The Gironde Mails.

Lisbon, Dec. 10th. The French Constitutional Committee of thirty members was completed on the 4th inst. The first business that they will take in hand will probably be the formation of an Upper Chamber, comprising the Marshals, Admirals, Cardinals and Chief Judges, the Government always reserving to itself a certain number of nominations, and each Department to have the right to send one representative. It will not be called a Senate, as the word recalls the Imperial epoch, but simply Upper Chamber. Duc de Broglie has submitted a project whereby, until the Municipal Reform system be voted, all Mayors will be appointed by the President of the Republic, except in small towns, where the Prefects will appoint them, just as they do police officials. This project was sent by the Assembly before a special committee, 9 of whom have declared for, and 6 against it. A proposal was made by one of the Budget Committee to place the Elysée palace at the President's disposal, which was opposed by a Ministerialist, as it would seem to indicate a removal of the Government to Paris. Meantime MacMahon will have his receptions, as usual, at the Elysée, but reside at Versailles, and it is rumored he means to ask an increase of £24,000 sterling to his present salary. The Count de Chambord accompanied by Duc de Blacas and some old attendants crossed over from Switzerland into France in incognito, and took up his quarters at a hotel in the Versailles, as M. Honoré; he made various excursions to the chateaux of Rochefoucauld, De Laynes, and the Duchesse de Chevreux, besides going one day to Paris. He was at Versailles the night that MacMahon was elected President for 7 years. The Ministers did not interfere with his incognito, and the Orleans Princes allowed him to remain in retirement, except the Countess of Paris who went with her children to visit him. There is no truth in the story that he had intended to present himself to the Assembly and explain the tenor of his Salzburg letter, which at least for a

time was shut him out from the throne. Before leaving Versailles he had an interview with MacMahon, who said he had accepted his appointment for 7 years merely to preserve order, and that his dearest wish would be to see France and her lawful King reconciled. One of Chambord's organs the Union announced that Henry the Fifth was about to abdicate in favor of the Count of Paris, so as to allow an immediate proclamation of the Monarchy before the Assembly vote the new Constitution. When this news was telegraphed from London to Paris it caused a great rise in French funds, but the Unites afterwards contradicted it.

The Bazaine trial will probably terminate about the middle of December, and it is supposed the Marshal will be disgraced and shot, according to Art. 210 of the Military Code, invoked by the Government prosecutor when concluding the accusation on the 8th inst. Prince Ferdinand of Orleans, son of the Duke of Montpensier, is dead. Prince Ghika, who was recently shot by Prince Soutzo in a duel at Fontainebleau was son of the Liberator of Wallachia, of which country both families have been Hospodars; Ghika was 56 years of age and the cause of quarrel is a mystery.

The Moldo-Wallachian Government has addressed a circular to the great Powers, insisting on the Treaty of Paris as allowing it to be represented near foreign courts, and repelling the pretensions of Turkey. "Our independence," it says, "is guaranteed by the great Powers, and we mean to make Turkey respect it."

It is rumored that Germany requires Denmark to give up her West India islands in exchange for Schleswig, as the new Empire wishes to augment her naval and colonial relations; but the Magdeburg Gazette denies it in toto, and so does the Daily Telegraph correspondent writing from Copenhagen. The condition of the Emperor William is very grave, the paralysis preventing him from moving in bed.

The Pope is again ailing, although his illness is nothing serious; he was, however, confined to his rooms yesterday. The Government Commissioners continue taking up and selling the church properties, colleges, libraries, &c. The Minister of Justice has brought in a bill forbidding any clergyman from celebrating a marriage until the civil ceremony has first been gone through. He stated also in the Chambers that he cannot recognize the present Curates or hand them over parochial properties, and that he will not allow any Curate to take a parish if the parishioners declare an aversion to him. The Duke of Aosta, ex-King of Spain, is named Inspector General of the Italian army; his wife the Queen is now in a fair way of recovery. The 7 great military commands of the Kingdom have been distributed thus—Prince Humbert at Rome, Cialdini at Florence, Pianelli at Verona, Pettinero at Naples, Pettini at Milan, Cadorna at Turin, and Casanova at Palermo.

Great rejoicings occurred at Vienna on the 25th anniversary of the Emperor's coronation. Francis Joseph and the Empress were loudly cheered in the streets. All political prisoners were released. A medal was struck for the army, for the various campaigns since 1848.

