

with him that, if the business, disagreeable as it was, had to be done, it ought to be well done. We must use our utmost efforts to make our action effective, and above all things, it ought to be finished in the shortest possible time.

A serious conflict is reported to have taken place at Constantine, Algeria, on the 6th inst., between a large number of Jews and Arabs. On the morning of that day a Jewish funeral was quietly wending its way through the Rue Nationale, when a non-commissioned officer of the native tirailleurs threw himself in the way of the cortege and spat alone, and the Jews fell upon the offender and beat him severely with sticks. A captain of the Spahis sent a Jager to the nearest barrack for military assistance. During the absence of the Jager a large number of Arabs hastened to the spot to rescue their countryman and co-religionist, and a serious melee ensued, in which more than 1,000 Jews and Arabs took part. The military soon arrived, and succeeded after great trouble in separating the combatants. Twenty Arabs, three of whom were mortally wounded, were left on the ground. Almost at the same time another conflict was taking place in another quarter of the city, near the Place Négrier. Fears were entertained that a general riot would take place in the city, and on the evening of that day the entire garrison patrolled through the city.

It is stated that the arrangements for a regular mail steam service between San Francisco and Australia have just been definitely completed. The vessels leaving San Francisco will touch at the Sandwich Islands, Fiji, and New Zealand, and Sydney will be the terminus. A subsidy has been granted of £80,000 per annum (half from New South Wales and half from New Zealand), and the contractors will also be at liberty to negotiate mail terms with the United States and French governments, the latter being interested in the communication with New Caledonia and Tahiti. Four screw steamers are to be built for the purpose—two of 2,800 tons and 500-horse power each, by Messrs. John Elder and Co. of Glasgow, and two of 3,130 tons and 600-horse power, by Mr. James Laing, of Sunderland—the guaranteed speed being 12 knots. The first of these is to be ready by the 1st of October next, but as the service is to commence immediately, a fleet of four new ships—the Mongol, the Tartar, the Macgregor, and another, have been chartered for the purpose. These steamers were constructed for the China trade, and one of them, the Macgregor, is to leave Sydney on the 13th of December and is appointed to sail from San Francisco on the 27th of January. When the regular ships shall be in operation, the contractors will be under heavy penalties to perform the voyage from San Francisco to Sydney in 25 days, but during the temporary service the time is expected to be between 26 and 28 days. From London to Australia the time with the regular vessels in operation is expected to be 42 days. The negotiations on behalf of the capitalists interested have been conducted by Mr. H. H. Hall, the United States' Consul at Sydney, and Messrs. Lawrence, Clark and Co. are to be the London agents. Dr. Macleod, surgeon-major of the Madras army, has been committed for trial by the Carlisle magistrates on the charge of causing the death of his wife by giving her an overdose of morphia. He was admitted to bail.

It was rumored the other day that Mr. Gladstone did not intend to offer himself as a candidate for the suffrages of the electors of Greenwich at the next election. The Premier, however, has stated through his secretary, Mr. J. A. Godby, that he had given no authority for the report, and that he has said nothing on the subject.

Five officers of the 1st Life Guards, who were tried at Marlborough-street Police-court for behaving in a disorderly manner at the Argill Rooms the other evening, and with attempted rescue and assaults on the police, were yesterday discharged, Mr. Knox thinking that the defendants had been more violently treated by the police than the occasion justified.

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This country or any other as the bountiful bestower of relief is rather good, and requires qualities in the artist which, it may be hoped, are exceptional. We send money to other countries just for the identical reason that other countries send it us, either because we owe it (in which case other explanation is absurd), or because those who so employ it see their advantage in such a course, and do with their own as in so simple a matter they justly have every liberty.

The French mail steamer Niger (we again object to this fine ship being called the Nigger by so many persons who ought to know better) entered Montevideo on Sunday morning and may be in port to-day. Her news fully confirms the telegram by the Camoens announcing the rise to 9 per cent in the Bank of England rate of Discount. The Wool news is 'asi.' The great question in financial circles yesterday was, Ten per cent, or not? by the Garonne.

