At the sound of the opening door the Marshal, who was engaged in conversation with those about him, advanced towards the young advocate, and observing his despondent countenance, at once understood what was the nature of his communication.

'They have condemned me to death,' he said quietly, and asked him, 'By what majority?' 'Unanimously,' was the reply. 'Ah!' was the sole exclamation of the Marshal, and then he resumed, as if nothing had occurred to interrupt, the conversation he had been carrying on.

Every one in tears; the condemned Marshal alone preserved a calm aspect. At that moment Colonel Villette entered the room. He had advanced towards him whom he had so devotedly served during the last 18 months, but as he was about to grasp the offered hand his strength gave way, and he fell heavily to the ground.

In the midst of this heart-rending scene the Commandant Guitho, aide-de-camp to the Duc d'Annamale, arrived. M. Lachaud followed the aide-de-camp. He found the Judges assembled; and the Duc d'Annamale read to him an appeal for mercy signed by all the members of the Court. He added that he was about to visit the Minister of War and the President of the Republic personally to support the recommendation of the Court.

The distinguished advocate simply replied that he would communicate the fact to the Marshal, and withdrew. The Marshal had already refused to avail himself of his right to appeal, and only asked to have his son with him.

The petition of the Court to the Minister of War, to be presented to MacMahon was as follows—'The Council of War has passed sentence on Marshal Bazaine. In our judgment we listened only to the voices of our own conscience. The lengthened trial precludes the necessity of our reasons, since to God alone have we to render account of our decision.

'Our judicial character obliged us to follow the strict sentence of the Law, without admitting any extenuating circumstances, but we feel bound now to call into notice those circumstances.

'When Marshal Bazaine took command of the Army of the Rhine he did so under such extraordinary difficulties that he is nowise responsible for the disastrous termination of the war, or the choice of strategic positions.

'We must also observe that whenever he was in the thickest of the fight, whether at Borny, or Gravelotte, or Naisseville, nothing could exceed his bravery; and on the eventful 16th August it was his personal gallantry and decision which maintained the centre line of battle.

'Moreover, take into consideration his long services, from his first entry as a volunteer in 1831, and count his numerous campaigns, the wounds he received, and the glorious deeds of valor which won him a Marshal's baton.

'Finally, bear in mind his long imprisonment and the two months of cruel anxiety he has suffered during this painful trial for his life and honor.

'On these grounds we trust Your Excellency will join us in asking the President to commute the sentence we have passed.

On Dec. 12th, before Bazaine learned that his sentence was commuted he wrote a letter of thanks to his Advocate, Lachaud, for the brilliant defence made in his behalf, and concluded with these words:—'If your eloquent and truthful arguments were unable to convince my judges, it was because no human reasoning could sway them. I shall not appeal against their sentence. I wish not to prolong before the world so painful a spectacle, and I beg you to take no further steps in my favor.

'I no longer look to men to judge me. Time will bring with it a freedom from passions, to which I appeal, confident of justice being one day done me. With a calm conscience, I await resolutely the execution of my sentence.

'The Count de Chambord left Versailles for Pau, accompanied by Lord Saxe, an Irish peer, who is his bosom friend. They arrived at Biarritz by special train, and were joined by the Mayor, as far as Pau, where the Count proceeded to visit the native chateau of Henri Quatre. The Duchess of Parma was at Pau, expecting a visit from the Duchess of Madrid; the Count de Bari, brother of the King of Naples, is also at Pau. Quite a Bourbon gathering.

The French Assembly is busy with the Budget, having already voted 103 millions of the 149 millions proposed by Government. The attempt to pass a vote of censure on the Ministry for maintaining the state of siege was thrown out by 407 votes to 273, showing that MacMahon had a large majority.

The 30 members just chosen to frame the Constitutional Laws are almost largely on the Government side, there being only 5 opposition, viz—Dufaure, Laboulaye, Waddington, Cezanne and Vacherot. At the first session M. Batbie, the chairman, announced that no news would be given to the journals, the committee meeting every Wednesday and Friday, but any of the Deputies would be at liberty on his own account to act as reporter for the leading papers.