Spain is in a lamentable condition, both internally and externally. The Carlists on one side, the Communists of Cartagena on the other, an empty treasury, Castelar on his last legs, a new President expected the moment the Cortes meet, the Virginian affair not settled, and a fresh complication with Germany owing to the illegal seizure of two German merchant-ves-

els at Manila. Cartagena is in ruins, but not yet taken. The bombardment is one of the most terrific on record—

The hospitals, town-hall, factories, arsenals, shops, markets and foreign consulates have been sacked and burnt. The foreign war-vessels removed from Escambreras at Castelar's request, to prevent the rebel leaders taking refuge aboard. The Council at Madrid was unanimous against shelling Cartagena from the sea, but Castelar over-ruled their objection. He means to send 10,000 of the Palma veterans to aid the besieging army, as he wants to take Cartagena before the Cortes meet on January 7th.

General La Concha is spoken of to succeed the Viceroy Jovellar at Cuba, who declares he cannot cause his orders to be respected at Havana. When Castelar ordered him to deliver up the Virginians to the United States, he telegraphed back that the Cuban Volunteers would not permit him. This caused great excitement at Madrid, and a Cabinet Council was held, repeating the order to Jovellar, who then said he must retire from the island. The Santiago de Cuba authorities are not going to shoot the remaining prisoners, and seem even ready to hand them over; they are still at Santiago, and the Virginians is at Habana. The Volunteers published a manifesto of confidence in Viceroy Jovellar, who replied by a message begging them to obey the orders from Madrid. Meantime the Colonial Minister, Soler Piaz, telegraphs from Habana that he can do nothing, and will come home resigning. The Washington Government sees that Castelar is powerless, and will give him a fresh date for the surrender of the Virginians, to allow Congress meantime to resolve what steps to be taken.

The Times maintains that the Virginians was rightly seized, as the U-

States were at peace with Spain and had never recognized the Cubans as belligerents. The fact of hoisting an American flag amounted to nothing, as it was simply a case of filibusters or pirates, who might as well have pounced upon one of the Cunard mail-steamer and should certainly have been hung for pirates. The case is made worse, continues the Times, by the fact that another expedition is now being fitted out at New Orleans, of the same character as the Virginians.

The demand of the German Government is put in the mildest form to Castelar, offering to leave the question entirely to diplomatic arrangement. Castelar had a dispute with Salmeron and the other leaders about 33 seats he wanted to declare vacant before the Cortes met. He carried his point and has ordered new elections for those departments, but before the new members can come up he will be hurled from power by Pi, Salmeron, Figueras, Estevanez and the others.

UNITED STATES.

President Grant in his message to Congress speaks in the most friendly manner of Spain.

As regards the Virginians he says she was captured on the high seas, while carrying the American flag; the subject was a grave one, causing a lively impression on the public mind. It is established by treaties no vessel carrying the American flag can be overhauled or molested on the high seas, without an offence to the United States. Hence the proper reclamations were made of Spain, and that Government admitted the justice of same, the matter being now in a fair way for an arrangement satisfactory to both countries.

The American Government pointed out to Spain that slavery is the chief cause of the lamentable situation of Cuba, and that no peace or prosperity could ensue until its abolition.

The seizure of the Virginians and execution of the prisoners induce the Government to call out the whole American navy, pending negotiations.

Meantime Spain deserves some praise for having proclaimed a Republican form of Government, also for having abolished slavery in Porto Rico and promised to do so in Cuba.

The Secretary of the Navy at Washington has published his report on the various vessels, showing that the whole fleet of the U. States is now ready to put to sea and commence active operations.

THE BRAZILIAN CABLE.

Rio Janeiro, Dec. 25th. Yesterday morning the shore end was laid of the cable connecting this city with Bahia and Pernambuco, the Hooper having transferred the concluding portion to a lighter in tow by a tug-steamer. At 11.30 a.m. His Majesty Dom Pedro, accompanied by his staff aides-de-camp, arrived at the Copacabana beach, whereupon the boats drew nearer shore to the place where a heavier shore cable was to be spliced to the deep-sea one. At 2 p.m. His Majesty took hold of the cable, and aided by those present pulled it safely in shore. It was then carried up to the house adjoining the chapel and connected with the electric battery. At 2.20 the Emperor telegraphed to the clerk at Bahia, who at once replied "All right."

The Emperor then sent the following inaugural message to the Presidents of Bahia, Pernambuco and Pará:—

"The submarine cable has at last reached the capital of the Empire, uniting the most important cities of Brazil just as the bond of patriotism unites all Brazilians in the same zealous wish for the prosperity of our magnificent country. The Emperor salutes Bahia, Pernambuco and Pará, so auspicious an event, as their foremost friend and countryman, wishing those cities a Happy New Year."

No other telegram was sent as the apparatus was still aboard the Hooper, and the cable cannot begin to work for the public till New Year's day.

The work of laying the cable behind Isla Rasa, and in front of Ilha Redonda, to the coast, was successfully carried out by Fred. A. Armiston, chief engineer, Mr. Hydeau, manager, Mr. France, superintendent, and Messrs. King and Botteley C.E., representatives of Thomson's Mirror System Company.