We publish in another column an interesting account of the recent earthquake at Mendoza, translated from the Independent of Cordoba and kindly sent to us by a foreign subscriber residing in that city. The shock appears to have been severe, though, happily, no lives were lost.

The fine steamer Galileo entered Montevideo on Sunday morning, bringing English papers to the 1st November, or one day later than those we had last to extract from. The beginning of the end of the Tichborne Trial is at last looming up, but opinion is as divided as ever as to what the Verdict will be. Some say that the Chief Justice's Charge will be terrific, and last a couple of months, while Lush and Mellor will go in for a fortnight each. The shortest thing about the whole business will, probably, be the time the Jury will take to make up their minds. Wretches swing that Jurymen may dine. The news about wool is discouraging. A good deal of general news will be found in another column.

An appalling murder was committed on Saturday evening about 4 o'clock in a house in Calle Balcarce, the victim being a man named Martin and the assassin called Daly, both Irishmen. It appears that the victim was generally a good, steady man; he had been in the employment of the Mutual Gas Company, but was idle when murdered, and only four weeks married. On the morning of the fatal occurrence both the victim and his slayer had been drinking, and had a wrestling match, in which Martin was victorious, accidentally hurting Daly with his foot, the latter getting very angry and saying he would "have it out with him." Later in the day while Martin and his wife were conversing Daly entered the room with a knife 7 inches long, and without a word drove it right through the unfortunate man's heart, subsequently drawing out the blade and stabbing him in the ribs. Martin never spoke a word, but fell prone to the ground and expired. Daly then walked coolly off to the nearest 'Comisaria' and gave himself up to Justice. There was fearful excitement in the neighbourhood, as the blood was flowing in a thick stream from the patio to the street. Some men engaged on the City Improvement works entered the house and washed the body, while a 'bomba' was turned on the footway to wash away the terrible evidence of the crime. There is a terrible outcry in the neighbourhood against the Municipal doctor. The 'Comisario' reported the case immediately to the Municipality, but on Sunday morning the doctor had not come to inspect the corpse, from which the effluvia was awful, and it then turned out that he had gone to the camp on a 'pasado' and his return was uncertain. An order was then obtained from the Pölicia for the immediate interment of the body, but yesterday, Monday, at 8 o'clock a.m. it was still unburied. The cowardly crime has caused the greatest indignation amongst the English speaking community, and a general wish is expressed that swift justice may be dealt out to the accused by the authorities.

Our friend in need, Professor Murray, had the disagreeable pleasure on Saturday last to cook up a sally for which he had the misfortune to have a 'tercio' of yerba make a sudden acquaintance with his left foot, thereby causing considerable commotion in said place, as one of his toes was pretty well smashed and the foot in a nice state of tenderness, we may say rather pulpy. He was duly attended to and sent home to his parents (if they are in the land of the living) with a strict injunction not to try that dodge on again, which he faithfully promised not to do, and we trust he won't for his own sake.

Bishop Miede of Kansas, while in this Republic some months ago addressed a graceful letter to a friend in the States, from Cordoba, which was published in the Boston Pilot. The good Bishop therein expresses a high opinion of the Cordoveses, whom he considers the best Catholics in the Republic.

Professor Kyle of the University and National College intends leaving in the Neva on a short trip to Europe; he expects to return about March, to resume his important duties at our Alma Mater.

Sunday was a lovely day, neither too hot nor too cold, but 'about right.' The tramways did an astounding business, every line being chock-block full from morning till night. The auctioneering business was limp, but some sales went off well.

