THE NIGER MAILS. Telegrams to Club and Bolsa.

Tallow firmer. Hides in England continue weak, but are firmer on the Continent. London wool, auction. First day B. Ayres fell a penny, but afterwards rose a half penny as holders were firm.

Antwerp 6th. Wools recovered 10 centimes rise of February. Salted hides firmer, few buyers. Cargo of Rio Grande sold at Liverpool for 7 1/2. Tallow heavy at 38 1/2. Havre and other French markets, wool fell 10 or 15, and skins 10 centimes.

The Niger Mails IMPORTANT FROM EUROPE. London, May 4th.

The Times of this morning considers the relief of Bilbao, and defeat of the Carlists as a decisive blow from which Don Carlos and his adherents can never rally: the real merit of the victory is due to Concha, and Marshal Serrano has rightly acknowledged this in allowing him to enter Bilbao first and receive the congratulations of the townspeople.

The Bengal authorities are successfully coping with the famine, and no more deaths are reported: the Viceroy reports— "Forty-five thousand tons of food sent weekly to the suffering districts. Number of persons receiving relief and on works—1,305,473.

The King of Greece is likely to be expelled and claim the life-pension of £10,000 guaranteed him by G. Britain and the other powers. He asked Councillor Comandouros to make a Cabinet and he failed, then Zaimis tried his hand with equal success. Finally M. De Giorgis made an effort and also failed, so that it is believed a Greek Republic is inevitable.

The Czar arrived at Berlin yesterday attended by the Grand-Dukes Constantine and Alexis, and a brilliant suite. His Majesty wore Prussian uniform and was received by the Emperor William who embraced him, in presence of the Crown Prince, Moltke, Manteuffel &c., all of whom wore Russian uniform.

The Gazette and other Berlin journals severely censure Count Arnim, for his letter against Bismarck on the Catholic question. As anticipated the Count has been dismissed from his post of Ambassador at Paris, and presented last week to MacMahon his letters of recall.

Count de Chambord arrived at Vienna on the 2nd from his castle of Frohsdorf, and is expected in Paris. Baron Lesseps asked the Italian Government to move the purchase of the Suez Canal, but the Government refused, saying it would be guided entirely by England.

Troubles in Turkey are expected on religious matters, and Count Ludolf, Austrian Ambassador, has left Constantinople for Vienna. The Grand Duke Vladimir was married yesterday at Berlin to Princess Mary of Mecklenburg.

The Duke of Edinburgh presided yesterday at the Centenary dinner of the Royal Humane Society. The House of Commons has again rejected by a sweeping majority the proposal for Government to buy up the Irish Railways (this time advanced by the Home Rulers). It was shown there are 56 Boards and 400 Railway directors in Ireland, drawing heavy salaries, who could be dispensed with. The Government refuses on 3 grounds— 1st. That no price is mentioned, although the Irish papers talk of 20 millions sterling.

2nd. That there is no authority to dispose of public money after this fashion. 3rd. That Government might as well be asked to buy up the English or Scotch railways.

A landlord named George Whitford, Queen's Co., had been shot by his tenants, and the police "proceeding to the scene of the transaction arrested several parties." Mrs. Valentine O'Brien O'Connor, whose husband had purchased Lord Derby's estates in Tipperary, having raised the rents 50 or 60 per cent, the tenants refused to pay more than in Lord Derby's time. An exciting scene occurred in which the parish-priest prevailed on the lady to leave all holdings under 15 acres as before, but when she declared she would levy the rack-rent on the others she was assailed by a storm of yells. The tenantry are very sorry Lord Derby is not still their landlord, but he sold out because a murderer was allowed to go unpunished.

Mr. Gladstone is going to devote himself to literary pursuits. The Irish papers boast that their countryman Sir Garnet Wolsey is the only English General alive who has fought in the four quarters of the world.

The number of telegrams last year was 12 1/2 million messages in United States, 12 1/2 in England, 7 1/2 France, 7 Germany, 4 Austria, 2 1/2 Italy, 2 1/2 Belgium, 2 Holland, and 1 1/2 million in Switzerland.

SANDWICH ISLANDS. THE NEW KING.

The arrival of the steamer Nevada, from San Francisco, brings to Panama the Hawaiian Gazette, containing a long account about the election of Prince David Kalakau as King of the Sandwich Islands, and of his wife Queen Kapiolani, who was the widow of Naniakela, who was brother of Naea, the father of Queen Dowager Emma.

