AWFUL STATE OF THE CAMP.

CAPTURE OF 20 ROBBERERS. We must go back fifty years before we can find any parallel for the present condition of the Province of Buenos Ayres.

People who have been in Mexico say it is just as bad there; but we doubt if any other part of the world can show such an entire disruption of society from its very basis.

Gangs of marauders go about in battalions, robbing and murdering all before them. Of course the National Government, or Federal Tribunal have nothing to do but look on.

And as the Provincial Government is actually undergoing a change, in consequence of the Governor being elected Vice-president, it is not likely any active measures can be taken for some time in favor of the unfortunate estancieros and camp residents.

Pergamino, July 29th. The telegram to the STANDARD last Sunday says to put the people of these "partidos" on their guard against a gang of robbers, now ascertained to be about 50 in number, but of which 20 of the more notorious have just been captured and lodged in prison.

On the night of the 21st four robbers attacked the rancho of a poor man named Pedro Silva, who was sick in bed; when the dogs barked his wife went out to see what was the matter, and a poucho was immediately thrown over her to hold her down. Silva jumped up and ran to her assistance, fighting so valiantly with his knife that he wounded the ringleader and two others, the first of them mortally, but while struggling to free his wife he received two shots in the back, and fell dead.

The 3 wounded assassins mounted their horses and rode to one of Mr. Mooney's puestos; here they were denied admittance, and seem then to have started in different directions.

One of them made his way to Mr. Mooney's house, where he told the occupants he had just been wounded by Ganchos; his wound was dressed with great care, and as he seemed likely to die before morning the Alcalde was sent for, to take his declarations. Presently another fellow also wounded made his appearance, asking for shelter. The Alcalde was again sent for, but said it was too late, that he was in bed. Next morning the Alcalde sent word to detain the wounded men, that they had murdered a man last night.

When taken to hospital they would confess nothing. The Chileno, supposed to be the leader, before he died said to the Commissary: "you may cut my throat; you'll get nothing out of me." Their clothes were searched, and one of them was found to have 17 papuletas. As the Judge could get no particulars it seemed a hopeless case, but the younger assassin thinking he was dying made an open confession, to which he was probably urged by the priest who had been attending him. He gave the names of all his accomplices and professed extreme sorrow for his misdeeds.

The authorities lost not a moment in seizing 20 of the scoundrels. The Justice of Peace was accompanied by Commissary Suarez, Captain Carrasquera, Alcalde James Fox and others, who were in their saddles night and day hunting up the bandits. The leader of the entire band or at least of the Arrecifes gang seems to have been Manco Ruino, who was employed on a German estancia and usually regarded as "hombre de bien"; so many others bore good character and appeared in comfortable circumstances that the discovery has caused a dreadful sensation in this part of the country.

The wife of Silva has identified one, a cousin of her own and brother of the Alcalde. Mrs. Rochford has sworn to another Jacinto Salinas alias Gonzalez, who murdered Rochford and was also in the attack on Cloff's house, when poor Coyne was murdered. This Jacinto is a noted bandit, has a large cut on one side of his face, by which he may be easily recognized, for he is still at large.

The band had spies all over San Nicolas, Pergamino, Rojas, Salto, Arrecifes, Chacabuco and Carriz de Arco, the whole band numbering fifty, following different occupations. They were planning a raid against Carmen de Arco next month, when they expected the "Ingleses" would have money in their houses to pay for the coming shearing expenses.

It seems Silva had sold some mares a few days before the attack on his house. The robbers did not find the money, which was in a leathern "tador" on a box beside his bed; the stirrups and bridle of the murdered man were all they took. It is proposed to erect a public monument to Pedro Silva for so bravely fighting with his knife against four bandits with firearms, and losing his life in defence of that of his wife.

It is fortunate so large a band of brigands has been broken up, for if they remained in force till the thistles grew they would have depopulated the seven districts.

Capilla del Señor, Aug. 8th. The camp is in such an awful state that the oldest farmers are getting frightened. Every week some atrocious murder, too often the victim a poor Irishman, butchered with circumstances of barbarity that have no parallel in the annals of crime.

Notorious murderers go about unimpeded, and are treated as respectable members of society. You, said, some time ago, that the Sarmiento administration would close under the happiest auspices. Is that likely, when you see gangs of cut-throats going about so unimpeded that we are thinking of forming mutual defence associations.

