VILLA OCCIDENTAL.

ITS CONDITION AND PROSPECTS.

Latest advices from our new territory in the Chaco are not of the most flattering description. Since the departure of Gen. Vedia the fortunes of Villa Occidental are decidedly on the wane.

The Deputy-Governor, Col. Frederic Mitre, resides at Asuncion, and the Montagues and Capulets who dispute local supremacy have none of that fostering care for the little colony that Gen. Vedia displayed when appointed Governor. The Military Commander is Lieut. Col. Sora, who has a garrison of 80 men belonging to the 8th Batt. There is also Gelo Politico and Receiver of Customs, one Major Diana; and the chief civil authority, or the Mayor of the Corporation, is Dr Zubizarreta, a gentleman of Spanish birth, naturalized in Paraguay, and for some time in the War-office at Asuncion. Jealousies now and there arise between these various authorities.

On Christmas Day Major Diana was placed under arrest, and the Mayor of the village has to act as Gefe Politico and Receiver of Customs pro tem. There are only two shops of any note, those of the Mayor and Sor, Pérez, the latter being probably an agent for Molina & Co.

Cattle are allowed to graze through the village, the streets being so grass-grown that a man on horseback cannot be seen fifty yards off. Most of the large chacras of 1872 are abandoned, the poor settlers being unable to get the Municipality to prohibit grazing cattle within the limits of the Corporation. The Municipality has quite enough to do in collecting its fees wherewith to keep the secretary going, for he is also village schoolmaster.

The market-place is always crowded with Paraguayans, some dancing, some sleeping, some gambling, and the rest bartering their wares. The Commissary visits the place twice a day to collect fees.

The Receiver of Customs has an honorary post, as there are neither export nor import duties, nor any stamped paper, not even postage-stamps. The imported goods are brought in small boats from Asuncion, transhipped from Montevideo or B. Ayres steamers. It is in fact a free port.

Sometimes a 'guia' is taken out for produce for the down-river ports.

The real vitality and resources of the place would seem to depend on agriculture, which meets with so little encouragement from the authorities that it is on its last legs.

There are at present 12 tillage farms, viz—

Domingo Escobar, Argentine, 135 cuadras, with a plantation of 40,000 orange trees, besides patches of sugarcane, &c.

Pietro Petrucino, Italian, 80 cuadras under oranges, maize, tobacco, caña, &c. Last year he produced 10½ tons tobacco, 1 cwt. wax, 147 tiger-skins, and 4,000 palms.

Valentino Perez, Spaniard, 35 cuadras, with 800 orange trees, and plantations of cane and mandioca. Last year he exported 400 demijohns caña and 500 beams of wood.

Rodrigo Guimaraens, Brazilian, 18 cuadras, with 600 orange-trees: he shipped last year 900 'vigs' of hard wood.

Lepori, Paganini and Fiori, 3 Italians, cultivating small farms, collectively 19 cuadras, with 1850 orange trees, 2100 bananas, &c. They export each last year 800 hard wood 'vigs'.

Montiel and Delmas, two Spaniards, together holding 8 cuadras under mandioca, tobacco and caña, besides 300 orange trees and 1880 bananas.

Pablo Noguera, Paraguayan, has one cuadra under mandioca, bananas and orange trees.

Lorenzo Arduino, Italian, has one cuadra under 50,000 onions.

Torbio Ugarte, Spaniard, produced last year 200 demijohns of caña.

In Gen. Vedia's time he gave land, seeds and implements to any settlers, and there were no idle hands in the colony. But now the place swarms with vagrants, especially as the troubles in Paraguay drive refugees here. Agriculture being discouraged no one sows an acre.

Meantime there are two consolatory items in this gloomy list. The new steam saw-mill is nearly ready, the machinery being all put up, and all complete except the deposit sheds. The woods around are full of timber of various kinds and qualities, and must prove an inexhaustible source of revenue. Moreover two Paraguayans, recently arrived, have begun manufacturing caña, out of the sugar-cane grown on the spot, and the liquor is said to be equal to the famous Paraguayan caña.