The ceremony of inauguration took place in presence of the Cabinet and other officers of the late King, the officers of the three war ships in port, the Foreign Diplomatic and Consular Representatives, and some two or three hundred people.

The King made a speech, and took the oath to maintain the Constitution, after which Punch-bowl Battery boomed forth its first royal salute to King Kalakau and his standard, which was responded to by Her Britannic Majesty's steamer Tenedos and the United States steamer Tuscarora.

Prince William Pitt Leleiohoku has been appointed Her Apparent. He is brother to the King and twenty years of age.

PARIS LETTER. (From our own Correspondent.) April 19.

Phoreys had three daughters called the Græne. In addition to being grey-haired from their birth they had only one eye and one tooth in common, which they borrowed from each other when they wanted them. The more the history of French governments is studied the more it resembles three old girls in possessing and borrowing the eye and the tooth, in displaying but small penetration and foresight, and using the tooth pretty vigorously.

Politics become more and more a hotchpotch, and despite appearances to the contrary, the odds are in favor that this 'statu quo' will continue till the republicans obtain a majority in the Assembly. The future of France at this moment would seem to depend upon the title to give to Marshal MacMahon's Government. Is it to be Septennate, quite short, or Septennial, quite long? It is gratifying to perceive that while politicians are profoundly occupied in solving the difference between tweedledum and tweedledee, MacMahon has resolved to occupy for seven years that vestibule, so much coveted by the pretenders.

"God bless—no harm in blessing—the pretender: but who pretender is, or who is King— God bless us all—that's quite another thing."

Strange, all the noise and smoke are produced by the deputies and the journals. The country remains sage, tranquil and expectant, maintaining a strict obedience to the laws, reclaiming without irritation or despondency some definite institutions, behind which shelter it can work and resuscitate.

The ministry has taken a sensible step in cutting the Gordian knot respecting MacMahon's office. The Legitimist and Bonapartist organs roundly asserted that what the Sovereign Assembly gave, that Assembly could take away. No such thing replies the Cabinet, by 'communications' and an official circular threatening with pains and penalties all newspapers that call in question the Septennate. For the space of seven years the Assembly has bound itself and the country, in an indissoluble union, to not disturb the Marshal. But all are free to fiddle over the chances of a restoration of the Comte de Chambord in 1880, or of the Bonapartist plan of an appeal to the people at that date. The Assembly is thus compelled to agree with the ministerial interpretation, or to overthrow the cabinet. It must either allow ministers to organize the office held by MacMahon, or permit the Republicans to do so. If the monarchial majority does neither, sustains the dog-in-the-manger policy, it must abdicate. But after indulging in school-boy freaks and revenges at the expense of its own coalition cabinet, it will most likely swallow the lead, and ministers must be convinced of the certainty of such a result, before bearing the lion in its den. The first and last consideration with a French statesman is the non-surrendering of power. The organization of the Septennate, however it may be metaphorically described, means the foundation of the Republic, and until the latter word be erased from the public documents and acts of authority, from the coin, from the public edifices &c. the republicans have no occasion to go into hysterics. In teaching them to labor and to wait, the Septennate will render them a signal service, for it will consummate Thiers's work, the conservative Republic, without Thiers.

Bouapartism has received a terrible knock down-blow, just as many were concluding—but not in France—that it was coming up smiling. To apologize for the unjustifiable and premeditated war against Germany, as the last card to play in the Imperial pack to save the dynasty in its visible gravitation to ruin, the Bonapartists commanding every avenue of power and arranged according to their own will—asserted

the nation desired war, which was untrue; that everything was in apple pie order, which was a cruelly willful deception, and above all, that the government had secured armed alliances. Though a good deal of pathos and bathos took place about the debt of gratitude England and America owed France, for her aid in the Crimea and during the War of Independence, the French knew neither power would knock their heads against a stone-wall. Austria and Italy were the allies counted upon, the latter was not expected to lend a man or a centesimo, so long as a French soldier remained at Rome. Austria was the state ready to fly to arms, and the Foreign-Secretary, the due de Gramont, quoted triumphantly two lines only from a despatch from Count de Beust, affirming most positively this alleged fact. By some mysterious channel, M. de Beust's letter in full has found its way into a Paris journal, and instead of promising to aid France by arms, and mediation even only in certain cases, the Austrian chancellor very decidedly stated his country would no more depart from neutrality than England or the States. The French were prepared for much from Imperialism in the way of deception, but their hair stands aghast at the conduct of the Ministers, de Gramont, Ollivier & Co. plunging France into such mourning and ruin, and justifying themselves by falsified despatches as to ready allies. The revelation is so infamous that the Bonapartist papers throw de Gramont overboard, and hint that the light-hearted Ollivier may return to Italy as soon as possible.

