Baron Haussmann and his friends are known to have made great fortunes by the new Boulevards in Paris; but it is no less certain that they would have improved the aspect and health of the city. The sum so expended reached the enormous figure of 50 milliards of francs, say 3 times the amount of the National Debt of G. Britain.

What has been done in Paris can be effected here in a smaller scale, but with still greater success. The city requires avenues or boulevards such as proposed, for the better preservation against passing epidemics, as well as for public convenience.

Mr. Dravo only asks two concessions from Government in return for the introduction of such a prodigious amount of money. Ist.—To exempt the Boulevards from Contribucion Directa for 20 years. 2nd.—To solicit from the National Government the introduction of materials duty-free.

Before many years new Boulevards will be formed like the first, and B. Ayres will become as remarkable for this great improvement as it is now for Tramways. The 'cuadras' in the central parts of Mr. Bravo's boulevards will be quite a fair scene: arcades covered with glass crossing each other from one block to another; the new 'manzanas' being about 100x140 varas, so as to coincide with the present cross-streets.

The law of expropriation will be as in the case of Railways, and those who are fortunate enough to own houses along the route will get probably 30 per cent. more than the real value of their 'finca.' Tenants on contract will be compensated in a like manner. In fact it is just the same as if a railway were ordered from Plaza Victoria to Calle Callao.

The plans of Mr. Stant's proposed harbor, on exhibition at our office, receive general approval. First of all there is the manifest advantage of having the Riachuelo flowing through the Docks, instead of a vast area of stagnant water in front of the city, as proposed by Mr. Bateman.

The scheme is based on a series of Docks from the Vuelta de Rocha straight to the River Plata, shutting up the present mouth, and reclaiming much land all round. The Harbor would embrace 540 acres, including graving-docks, custom-house, warehouses &c. in the following manner:— A. Dock of 120 acres, properly the harbor.

B. Site for second dock, 120 acres. C. Site for third dock, 100 acres. D. Graving-docks & Custom-house, 40 acres. E. Steam-pumps, offices &c., 40 acres. F. Warehouses, railway between, 120 acres.

This would give much larger accommodation than Mr. Bateman proposes, while the projector assures us it would cost less, and possess many other advantages. At all events to an unscientific eye it seems much simpler and more intelligible than any plan yet presented for a port in front of the city.

It remains to be seen whether Mr. Stant is to encounter much opposition to his project. Coast and sails this afternoon on her homeward voyage with a full cargo, and takes from here about fifty five passengers among whom I note Messrs. Stephenson and Roberts: Mr. Joseph Roberts, who has been manager of the house of Messrs. Glover Barge and Co. for some time past was fairly enveloped by his friends on embarking, all of whom wished him a pleasant and safe trip and a speedy return to this country.

This steamer carried some specie from here also, consisting of the following amounts: For Paris... \$10,000. For Liverpool... 1,000. For Rio Janeiro... 1,000. and also two hundred and fifty bales sheepskins.

On the Bolsa very little activity was shown and the sales made were at almost the same rates as yesterday, they were as follows— Deuda Intera, 2nd Series 110,000 a 60 for 100 of month. 30,000 a 64 do. 30,000 a 60 do, with option of 30,000 more. Emprestio Pacifico 8,000 a 93 for delivery on the 15th August. Exchange continues flat, and a few amounts have been passed to-day at the rate of 50qd. per national dollar.

In produce I have not heard of any transactions that have been made public, though I am aware of some having taken place. The Royal Mail steamer Tiber, Captain Andrew Gillies, leaves this afternoon for your port. This steamer has made a very fine trip out, and brought newspapers to the 24th ultimo.

We are anxiously awaiting the arrival of Messrs. Lamport and Holt's steamer Kepler, which will probably bring us telegraphic news to the 20th instant. The Falkland Islands packet is awaiting the arrival of this steamer, as she has the mails on board for those islands. The judicial sale of the house of Essing, formerly of the firm of Messrs. Essing and Lima, who, you will recollect, failed here a short time ago, took place yesterday. This house formerly belonged to Guimaraens, and was sold by him to Essing for the sum of 74,000 dollars; the price obtained, however by auction, was only 34,000 dollars.

The barque Blair Athol, that went aground on the English bank, is said to be a total wreck, and will probably be sold by public auction in the course of a few days for account of whom it may concern. The barque Sarmiento is discharging her cargo in this port, and will at afterwards have her hull overhauled. I have to report the death of one of your citizens, Don Jose M. Nunez, who died here yesterday in the Hotel Oriental, and was buried this afternoon; his funeral was very largely attended by all the principal men of this city.

Mr. Moller, late partner of Mr. J. R. Schwartz, has recently been decorated by the Portuguese Government, for the great assistance he rendered to the Portuguese barque Zambesia, in June 1872.
