THE BRAZILIAN CABLE.

Montevideo, March 25th. The Ambassador with cable left Rio Janeiro on 21st March, accompanied by Brazilian corvette Meaurio. Commenced laying shore end of cable at Praya Copacabana. This finished, will proceed to Santa Catharina. In London, on 21st Feb., subscription was opened for £100,000 preference debentures R. Plate and Brazilian Telegraph Company at 90, with 7 per cent. interest, repayable at par in ten years.

WEST COAST MAILS.

Valparaiso, March 25th. Enquiry at British Consulate into the loss of the steamer Tacora, resulted yesterday in a sentence severely censuring the Captain for negligence, as well as the Company's agents. The Criminal Tribunal is making investigations regarding the immediate authors of the disaster. Divers are trying to lift the ship Deva and steamer Baja, sunk last year. Chilean iron-clad Repulse expected to arrive next month with Admiral Cochrane. Attempted revolution at Mejillones under Col. Varas and Capt. Reyes, was quickly suppressed and Reyes imprisoned. Accomplished field.

THE ASHANTEE WAR.

Capture of Coomassie. Coomassie, February 5th. Reached this place yesterday after five days' hard fighting. Troops beheaded admirably. Officers killed.—Captain Buckle, R. E., Captain O'Neil or Nicol, Hants Militia, Lieutenant (t) Eyre, 19th Foot. All other casualties under 300. The King has left the town, but is close by, and says he will pay me a visit to-day to sign the Treaty of Peace. I hope to commence my march to the coast to-morrow. All wounded doing well. Health generally good. Despatches follow by special fast steamer. Garnett Wolsley.

THE ASHANTEE WAR.

The operations preceding the fall of Coomassie are explained in the following despatch:—Cape Coast Castle, Feb. 5th. A great battle has been fought near Coomassie, resulting in the defeat of the Ashantees and the capture of the Amoafol. The operations commenced at 6 a.m. on the 31st of January, and lasted until 3 p.m. The British forces, consisting of Lord Gifford and his native scouts, the 42nd Regiment, under Major Macpherson, two guns of Rait's Artillery, the left column under Colonel McLeod, Major Russell's native regiment, with Gordon's Houssas, two rockets, under Lieutenant Palmer, and a wing of the Naval Brigade under Captain Grubbe, R.N., cut a path at right angles to the main road for 300 yards, and then due north. Upon the left was the 42nd Regiment, and on the right a column under Colonel Wood, with a wing of the Naval Brigade under Captain Luxmore, and two rockets under Lieutenant Knox. Colonel Wood's native regiment was to carry out the same plan on the right of the centre column. The second line consisted of the 23rd, supported by Colonel Wood's and Major Russell's native regiments on its flanks. The third line was composed of the Rifle Brigade, under Colonel Warren.

THE ASHANTEE WAR.

The enemy formed a broad angle diverging from the main right apex of the Amoafol, and had a position on steep hills. The King of the Ashantees is supposed to have been present. The enemy fought most desperately, and suffered severely. Amanquanta, the Commander-in-Chief of the Ashantee army, is reported to be killed. The firing was very heavy for five hours. The casualties on the British side are—Royal Engineers, Captain Buckle, killed; Major Home, wounded in two places; Lieutenant Hare, wounded in two places; two Sappers and 36 labourers killed. The Naval Brigade, which was 145 strong had 3 officers wounded—namely, Captain Grubbe, Lieutenant Mundy, and Lieutenant Rawson—and 26 men killed and wounded. The 23rd, which was about 90 strong, had one officer and five men wounded. The 42nd lost nine officers and 105 men in killed and wounded, including Major Macpherson, wounded in two places. One bullet passed through his leg, but he led his men the whole way. Major Baird was badly wounded in both legs and in the chest, and was carried to the rear, being unable to move. The carriers were attacked; he himself was beheaded. Lieutenant Berwick was wounded in the ankle, and Lieutenant Stephenson, Captain Creagh, and 4 Rollin. Moltke's speech on keeping up the German army occupies all the papers.