With the return of fine weather Parisians have resumed their weekly promenades. This year secular pilgrimages, instead of being directed to the usual suburban villages, will extend as far as the proposed new fortifications, destined to convert Paris into the strongest entrenched camp in the world, having defensive frontier forts around her, comprised within a radius of 20 miles. The French do not yet understand the constitution of a picnic: the idea of transporting the contents of the pantry some miles into the country, to be spread on the grass, strikes them as absurd. They never rise higher in this respect than to bring a package of meat and poultry, purchasing bread and wine convenient to the site of their 'al fresco' repast. Their idea of going into the country to dine is confined to banqueting 'à la carte,' in the little groves of the inn gardens—a plan that has much to recommend it. This season the suburbs of the city will nearly be as cheerful-looking as they were before the invasion. The devastations, if not repaired, are concealed from alighting the eye. The number of villas to be sold, rather than to be let, indicates that many families cannot afford the luxury of a residence in the country as heretofore, and yet prices have not much diminished in the way of rents. Hotel-keepers in these little towns have proved so extortionate in their charges that they have driven away customers, which compulsory reduced tariffs fail to attract back. Burnt people dread the fire. Ever ingenious, a French family rents an apartment of five or six rooms, and then sub-lets the chambers to its immediate relatives or friends, who board in common. Keeping up appearances never troubles them for a moment; they will relate their domestic affairs to you, if at all interested, with all the glibness of children, and their own in addition, as a proof of their universal knowledge.

LONDON LETTER. (From our own Correspondent.) April 19th.

For a long time to come it will be my unpleasant duty to refer again and again to the Tichborne case. The appearance of Dr. Kenealy's paper The Englishman keeps open the wounds which not even the verdicts on Laie and Brown following that in the principal trial have sufficed to close. At dinner tables and tea parties we hear the everlasting discussion and the almost stereotyped admission from men who are not by any means lunatics or fanatics, but who first believing in the claimant as the veritable Sir Roger, were swayed against him by the weight of evidence and by what in this country is much more important, the weight of opinion in polite society, that "they do not think the man is Tichborne, but they believe he is not Orton." Dr. Kenealy's audacious statement that within twelve months the real Arthur Orton will be in this country naturally fortifies the opinions of the unbelievers in the verdict. Setting aside the almost unanswerable question "if he is not Orton and not Tichborne, who is he?" we have I am sorry to say to weigh with suspicion the assertions of Dr. Kenealy and his friends. For example amongst the Tichbornians I send you, you will see it stated that Mr. Spurgeon and a great part of his congregation are believers in the claimant. Mr. Spurgeon in the columns of the Daily News has indignantly denied that assertion and he adds, "that it argues badly for their cause that the friends of Dr. Kenealy and the claimant should resort to 'lies'!" The truth is, we may hope for the credit of the English bench and bar and jury, that the verdict is correct; but that fact after all mainly concerns Mr. Orton and his friends, and the Tichborne family and their friends, and none of those persons have appeared in a light to deserve much active sympathy from sensible and decent people. The feeling which still burns in the hearts of

Englishmen, and which to a certain extent has supported the two numbers as yet published of the Englishman, is that our judges and lawyers like the rest of cultivated society are infected by that prevailing arrogance and effeminacy which is born of two social elements in themselves unobjectionable—namely, the influence of parsons and of sisters in the education of our youth. The malignant species of social tyranny which reigns supreme is exactly what we could expect from its double origin. Fortunately it is only suited to fair weather. At the first indication of political strife the parsons, the women and genteel lawyers will retire into their appropriate haunts. That the shipbrokers of Buenos Ayres who you tell us are highly conservative may not think those sentiments offensive and Radical, I must tell you that as far as Dr. Kenealy's efforts to redress the wrongs of the "unfashionable world" are concerned, Vanity Fair, which is at once the organ and the caricaturist of the upper classes, has in an excellent article on the Englishman chastised the tendency in society to crush everything that differs from its own narrow, superficial and superfluous notions. Indeed, it is now doubtful if the young snobs of the Oxford circuit mess and the older sinners, benchers of Gray's Inn, will venture to carry out their threats against Dr. Kenealy.