Among those present on the Copacabana beach were the President of the Council, the Minister of Agriculture, the Minister for War, the commanders of the Hooper, and the Paracense, the engineer, Mr. John Hooper, and some other gentlemen.

The event is one of transcendental importance, as this cable connects Rio Janeiro with the great northern ports, and will speedily place Brazil in contact with Europe, probably before the close of 1874. Meantime a day or two will see us connected with the River Plate and West Coast, and our Para cable will push on to the W. Indies and North America.—Journal do Commercio.

PARIS LETTER.

(From our Own Correspondent.)

Nov.

Girls, have you any objection to a German husband? We suppose not. Then hit the nail on the head. The 'nail,' or rather the 'male,' in the case is a Truton, 30 years of age, (he says nothing about his looks) occupying a position in the Southern camps as teacher in an Infant School; and he advertizes in the columns of our German colleague for a wife whose only qualifications need be amiability, a smattering of music, and an inclination to assist advertiser in teaching the infants. This bashful Truton is likely enough to get what he wants. We never knew a girl yet that was n't amiable, nor had not a most tantalizing smattering of music; the inclination to assist in teaching the infants is another thing. Herr Ernst, Box 855 G. P. O., is the man holding carriage of the sale, or the 'sell'—for all we know, he is the willing victim himself.

The following are the sad particulars of the murder of our unfortunate countryman, Gallaher, at Saladas, to which we referred in our last issue:—"On Sunday, the 28th, a little after sundown, as Conby Gallaher was driving up his horses, two natives met him, and killed him. It appears he was taken by surprise; in any case as he had nothing in his hand but a 'soga' it was easy to do it. His head was all chopped, and even the skull was broken, his face and hands cut, and one frightful stab in the breast; they appear to have turned the 'puñal' several times in his breast like an augur. The assassins then went up to the house, and asked for a drink, and poor Mrs. G., not knowing what had occurred, went out to give it to them. They then jumped off, and gave her several strokes of a whip, knocked her down, and one of them held a 'facon' to her ribs—whilst the other went in, and made a bundle of all the articles of any use in the house, taking G's revolver, and pulling the rings off her fingers. It appears that they then passed back by where G. was lying dead, and with the poor fellow's own revolver put a ball through him, burning the cloth and skin with the powder. I forgot to tell you that they cut his pockets with a knife, expecting to get money, but the poor fellow had nothing in them but a piece of sealing wax, and a few nails and staples."

We had mails from the Mount yesterday. Great alarm prevails there respecting the cholera here, and the port may be closed at any moment. Madame Marziani had an oration at her benefit on Tuesday evening at the Solia Theatre. A fatal accident occurred on the same day to a native gentleman named Adolfo Flores. While standing in the patio of his house in Calle 25 de Agosto, a pillar supporting part of the roof gave way, and the mass fell on him, killing him on the spot.

A terribly sudden death occurred in a hotel at Mercedes in this province a few days since. A respectable Irishman, named Crow, who had recently bought some sheep there, and was about setting in the neighborhood, dropped dead while partaking of dinner in the hotel. Aneurism of the heart is supposed to have been the cause of death.

Very important papers in connection with the Limits Question between Chile and this Republic are said to have been received lately by the Chilean Government from Mr. Blest Gana, its Minister at Paris. The papers in question were hunted up in Madrid, and are said to be quite conclusive on the subject of the limits at Patagonia.

The West Coast advices announce the immediate departure from Peru of the officers and men necessary to navigate home the ironclads lately built in England for the Peruvian Government.

Great news. The cable between Lisbon and Madeira is being laid by the steamer Seine. This is good news. We have now electric communication between Rio and Bahia, this and the wire between Lisbon and Madeira must shorten our communication with Europe by several days. An attendant of the links between Madeira, St. Vincent and Brazil, and from Rio to Chay, which will complete the chain to Europe.

In cholera times made to swallow daily, 'molens volens,' as much common salt as can be piled on a rupee piece. The measure never fails to reduce the death rate in the prisons to a wonderful extent compared to that outside them. We commend this cheap remedy to nervous subscribers.

A letter from some 'patri families' in the city prisons suggests that those prisoners who can give bail for their reappearance when the cholera is over, should be set at liberty now, to ease the present dangerous crowding of malefactors in jail. Poor lambs. "Very like a whale!" Let them all out on their 'parole d'honneur.' 'Caspita!'

A 'conventillo' at the corner of Calles Temple and Suipacha was cleared on Wednesday. Can our readers guess how many beds were taken from the place—a mere hole? 200!!! The Salubrity Commissioners of that Parish are a pretty lot.