THE LANUS RACES.

Wednesday was a lovely day for the above races, and thousands of all classes of our citizens proceeded to Lanus by the Southern Railway, while the Lomas road was crowded from Barraecas with hack-coaches, gay equipages, four-in-hands, dog-carts and other vehicles. Half-hour trains continued to discharge hundreds of passengers at the Lanus station, where a village is already springing up near the chapel of Santa Theresa, erected by Mr Lanus between the station and his quinta. The road was well kept by half a dozen mounted police, the distance to the Stand-house being nearly half a mile. The Stand was crowded, as well as all the approaches, but the proportion of ladies was small. Mr Lanus and family, with their immediate friends, occupied the private stand, abreast of the Judges' box. Englishmen mustered in great strength, and a good deal of betting seemed to be going on. The hero of the day was Nil Desperandum, who, although weighed 17lbs, won easily, proving that the blood of Blair Athol must win in spite of everything. At the conclusion of each race an Italian brass band played operatic airs; while Mr Sempé, of the Café de Paris, had a splendid lunch-room under the Stand, stocked with the best of wines and meats, at very reasonable charges. The view from the Stand was very pleasing, and until the bell rang for the first race at 1 p.m. we could not fail to admire the nice arrangement of the Race-ground, the beautiful gardens and plantations of Mr. Lanus's country seat, and the landscape extending from Quilmes in front to Barraecas, with the spires and turrets of the city on our left, about 10 miles distant. A light breeze cooled the atmosphere, and nothing could be more admirable than the weather, except the uniform good temper and gentlemanly conduct of the assemblage. We are probably below the mark in estimating the attendance at 5,000 persons; yet there was not a single case of drunkenness or rudeness during the day. The officers of the Meeting were—Chairman—D. No return of the loss of the native allies has been received, but it is heavy among Gordon's Houssas.

The troops bivouacked on the ground taken. A baggage train has been attacked on the way up 750 loads arrived at Amoafol on the 1st of February, escorted by men of the Rifle Brigade, the 42nd, and the 2nd West India Regiments. A strong force attacked Dequa, a mile on the right. The place was well defended, and the houses were loop-holed. One blue-jacket was killed and three were wounded, as well as some allies. The rear is threatened, and a large force is said to be to the south-west. Companies of the 23rd Regiment are defeating the threatened paths. Several carriers have been killed on the way up. During the battle on the 31st the Staff was much exposed to the fire, but suffered no casualties. Orders have been issued to parade on the 2nd, with four days' rations, and it is expected that an attack will then be made on Coomassie. The 2nd West India Regiment has been ordered to the rear for the protection of the transport.

There was a touch of 'old times' about port things yesterday. No quarantine, port open, steamers in from all quarters, and everyone landing as he liked. We may expect a sharp revival in business now, particularly when our neighbours abolish their quarantine. We have an interesting London Letter by the Galicia, but hold it over till to-morrow—for want of space. We have papers from Asuncion to the 20th inst, but they are of little interest. Heavy rain fell in Asuncion on Sunday week, and cooled the air a little. There was a scuffle between the "patrol" and a lot of the unwashed on the 19th. The latter replied to a 'qui vive' with stones and insulting language, and the soldiers answered with a volley, which wounded one woman mortally. Four men of the mob were arrested. The German Musical Society will give a sacred concert on to-morrow week, at the Coliseum. Meadames Krutisch, Rodenan and other leading amateurs will take part in the concert. The last report of the health of the city merely refers to one case of cholera in the last three weeks. Small pox and typhoid fever are a little prevalent. A Captain Cabot is in durance vile in the Retiro for having used violent language to his Excellency the Minister of War. Major J. F. Rickard has been named Argentine Vice-Consul at Gravesend. If every member of the Consular Corps knew as much about this land as Major Rickard, it would be well both for the Consuls and the country. Leaving for Peru! His Excellency Don Luis Dominguez bids adieu to a time in his native country, and goes to take his post as Envoy at Lima. May the people among whom he is now going to reside esteem him as much as we do here.