CLARK'S RAILWAY SCHEME.

(By Intendente MacKenna.) From the time of Columbus down to Fulton all great enterprises have met with opposition, and Clark's project to overcome the Andes is likely to meet with many difficulties, because Clark is ahead of his time.

For two centuries of Spanish rule Chile had only mule paths. The Frenchman Frezier in the last century used to cross the Spauliards because his clothes were torn by the brambles he drove his mules from Santiago to the Port (now Valparaiso).

A great man rose in Chile, Ambrosio O'Higgins, the father of all our progress. He proposed to substitute carriage roads for mule paths. The Cabildo, the Real Audiencia and every body opposed him; but he made a carriage road over Uspallata, with refuge huts from Santiago to Mendoza, and finished the great work in six years. He used to drive out in a "sopanda" drawn by four mules to inspect the progress of the works, and as he passed the people would gaze at him and say, "There goes the mad O'Higgins."

When the road was finished wagons began to make the journey in eight days; freights fell one-half. In twenty years Congress began to see O'Higgins was right, and made roads in all directions. The first railway projected was in 1852, when the first sod of the Valparaiso line was turned, but not without bloodshed, for a military leader attempted to surprise the founders at the inaugural banquet on October 1st, 1852. Steadily the engineers bored the mountains at Punta Gordia, Centinola and Paven. At one defile they were delayed four years; but the locomotive at last reached Santiago, and the gaudsons of those who had laughed at O'Higgins threw up their hats in the air for joy.

Tramways had just as many difficulties; it took seven years to get the first one started. The history of great enterprises, north or south, is simply a repetition of obstacles overcome by unyielding perseverance.

Fifteen years ago a shopkeeper in Sacramento, named Huntingdon, formed the idea of a railway over the Rocky Mountains, to join California with the rest of the Union. He dealt in crockery, and found 4 associates as humble as himself. People regarded them as lunatics, when they emitted Compons of a Pacific Railway, to pay for the preliminary surveys. A minor of Nevada took the first coupon for \$100. A banker of San Francisco said his house was too respectable to allow him to take a single share. Huntingdon and his friends went on; an engineer found for them a suitable passage over the Rocky Mountains, and the first great step was accomplished. In 1861 when Mr Huntingdon went to Washington to ask for the concession he was generally laughed at, because the whole capital subscribed would not pay the wages of 800 navvies for a year; yet he carried the stupendous work to completion. In ten years he saw the Pacific Railway finished; crossing 800 miles of desert without water, surmounting two ranges of mountains mounting two ranges of mountains where the snow lies sixty feet thick. And when with two rivets of solid gold he fastened down the concluding rail the North American people took off their hats and hailed Huntingdon as the great man of the age. He had been, when young, a rail-splitter in Connecticut, and a site is marked out in San Francisco for a statue to commemorate his great achievement.

The U. States know the value of railways, and have 75,000 miles in actual traffic, or more than all the rest of the world.

Are we to be deterred in Clark's line because we have to make a tunnel, which is not one-third the length of the Mont Cenis? Last week 5 capitalists met in a Bank at Santiago, who were able to put down on the table twenty times as much capital as Huntingdon and his companions had in beginning the Pacific Railway; they resolved at their own expense to make the necessary surveys over the Andes, and we may regard the work now as merely a matter of time.

Our young countryman Clark observed 3 years ago, "when constructing his line of telegraph over the Andes, how easy it would be to make a railway connecting La Plata and Chile. His project met with much opposition, but like the Sacramento shopkeeper he persevered until he obtained from the Argentine and Chilean Governments a concession and a guarantee. Like all Chileans he never wavered for a moment. A rival project has since sprung up by Mr. San Roman, to prolong the Copiapo line to Rioja.

Congress is now asked for a vote of \$100,000 towards the surveys for which the 5 capitalists have made themselves personally responsible. Whether it be Clark's line or the other that is ultimately carried out the subjugation of the Andes is as certain as if already accomplished. It was the dream of Mr. Wheelwright, who made our first railway over twenty years ago, and whose memory must be as dear to Chileans as that of his great predecessor O'Higgins.

BOLIVIA TO PARAGUAY.