At the conclusion of the Bazaine trial everybody expected that MacMahon would give the Duc d'Annamale some high military post, and that he would resign his seat in the Assembly; but he continues simply as Commander of a Corps d'Armée. The Duke de Broglie in defence of the new Mayoralities project showed that it was essential for the Government to have the appointment and absolute control of Mayors and Prefects. In many departments an anxiety is evinced to dissolve the Assembly and have new elections. MacMahon, meantime, is determined to hold his ground for seven years. The Republican party are likely to win the four new seats.

Madrid telegrams of yesterday (17th) show that President Castelar is going to send great reinforcements, and make a final effort to take Cartagena, as the European Powers signify to him that they cannot until then recognize the Spanish Republic. The bombardment continues day and night, but the fire of the garrison has greatly diminished, and it is believed they are coming short of provisions.

A Communist movement occurred at Barcelona on the night of the 12th; groups of men rushed into the streets crying 'Viva la Comuna!' and firing several shots, but hurrying away to their houses the moment the troops appeared in sight.

Castelar expects to have Cartagena and the other difficulties settled in time for the opening of the Cortes. He has amicably arranged with the German Minister about the illegal capture of German vessels at Manila. He has sent the Virginus and survivors to Bahia Honda, to be handed over to the United States. He has named General Concha, de Rodas, Balsaude and Portilla to examine General Donato's proposal for the subjugation of Cuba.

The Carlist war continues. General Moriones left San Sebastian on the 9th and claims to have routed the Carlists, although his own loss was 200 between killed and wounded. He says this is the same difficult country where Sarsfield, O'Donnell and De Lacy Evans had such hard fighting forty years ago, against these hardy Basque peasants.

Carlist advances announce that General Padiel has been defeated in an attempt to break the Carlist blockade of Tolosa. General Padiel is stated to have been wounded and one of his Colonels killed.

It is stated that the Porte is negotiating with English bankers to obtain an advance of £5,000,000. The French Government have ordered an investigation to be opened into the loss of the Ville du Havre, in addition to the inquiry instituted by the English authorities.

The American frigate Camandagua left New York for Cuba in order to receive the Virginus.

The men are to be delivered up to a vessel of the United States at Santiago.

THE BRAZILIAN CABLE. RIO JANEIRO TO PARA. INAUGURATION BY THE EMPEROR. New Year's day 1874.

Rio Janeiro. To-day was solemnly inaugurated by His Majesty, Dom Pedro Segundo, the cable connecting this capital with the cities of Bahia, Pernambuco and Para, and which will shortly be completed to Europe, uniting Brazil with the rest of the universe.

At 2 p.m. the Hotel de los Estrangeros, brilliantly decorated, was crowded with 200 gentlemen invited for the occasion by Messrs. Colin MacKenzie, Robert M. Hyde, and Frederic A. Ormiston, representatives and superintendent engineers of the Western and Brazilian Telegraph Company Limited.

Their Majesties the Emperor and Empress arrived at a quarter past two, attended by a brilliant staff, and when Mr. MacKenzie announced that everything was in readiness Dom Pedro forwarded the following message of salutation to the Provinces of Bahia, Pernambuco and Para.

'His Majesty the Emperor sends a greeting from this capital to the Provinces of Bahia, Pernambuco and Para, on the inauguration this day of the submarine telegraph cable which now stretches along nearly the whole length of the Brazilian seaboard; hoping that this happy event will be the forerunner of great natural and material advancement for our country.'

The Emperor then sat down at the banquet-table, with the Empress on his right and the President of the Council on his left. The table was beautifully arranged, covers being laid for 200 guests. During the lunch His Majesty received replies from Para and Pernambuco, and a few minutes later from Bahia. The President of Para's message was in these words.

'As interpreter of the enthusiastic feeling of the Paranaenses I salute and thank the high-minded monarch of Brazil, for having initiated the great work that to-day we celebrate.'

Then followed several appropriate speeches by the Ministers and others present.