The funeral cortege of poor Livingstone, who was buried to-day in Westminster Abbey, was an informant told me, a very "shady affair." Of course, as the government only contributed £250, and there was no time for a public subscription, it could not be otherwise. It is curious that the Tichborne trial has made people confirmed sceptics. Some doubt it remains buried to-day were really those of Livingstone, notwithstanding the disgusting medical details published in the papers proving their identity; as for poor Mr. Stanley, there are numbers of old sceptics who firmly assert he never saw Livingstone, and that the letter lately reprinted from the New York Herald is purely apocryphal. The fact that Livingstone's black boy, Jacob Wainwright, who arrived with the coffin, when introduced to Stanley did not recognize him for some time, and till after much questioning, was, of course, the origin of immense chucking amongst the big wigs at the "Geographic."

MONTEVIDEAN LETTER. May 28th.

The arrival of the French Packet Niger, with our friend Doctor Perez Gomar on board, was the excitement of the afternoon. As soon as the French steamer was known to be in sight, crowds rushed down to the mole and anxiously awaited the return of the Captain of the Port's steamer. "Is Perez Gomar on board?" was the cry, and the answer in the affirmative had such an effect on every one that the mole was cleared out in a moment. No particulars, however, are as yet known as to the documents brought out, though I have noticed a good many who try to look very wise.

The Captain of the Spanish gunboat Ceres died the day before yesterday; the funeral took place to-day at eleven o'clock, and was attended by a large concourse of people of foreign nations: the English were the only ones who put in a respectable appearance. Captain Buckle, of H.M.S. Orackor, followed the procession to the last solemn resting-place of a well-known, well-liked, and much-regretted man. I noticed among others who followed, Captain Mahon, of the United States gunboat Wasp, the Spanish Minister, and several others of note here; but what was remarkable was the absence of any French officers. The Orientals behaved very well, and besides sending representatives of the Government, a band of music accompanied the procession.

The re-embarking of the Spanish sailors after the funeral was attended by a very unfortunate accident; the mole was crowded with people who were drawn there by the novelty of seeing an armed crew on shore, of a foreign nation, and more so as Spaniards are a great attraction, and at the time one of the Custom-house trucks loaded too heavily with cases of kerosene was overbalanced, and down came the boxes on the heads of those who were near; three men were knocked into the lighter, and escaped very narrowly from being taken to the cemetery. The cases belonged to the firm of Le Bas, Nuttall & Co., and doubtless, a question will arise as to who is the responsible party.

COMMANDER CILLEY'S EXPEDITION. ROUTE FROM PARAGUAY TO BOLIVIA.

Santa Cruz, March 19th 1874. On the morning of August 23rd 1873 I set out with a party of exploration entirely equipped and armed at my expense, from the port of Corumbá on the Paraguay river. The party comprised myself, another American, a Scotchman, a Bolivian, a German, and an Englishman, having a supply of provisions for 3 months, besides arms, implements, fish-hooks, scientific instruments and books. Our large canoe was 60 feet long, 3 wide, and 2 1/2 deep, cut out of a single cedar-tree; the smaller one was 15 feet long, 18 inches wide, and a foot deep; both being supplied with double allowance of oars, cables &c.

The immediate object was to explore Bahia Negra and the Otquis river, and the Brazilian authorities lent every assistance to myself and my partner, D. Belisario Ibañez. My programme was to explore Bahia Negra up to the mouth of the Otquis, ascend this river as far as we could go, and then proceed by land to Santiago (province of Chiquitos) either by the Corumbá road or that made by Sr. Vargas. In the meantime Ibañez was to go straight overland to Santiago, and come back with assistance and supplies along the right bank of the Otquis, till meeting my party.

