THE PLAGUES OF EGYPT.

Although Buenos Ayres enjoys a delightful climate, and is the most enjoyable place in South America to reside in, it is periodically visited with plagues which might be easily prevented, and which render our city for the time uninhabitable.

In olden times, as Parish and Darwin tell us, it was nothing strange to get up in the morning and find the camps covered with a visitation of frogs or mice. After that came the period of beetles, which most of us can remember, say fifteen or twenty years ago.

After the Paraguayan war came epidemics in quick succession, carrying off 40,000 persons in B. Ayres alone. About contemporary with cholera and yellow fever came the banditti, who have infested our city for the past seven or eight years in a manner as daring and unpunished as in the worst days of San Francisco.

At times there is a lull, as if the bandits went away for a change of air or newer fields of operations, but the entire impunity for crime encourages them to come back in renewed force. Since the present election struggle commenced we see our streets paraded by men of sinister aspect and diabolical expression of countenance.

Every morning we hear of three or four corpses taken to the Police, and hardly a 'terruil' occurs in any part of town but one or other of the gentlemen returning home is fired at or accosted by a ruffian with a knife or revolver who has taken the place of the policeman in the principal thoroughfares.

If you go into any of our fashionable clubs to have a game of whist in the evening you find every man has a revolver in his pocket. Nay, you may even bet that the Legislators, Cabinet Ministers, and possibly the doctors and clergymen go armed after sundown.

The hospital surgeons are kept quite busy, dressing the wounds of people who have been maimed, or soothing the last moments of others, who have been struck down by ruthless assassins in the midst of this populous and enlightened city.

You hear old residents who have been 40 years in Buenos Ayres say that they never remember anything so bad at any previous epoch, in even the most troubled times. The tramway cars are assaulted at 7 o'clock in the evening. One band of robbers infests the Flores road, another fires at people near the Water-works, another carries on murder and robbery at Puenta Alsina, and no street in town is safe after nightfall.

How long is this going to last? The necessity for carrying revolvers argues a condition of things that is a disgrace to any country supposed to enjoy a Constitution.

NATIONAL TELEGRAPH WIRES.

Don Adolfo Carranza has submitted a project to the Minister of Interior for taking over the entire management and working of the National Telegraph wires, on an improved system which it is in the interests of the commercial public to see at once adopted.

The lines at present represent an aggregate of nearly 4,000 miles, connecting even the most remote Provinces with Buenos Ayres, and extending also to the neighboring States of Paraguay, Bolivia, Chile, Uruguay and Brazil. Whether it is that Mr. Burton's staff is too small, or that the usual red-tape of official control impedes his action, or whatever be the cause, the National Telegraphs have caused the greatest dissatisfaction. This is especially the case since the elections have begun to interfere with the working of the lines. At any rate the mercantile public is highly dissatisfied.

It would be unfair not to add that Mr. Burton is a most intelligent, zealous and pains-taking official, and that his clerks are worked off their legs by the enormous business crowded on them for want of double wires.

Mr. Carranza fully recognizes Mr. Burton's merits and services by proposing to keep him in his present position, and once emancipated from the Government-house we may be assured the Telegraph Department would give general satisfaction.

The main points of the present proposal are as follows:— 1st. Mr. Carranza contracts to work the department for the present cost as set down in the Budget.

2nd. The tariff will be unaltered, namely 25 cents, for all messages between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m.

3rd. The principal offices in the Provinces will be kept open all the 24 hours, and messages between 8 p.m. and 8 a.m. charged double, the extra charge to be given to the clerk in each case.

4th. No line to be interrupted for 24 hours, under penalty of 20pts. the first day, 40s the second, 80s the third, and so on.

5th. All cost of repairs, materials &c. to be included, as well as salaries, by Mr. Carranza in the item allowed him for working the Department.

6th. All employees to be exempt from military service.

7th. All the income and receipts of the various offices to be handed over without deduction to the National Government.

8th. In the case of new offices or lines opened the Government to add the cost of such office and clerk's salary.

The above shews that without any additional cost to the nation Mr. Carranza would notably improve the Telegraph service, and at the same time cause a certain increase to the national revenue, as all the earnings of the various lines would be handed over to Government without any deduction even for repairs or materials.