La Paz, June 18th. The new administration is doing wonders in the way of progress. Not content with hearing that D. Natalio holdan has just opened the Rio Bermejo, and with ordering surveys for a railway from La Paz to Desaguadero, a decree has been issued for constructing a road that will connect La Paz with the River Paraguay, as proposed by Captain Greenleaf Gilley, the explorer of the Otquis territory.

From La Paz to Izozo the road will pass through the old Jesuit missions of Itau, Oubaiz and Parapiti; in fact it is simply restoring the old road of the last century. Much more arduous will be the section from Izozo to Otquis and Bahia Negra, as there are forests to be cut through. Rivero's project seems even easier, and he is an experienced road-maker, to cut a road from Chuquisaca to Otquis, with a cross-road from Santa Cruz to Tarija. This would open up not only Chiquitos, but also all the Chiriguano and country bordering on the Paraguay, supposed to be very rich in animal, vegetable and mineralogical resources.

If the Government of Bolivia spend money freely in the proposed highway in the proposed highway to the Paraguay joint stock companies will be formed to establish colonies and "poblaciones" along the route. A hundred years ago the Missions kept up considerable traffic between Santa Cruz and Beni. The delightful plains of the Chaco will soon tempt the inhabitants of the Sierras to move thither as soon as a road be opened to facilitate the traffic of the new settlement.

ORIENTAL FINANCES.

Loudon, July 8th. To the Editors of the STANDARD. Gentlemen, We Englishmen are deeply indebted to the Chief Magistrate President Ellauri, and to his Minister Sr Peñalva, for stating the plain, unvarnished truth, and having the courage to tell us that the financial position of Uruguay is really desperate.

We know that such frankness is not a characteristic of South American politicians, and especially when they are coming in humble fashion to obtain from credulous and confiding John Bull a large loan. No! The Message of President Ellauri, the Budget of Sr Peñalva—thanks to them—have prevented Englishmen from entrusting their hard earnings to the coffers of the Uruguayan Republic. Their five million loan will never be floated here. The gigantic bubble has burst. Consul-General Soto may talk about the "religiosity" of his countrymen as long as he likes, but not even the most unscrupulous old maid will be charmed with his dulcet, meaningless rhetoric. We have had the old, old story repeated, how the Uruguayan Republic is as worthy of credit as the Argentine!! how they have gone on daily increasing in civilisation, emigration flocking to their shores, railways in course of construction, newspapers printed on better paper than those of France, and all political parties represented in the press; peace established on the most firm basis.

No longer are we to be deluded. We know they have done a good deal with our money, that they have spent it, and want more; we are not satisfied with the manner in which they have employed the last, and we feel confident that further sums would only remove the evil, and make it still greater. Their vast proportional military expenditure, the insecurity of life and property, the ever increasing deficits in the budgets, the decrease in the export trade, and in the number of sheep bred, and the condition of their commerce, owing to the heavy duties imposed, and rampant speculation, have all been abundantly and fully made known to us through the columns of the entire English press. I send you copies of some of the leading daily and financial journals. From them you will gather Englishmen are shaking off their lethargy—that hope has fled. The Argentine and Chilean Republics are the only two in South America in which Englishmen have confidence. Paraguay has ruined a lot of people; Bolivia is about to do so; Peru is very shaky, and Uruguayan credit is tottering. The Government of Montevideo may try to restore confidence in the minds of the people of the Banda Oriental by assuring them that the loan will be raised here; they may endeavour to elaborately explain "ad referendum" contracts with Thompson, Bonar & Co., and the simple Uruguayan can believe their statements; they will not have any effect here—Englishmen know too much. The other day one of the most eminent of our financial firms could not place £50,000 stock of the North Western Railway of Montevideo. How then can any house place a £5,000,000 loan? Consul-General Soto has published a pamphlet; nearly every point has been in detail annihilated by persons writing to the press; the leading journals have reviewed it unfavorably. A Mr. Gardner, who has stated most telling home truths about the condition of Uruguay, has publicly stated in a letter to the "Financier" that he intends to publish a pamphlet in reply, and it he treats the subject as ably as he has hitherto done in the press, he will give the "golpe fuerte" to Consul General Soto's effusion. Dr. "Emprestito" Gomar having returned to enlighten the people on your side, the Consul General has had associated with him in his task Dr. Bustamante, but the united effort of both those hopeful officials has sent down the stock. But we are about to bring Uruguay to book in another manner. It is stated that a

