PRINCE BISMARCK ON POLITICAL PROSPECTS IN EUROPE.

The well-known Hungarian author, Maurus Jokai, is at present a visitor in the German capital. As a man of note he has obtained access to Prince Bismarck's study, where an interesting conversation took place, which M. Jokai reports pretty fully to the Hungarian journal the *Hon*—

The Prince was, as usual, easy in his manner, and communicative, and put a stop at the very outset to the Hungarian's attempt at ceremony. M. Jokai humorously remarked upon the prevalence of 'iron' in the surroundings of the 'iron' Prince. Among other things, there is an iron couch and an iron safe in which the Chancellor appears to keep his cigars. Prince Bismarck was struck by the youthful appearance of his guest, who is ten years his junior, but whose writings he remembers to have seen reviewed long ago in the *Augsburg Gazette* (at that time still, the Chancellor said, a clever paper) when he bore a lieutenant's commission. In the ensuing conversation, Prince Bismarck pointed out the paramount necessity to Europe of a consolidated State in the position of Austria-Hungary. It was mainly on that account that he concluded peace with so great despatch in 1866, Small independent States in the East would be a misfortune to Europe. Austria and Hungary must realize their mutual interdependence and the necessity of being one. However, the dualist system of government must be preserved, because the task of developing the State, which on this side of the Leitha falls to the Germans, beyond that naturally falls to the Magyars. The notion that Germany has an inclination to annex more land Prince Bismarck designated as a myth. God preserve the Germans from such a wish! Whatever more territory they might acquire would probably be undetermined by Papal influence, and they have enough of that already. Should the Germans of Austria want to be annexed by Germany the Chancellor would feel inclined to declare war against them for that wish alone. A German Minister who should conceive the desire to annex part of Austria would deserve to be hanged—a punishment the Prince indicated by gesture. He does not wish to annex even a square foot of fresh territory, not as much as two pencils he kept on playing with during the conversation would cover. Those pencils, however, M. Jokai remarks, were big enough to serve as walking-sticks, and on the map they would have reached quite from Berlin to Trieste. Prince Bismarck went on to justify his annexation of Alsace-Lorraine by geographical necessity. Otherwise, he would rather not have grafted the French twig upon the German tree. The French are enemies never to be appeased. Take away from them the cook, the tailor, and the hairdresser, and what remains of them is a copper-colored Indian. It is a great gain to Germany that Austria and Russia have been reconciled. Had they come to loggerheads it would have been hard for Germany to choose its side. But now all three are friends, not in the spirit of the Holy Alliance, but as a guarantee of peace, and of the development of liberty and the general welfare of Europe. Whoever should now attempt to disturb the peace of Austria-Hungary would find Germany arrayed against him. Austria-Hungary has, in the Prince's opinion, nothing to fear from Russia. Russia does not want any more European territory and does not aim at its acquisition. It would not require any fresh territory at all, having its hands more than full with what it holds already, let alone the task it has set itself of Russifying the three millions of Germans in the Baltic provinces. But it must go on conquering territory in Asia, in order to occupy the restless and dissatisfied elements it contains. Prince Bismarck does not like Russianized Germans by any means. They acquire all the faults of genuine Russians, but none of their good qualities. He quoted a Russian proverb, which says that when a Russian steals he steals enough only for himself; when a German steals he steals what will keep himself, his wife and family, and leave something over for next day. If Russia keeps Europe in a state of agitation, it is because there are two schools of Russian diplomacy, one at St. Petersburg, the other at Constantinople. As soon as a statesman is sent to Constantinople he at once catches madness from his surroundings. He begins to intrigue, to envy, to emulate, to culminate, to engage in 'la haute politique' of Europe, till he is recalled, when he subsides into his former state. M. Jokai suggested that a change of Sovereign might effect a change of policy, but this the German Chancellor would not believe. He holds the Czar to be a true-hearted, sound-minded father of his nation, who loves peace and quiet, and will not engage in a Napoleonic policy to carry out the famous will of Peter the Great.

THE DEATH OF MR. SUMNER.

The *Times*, noticing the death of Mr. Charles Sumner, remarks that though it were vain to pretend that his course could be contemplated with unmixed satisfaction, yet when we look back upon the 30 years during which Mr. Sumner was among the foremost in the United States, we must admit that his career was such as to deserve the highest admiration and gratitude of his fellow-citizens; and those who are disposed to judge his faults with severity must remember how much there was to provoke to intemperance of judgment the man who was pur-

sued with such animosity that he barely escaped with life from a cowardly assault in the Senate Chamber at Washington. Mr. Sumner's work properly closed when slavery was abolished. His influence since the termination of the war upon the re-organization of the South cannot be said to have worked for good. He had been too long an enemy of the slave-holding population to be able to believe in their readiness to accept the new state of things, and he threw his power into the scale in support of their continued deprivation of political privileges, and of the Government of the South by immigrants from the North. There was much to excuse the policy favoring the re-admission of the Southern States on easy terms; but better counsels have, happily, since prevailed in most cases, though not universally. We need not refer at length (the *Times* says) to his influence in reconciling the Governments of the United States and the United Kingdom. It is, perhaps, better not to touch on occasions of differences so recent that resentment may easily revive when they are recalled. Let us rather remember that strong impulse for good which first drew him, after the enthusiasm of youth may be supposed to have past, from the refined pleasures of a studious life to oppose a great national wrong, and which remained, through many aberrations and many weaknesses, his guiding principle even to the end.