It is also to be observed that Mr. Carranza has already constructed some of these lines for the Government, and his high position in our community, as well as his widely extended relations in the upper Provinces, peculiarly recommend him for a contract of this all-important character.

EAST ARGENTINE RAILWAY. REPORT OF INSPECTING ENGINEER.

Concordia, March 17th 1874. In obedience to order of the 3rd inst. I proceeded yesterday to inspect the line of railway from this town to Federación, in a special train, which took 5 hours in going over the entire length, 55 kilometers or 34 miles, as I halted to examine the various bridges, stations, embankments, cuttings &c. that called for special notice.

The earthworks are most solidly made, as shewn after the recent heavy floods, and over the prescribed width of 10 feet. The drains and culverts are equally well done. The line is almost all ballasted, and from Concordia to Gualeguaycito looks like an old established railway. There are 48 kilometers perfectly ballasted. Two curves call for alteration, one being of defective radius, the other not possessing the proper difference between level of rails. At kilometer 40 the engineers had to deviate half-a-dozen yards for one-third of a mile as a quagmire intervened. The greatest incline on the whole-line is 1 in 100, and the inclines are 39 kilometers long instead of 44, as in the plans, which has much facilitated the working of the line.

The curves are 16, instead of 8 as in the plans; the minimum radius was fixed at 240 metres, and most of them are from 1,000 metres upwards, with a few of 500. On the whole the line will be much more secure than if the plans had been strictly followed.

The permanent way is the Vignolles rail, and is complete from Concordia to Federación. Rails, fish-plates, &c. are of superior quality, the rail being 30 kilograms to the metre. The sleepers are of oak, and about 34 in. chess apart.

There are two culverts (25 inches) extra between Concordia and Gualeguaycito, and two more going to Federación, not in the plans. The bridges were all examined by me, and are well built, with superstructure of iron; that of Ayuy Grande is 40 inches higher than proposed, on account of the recent floods; that of Gualeguaycito is also made 60 feet longer on the north side for a similar reason. They were so solidly made that I did not test them, but next time I mean to do so with the Gualeguaycito bridge, more for technical curiosity than other purpose. There are two brick bridges of arches, one over the Biscocho, between Gualeguaycito and Federación, which are finished in the same workmanlike manner, as are also the culverts &c. as laid down in surveys.

The Concordia terminus is finished, in superior style, with furniture for offices and waiting-rooms. The goods shed is twice the prescribed length, with a wharf not laid down in the plans; the whole surrounded by a wall of 2000 feet, 6 1/2 feet high and 20 inches thick, also extra. The workshops, waggon-sheds, turning-table, tank, well &c. are complete.

At Gualeguaycito the station, goods shed, tank &c. are also finished.

At Federación the painters will have concluded in a few days; the sliding-doors of the goods-store are ready, but not yet up. The siding wants about 100 yards to be completed. The goods store is twice the prescribed size, and there is a mole as at Concordia, not in the plans.

The rolling-stock comprises 6 locomotives, 1 ballast-engine, 6 passenger cars, 2 parcel do., 100 open and 50 closed waggons, 20 trucks for coal or lumber, and 2 horse boxes. This is more than proportionate for the length of line open to traffic; and all the engines, cars &c. are of superior quality.

Workshops: vertical engine of 25 horsepower with two boilers; steam-pump of 5 horsepower; 4 lathes for wheels and bolts; patent boring machine; planing do; filing do; shrouning do; 6 forges, ventilator &c. all well mounted and in first-rate order.

The telegraph wires are laid the whole way to Federación, on the Morse system, with stations ready at Concordia and Gualeguaycito; the apparatus is being arranged at Federación.

Near the towns the line is properly fenced. The Concordia wharf is finished, all but the last length, and loads or unloads with the utmost facility.

The Federación wharf wants two lengths, but can be of no service when the river is so low. It can be finished in 20 days, but is of little use in this season.

At Concordia there is a great stock of sleepers, rails, &c. for the permanent way, and all the rolling-stock has been cleared from England except two more locomotives.