question will be asked in our House of Commons very shortly enquiring what steps Her Majesty's Government intend to take to enforce the payment of the long outstanding claims and to protect the lives of British subjects in Uruguay? No! Sirs, we shall hesitate to lend any more money to promote harbour schemes, or even to construct water works. They must carry their water at their own expense, or get unsuspecting Brazilians or Argentines to lend them the coin. Not even the tempting prospect of a forced currency in the Queen city of La Plata has any charm for us. Although, according to Dr. Bustamante, the teeming population of Uruguay, estimated at 500,000 souls, can eat more beef than any other people in the world, we are satisfied with the knowledge and admire their appetites, but our appreciation of these facts is not sufficient to induce us to stimulate them to still further efforts in that direction by lending them more money. However much we may be inclined to jest at these absurd statements made to bolster up the credit of an encumbered State, the matter is too grave and serious.

Thanks to the honesty of Ellauri and Peñalva, who first aroused public attention here, we know the truth. I am, Gentlemen, Yours, &c. One on the look out.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

An interesting letter on Uruguayan Finance, which we received by the mail, will be found in another column. The London financial papers teem with leaders and communications on the same subject, and all we regret to say, breathe the same fish-like opinion as to the monetary situation of our neighbour, and the strong improbability of John Bull stamping up any more cash to keep her afloat. Only two South American Republics are now believed in in London—the Argentine and Chilean. All the others are either going or gone to the dogs, in the acute estimation of Lombard Street and Capel Court.

Our correspondents in the camp still sing of murder and pillage. We give further particulars to-day of the capture of 20 banditti in Pergamino. Would that the authorities in other partidos bestirred themselves equally to get rid of the plague of robbery and assassination.

"What's the news from London?" is now the matutinal question in every commercial man's mouth. With all the talk and fuss very few receive or send telegrams, trusting to scrape the news from their more enterprising friends. Mr. Weaver (of the Oriental Agency) is at the Bottom of all that is going on and is the man of the day; his registry list grows with the rapidity of a South American debt, and he and Paek are working the girdle famously. Before breakfast yesterday he received and answered three through telegrams from Europe; but it would be as easy to pump the Pacific dry as get the faintest hint of their contents out of him.

The Cremation Society proposes to do its cremating on Fridays. An American paper speaks of a fellow who is nearly as big a bore as the Hoosac tunnel.

We perceive that many residents of Belgrano are anxious to "place the station of the Campana Railway at that town on the race course, and have presented a petition to that effect to the authorities.

The prison of Mercedes has the name of being the worst in this province (and this is saying a good deal) although it is more in demand and has a greater number of criminals confined in it than most others. It must be in a charming state of repair, as the other day, while the guard was being relieved a policeman fell slap, bang, musket, bayonet and all, right through the floor into a huge "letrina." He swam about, nearly suffocated, till pulled out with a rope, but when just out the cord went crack! and he got another dip. A second attempt to rescue him succeeded, but the poor fellow is in hospital, half poisoned. A fine, healthy and secure prison that at Mercedes must be.

Verdi's Aida will be performed at the Colon Theatre this evening for the first time this season, with or without the permission of Weather, Wives, or anything or anybody else. Several years experience in the Plate enables us to state without fear of contradiction that next Saturday—Lady Day—will be a strict holiday, being one of the most solemn Feasts of the Catholic Church.

The Royal mail steamer Douro will sail for England on Friday next. Packet Edition on Thursday. We published part of the Home Rule Debate in Parliament on the back page of our Sunday's issue. We make this "ex post facto" announcement as some subscribers might like to read it, and we met half a dozen yesterday who had not read the back page. It is a mistake not to do so always, as many most seductive advertisements are to be met with there.

The only news from Rosario is that the good people of that town are gravely disappointed that the Duke of Genoa did not pay them a visit, some wag having given out that H.R.H. intended to do so before returning to the Montevideo. Ten English labourers going up to Cordoba, to work on the railway to Tucuman, were put out of the train at Tortugas last week. They had obtained free passes as newly arrived emigrants, though most of them have been years in the country.

"Pa, ain't I growing tall?" "Why, what's your height, sonny?" "I'm seven feet, lacking a yard?"

The news from learned Cordoba is afflicting. The Government balance in the Provincial cash box is exactly 22 pats!! The situation is more easily imagined than described, so we won't describe it. Mr. National Deputy Acaval is recovering.

