lieans depended on the superiority of their artillery; otherwise, considering the strength of the Carlist position, their numerical force was quite unequal to attacking 25,000 in such a position.

Moreover it appears that Marshal Concha, rendered over-confident through previous success, was ambitious not only of driving the Carlists out of Estella, but of cutting off their retreat and finishing the war at one blow.

For this double object he extended his lines so as to overtake the enemy. The gallant Marshal, in spite of this error, very nearly succeeded; and in all probability, had it not been for the fatal volley which struck down him and many of his officers, he would have retrieved the error by a final and desperate charge of the reserves, which he led in person.

As it was, the left of the Republican army had been successful, but the right and centre were not sufficiently supported, and what might have been at first only an unsuccessful attack was converted into a rout when the fall of the Republican general became known to his soldiers.

The death of Concha was not known to the Carlists till two days afterwards, or they might have been encouraged in a more deadly pursuit. Thanks to the artillery, the retreat was well covered, and the Republicans, with a loss of three or four thousand men, got back to Tafalla without the loss of a gun or trophy.

The Carlists' loss is also very great, but we have no authentic accounts from their side. The gallantry on both sides does honor to the fighting capacities of the Spaniard.

After the death of Concha, the command was assumed by Generals Echagüe and Rosell. Marshal Zabala is appointed to take the supreme command, and he is already at Tafalla engaged in fortifying the line of defence planned by Marshal Concha.

He is accompanied by the heroes of the commencement of the war, Generals Loma and Moriones, who must now feel themselves quite acquitted of the disgrace of being recalled. Poor Marshal Concha was 72 years of age.

He was shot through the body and expired in a short time after he was carried to the rear. His dying words were "I was in the van." No one doubted the veteran's bravery. Better for Spain had he been in a sater and for a general in command equally honorable post. The Marshal was buried with great pomp at Madrid.

The pamphlet by Don Carlos Soto, "Uruguanian stock as a very secure and most profitable investment," has duly appeared, and seems to give satisfaction to the friends of the Uruguan Government.

Of course Mr. Soto has him on the hip by replying that he does not think the depression could arise from that circumstance, as between Uruguan and Paraguay there are quite 300 leagues of territory belonging to the Argentine Republic.

Now Mr. Hyde Clarke, the Secretary of the Council of foreign bondholders, is a serious and learned gentleman; quite a scholar in philology and makes a special study of the Aztec, Guaraní and Quechua tongues; and he is besides a very pillar of the Geographical Society.

In his capacity as the mouthpiece of the bondholders he was obliged to think as a bondholder and speak bondholderish things upon 'Paraguay' and 'Uruguan' and all the other 'gays' as the same thing, and anything but lively; just as people in Buenos Ayres look upon the 'Jungees' and 'Jungees' of Bombay as undefinable parts of India.

This weakness, common to humanity, of laughing at everything different to our own little surroundings, and exposing our own ignorance in the act of ridiculing, is amusingly exemplified in a London paper this week. You will have seen that the Chilian authorities refused to allow English medical men to practise in that country, and gave as a reason that English medical education was too imperfect to allow of Englishmen getting a Chilian diploma.

The London paper roared at this in its little way, so that you could see its pink sides shake at the notion of a South American State depreciating the Universities of London and Edinburgh. Suddenly it grew serious, and reminding us that we had now a Conservative Government, it trusted that Lord Derby would energetically represent the matter to what do you think?—the Brazilian Government!

The Argentine horses sold at auction have turned out better than they looked. So I am told is the opinion of the purchasers. They have created quite an excitement amongst dealers. The horses are small for our shafts, but they make capital 'polo' animals and can be made useful for many purposes. The new trade looks well. See that it is not discredited by too eager speculators.

Leicester Square was opened to-day with becoming festivities in honour of the donor Baron Grant. The square looks charming with its green swards, its statues and fountains. Really nothing the beneficent Baron could

have devised would raise us higher in the scale of nations. Would that he could take into his hands the decoration of St. Paul's which is being profaned by Gothic taste!

Many in Montevideo and B. Ayres will be grieved to hear of the death of Mr. Richard Cranwell who was carried off yesterday after a short, but severe, attack of bronchitis. Poor Mr. Cranwell was barely thirty and had succeeded so well in his short residence in the old country he had a fine future before him as a London merchant.