The Minister of Agriculture toasted the Company which had so successfully completed this part of the great enterprise they had taken in hand.

Mr. MacKenzie, in returning thanks, testified to the friendly co-operation he had found everywhere in Brazil, from the Cabinet Minister down to the lowest employee.

Baron Maua returned thanks for the Company, of which he was in some manner the founder; as concessionaire and originator of the enterprise of a cable to Europe, and called attention to the merchants of Brazil, who aided him in launching so great a scheme.

Comendador Acevedo toasted Viscount Tocantius and the members of the Rio Exchange, who took so lively an interest in the work.

Viscount Tocantius returned thanks, but gave all the merit to the merchants of Rio Janeiro for fostering so splendid an undertaking.

The President of the Council gave a toast to the nations that lead the vanguard of civilization in the 19th century, whose representatives are present at this friendly board.

The Portuguese Minister replied for himself and colleagues, expressing the best wishes for the progress of Brazil.

Several other speeches followed, including one by Mr. Colin MacKenzie to the Emperor, after which the function terminated. His Majesty before leaving examined the workshops attentively.—Journal do Commercio.

LONDON LETTER. (From Our Own Correspondent.) Bazaine sentence—Shadow of Death—Ticborne trial—Surrender of Virginus &c.

December 11, 1873. To most of the world the condemnation to death of Marshal Bazaine has come with a strange suddenness. We expected a longer defence and a greater delay in pronouncing judgment. I think the general opinion was that military degradation and exile would have been the severest sentence passed; and there were not a few who expected that at the hands of the conservative Government in France, the Marshal would receive an acquittal. But the wounded military vanity of the French is independent of political parties; the indignation was deep; the desire for a victim intense.

Beyond these concealed causes the official evidence of treason on the part of the Marshal was painfully convincing; and it is difficult not to agree with the Times of this morning which in summing up the case says that the High Military Council of France found Marshal Bazaine guilty; and history it thinks will approve their verdict.

There is also this remarkable passage in the Times article: 'Now that the terror produced by the fall of Paris is passing away, the spirit which animated the electors of the Bordeaux Assembly is vanishing with it. Three years ago Gambetta was a 'Gibonax'; three years hence the legend of France's heroic defence after Sedan may be incorporated with the national history. A sufficiently large part of society already accepts it to make it impossible to endorse the surrender of Metz. We confess that our own opinion has always tended in this direction. Whether it was wise or not for France to continue the war after Sedan is a question in which discussion would be wasted. Nations, at great crises of their history, do not consult expediency or utility; they obey in strictness of patriotism, courage, national animosity, and these are often surer guides than sober reasoning.'

With great respect for the powers of memory of the Times, its opinions have not 'always been in this direction,' on the contrary, it counselled expediency, and heaped abuse upon Gambetta and the brave men who, at vast odds, defended all that was left to France—her honor.

Even on the ground of expediency which suits the Lombard-street organ, the cause of the 'furious fools' who defended France was not, hopeless. Dr. Russell, who is probably the author of the article I have quoted, reminds us again as he has done in his history of the war, and as he told us at the time when he was with the Germans before Paris, that when they were hard pressed on the Loire it was for days a question whether they should not raise the siege.

The council in unanimously finding Bazaine guilty, and condemning him to death, took care to recommend him to mercy. There is no fear that Marshal MacMahon will sign the death warrant of his former comrade and chief; but the political effect of the condemnation of Bazaine, and I may add of the article in the Times, will be very important in weakening the Imperialists who support the government, and in restoring the prestige of the Radicals, whose recent electoral victories were no doubt due much less to their political opinions than to the fact that the defence of the honour of France was identified with the chief of that party and his government.

The Imperialist generals one and all, not excepting MacMahon, thought more of what they were pleased to call 'society' and its 'saviour' than of France. I remember when Bourbaki was in England when he had come from Metz to see the Empress, or in a subsequent visit, I forget which, he told a friend of mine that he was returning to France to take a command, but with a shrug of the shoulders he said, 'he had no men, and could do nothing.' Bourbaki is a soldier and a gentleman 'sans reproche,' but that speech was not in the spirit which animated the 'furious fools,' and who for all we know so nearly succeeded.