The branch to the San Isidro brick-works on the Northern Railway is finished, and ready for the Government Inspector. "My bien!" Two months grace from the 1st inst have been given to the buyers of Government land near Obilivoy who have not yet paid their instalments. Unless they book up before the 15th of March they are done for. The Cudua market late on Wednesday afternoon gave greatly and several large sales were made for cash at 82. The venciencia's were by millions over the figure marked on the black board and we believe fully amounted to 13 millions pata, about the heaviest business ever done on 'Change.

The Legislatura on Wednesday authorized the Provincial Bank to advance the Government 20 millions currency, meet epidemic cholera, and to arrange a loan with the Nat. Bank for one million pata, 25 millions currency. Again, we have a project of law laid before the Provincial Legislature for a Bank Municipal loan of ten millions currency. Verily, in such times as the present money flows like water, and it would be well to have a good fiscal to look over the accounts; here we have some 55 millions going out, and it will enrich the community and we suppose every dollar is required, but those conventionalists are dear 'concerns for the citizens. Yet they stand, mock Public Opinion, board of health, press, law, and public safety until these notes of disease and death are got out of the town in toto and the people are prepared for fifty or sixty millions of public money for epidemic cholera, next summer.

We have rather good advice respecting the wheat crop which, spite of the rains has been stacked in time, but up the country the locusts are doing great damage and the Ordovala maize crop is considered as almost lost owing to the locusts.

The Tucuman Railway works are pushing ahead fast; now the rails are laid for several miles; Mr. Telfener is in Rosario attending to the forwarding of the materials, several vessels are discharging rails &c. at Rosario, and the work goes ahead splendidly.

To-day we learned that the Rosario authorities have established a cordon around the city to prevent people from Buenos Ayres entering. There are numerous parties here who want to go to the country, but now must remain here until things improve.

From San Nicolas we learn that the barasses up there are all dead at work, and a great scarcity of stamens. Messrs. Matti and Pion, we hear, have contracted with some of the baraqueros up there to bring down 10,000 bales up to 1st Jan., for shipment here by steamers for Havre. This is a very large business for San Nicolas, and shows how much that place is going ahead. We hear that one of the flour mills is working up there, the other is at a stand still. Our commercial readers can form some idea of the once splendid business of flour mills in the Plata when we state that some years ago one of the flour mills in this city netted two thousand patagons per day.

The Provincial Government has granted the necessary permit to the City of Buenos Ayres Tramway Co. to open its line to San Barracas. This will secure a largely increased traffic to the Company.

It will enter in many in this market to know that very favorable advices have come out from London by the Araucania respecting the Rosario Railway, and there seems very little doubt that it will be carried out, and that at once.

At noon to-day official news from the Municipality was received on 'Change respecting the health of the city, and it put every one in good humour. The Municipal returns of new cases for yesterday only amounted to seven, whilst for every one in good spirits. The hall of the Bolsa was thronged before 12 o'clock, every one talking over the news of the day. It is calculated that some 25,000 people moved out of the city yesterday to the suburbs, such was the crowd of furniture carts on all the roads leading out of town. This move is greatly approved of by the doctors, who consider the population of this city too dense for the summer months.

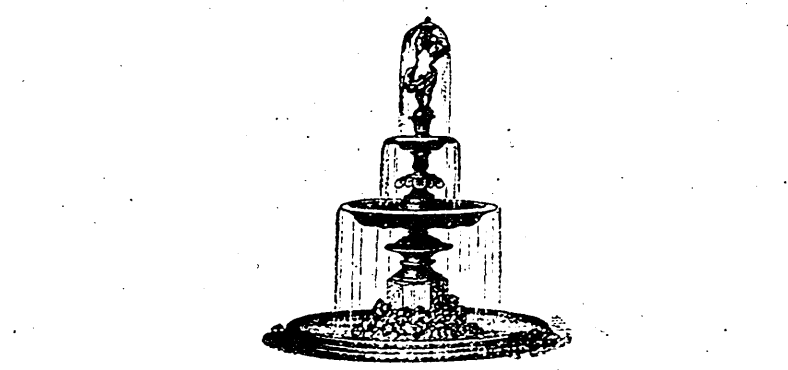

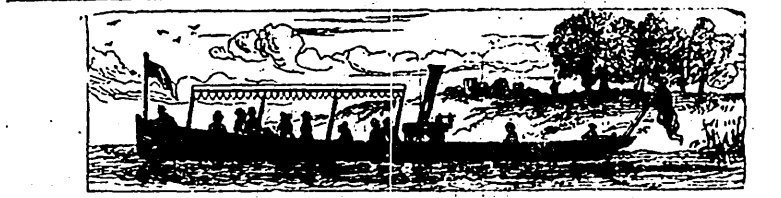

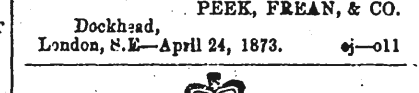