Every one is talking of Cunapiru and the rose-coloured opinion expressed about it by the Hamburg-merchant. We had scores of visitors yesterday, all anxious to know something about the 'Diggings.' Many of the young and sturdy men loafing about town and camp might do worse than form parties, and be off to try their luck. They might prove to be the pioneers of a rush from all parts of the Earth to the South American Ballarat. Now is the time for adventurers with pick and shovel, before capitalists get a hold of the business and take all the romance as well as the profit from it. We feel certain that those who have read 'A Simpleton,' in London Society, would enjoy six months at Cunapiru enormously, particularly if they found nuggets.

Prodigious. Over 1,200 emigrants landed on the Mole on Saturday, a splendid consignment to wind up a splendid month of immigration—the best the Plate has ever seen yet. The Belgrano brings 640 to begin December with.

Mr. Howard, who is shortly expected from England as second-secretary of Legation, comes in place of Lord Brazazon, son of the Earl of Meath, whose appointment is cancelled. Mr. Howard is son of the late Sir Henry Howard, for some time British Envoy at Lisbon and at Hanover.

The crowd on the Western Railway is still so great that many passengers from Flores have to stand.

Rev. Father Davis has arrived in town after a missionary tour of the Irish estancias in Banda Oriental. The condition of things is very lawless in that country: on one day the intelligence of three murders was received, the victim in one case being an Irishman, who had ridden up to a pulperia, and was killed by a gaucho unaware.

We understand that the fine steamers of the Lavarello line will henceforward call at Barcelona and Cadiz on their trips to the Plate.

The usual number of Police were to be found at the church doors on Sunday, but the usual rockets and boletins were let off yesterday at the usual hour by both great parties, and, as usual, both sides claim a majority in the Inscriptions.

We observe that Red Maize is bringing a high price in the markets. It seems that it is looked for by exporters on account of its keeping properties. Our camp friends should take a note of this: also that Red Maize gives a greater per centage than any other class.

A subscriber who recently visited Mr. Latham's Model Farm informs us that he was delighted with the way in which the place is managed. Skill, care and industry are remarked in every department. The new stud horse attracts great attention; he is a splendid animal, well bred and with plenty of bone, the very class most wanted here. Most of the horses brought out here are 'weeds' of the first water, sold at Tattersalls for £20 or £30, the worst class that can be imported. Mr. Latham is too old a hand to make this mistake, and his Farm is truly a Model in every other way as well as name.

The electrifying telegrams published yesterday report a military mutiny at Guardia Esquina, Cordoba, and some officers killed. The ring-leader is a Captain.

A Wilmington (North Carolina) gentleman states that he has discovered positive evidence that his state was colonised by 'civilised Caucasians' five centuries and a half before the Christian era.

All the lighters are not out of the Boca yet. We hear there are a good few still locked up. In any case the escape of those that got out was an mere accident. The trade of the Boca will be always at the mercy of the mud and water till the Dredges are put to their proper work, instead of costly experiments.

On dit that the Municipality spree at Belgrano on the 8th will be postponed till the 14th, the day on which the tramway from town will open on its whole length, so as not to make two bites at a cherry. The Belgrano Club is getting gay again, as most of the members have returned from hibernating in town. The Municipality of this fashionable place is doing the shabby with the Prensa, a nice little paper now published there; it has not even subscribed for one number, when it ought to take fifty at least if it wishes to give the town a good push. Great preparations are going on for the Swiss fete-up on Monday next.

Those who wish to keep flies at bay this hot weather have only to place in each room a single plant of the golden fly of Japan. The insects hate its odor, which makes them sick, and they invariably fly from it.

A boy of 10 years was drowned on the beach while bathing on Saturday. Two other boys were with him when he was pulled out in time by two sailors who were passing.

There were vague rumours yesterday that the Indians are preparing a tremendous foray on the Northern frontier. 'Wolf' has been cried so often lately about the Indians that we don't like to believe it till we hear of a fair amount of cattle carried off and subsequently rescued by the troops in the usual manner.

Quite a lot of River Plate men have come back by the Niger, and are expected on 'Change to-day, where they will be welcomed as usual, at least we suppose so.