Returning from Federación to Concordia my train travelled 30 to 33 miles an hour, making the whole distance in 70 minutes. This is twice the required speed, and the movement was perfectly even, free from rocking, and no heating observable in engines or cars. As soon as the ballasting is concluded the journey to Federación may be safely made in an hour, including stoppages at Gualeguaycito. In conclusion I have only to say that the line is quite ready for traffic.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

Yesterday was a most exciting day in every circle. Politicians were running up and down with telegrams in every pocket; one could read in their countenances how the wind blew for Mitre or Avellaneda. Both sides, it seems, have made a clean sweep, and both are victorious. Bankers had an uneasy gait, and there was none of that 'naivete' of manner about them for which they are ordinarily so commendable. The Navia telegram was unpleasant. Cordoba men were awfully 'down in the mouth,' as some well known broker had collapsed, said for 1 1/2 millions Cedula. Gracious Heavens! one million and a half of Cedula! Why, they would not fit in a bullock cart. As for our friends the farmers the news from the camp is shocking; everything goes to the dogs outside for want of water. The drought is worse than in 1859. We never recollect a worse day than yesterday, but it will all pass away.

STANDARD luck. A land sale, before whose proportions all the feats of Bullrich, Ebbeke, Rodriguez, Dennehy, Ferrer and other leading land auctioneers pale their ineffectual fires, has just been completed by our tenants Messrs. Halbach and Viera, who have negotiated the sale to Mr. Cobo of 250 square leagues in the province of Cordoba, for the square sum of ten millions of paper dollars. This is the biggest lot of land ever sold in or probably any other country, and we congratulate the young firm in question on their success. The territory in question is equal in extent to three average counties in Great Britain or Ireland, or about a fourth of the Kingdom of Belgium.

The Reign of Terror and bloodshed in the city and suburbs is not abating; 'au contraire,' yesterday morning's papers contain further lists of murders, burglaries assaults, and every violent crime imaginable. The streets are now deserted after 9 o'clock, such is the fear of being abroad at the mercy of assassins and rowdies. The Provincial Government-house and Police people are fast asleep, and there is no sign of any effort to restore peace of mind to the citizens. The people of Buenos Ayres are a meek and patient lot; but endurance has its limits, and the authorities had better set about vigorous measures of repression at once, or the citizens, in despair, must appeal to the two Ls—Lynch and 'la lanterne.'

The elections were still an engrossing topic yesterday, and both sides continued the waste of gunpowder. The result will probably be known accurately to-day or to-morrow. Never since telegraphy was invented have the wires carried such contradictory 'bolas' from the zealous friends of both candidates.

The very latest about that obese character Arthur Orton is to be found in the English Provincial papers. He is cheerful enough in prison, and whilst taking exercise in file with his fellow convicts. When addressed as Orton he never answers; so, to avoid saying 'Dickens' the warders call him 'Claimant,' sometimes 'Clammy.' He has lost some pounds weight even in the short time he has been in jail, and feels the loss of his daily modicum of brandy and cigars terribly. The trial has cost the National Exchequer £170,000, and the friends of the Claimant about half that. A sad story is told of a young gentleman of good family, married to a beautiful girl, who, when the impostor first issued his famous Bonds, took £14,000 worth of them, against the earnest entreaties of his young wife; when the first trial was stopped and the Claimant committed for perjury, he saw that all was lost, sickened, and died, leaving his widow a beggar. This sad tale shews what a bold Orton's case took on his proverbially gullible countrymen. How many similar victims must this 'cause celebre' have made!

A great many serious people affect to believe that the Hole in the Mole is a myth, and a standing joke of the STANDARD, although hundreds, nay thousands, of broken shins, cracked skulls, sprained ankles and ruined shirt collars have testified to the con-

trary. For some time past we have laboured under the impression that 'the Hole' had been mended, but the departure of the Boyce on Tuesday proved it to be still flourishing, as fresh as a daisy, or new mown hay. An English gentleman, while waiting at the end of the Mole to see some friends, saw a party of two gentlemen and a lady coming down the pier. Suddenly one of them disappeared up to his chin, nothing but his hat and shirt collar being visible. His companion, though choking with suppressed laughter, hauled him out unhurt, but his coat was in ribbons, and his pants terribly damaged. A lady going off had also a miraculous escape of being engulfed. It is clear that the Hole in the Mole is an institution of the country, and cannot be suppressed any more than Congress or the Constitution. P.S. We have just heard of another wight who tripped in the Hole and smashed one of his big toes for life.

