WEST COAST MAILS. REVOLUTION IN LIMA. FRIAS PRESIDENT OF BOLIVIA. Lima, January 27th. A revolution broke out last night at the San Francisco barracks at 15 minutes past 8, causing such alarm that all the citizens closed their doors...

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La Paz letters of Jan. 15th mention that when Ballivian was receiving the last rites of the Church he begged his Ministers to proclaim Frias as President, but they said they would take time to consider what course was best. When Ballivian was brought into town from the Bishop's quinta he was so bad that he fell while they lifted him out of the coach. He urged the Ministers to call a general election, and troops were despatched to Chiquisaca, Potosi and other places. Col. Perera was sent to Cobija to bring up a lot of 150 rifles that had come out for Government.

Meantime Colonel Quevedo took the field, Rendon made a proclamation, Daza and the Prefect Salinas declared with their troops against the Cabinet, Aguirre was proclaimed at Cochabamba, and Corral was hourly expected from Lima. The troops are under arms, to watch Quevedo and Corral's movements. The moment Ballivian dies a military dictatorship will ensue. Valparaiso, Feb. 9th.

Advices from the south report an abundant harvest. The Argentine Minister, Frias, has protested against the Franco-Chilian expedition to Tierra del Fuero.

LONDON LETTER. (From our Own Correspondent.) Jan. 30th. Certain rumors as to the relations between Brazil and the Argentine Confederation have caused a little alarm amongst persons who hold property in Buenos Ayres. Up to the 27th inst nothing appeared in the newspapers to confirm the rumors, nor did the quotations of the securities of either of those countries in the London Stock Exchange announce any danger. Nevertheless there must have been some reason for the uneasiness and it is generally understood that the Puno and the French mail brought despatches from the Rio Government to the Legation of a serious nature, and that they amounted to a warning to prepare them for hostilities, as Brazil could not tolerate the arrogance of the Argentine Government.

As far as I can learn, our Foreign Office knows nothing as yet of the Brazilian despatches. I have to correct the information given in my last letter concerning ironclads. I find that the Brazilian Government has only lately given the order for an ironclad to be built in France, and that she will barely be one-third the size of the large vessel building for the same Government in the works of Messrs. Dugues, of Millwall; this ironclad will be 9000 tons, and a turret ship, more or less of the same class as H M S Monarch; she will be the most powerful war ship afloat, and will be launched during the coming spring; her armament will consist of Whitworth 1200-pounders, capable of carrying 10 or 11 miles; she will only draw about twenty feet of water, so that the redoubtable visitor could from halfway between the mole and Colonia easily drop a shell into the STANDARD Office. I hear that in addition to two ironclads somewhat less terrible than the one just described, the Messrs. Laird are building for the Argentine Government two or three composite gunboats. A somewhat nondescript ironclad was launched the other day at Hull for the Chilean Government.

Two or three days ago the 'Telegraph' published a telegram announcing the death of Livingstone. The evening afterwards there was a meeting of the Geographical Society. Sir Samuel Baker was present and also Dr. Kirk who had just arrived from Zanzibar. The general opinion of the experts in the society was that the news was untrue and that it could not have reached Zanzibar since Dr. Kirk left. However as in the Stanley business the savans are perhaps again wrong. The news of Livingstone's death is since pretty well confirmed. He is said to have died of dysentery contracted by wading for two or three hours at a time up to the waist through marshes and rivers in endeavouring to cross Lake Bamba. He died at Loliba not far from Unanyomba. His native followers disembowelled the body, and filled it with salt, and put brandy in the mouth. The great traveller suffered from dysentery a fortnight before he succumbed. The date of his death is not yet known. Some accounts put it in May or June. The German African traveller, Dr. Petermann, says it occurred on the 15th of August. Cameron is at Unanyomba, and suffering from temporary blindness. He will take charge of the body, and if it is possible to preserve it with the means at his disposal, the remains of Livingstone may arrive at Zanzibar in February. Lieutenant Cameron will go on to Ujiji to secure the papers of Livingstone, which it is hoped may prove of value; otherwise a great life will have been wasted. I may add that some of the savans are not yet believers in his death. In the midst of the excitement caused by Mr. Gladstone's coup d'etat, and the preparations for a general election, the long talked of meetings at St. James' Hall and Exeter Hall, to express sympathy with the German Emperor in his struggle with Ultramontanism, have passed away almost unnoticed. The meetings took place on the 27th inst.; Earl Russell through indisposition could not attend. In his absence Sir John Murray presided. The principal speakers were Sir Thomas Chambers, Mr. Lowry Whittle, an 'old Catholic,' the Dean of Canterbury Mr. Newdegate, and Sir Robert Peel. At the evening meeting the speakers were Sir John