Messrs. Kidd and Co.'s Guia for December was distributed yesterday. It is improving every month, and now contains all the railway and tramway time tables. The price is miserably low, one paper dollar.

The Montevideo papers to hand on Sunday contain precious little news. The only thing of interest we see in them is that the Custom House down there took in \$538,000 during the past month.

The following telegram was received yesterday by Mr. Burton, Inspector-General of Telegraphs:— At 2.50 a.m. on 28th Nov. two severe shocks of earthquake were felt in the city of Salta, causing great alarm to the inhabitants, who left their houses amidst the greatest confusion. No serious results are to be lamented. The shocks were also felt in Jujuy. The movements were very strong in Campo Sauto, R. las Piedras and Metan, walls being cracked and rendered unsafe. Weather very wet."

ON 'CHANGE.

Notwithstanding the very unfavorable news from Europe the market rather well on the 1st to-day. Some people thought to establish Saturday's liquidation prices as the opening rate to-day, but this was an error. The Cédula market, freed from the corner of Saturday, is weak and downward, but the money market looks better. The liquidation of Saturday was carried on to-day, but everything was met and discharged honourably. Everyone spoke to-day of the enormous money transactions on last Saturday at all the banks. We hear on 'Change that Mr. Arcoana, President of the Provincial Bank, and his clerks were busy in the bank on Sunday till afternoon closing up Saturday's business.

Table titled 'The sales to-day were as follows—' listing various goods like Cédulas, For cash, For Saturday, and For Dec. 1st with their respective prices.

National Bank shares show a drop of 4 per cent on last week's prices; now that the transfer books are closed, it was said the stock will come freely on the market. Sales— 40 shares at 97 90.

In the liquidation to-day nothing much done, prices for end of the year somewhat better, 83 1/2 offered.

Two discount operations were effected on the Bolsa to-day 3,000 pats. on Cédulas at 12 per cent. for 60 days and 2,000 pats. for 60 days on same stock at same rate.

By far the most important news in the market to-day was from Rio, the immense land properties in the River Plata belonging to Bar-n Mann are being purchased by a Rio Joint Stock Co. for about \$2,000,000, the name of the Company is The Agricultural Pastoral and Industrial Company. Capital one million sterling, and the property purchased is as follows:— 775 suertes estancia land in Banda Oriental, Uruguay, Mellado, Sauro, Cerro, Arapay, Na vo Roman, Blanquedaga, Jones, Aranita, Casera, Bon Vista, Montevideo, Alegre, A Carupú, 270 squares chacra and suburbs M. tevidon, 100,000 head horn cattle, 60,000 sheep, 4,000 horses.

Suera Saladero, near Paysandu, one of the finest saladero establishments in the Banda Oriental. Nuevo Roman, a large meat extract and preserving establishment.

Floor mill at Castellones, worked by steam and water. Sixty leagues of prime land in the Argentine Republic. The full particulars of this gigantic operation we hold over for to-morrow. The business is one of the largest ever effected in the Plata.

Mr. Grant, of the Great Southern Railway, was welcomed on 'Change to-day. He reports earth- quakes finished at Do. overs.

The Liffey took from here— 25,000 casks preserved Forbes mutton 30 casks dried Silverbea brand.

Messrs Woodgate Brothers report the following steamers to be cleared by them to-morrow— Colina— 2700 bales Gaatea for London and Antwerp 2,800 bales.

Rosario, including river cargo 1,700 bales. Rather a brisk export trade this 7,200 bales in one day and by one ship breaking firm.

The barber's shop alongside of the Boca was closed to-day owing to sudden death of owner; apology.

Mr. Mendez's cattle steamer will be ready to leave with live cargo in about 20 days.

The Niger we hear has brought out a whole troop of friends— Messrs. Baucht, Heineundahl, Moller, Grober and others. Mr. Haubach has not come in her.

The Liffey takes 200,000 more gold from Montevideo.