It would be well if the Argentine Government offered grants of 3 or 4 cuadras each to settlers, and took measures to prevent cattle-owners from being allowed to destroy the labors of the husbandman. Otherwise Villa Occidental will fall back into the misery which made it so famous as New Bordeaux, when many of the French settlers committed suicide or were lost in the woods.

THE BOLSA MEETING.

At three o'clock yesterday the regular annual Bolsa meeting was held in the Bolsa hall; Mr. Huergo in the chair, assisted by Messrs. Luis Martinez, J. B. Sala, A. Klengel, J. Cramer, and M. Irigoyen.

The Chairman, after fruitless ringing of the bell to enforce silence, at last opened the proceedings by himself reading the report, which we give at foot. The noise and hum was so great in the hall, however, that it was impossible to hear anything that fell from the chair, or fell from anywhere else. D. Alejandro Ocampo did say something, but nobody heard him. Then the Chairman put the report to the meeting. Some half a dozen members stood up in affirmation of the report, and this part of the business was concluded.

The next business appeared to be the election of the new Board. The following gentlemen were elected: Eduardo Madero, Juan Lanus, Federico Cibils, Calixto Oyuela, broker, Juan Rivera, suplente.

It is to be hoped that this will be the last attempt at holding a meeting in the hall of the Bolsa; there are admirable meeting rooms upstairs which would answer the purpose better than the hall, where the noise and hum is as great as the roar of the waters at the Salto de Guayrá or Magara. The meeting to-day really amounted to nothing, for nobody, not even the Chairman, knew what was going on. It was intended to bring in a rule compelling all new brokers henceforward to give security—a most necessary and useful measure.

Report to the Members and Shareholders for the year 1873.

The Directors and Chamber of Commerce, pursuant to Art. 4, submit the report for the year 1873.

In view of the importance of getting frequent telegrams from M. Video we have arranged with our correspondent for an increase of the same, so as to furnish all the latest news from the European markets.

ORIENTAL RESOURCES.

BY A PORONGOS SETTLER.

The Orientales have great faith and pride in themselves as a nation; I don't quarrel with them for that, every man should be proud of his own country and should have her interests clearly at heart; but their way of displaying this faith and pride is not always the most judicious. Instances—when the Central Uruguay Railway was started, they sought to carry it out with money subscribed in the country; ere long the work came to a stand still.

The idea of carrying it out with money subscribed in the country was a great mistake; every dollar so subscribed would otherwise have been expended in the fostering of some native industry, whereby the country would have been enriched. The idea was founded upon a fallacy—foreigners would not construct and work a railway save for profit; this profit would be made out of the country and would go to enrich foreigners—true so far. This profit might just as well be made by Orientales and remain in the country—false. In the first place a seven per cent guarantee would bring a large amount of foreign capital into the country, which would not go out, but would remain there for the permanent enrichment of the country. Even if Government would be called upon to pay this seven per cent, it would have brought money into the country at a much cheaper rate than they can bring it in by means of loans effected in London; the probability is that the Government would never have to pay the full seven per cent, if

any of it. And in the second place, the natives are accustomed to a much larger return than seven per cent. on their capital. If they invest their money in the railway, they sacrifice their interests to their patriotism; highly laudable, but at the same time they unconsciously inflict great injury on their country. Estancieros seeking to increase or improve their stock, and thus add to the material wealth of the country, cannot get money under 12 or 15 per cent., and thus abstain from any effort at improvement; for what business can stand 15 per cent., save in times of exceptional prosperity? The entire savings of the country are needed for the development of its own resources. The Orientales are beginning to understand that now; they did not some years ago.

The wars which have desolated the Banda Oriental have not only checked the development of the natural wealth of the country, but have drawn heavily upon the future. The ordinary revenue fell far short of the expenditure; to meet this extra charge Government had recourse to loans, not loans raised in foreign markets at some reasonable rate, but loans raised in the country itself at ruinous rates. These loans bear heavily upon the country in two ways; in the first place Government pays an exorbitant rate of interest which absorbs a large portion of the revenue, and in the second this money thus invested in Government loans is taken from the spare capital of the country, all of which is required for the development of her own resources. To use a homely phrase the candle is burning at both ends.

