of meat. Those who attended the meeting were requested to inspect certain raw meats and to partake of cooked meats, served in the joints, such as leg of mutton and 'trimmings,' boiled beef, and the vegetables usual with that dish. Some of these were stated to be joints of River Plate meat preserved raw in two different fashions, and others joints of English meat preserved in the same way. The most interesting part of the story was that by the one process beef and mutton could be introduced into England at 2d a lb., and pork at 4d., and by the other that mutton could be sold in London at 2d and 3d a lb., and beef at 3d and 4d. The mutton said to be River Plate tasted very well, but beef said to be preserved at the cheaper process, described as preserving in prepared tallow with "something in it" was not so pleasant to the palate. The second process, which appeared to be the most expensive, was described as being by the aid of salt, nitre, and glycerine, and the raw meat, stated to have been preserved at Buenos Ayres in June last, certainly

had no smell of decomposition; but the mixture was not altogether pleasant to the nostrils. The meat had the appearance of being from good cattle, but it is questionable, with the peculiar love of the London labouring classes for the 'offal' and 'crag-mag,' and cuttings, whether meat such as was presented in this condition of preservation would be accepted by them even at a low price and cause a demand sufficient to create a market. The inventor of the systems is Mr. Goulstone, who stated that by his principle he could bring to this country all the other parts of the animals, besides the meat portions, manufactured so as to command a ready use—the fat melted into tallow, the blood formed into manure, the hides, &c. There were present many gentlemen interested in the question as social reformers, and as connected with the British colonies, and among others Colonel Money, Major de Winton, Dr. Hardwicke, Mr. Booth, Mr. D. Tallman, Mr. McCall, Mr. Wetherston, Mr. Allan, Mr. C. Clark, and Mr. E. Carton Booth. The meeting ended by many present availing themselves of an invitation that they should take portions of the meat for private cooking.

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On Friday last the Montevideo Harbour Improvement Company (limited), successfully launched one of the splendid Hopper barges destined for the dredging operations of the harbour. This barge is very solidly constructed by Messrs. Blyth, and is capable of carrying out to sea, and discharging the 100 tons of earth. The launch took place at the company's iron yard in Calle Andes, and inmediately afterwards preparations were made for preparing another barge of the same pattern, which will be ready very shortly. Other iron barges are on the road, as well as a powerful dredging machine, which will sail and steam out with its own machinery. This is the second dredger belonging to this company, the one now complete and ready for work in the harbour having come out in pieces, and been put together in the company's yard in Montevideo.

We mentioned the circumstance of her launch in August last, but by an error she was stated to have belonged to Messrs. Clarke, Panchard & Co. instead of the Montevideo Harbour Improvement Company, who have taken over, and are about to work the concession obtained by Mr. Javier Alvarez for the clearing of the harbour, as well as the construction of a new custom house and have likewise proposed to the government the construction of the new port as designed by the eminent engineer Mr. J. F. Bateman. Mr. W. Elliott, whom we have known for a long time in this city as agent for Messrs. Clark Panchard and Co., is engineer and manager of this company, and thence arose our mistake.

Respecting the Salto Railway we have the following:—"The works of this railway, which is officially known as the North Western Railway of Montevideo, are progressing rapidly under the direction of Mr. C. H. Gripper, the Company's engineer, and Mr. J. C. Humann, the agent for the contractors of the line, Messrs. C. Clark Panchard and Co. Already the earthworks and bridges are completed over an extent of nearly 60 miles, or little less than half the total length; the iron work of the large bridge over the Arroyo river is on its way out and skilled workmen have arrived from England to erect it. There are several other large bridges on the line, all of which are in a forward state, and we have every reason to believe that by the end of next year the locomotive will unite the two termini of Salto and Santa Rosa. At present there are 12 1/2 miles of line in complete running order, and the laying of permanent way is progressing rapidly.

The Silas entered this morning with the much looked for Cordillera mails. The first touch of news however, before the mails were delivered, came to us by the Telegrama Maritimo, in the shape of an article on the London money market; it will be found embodied in the mail news in another column: this article was read by every merchant in town, and produced depression, as it opened people's eyes to the magnitude of the difficulties, that surrounded the financial situation of Europe. Still there is to be believed that by the end of next year the local money market certainly reaches a slight improvement, and we cannot look to a recurrence of the extreme difficulties of October. Wool our chief staple keeps up, and business is unchecked, there was scarcely an article in the market the day before the Cordillera entered; we note that in Montevideo, all produce orders were suspended, on the receipt of the Cordillera's news, but here this is not so, business was somewhat checked in our markets this morning, but this was on account of the shocking dust; the carts could not be opened.

The National Bank discounted very freely yesterday morning—fully 300,000 pats.—while the Provincial Bank discounted to day fully ten millions currency. The private banks are doing little in the way of giving out new money, but, so liberal enough in renewals. Within the last few days a good deal of money has gone into cereales. The Bulls were so strong yesterday that many of them offered to take up all C. dulas deliverable at the end of the month; nevertheless there was no delivery. This, it is urged, proves that the stock is greatly oversold, and therefore the Bulls are determined to hold the market until the end of the month, in order to corner the Bears. Saturday is now so close at hand that the effort will not cost much. All, however, depends on a closing exchange rate for the Liffey—the opinion is general that exchange will not give way.

The new Decord Hotel is the talk of the market. We heard to day on 'Change that it is to be the most stately edifice of the kind in the city. It will face two streets, having frontage on Calle Mayo and Paseo Julio. As the building will run through the old block from street to street, the lower part of the building will be occupied with large saloons or warehouses, while up stairs will be the hotel, with six immense saloons larger than the Club Progress, and over 100 rooms for the guests. The building will cost four to five millions. As an evidence of Paraguayan enterprise in the Plata this new hotel will certainly stand first. The plans are beautifully drawn up, and the building will be an ornament to the city. The hotel will stand in Calles 25 de Mayo and Paseo Julio, between Corrientes and Parque, and will have a most commanding view of the R. Plate.

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Our advice from Paysandu to-day is very following. The river is very low, and deep loaded vessels cannot pass the Paso Almiron, business at a dead lock, nothing doing and all the vessels leaving in ballast, American brig Dudley left on 23rd for Baltimore with full cargo of goods shipped Messrs Hufnagel and Pottiers.

The new \$200 Nat. Bank notes are much admired, in fact all the new notes are fully up to the high reputation of the American Bank Note Co. New York. The order from the National Bank was one of the largest ever sent from S. America and executed in remarkably short time; the order went through the house of Messrs Zimmerman Fair and Co. of this market, as agents of the American Bank Note Co.; we believe that the order for the note is almost amount to about \$1,000,000, whilst the checks and books also came from New York, and were supplied by Messrs Sanford and Co. of this plaza, the cheque books are admitted an improvement on the ordinary Bank cheques in this city.
