Definite arrangements of peace between the Argentine Republic and Paraguay, although not yet concluded, may, nevertheless, be expected settled peaceably and amicably; for this purpose we have given our ally co-operation, which was bound by treaty on the 19th September, 1872.

BRITISH TRADE RETURNS. 1873 COMPARED WITH 1872.

We have before us the trade returns of Great Britain for nine months ending Sept. 30th, 1873, from which it will be seen on comparison with the same period of the previous year that the value of British exports increased only 1 per cent. Some countries show a notable decline in their consumption of British manufactures, others, and among those, the River Plate, a decided increase.

PARIS LETTER.

From Our Own Correspondent. April 10.

The 'Stadtholdership' has, following the general law of the march of events in France, jumped into view Jack-in-the-box manner. It is interesting, because the institution is new to the people, and entertaining because they know nothing about it.

MONTEVIDEAN LETTER

May 16, 1874.

profound miseries, but time effaces these as it does everything else. There is no essential incompatibility of humor, unhappily, between the mass of the nation and Caesarism. France lacks a liberal temperament; the love and the want of liberty for liberty's sake. She has a mind too active, an imagination too quick, not to admire and acclaim liberty; but liberty is for her the luxury of a fete, rather than the personal necessity for each day.

France is certainly not royalist; she is far from being reconciled with Bonapartism; she is sincerely republican, but it remains for her still to become liberal. Till then nothing is stable, and all pretensions are possible.

A well known restaurant is celebrated for its Stadtholder sauce, served with cod fish; and this is about the extent of Parisian acquaintance with the due d'Annam's contemplated additional 'evolution' for his country. But Paris has been ever curious, and in character is 'semper idem', while her motto is appropriately 'fluctuat nec mergitur'. The citizens laugh as much at Rochefort's escape—their pet 'gamin'—as they do at that new addition—Stadtholder—to their already pretty large collection of forms of government. They are never surprised, so that if they take a run into the country for a week, and find a new government installed on their return, they bow to it as a matter of course. It would seem to be a mania with France to discover a form of government every fortnight. We have two or three monarchies, a few empires, several republics of various degrees of conservatism, a Septennate destined to be called in question once a month for seven years, and to make confusion worse confounded, 'voilà le Stadtholder'! Just as Parisians were expecting new peap and asparagus, it is the stadtholdership that comes into season. No fantasy is spared the capital of Europe. Pending the early years of the second Empire, every day witnessed the production of some new company, some new industrial scheme, at present novelties seem to be confined to forms of government. Of course while this changeableness lasts, the country cannot make any serious friendships with foreign powers. Even Japan and China are plunged into brown studies. They send Embassies to congratulate Napoleon III, and find on arriving, Gambetta rules the roast; they write home for fresh instructions, and when such are received, Thiers is in office; demanding from their government credentials rectified accordingly, when these are delivered, Thiers has disappeared, and the Septennate is in power. Finally, intending to congratulate the Marshal, they may discover themselves in presence of a Stadtholder, or some kindred unknown institution.

French authors form a Mutual Protection Society, so that the rights of these 'gens de lettres' are protected as far as they can be against piracy etc. The Government annually votes a subsidy of 12,000 francs to aid its necessitous members, for it has also a Friendly character. The political opinions of its members are never allowed to come on the 'tapis'. Now Felix Pyat, the escaped Groussot etc, being associates, and at the same time over-celebrated Communists, have claims for assistance on the guild. This help is accorded by a secret committee elected from the council of the society; the names of the recipients being, for delicacy's sake, represented by figures. The Government objects to its rebels being pensioned out of the national grant, and the society kicks against the demand to violate its very basis—that of political neutrality. It does seem odd to ask the Government to aid Rochefort to live in Belgium and England instead of New Caledonia. But the ex-member of what Bismarck designated the Fourth of September, the Government of the gentlemen of the pavement, is not in want of funds; and Parisians, it must be confessed, are looking forward with greater anxiety for the account of his Odyssey than for the Ministerial scheme of a pocket Senate.