There is on exhibition in Bond-street (W.) a realistic picture by the pre-Raphaelite artist, Holman Hunt. Thousands upon thousands of good respectable religious English men and women and girls go to see that picture which in parenthesis I may mention has been sold to a publisher for £15,000 the artist to deliver it in four years hence in which time he hopes to make as much again by its exhibition in London and the provinces. The picture is called 'The Shadow of Death.' It represents Christ in his youth working in a carpenter's shop; and the saws and planes are so arranged that

their shadow forms a cross on the wall; whilst the principal figure resting from his toil and with his hands locked and stretched before him is gazing in an ecstatic moment of prescience at the light of a Syrian day streaming into the workshop. Every detail is topographically and historically delineated. The room in which the canvas, 10 by 6, is placed, is skilfully draped and darkened under the personal superintendence of the artist who has managed to throw a dim religious light on his picture.

The result of the investigation into the character of Luie, the wonderful witness who had almost upset the prosecution in the Ticborne case, is exceedingly unfavorable. Besides a crowd of warders from prisons, clerks from Liverpool, Newcastle and Cardiff who testified to his identity as a convict, swindler and other things; the wife of Luie's own bosom appeared and stated that he had left her some time ago. When asked if she recognized him, she said 'Rather!' She and the other witnesses testified to certain wounds and marks, and amongst other things to his having suffered from hernia. To prove this a medical witness was called; and after that even Dr. Kenealy who had up to then placed so much angelic faith in Luie, was obliged to give him up; and the 'steward of the Isoprey' that ought to have been, was ignominiously walked out of Court between two constables, and fairly committed for perjury.

The only incidents to which the episode gave rise in court you will find an account of separately. One of them—an unseemly altercation between the Lord Chief Justice and Dr. Kenealy—was equally disgraceful to both. The Lord Chief Justice defended his conduct amidst the suppressed applause of the bar and the gaping audience. I care nothing for the suppressed applause of the public, much less for that of the 'bar,' which was not disinterested. Admitting that in the present instance Kenealy was wrong, that he was rude in telling the judge that he 'persistently insulted him in the most offensive terms he could employ,' there is no doubt about it that Cockburn has throughout the trial assumed the part of advocate for the prosecution, and in his manner towards Kenealy has been bullying, aggravating and unjust. One of the worst effects of his conduct is that the jurymen have aped his Lordship in badgering Kenealy. On one occasion an idiot in the box asked it such and such a remark was not 'what in law they called a 'suggested falsi? Even his Lordship was obliged to pass over the Latin and learning of the chandler, or whatever he was, without deigning to notice it.

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Dr. Kenealy has resumed his address, which is interesting in spite of the incessant chaff from the Bench, but after the Luie incident the interest rather hangs fire, and the faithful Mr. Whalley has disappeared from Court for some days.

Notwithstanding they speak of adjourning the Court for the Christmas holidays on the Friday before Christmas Day till the 9th January. Dr. Kenealy is determined that the claimant shall have his plum-pudding in peace this year.

The Bank rate was lowered to-day to 4 per cent. but the market is not very animated although better this afternoon than when it opened. Political affairs in France and Prussia are beginning to be uneasy; the Bazaine episode will certainly not improve matters. I see they have just caught another communist in Paris, a poor young clerk in a merchant's office who was enthusiastic enough to become a sergeant in the communal army. I understand that there is always a stock of communists on hand well-known to the police and who are exercising peaceably and innocently their callings. But when the Government feels uneasy and wants an example they catch one and publish the account of his arrest.

The Cuban business is to be settled by the expected surrender of the Virginus. The Carlist insurrection in Spain seems to have arrived at a critical period. The Carlists are fighting amongst themselves, and it is reported Lizarra has captured and shot Santa Cruz. Meantime Moriones and Loma have made a feint of retreat and suddenly combined and have come upon the Carlists from the North. A fight is expected and if the Carlists are beaten they must cut through the Republican army, or retreat towards the Ebro where General Prince Bivera is now and when Genera Concha may be shortly.