Dr. Smith of Edinburgh, Mr. Murray, (Rob Roy) and the Rev. Charles Clinchy. All these names exhaled an odour of the whisky and meal of the 'auld country'; and I have seen some old faces from Liverpool and Glasgow in Regent Street within the last day or two which I recognized as belonging to men able in the business of your East and West Coasts, and staunch upholders of the 'Kerk.' The cause is a growing one; but under existing circumstances, the meeting was a mistake. Very meagre accounts of it appear in the London papers which are taken up with election intelligence. The speeches were not remarkable and indicated less judgment and political knowledge than even Panatics of our day might pretend to. The affair is decidedly pool-pooled in the worldly London papers, and Earl Russell's medical adviser who prohibited him from attending the meeting is an exceedingly wise leech.

The following items are from the morning papers: St. Petersburg, Friday, 230, p.m. The marriage of Her Imperial Highness the Grand Duchess Alexandra and the Duke of Edinburgh has just been concluded in the Greek Church; and event is now being announced to the capital by a salute of 101 guns from the fortress. The procession entering the church was headed by the principal officers of the Russian Imperial Household, followed by the Emperor and Empress, the Czar and Czarina, the Prince and Princess of Wales, the German Imperial Prince and Princess, and the Crown Prince of Denmark. Then followed the bride and bridegroom, Prince Arthur, the reigning Duke of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, and the Russian Grand Dukes.

The bride wore a Greek coronet of brilliant, and an ermine-trimmed robe of crimson velvet, the train of which was borne by an eunuch and four chamberlains. The other ladies present wore the Russian national costume. The ceremony was also attended by the members of the Synod, the Imperial Council, the Senate, the foreign Diplomatic Body, the generals and officers of the Guard, the army, and the fleet, and deputations from Russian and foreign chambers of commerce.

The aisle and galleries of the church were greatly crowded, and the general effect presented by the magnificence and variety of the toilettes and uniforms was exceedingly brilliant. The procession has now entered the Alexander Hall, for the celebration of the English marriage ceremony by Dean Stauley.

Glasgow, Tuesday Night. A dreadful accident, by which fifteen persons were killed, several dangerously, and twelve otherwise injured, took place this morning, on the Glasgow and Edinburgh line of North British Railway, near Bolton Junction. A passenger train from Edinburgh to the North ran into violent collision with a mineral train, which had entered the down line from a siding leading from the Monkland system. The mineral train was considerably smashed, but the engine men escaped unhurt. The engine of the passenger train was dreadfully scalded, and the driver was dreadfully injured, and died instantaneously; the firemen, however, escaped with comparatively trifling injuries. The first carriage, a third-class, was smashed to atoms, and all the passengers it contained were killed on the spot. Following it was a second-class carriage, several of the passengers in which met with immediate death. A van containing two horses was also broken and the animals were killed. The accident occurred at 7.23 in the morning; the trains had been up to time. The signals were set at danger against the passenger train, and the morning was quite clear. The only explanation of the cause of the accident, therefore, seems to be that the driver had not attended to the signals. It is also said that the conductor of the mineral train mistook a Glasgow train for the ill-fated train, and so entered on the down line thinking there was no cause for danger. The following is a list of dead, and the names of persons seriously injured:—Killed: James Hastie, grain measurer, Leith; John Ross, probably of London; a man named Singer, supposed to be a sailor, with a ticket for Aberdeen; a woman unknown, about 30 years of age; a child 8 years of age; Andrew Dickson, 7, Brighton-street, Edinburgh; John Cairns, 90, Fountain-bridge-street, Edinburgh; Robert Allan, the driver of the passenger train; a woman unknown, about 50 years of age, with a letter in her pocket addressed N. Baxter, 2, Hope-park, Musselburgh; a little boy about four years old; William Trotter, 2, Victoria-terrace, Edinburgh; a married woman with a paper in her pocket containing the address of John Hogg; Gilbert Robertson, 8, South Frederick-street, Edinburgh; a merchant in Leith; and George Geddes, belonging to Aberchirder, who had been on a visit to his daughter in Edinburgh, and was on his way home to the marriage of his son. Among the most seriously injured are Miss Maggie Lind, wife of S. Abert-terrace, Aberdeen, who has sustained a fracture of both legs, and is unable to be removed. Miss Lydia Wilson, going to Cromarty, has had both legs amputated, and has sustained other severe injuries about the body. She lies in a dangerous state.