The steamer Jaurú took me and my canoe to the mouth of Rio Negro, where I lauded with my party at midnight on the 24th August. Having put a sentinel we camped for the night and slept till daybreak. Then sending out scouts they brought me back word there was no sign of Indians, but we saw the tracks of the Chamacoos tribe whom I had left behind me at Corumbá. Having made some astronomical observations we ascended the Rio Negro mentioned by Capt. Page U. S. N.

About a mile from the confluence of the Negro and Paraguay we came on a branch in a N. W. direction, following which we reached a deep water like which had no current. Then returning to the main stream, which goes northward, we followed its various windings to what is marked on the maps as Bahia Negra.

The Rio Negro was at its highest, flooding the banks in many places, but the line of jungle and brushwood still showed the current, which ran hardly 400 yards an hour. West and north-west extended a plain broken by clumps of palm-trees. As we proceeded carefully sounding the stream one of the men called my attention to an enormous Boa-constrictor, fully 25 feet long and 24 inches thick, twined in the branches overhanging the river. Seizing my rifle I took aim, fired, and the monster fell into the stream; mortally wounded, but I had no means of preserving the skin or taking it with me. We continued to pull up the river till sighting the peaks of Coimbra on the N. E. about 25 miles distant.

The Rio Negro has a muddy bottom, and we found up to this a depth of 13 to 18 feet. The overland route from Coimbra to Santa Cruz by which Ibañez was to proceed was made by Mr. Pomier for President Lopez of Paraguay, and the engineer selected generally the low grounds as offering greatest facilities for water, but as a consequence it is marshy and useless in wet seasons. From Corumbá to Florida there is a stretch of 60 leagues utterly uninhabited or without vestige of men or cattle, although most suitable for pastoral purposes, being extremely fertile. The part near Santiago of the main road was repaired by the neighbors gratis, the Bolivian Government merely giving them supplies of food, but the Indians having come down and killed some of the workmen the repairs were suspended in 1871. Then the Bolivian Government ordered a piquet of six soldiers to protect the workmen, but the Sub-prefect kept the soldiers for his own purpose. Since then no efforts have been made to keep open the communication between Santa Cruz de la Sierra and the River Paraguay.

The Spanish Republicans here are in ecstasies at the result, while the brave Basques are proportionately depressed. The desperate valour that must have been displayed by Serrano's troops to storm the Carlist position is the theme of general conversation, and the chivalrous devotion of the Biscayans to their ancient line of Kings, similar to that of the Scotch Highlanders to the Stuarts, does equal credit to the Spanish race, which might to-day hold some of its former high position in the world but for being so long in the hands of worthless sovereigns, ambitious soldiers and blustering politicians. Let us hope that the present dreadful ordeal will be productive of permanent

The Te-Deum at the Cathedral was the great event of the day. At 1 p.m. the foreign Ministers began to arrive, the first Mr. West, accompanied by the secretaries Mr. Frederic St. John and Mr. E. Gibson.

At half-past one His Excellency the President of the Republic arrived, being received at the entrance by Very Rev. Canon Dillon, who conducted him to the chair of state placed for His Excellency near the altar-steps.

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CITY IMPROVEMENTS.

INAUGURATION AT THE RECOLETA. On the 15th, Governor Acosta inaugurated the city-improvements in presence of a great concourse of people at the Recoleta, with the accustomed solemnities.

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General of the Montevideo army-list, followed by many of his countrymen invaded our territory to aid the rebels, and although he has returned to Montevideo the authorities there have not thought fit to order his trial or arrest.

A lustral question occurred with the Brazilian merchant-steamers Guyabá, which we detained in this port because she had aboard a noted Argentine rebel, who was a passenger from Asunción.

The Sanitary Convention arrived at last year between Brazil, B. Ayres, and Montevideo has remained a dead-letter. It provided that in no case were ports to be closed, nor any quarantine to exceed 10 days.

Relations with Europe. We have no need of Europe or her monarchial traditions, but the working-classes of Europe gladly flock to our shores in France, Spain, England, Prussia, Italy, and Germany.

Relations with America. As the Argentine Republic has already lost Banda Oriental, Paraguay and Bolivia, which formed parts of the old vicereignty of Buenos Ayres, it is doubly necessary not to allow our neighbors to strip us of any more territory.

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President Sarmiento's appointment of General Mitre bears date March 1st 1873, and the accompanying letter of instructions lays down that whatever treaty he may make with Paraguay must be on the understanding—

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