We are informed that there was an error in the list of Irish Chaplains in the camp, which we copied on Sunday last from our colleague La Verdad. We understand that the Rev. Fathers Leahy have been named for Fortin de Arco, and the Rev. Father Mullady for San Antonio de Arco, instead of San Andres de Giles and Baradero, as announced by our colleague.

The weather yesterday was terribly close, with a north wind, dust, and many signs of a change which is badly wanted. The accounts from the camps are very distressing. King Drought is monarch of all he surveys; the flocks and herds are dying and dispersing before him, and the 'balde sin fondo' (that marvel of inventive genius) is going from morn till dewy eve on every estancia in the province. The state of things in many of the rural districts is more critical than people in town imagine; but let us hope that a dash of rain is not far off.

We remind all our muscular subscribers that the meeting of that promising institution, the Gymnastic and Fencing Club, will come off to-morrow night at their headquarters in Calle Florida. Every Britisher in town ought to support this Club. If all are not able to knock a man down with the gloves, or beat him black and blue with a single stick or shillelagh, they should subscribe for the training of those who can. In these dangerous times readiness with the fist or a stick may often save a man's life or that of a friend.

The French Courts have thrown out the claim of M. Naundorff. Lt. in the Dutch Army, to be considered the grandson of the unfortunate Louis XVI. There is now another Richmond in the field, called Meves, who is equally certain of his claims. M. le Comte de Chambord's lawyers must have a good deal to do to keep those Pretenders at bay.

The French mail steamer from Bordeaux is expected to-morrow. There is some anxiety to know if Bismarck is better. Napoleon the Great lost Leipzig through dining too heartily off a boiled leg of mutton and turnips; and a stiff cold in the Great Chancellor's head might have very important consequences on the politics of Europe.

The Cedula is the great problem of the day. Is it going to 80? (anything lower than that would be perdition) 'Ay, there's the rub!' What a wonderful change from the halcyon days when this famous security was going up with such rocket-like velocity that the most distinguished financiers were cudgelling their brains how to stop it at part at all events, by reducing the interest on it to 6 per cent! It is hard to say now where it will find its centre of gravity. The situation is grave.

Our versatile Paris Correspondent has favored us with a letter on Science which will be perused with interest by even the lightest of readers. It appears in another column.

We have papers from Asuncion to the 10th inst. The Republica proposes Mr. Gill as candidate for the Presidency of the Republic. Dr. Uriarte is the new Minister of Foreign Affairs. The Oriental Minister, Mr. Sierra Carranza, has left for home. The Onja de Comercio advertises that it will give gold for notes, though where the coin comes from is a puzzle; perhaps there is a (scent of the Loan) clinging round the vase still.

A 'sujeto' in the town of Mercedes gave his neighbors and the police a rather amusing 'alerte' lately. He stationed himself at the door of his house, bawling out 'Help! Police! murder! as hard as he could. When the peace officers arrived and asked him what was up, he said he was only trying to awaken his wife, who was snoring like the Forty-seven Sleepers all in one. They walked the funny fellow off, and left the lady to her slumbers. The Pueblo is initiating a petition to Government respecting the better supervision of the 'mercachifles,' with whom the camp is infested.

PROTESTANT MARRIAGES.

Patagonas, March 30, 1874. To the Editors of the STANDARD.

Gentlemen, Will you kindly insert in the daily and weekly STANDARD this letter together with the letter from the Hon. L. S. West, and the official communication from the Minister of Public Worship to the Minister of Foreign Affairs.

Two years ago I wrote to Mr. MacDonnell asking him to call the attention of the Argentine Government to the great difficulties which existed in the way of the marriage of Protestants in this country. The intending bridegroom has to go to Buenos Ayres and get out certain papers from an Escribana and to pay sundry vicary fees for the mission to get married.

To persons living in or near Buenos Ayres this was perhaps no serious difficulty, but to parties living at a distance, say Bahia Blanca, Patagonas or Clupat, it was a great obstacle; indeed, when the parties were poor it might be impossible to make a voyage to B. Ayres.

I suggested that every duly recognized Protestant pastor should have full power to marry persons of his own religion, simply inserting the particulars in a formal register.