Government now seeks to raise a new loan in Europe, for the purpose of buying up all these various war loans, if they be successful, the measure will be one of incalculable service to the country, and the best security which the takers of this loan can have, will be the prosperity which the loan itself will quickly produce.

European capitalists, more especially English capitalists, are now well aware of the fact that special guarantees for the payment of interest on loans to foreign Governments are utterly fallacious; they look now to the ability of the country itself to repay the loan, and to the character of its Government.

As in private life the word of an honest man is better security for a debt than the bond of a swindler. Until within the last few years the spare capital, i.e. the savings, of Great Britain have been invested in foreign loans in a reckless manner, but capitalists are learning by experience, and no loan has now any chance of being successfully launched on the London market, unless the country requiring the loan can show clearly its ability to pay; the interest regularly and to repay the capital within a reasonable time, and has also a character for good faith which is a better security than any guarantee. Witness the fate of the loans lately attempted by Turkey and Egypt, and see the prices at which are quoted loans raised years ago by certain Republics of South America.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

No Potosi's mails even at 4 p.m. to the intense chagrin and inconvenience of the commercial public. The Argentine came up from the Mount, and the agents in the Queen City sent up the mails, but the usual hitch in their delivery occurred.

Sir Narrow Gauge Robertson O.E. K.C., paid us a ceremonial visit yesterday on his return from the Gran Chaco. He looks well, but had a tight squeak of 'Kingdom come' while up there. He has finished his surveying job for Government. Things in the Chaco are pretty much as they have been since Noah's time, and will be so until the revolution in Paraguay is a small potatoes affair.

The Cholera epidemic was disappearing with very satisfactory celerity, but, unfortunately, it has entered the 'Carcel,' the authorities of which are doing every thing they can think of to facilitate the escape of such a very unwelcome

There was intense bother about the delivery of the Potosi's mails yesterday. Until very late in the day few received their correspondence. When the new G. P. O. is finished we'll expect you to abolish the words-delay, late, to-morrow, &c. from your directionary, Mr. Posadas.

There will be a gold medal blow-out on the 30th at the Municipality, when 500 gold, silver and bronze medals will be distributed to those who made themselves philanthropically conspicuous during the Yellow Fever Plague. It is almost time to get done with this memorable Plague, and it is to be hoped the coming medalling business will be the last attempt to bore the public with unnecessary reminders of such a distressing period.

We perceive by the Montevideo papers to hand yesterday that the Junta has put a stop to all works necessitating the opening of the streets, till the hot weather has passed away. Very prudent.

CIGAR-MAKING IN N. YORK

B. Ayres, 15th Jan., 1874. To the Editors of the STANDARD. Gentlemen, The occurrence of the Virginius still fresh in the mind of your readers, it cannot be without interest to them to know what influence political events often exercise upon industries; before the Cuban insurrection the manufacture of cigars in New York was quite of minor importance, but has now assumed large dimensions, exiles from the Antilles being exclusively employed.

The process of rolling the cigars, although very simple and apparently very easy to perform, nevertheless requires the greatest skill and long practice. The men are seated in rows each one having before him, on his table, a thick slab of hard wood, and on either hand a heap of damped leaves consisting respectively of wrappers and fillers. A wrapper is selected, smoothed on the slab until it is free from creases and wrinkles, and then cut with a peculiarly-shaped knife, some that resembling that used by shoemakers in trimming soles, into a nearly semicircular form.

The annual Bolas meeting was, as a matter of course, the event of the day. We give in another column a full report. The best part of the proceedings is that the shareholders get 18 per cent dividend. There is some complaint made about the large sum charged for salaries—over \$200,000—while the amounts of unpaid subscriptions are far to large, being \$48,000 m.c.