Mr. William Wilcken, Government Immigration Commissioner, has addressed a letter to the Minister of the Interior enclosing plans for the new Asilo, and urging the building to be commenced as soon as possible. Mr. Wilcken alludes to the confusion Immigration matters were thrown into at the height of the recent epidemic, through the want of a proper Asilo. The Commissioner advises that the work should be commenced while the present Administration is in office, and recommends that the waste earth from the levelling of the Western Railway, now going on at Paseo Guardia Nacional, should be utilised for the building.

Dr. Cueto, Criminal Judge, has ordered the 37 parties arrested in Concepcion parish for creating a row at the elections, to be taken from the Police and lodged in the Public Prison. We have not been able to find a detailed account of the Duke of Edinburgh's marriage in any of the papers to hand by the Patagonia, but give a short telegraphic 'precis'. Our British fair readers will be glad to learn that many of the dresses ordered by the Russian ladies for the occasion were made in London, and completely "took the shine" out of those made in Paris by the man milliner Worth.

There was nothing said on 'Change to-day about the other two topics brought before the Bank Board, namely—the reduction of amortisation, and advancing on Cedulas. It is supposed that these matters stand over for next meeting. The Taysapa sails to-morrow (Saturday) for Montevideo, and takes a mail for the Mount; also a mail for the Cotopaxi, expected on Monday from Chilo, on route for England. Mr. Roy, C.E., has published a voluminous work on port works, &c. There is much, we hear, about the port of Buenos Ayres. The Commission from England to take evidence in the case of Roy versus Bateman has come out in the Liffey.

In a private letter we learn that Argentine stocks are held in a weak way owing to some diplomatic news current about Brazil and the Argentine Republic; in the latter question English and European sympathies are entirely with Argentines, whilst in the former they are completely with Brazil. In our London letter will be found further remarks on this subject.

Mr. Agote, the President of the National Bank of Credit has just published a useful pamphlet on the indebtedness of the nation, giving the history and present state of all the National stocks. We have already published extracts from the statements showing the issue, &c.; still, the pamphlet in question is worth perusal. The North Plaza this morning looked much the better as several troops had entered during the night, and there was a fair show of wool in the market still the wool business remains very heavy, and one or two well-known European buyers, who have touched seem likely to make money; for the information of local dealers we publish the following extraordinary facts about the American Maize market, as given to Mr. J. R. Dodge, the statistician of the Agricultural Bureau in Washington, D.C. Wheat and maize cross of the states of the Mississippi basin show for the year 1873, in comparison with 1872, an increase in wheat of 32,000,000 bushels, and a decrease in maize of 171,000,000 bushels. This sufficiently explains how it is possible that at the side of plenty there can be famine in the United States. It is especially the new settlers and homestead people who have to suffer from the bad maize crop. They are almost everywhere dependent for their existence upon this production because the newly-broken soil is not suitable for the culture of wheat. The homestead men are, therefore, this year in a very bad state, whilst the producers of wheat are making a good profit through the very lively export of this article.