The new firm of Cazon, Ortiz, Herrera & Co., was announced to-day, and its offices are in the top of Watson's old bar room, facing the Bolsa. The new firm starts with a solid connection as general commission brokers. Mr. Agent is a member of the new firm.

Mr. John King is the man of the manager of the new Joint Stock Export Company of Buenos Ayres (limited) Statutes to-morrow.

T. O. Niger's (limited) are looked for in the morning.

Exchange ruled dull to-day. Some bank paper passed at 4 1/2, and drawers asking 4 1/2, but no takers. Exchange must rise, wool business is so brisk.

In the Plaza Once this morning a brisker business than ever done. Messrs. Duggan so d everything, other consignees the same, the wool business never ruled brisker and now the question is where to put the sales. Several barraqueros received and baled wool yesterday and shipped same, prices in the Once the same, some 35,000 arrobes sold. In the South Market a different story, a heavy arbitration case between a barraquero and a consignee blocked up every thing to-day, but sides won, market dull prices down 2 to 3 m/c, some Magdalena wool sold at 72.

Mr. Grotr, manager of the estancia of the late Mr. Arthur W. Smith, Les Esparrillares, in the Nueve de Julio, was in town the other day; we heard his wool was in good order, and will be sold outside. Mr. Keppon, from the same partido, is in town waiting the arrival of his wool, which was expected to-day. Respecting frontier woools we hear they are very light, but badly grown; as they are without cotrilla, fetch high prices from French buyers.

The following is the latest Belgian telegram in the Plata— "Brussels 6.—Secondary defective, last auction prices. Good wools and lambs 6 to 10 centimes higher. Everything low."

7.—A citation open d. Much attention but no nomination; prices 6 to 10 centimes higher than last auction.

Mr. E. Blake sold on Sunday at auction the house 79 Calle Chile for 180,000 m/c. Dr. Bon to Paundred buyer.

There was nothing further known to-day about the losses of sheep in the camp, it seems that the losses for the most part are of old and poor sheep. Mr. Kelly, the well-known sheep broker, has returned to town having purchased 6000 fat pelado sheep, on the Itasy estancia Las Heras at the rate of 35 m/c each, which seems a high figure at this time of the year.

Professor Murray, who takes a great interest in the artificial saladero guano question, reports that upon a minute calculation this new trade gives 4 m/c per animal killed.

To-day we had several visits from parties interested in the Cunapiru gold mines; it seems that there are persons here quite willing to make up a strong party for the mines on the basis given by Mr. Gorman friend of £2 for every working day.

The National Government has granted permit to Jose Rodriguez & Sons to erect a landing place and 2 miles on the Rio-Chilo at the Boca, with power to the Government to order its removal if it interrupts the Bateman works.

The treasury paid on 16th ult. the following sums to Mr. C. D'Alkaine— For bills on London \$119,133 29 " " " " 97,312 40 " " " " 19,316 77 " " " " 13,103 99 \$328,866 45

The treasury paid on same day to Mr. Ernesto Kley \$7,000 pats. for horses.

The new Joint Stock Export Co. about to be formed in this market is the ilk of the Boisa, capital 100,000 pats. A German merchant is mentioned as the manager of the new concern.

The Niger's telegram came up on Sunday and fully confirmed the Rio Grande telegram giving the bank rate 9 per cent, about which there was so much question; there was great complaint about the shortage of the message and the absence of commercial news; private telegrams it appears have come up giving wool good.

The Galileo's mails were delivered early on Sunday; we have by her English papers to 1st November being one day later than received per Cordillera. We extract the following:— "London, Friday evening.

"The supply of available capital has been scarce to-day, with a fair demand at the Bank and out of it, and only in exceptional cases have the best short bills been negotiated at a fraction under the official minimum.

"The sum of £20,000 in sovereigns has been sent into the Bank to-day, from Montevideo.

"The Hipparchus, from Brazil, has arrived with £25,000, and the Garoana, from the Pacific, with £35,450 in specie.

"The Corcorado has reached Lisbon from the Pacific with £7,500 in specie.