We hear from Montevideo that hundreds of people have run the quarantine blockade established there. Here, though we are mere tyros in quarantine matters as compared with Europe and the United States, it has sometimes been 'tant soi peu difficile' to evade quarantine without detection; but at the Mount quarantine has always been the broadest farce, and it is mere egotistical 'chisme' to go through the form of shutting that port, to the great inconvenience of trade and traffic.

The City of Buenos Ayres Tramway Company carried 610,625 passengers over all its lines last month. Notwithstanding the increase in its mileage lately, and the apparent complication of its various routes, the traffic on this line goes on with the regularity of a Dent's chronometer. Good management is the secret of the success of this company.

In referring on Saturday to the South American Club we stated that the Entrance fee was £5 and the Subscription £3 for the year ending October next. We forgot to mention that these figures only apply to the founders of the Club. For the next 200 members the Entrance fee will be £12, and the Subscription £6, the Committee having power to increase both for the 201st applicant for admission.

The Municipality is getting deeper and deeper into the books of the old Gas Company. 1½ bill for light last month was 306,000 mjc. The Company must consult a fortune teller if it wishes to know anything about payment. A subscriber of whom we always thought better things asked us yesterday if we had any Spiritualists on our list of subscribers, as he would like to be introduced to them. We have n't the remotest idea as to whether we have any mediums amongst our patrons; it so, the next time they call at the Court we'd like to be introduced to the shade of the British Packet, Commercial Times, and all our defunct predecessors. If they can tell us nothing, we can inform them of a thing or two.

The practice of conveying huge bars of iron in one horse carts through the streets had a fatal result on Saturday, when a man standing at a corner in Calle Moreno got a rap on the crown from a bar protruding from a cart, and fell prone dead. The victim being an humble man the abuse will, of course, remain in full force till a Deputy or Lord Mayor is murdered.

We heard a novel proposal yesterday. Viz, that the Government should call for bids for the erection of a first class hotel on Martin Garcia, giving the ground free; that adequate accommodation should also be provided for second and third class passengers, and that all emigrants arriving here should be sent for eight days to the island during the summer months, quarantine or no quarantine, sickness or no sickness, to acclimatize them. We have not as yet fully digested this new idea, so will express no opinion on it.

The only news or remark worth repeating in the Rosario papers of Sunday last is that matrimony is at a discount in that quarter just now. Only 28 victims were led to the matrimonial slaughter in Rosario during the past month of December.

A gentleman in Cordoba offers a big bet that cholera will not invade that city this year. A similar unseemly wager was offered in the Rosario papers about a fortnight ago. Such a terrible visitation should not be made the subject of silly wagering. It is most indecent. There was a demonstration to Captain Reeks of the R. M. S. Boyne yesterday as the passengers were leaving for the shore. The popular Captain entertained the passengers and those who had come from shore to meet their friends at a recheché breakfast, and before the little steamer cast loose from the ship three thundering cheers were given for Captain Reeks, and the time honoured chorus "for he's a jolly good fellow" was sung in stentorian tones. Captain Reeks bowed his thanks from the gangway as his guests left for the Mole, which they reached about 1 o'clock.

Some curious statistics of marriages in Russia are published. Forty seven per cent. of them are contracted by boys and girls under age, and a very large proportion by widows and widowers. The gentlemen of the Black Sea districts are the only ones that do not evince much partiality for widows; on the contrary, they have a holy horror of them, and the spinsters have it all their own way in that quarter.

The last set to between Chief Justice Cockburn and Dr. Kenely, as reported in the papers per Cotopaxi, was something unheard of before in a British Court of Justice. His Lordship, amid applause from the Bar, stated that he had sat on the Bench for 17 years and had never begun so insulted before. Dr. Kenely asserted the same. When the Cotopaxi was leaving it was said at Lisbon that the Chief Justice, unwilling to seem partial by committing Dr. Kenely for contempt, had privately challenged him, against the earnest remonstrances of his learned brothers, Lush and Mellor. Kenely had accepted the challenge, and, as the story goes, was quite willing to fight his Lordship's colleagues also.