A Republic, according to Cicero, or some other worthy, is not founded upon virtue, but upon the ambition of each citizen, that contains the ambition of others: upon pride which represses pride; upon the desire to dominate, which permits not another to dominate—hence are framed laws which maintain equality as far as possible. A Republic is a society where the invited, with equal appetites, eat at the same table, till a voracious and vigorous man arises, taking all to him self, and leaving only the crumbs for the others. It is thus the Bonapartists understand a Republic. They come to rally to that existing, the better to devour it, the coalition having had the audacity, through the Government, to fine an ex-policeman 500 francs for surreptitiously writing on public places, 'Vive Napoleon IV.'! Such an abomination—after the plebiscite of May, 1870, recording only seven millions of votes for Napoleon III.—is intolerable in the eyes of the imperialists, who in their time would have made short work of any patriot who was lunatic enough to chuck up 'Vive la République,' or 'Vive Henri V.' But 'autres temps, autres meurs.'

The latest intelligence that I had from my beloved daughter the Countess D'Eu brought me the pleasing assurance that Her Imperial Highness was about to be confined, and it was her intention to return to Brazil in fulfillment of one of the conditions in her marriage contract, but it seems medical advice was opposed to Her Highness undertaking so long a voyage.

Sickness has appeared in many of our cities, but the help rendered by the State and by private benefactors has greatly mitigated the sufferings of the poorer classes.

Our relations with foreign Powers are unaltered, and the Government labors everyday to draw them closer by ties of amity and reciprocal interests.

Definitive peace arrangements between the Argentine Republic and Paraguay have not been concluded, but there is room to hope for a peaceful and amicable solution. To this end we have lent our ally the co-operation to which we were bound by convention of Sept. 19th 1872.

We have exchanged ratifications of a Consular concession with Great Britain, an extradition treaty with Belgium, and a postal convention with the Argentine Republic.

The proceeding of the Bishops of Olinda and Pará, who have been made amenable to the Supreme Court of Justice, for some time back caused me much pain, but it was impossible to let go unpunished so great an offence against the Constitution and laws of the empire, and I was, moreover, obliged to maintain the national sovereignty and protect the rights of the citizen from the excesses of clerical authorities. The Government counts on your support and, while pursuing the same course of moderation as heretofore, is determined to bring about the termination of a conflict so prejudicial both to public order and to the real interests of religion.

The revenue showed a falling-off in some places during the first months of the financial year, but will probably come up to the estimates when the year is finished. Although in certain respects new expenses have called for additional outlay, such as new arms and armament of the most approved kind, nevertheless we shall probably have a surplus to announce at the close of the fiscal year.

Additional facilities are called for as regards the staple industry of the empire, which is agriculture, and there is much felt a want of Rural Banks where planters may obtain money at reasonable interest. Our contract with the Bank of Brazil is highly beneficial, but we want to extend the same benefits to all the provinces.

Several important measures were sanctioned by you last session, and I am certain that you will this year adopt others no less necessary for the public welfare.

Government continues to give assiduous attention to public instruction, and a project will be laid before you to amplify and multiply its blessings, in which private benevolence ably cooperates with public action.

Electoral reform is much needed and I trust you will attend to it at once, seeing how closely it affects the march of political institutions.

Your notice is also directed to military organization in its relations with individual liberty and the system of recruiting, so as to cut short existing abuses.

August and worthy Representatives of Brazil. Each day brings fresh reason to believe in the splendid future that is opening for our country, and its realization will be the best recompense for our unremitting labors. The 3rd session of the 15th Legislature is now open.

The Pampero during the small hours of yesterday morning supplied food for conversation yesterday. The Wind was terrifically strong for an hour or so and made sad havoc in the quintas, young trees being blown down by the hundred, windows and doors forced in, and chimney pots toppled. The night was also decidedly unpleasant for the craft in port, but we have not heard of any serious disasters. The cold yesterday was most intense, and everyone muffled up to the eyebrow, still, the afternoon was agreeable.

The long expected news from Rio has come down at last and amounts to nothing. We publish the Emperor Dom Pedro's speech on opening the Brazilian Chambers. His Majesty's reference to the River Plate is as brief as possible, and has the same 'all serene' tone in reference to this country as President Sarmiento's Message had towards the Empire. The alarmists, pessimists and Bolsa Bears looked rather 'cheap' yesterday when the gist of the Emperor's speech became known.

We received yesterday a very interesting letter on the want of intellectual amusement in this country and city, but want of space forces us to hold it over for a day or two. The writer 'touches up' especially the former condition of the resident 'Jeuneur Britannique,' who know not what the deuce to do with themselves after business hours, and have to fall back on that somewhat rickety piece of mental furniture—their own resources.

A most laughable mistake occurred in our edition of Sunday in the wording of Mrs. Powell's farewell advertisement. 'Made' and 'spared' are too very different words, but it appears the printer didn't think so. We have corrected the error.