"The Rhediver, for the East, has taken out £4,000 in silver.

"A second dividend of 1s in the pound is announced to the creditors of Messrs. Glanstones and Co.

"The failure is announced by circular of Messrs. Stapley and Co., of Old Jewry Chambers, commission merchants. The suspension is due to the non-receipt of a large amount of acceptances from a foreign correspondent, caused by the depreciation in the value of securities in the American market.

"It appears from the statistics of foreign commerce at the port of New York for the month of September, that the imports show a decrease as compared with the same month last year of \$5,770,000, and are nearly three million dollars below those of September, 1873. There is a decrease in all the items presented, but the largest was in the entries for consumption, which stand about \$2,000,000 lower than last year. There is also a large decrease in the withdrawals from warehouses, amounting to nearly five million dollars, which leaves the total turnover upon the market \$5,250,048 less than in September, 1873.

"The exports show an increase this month over the same month last year of \$6,000,000. In all the items there is an increase, except dutiable goods, which show a decrease of less than \$100,000.

"For the past nine months the total exports amount to \$256,811,036, against \$225,020,382 for the corresponding period last year and \$230,923,963 in 1871.

"The chief feature in the foreign stock market has been the depression in French stocks, consequent on the publication of the letter of the Comte de Chambord, but prices have since rallied from the lowest point touched.

"The railway share market has shown continued dullness, and towards the close prices have receded on the expectation of an early advance in the Bank rate.

"A contemporary says it is believed at Berlin that a further financial crash is still to come. Of the legion of new joint stock companies which have sprung up since the war, the greater part will be swept away either by their own act or else by stern necessity. The more solvent are said to be preparing for voluntary dissolution.

Several banking companies are known to be winding up their own shares, so as to be able to buy up at a trifling loss. The more risky concerns are not prepared for self-liquidation, but will wait the doom of fate, which will necessarily entail the greatest loss upon members and creditors."

"It was said on 'Change to-day that the Provincial Bank will, this week, raise its rate to 10 per cent. The measure is resorted to to check speculation of every description, and limit transactions on strict business affairs. Money during the last week has become much easier, and there is a disposition on the part of the directors to discount all the trade paper offered, and refuse perceptibly all accommodation paper.

"The total receipts of the Buenos Ayres Custom House from January 1st to November 1st amount to 15,100,000 pats., which is really wonderful, allowing say 2,000,000 more for the months of November and December; the customs will give say 17,000,000 for the year. It is thought that next year the receipts will be much under this, as importers are restricting their trade; still, we doubt, if there will be much of a falling off.

"A very remarkable instance of the very silent growth of production in this country is evinced in the hiring of some 700 Italian reapers in this city on Saturday. The batch that we refer to left for the south-river districts, which is still more significant, since we had imagined that only for the Chivilvey and western districts would there be such a great demand for harvest labour. The wages are so high that the hired Italian gardeners are all throwing up their situation in and denouncing the city and starting for the chacras. On good authority we learn that a steady reaper earns from 90 to 100 m/c per day. Of course, viewed in a strict economic point no farmer can afford to pay these wages; yet, the fact stands that this is the money earned, and until labour becomes cheaper the farmer is only too willing to secure as many hands as possible at this rate, the quicker to get the crop in. It is really a new thing for us all this harvest demand for labour, and shows how profoundly asleep are those economists who laugh at grain crops in the Plata.

Saturday and Sunday were busy days on the mole head; some 1200 emigrants landed, all from the South of Europe, and 664 more to be landed to-morrow; what seems most astonishing is that in the presence of such tremendous arrivals wages keep as high as ever.

The news of the removal of the bullock cart portion of the Plaza Once out to Flores, has sent a new life into the village of the Plain and people seem to think that this move will tend to stretch the city more and more westward; how the wool men will manage remains to be seen, the breezy zephyr of income breathing morning, the break of a Flores tramway every day at day break, of course it must add greatly to the traffic both of the railway and tramway.