Neils and Co. during the absence of the senior partner—were each and all duly welcomed on 'Change; some were even welcomed in friends.

Stock, 372,700 hides, viz.: 83,400 dry and 331,300 salted R. P., 4200 dry and 37,400 salted R. Grande; and 16,400 miscellaneous.

The declining tendency of the market, which seemed somewhat checked last week, has again strengthened these last days under the influence of unexpected late arrivals, increasing the pressure of the already excessive stock. Prices receded since last inst., fully 2-3 for salted hides, 10f. for dry madero cows, and other descriptions, although nominally unchanged for want of transactions, are worth fully 3-6f. less than at end of November.

At Liverpool, good Uruguay saladero ox sold up to 74d., which shows a small recovery, but this remains without influence here. The trade is quite discouraged by the apparent impossibility of reducing the stock, and still lower prices are just now generally feared.

Business this morning at a complete stand still some few small sales, and people outside have stopped sending anything in.

Mr. Bergmann, representative of the leading Manchester firm of Richard Johnson and Nephew, has arrived out from Europe, and was welcomed on 'Change' to-day. Mr. B. purposes stopping in the Plate but a week. The firm of Johnson and Nephew, we learn from Mr. Oldham, of Montevideo, is one of the most famous for wire manufactures in England, and contractors and concessionaires requiring anything in the telegraph line would do well to see Mr. Bergmann before he leaves.

The balance sheet of the Provincial Bank for the month of December cannot fail to prove interesting. The deposits at interest amount to \$1,670,488 pats, and 473,284,167 pats, and 35,182,800 mjc.

Commercial deposits in which figure the Nat. Treasury deposit are \$1,658,019 pats, and 13,450,546 mjc; judicial deposits \$1,135,710 pats, and 14,043,756 mjc; private deposits \$1,124,818 pats, and 2,118,270 mjc; specie notes in circulation \$1,829,920 pats; bills discounted \$2,218,070 pats, and 688,894,350 mjc; cash on hand \$1,610,274 pats, and 818,616,674 mjc.

Upon the application of the Collector the Nat. Government, has published a most stringent order compelling the Custom House clerks to attend punctually at office hours.

Don Telemo Huergo has been re-elected as President of the Board of Directors of the Western Railway; no better man could be named to the post. During his previous term of office he has proved an active and economic manager, and the line shows a fine traffic and many great improvements since he took charge.

The eighth call on the shares of the new Gas Company is now being collected. As many of the shareholders as are out of town it would be well to extend the time for the payment of the call.

On Sunday morning the fine steamer Pampa entered, and all that day the Mole was crowded with her passengers, some 700; all fine, healthy, and clean-looking emigrants, well dressed and apparently in comfortable circumstances. Spite of the numerous arrivals of Basques, Spaniards, and Italians during the week, many parties looking for hands had to wait in town for the Pampa. The demand for labour is really something most extraordinary. It seems to increase with the very arrivals.

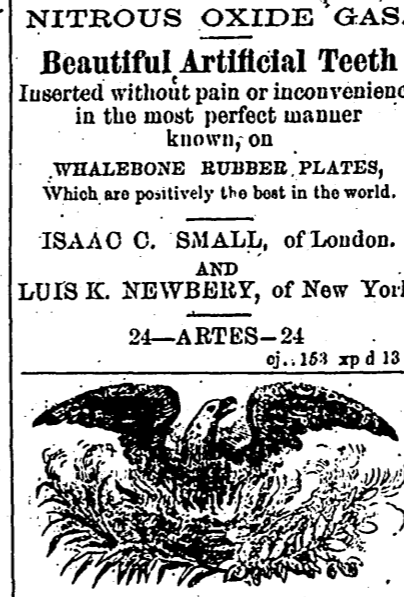