The Patagonia's mails were delivered late last evening. We extract from the Times of 30th, which came by supplemental Bordeaux mail, the following:—
"Thursday Evening.
"Consols remain at 92 1/4, but in the general market there are symptoms of a demand on the part of a considerable investment fund on the part of the public. At the Bank there is scarcely any discount business, and the charge out of doors is about 3 per cent. Coin on issue to return from the Provinces, and although \$204,000 in gold has been exported during the week, the return published this morning shows an increase of \$11,845, while the proportion of reserve to liabilities, which was last week 47 1/2 per cent., is now over 49 per cent.
"The sum of 20,000 sovereigns has been withdrawn from the Bank to-day for Lisbon.
"The directors of the London and County Bank will recommend at the meeting on the 6th of February a dividend of 10 per cent. for the half-year ended the 31st of December, making, with the payment in June, 20 per cent. for the year, and leaving, after an appropriation of \$25,000 in reduction of premises account, \$23,917. For the previous year the dividend was of similar amount, and \$14,936 was carried forward.

"Antoinette, Spanish ship, from B. Ayres to Cadiz, and Cadiz, &c., for London, was in collision Jan. 16th, at Cádiz, and both sustained damage to the amount of from £500 to £600.
"The Queen has been pleased to appoint Don Walter O. Urst as Consul at Manchester for the Oriental Republic of the Uruguay.
"The American mails came with unprecedented despatch this month and were delivered last night. The death of Mr. Davison, sr., is untimely news for this market where deceased was well and favorably known. We extract from a Boston paper the following obituary notice. Our much esteemed Argentinian Consul in N. York is son of deceased:—
"Mr. Edward Davison, who died at the Tremont House yesterday, was a native of Gloucester, Mass. He began his mercantile career as clerk in the house of Peters, Paul & Co., on Central wharf, in this city. Soon after reaching his majority, he went to B. Ayres, and established a commission house, which at once attained high standing, and for more than twenty years, occupied a leading position among the mercantile establishments of South America. About twenty years ago he removed to New York, remaining there until the death of his wife, three years thence, when he returned to Boston, where he lived the past three winters, enjoying the society of his early friends and relatives.

Mr. Davison was a gentleman whose mind was richly stored with the results of much reading and observation, whilst travelling on both sides of the Atlantic. As a merchant he was noted for industry, intelligence, sound judgment and liberality. His success was the result of fair dealing, attraction to business, and the constant exercise of sterling qualities of character. He leaves five children and numerous grandchildren. One of his sons married the only daughter of Rev. Dr. Chapin."

The very first now salted R hides, per steamer, will thus come to a much better market than it could be expected only a short time ago, but it seems it would not be safe to take the price they may obtain (which as a rule is only paid owing to the scarcity of fresh as well as of summer hid hides) as a basis of contracts at the River Plate for cargoes to arrive in Europe next summer, when the same reasons no longer exist.

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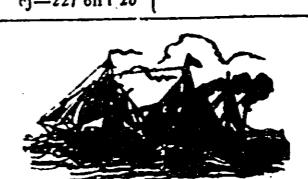

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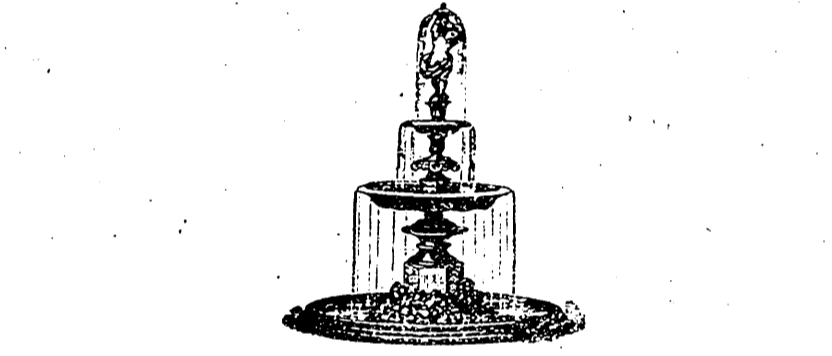
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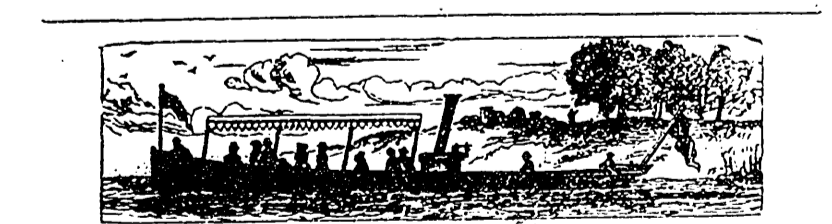