THE END OF THE ASHANTEE WAR.

The *Standard* observes that now that the Ashantee war is happily concluded it will be one of the first duties of the new Parliament, after awarding their due meed or credit to the general and the soldiers who have added this fresh glory to our arms, to inquire into the policy to be pursued hereafter on the Gold Coast, and into the causes and the object of the Ashantee war. That part of the work which Sir Garnet Wolseley had to do he has done excellently well, and he is entitled to all the praise and the reward which await him at home. But it is obvious that we have to distinguish between what was done by the general, and what was done before and during the campaign, by those who had the control of affairs. We cannot suppose, for instance, that Sir Garnet Wolseley is chargeable with any share of the responsibility in deciding upon the march to Coomassie. Some one else, other than the general, must have been responsible for the absurd sentiment with which we opened the campaign, to the effect that this was not a British, but a Panthe war. Again, we must all have been struck with the somewhat indecent alacrity with which the general has clutched at every opening for a treaty, even incurring some risks by his excessive desire to conclude the affair pacifically at any price. It was very unlikely that Sir Garnet Wolseley must have so acted without inspiration from home. There is still another incident of this campaign which requires explanation, as being obviously the inspiration of some one not directly engaged in the fighting—and that is the very curious order to the effect that our men were not to fire until the enemy had fired at them—a piece of supreme stupidity of which it is probable that several valuable lives have been the victims. In all these things we detect an influence which certainly came from outside West Africa, and which, perhaps, we shall not be wrong in assuming to be the same which, having originated the war, took flight at the 'equivocal and entangling engagements.' The public have a right to know, therefore, more fully of all these matters.

The *Telegraph* asserts that when all the facts are before the country, Parliament and the nation will be convinced not only that the little war was necessary, but that the expedition was well planned, well found in every respect, and carried out from first to last with a foresight, prudence, vigour, and daring which do credit alike to the late Government, and to the able officers who were the instruments of Imperial policy.

There was another sharp drop in the market to-day, and the stock fell lower than even the bears anticipated. Some of the large holders seem to have lost confidence in the market, and are selling out. Mercantile bankers and discounters are each day more difficult in the way of advances on Cedulas; many of the call loans on this stock are even with difficulty renewed, and hence it is that large amounts of the stock are coming upon the market from quarters not anticipated.

There was much enquiry as to the amount of specie actually shipped per *Boyne*; we believe about the sum we stated yesterday is the correct amount, although some parties stated that it was much more. We have good reason however to say that only about £50,000 was shipped.

Exchange closed for the mail at 49; the amount of exchange passed for this mail is estimated at over 1,000,000 sterling, perhaps the heaviest mail we have had for many years.

To-morrow (Wednesday) will be the last day for mortgagors to pay up the quarter's interest and amortization; after that date a fine of 2 per cent. per month.

A rise in dry hides was noticed this morning in the South Market; large sale and prices as high as 180 m/c per arroba.
The departure of the *Boyne* was one of the events of the day; as usual, this favourite steamer took a crowd of passengers. It is now precisely two years ago since we had a similar demonstration, and yet in that short interval what sweeping changes have occurred; the country was then just recovering from a period of intense prostration, and entering on an era of prosperity too brilliant to last.
The Provincial Bank discounted yesterday eight and a-half millions, and the National Bank, although it does not give out its discounts, we hear is discounting most liberally.
Dr. Norberto de la Hiestra, one of the directors of the National Bank, leaves for Cordova to recruit his health.
The advice from the country districts are unfavorable. From Saladillo we learn that as they have not had rain for some months the farmers and estancieros are kept hard at work every day watering sheep, cows and horses. As for sheep they have hardly anything to eat, and are looking very thin. Several people around this district are removing their flocks in search of better ramp. As for cows, they are running wild in search of water. Horses are also very thin and weak. If a person chanced to have a few good horses it is only to one to one but they are stolen. Never before do we recollect such horse stealing as is carried on out there at present. We learn that it is now fifteen years since water had to be drawn for animals so late in the season. All the springs are falling. There was a severe frost on the night of the 4th, which did great injury to the pastures.