Spring has come to us early this year, and the extra heat of the past week has forced on vegetation wonderfully. All the peach trees in the quintas are in bud, and we hear that the growth of grass in the camp is most encouraging. The Comet has, no doubt, something to say to the extraordinary mildness of the weather. The result of this early spring will probably be the loss of all the fruit crops. Rain, and plenty of it, is at hand, even before Santa Rosa's visit, which is now little more than a fortnight off.

The great rush of Italian emigration to South America is now by way of Havre, as the Italian authorities throw various impediments in the emigrants' way in their own ports. During March and April 6200 Italians embarked at Havre. The Lucesse are now leaving home "en masse," fired by the sight of fine houses and a monster Hotel built in their midst by successful countrymen from the Plate.

The latest official report of the health of the city is satisfactory. Typhoid fever and small-pox are prevalent, but the total mortality continues much under the average.

The Black Diamonds give a second performance this evening at the Alegria Theatre. The programme, as we have already stated, is first rate. Our Nigger friends have not yet announced to what purpose, charitable or otherwise, they intend devoting the proceeds, an indispensable piece of information when amateurs are concerned.

BRITISH HOSPITAL.

To the Editors of the STANDARD, Gentlemen: I find it requisite to apply for space in your columns to reply to the letter of Mr. Trotman's, which appeared in your issue of the 14th April, during my recent visit to England, making, whilst I was absent, insinuations regarding the purchase of land at Caballito for the British Hospital.

Mr. Trotman says—"Messrs. Fraser and Bell had the land at Caballito for sale, and Mr. Leighton Jordan, our secretary, but their broker sold it to the British Hospital. I questioned the delicacy of this proceeding at a committee meeting."

This paragraph conveys in two respects false impressions. In the first place, as Mr. Trotman was on the Committee of the Hospital at the time of the purchase, and was aware that whilst we were in treaty for it a higher price than that paid by us was offered for it, and of all the circumstances under which it was purchased, he must have known that there could not have been any improper motives either on the part of the seller or on that of any member of the Committee; and therefore his writing in such a manner as to insinuate the existence of improper motives would be inexcusable if it were not that he seems to be unconscious of having made any serious charge, for in reply to some observations which I recently made to him, he said that his letter was nothing more than that to "my dear Greg, about blundering and plundering," which he also informed me "does not prevent Mr. Gladstone and Mr. Disraeli from being very good friends in private."

I do not know that those gentlemen are immaculate models for our imitation, but as Mr. Trotman seems to think that offence ought not to be taken, inasmuch as he only attempted to imitate one of them, I presume he will not object to be publicly told that his insinuation is false. In the second place, Mr. Trotman's "questioning the delicacy of the proceeding" consisted of some observation made by him at a late evening meeting after I had pointed out the delicacy of my position as being a broker as well as Secretary for the Hospital, and for what he then said he freely apologized to me on the following morning, asking me to overlook it on the ground of his having misunderstood the matter in consequence of the ill state of his health. Mr. Trotman ought therefore to have been the last person to publish such insinuations during my absence.

I negotiated the purchase as the representative of the Committee, at considerable personal trouble and some expense, and made no commission, either directly or indirectly, nor in any manner whatever. Mr. Trotman might easily have convinced himself of this before writing to you on the subject. The resolution to purchase was passed unanimously, Mr. Trotman himself being present and voting in favor of it. He afterwards changed his mind regarding the purchase, though a considerably higher price was being offered to us for the land. It was, however, requisite to hold through the summer in order to comply with the terms on which the Fever Fund had been received, and Mr. Trotman's persistent denunciation of the purchase as ruinous could not tend to facilitate a sale at the end of the summer, and thwarted the action of other members of the Committee in their efforts to make some definite arrangements for building a new Hospital on other land.

It is out of place, I think, to be estimating the value of the purchase during a time of crisis such as that from which the money market is now recovering. And also it must be observed that the Hospital had an available cash reserve of \$105,000 beyond what was requisite for the payment for the land, and also a surplus income of \$25,000 a year as estimated on the two preceding years (the surplus for those years being \$55,000 a year, and the interest on the Bonds sold for investment in the land about \$30,000 a year). It was considered that the above cash reserve would be sufficient to meet any falling-off in the balance of income and expenditure, so that the institution could afford to run the risk of its remaining surplus being for some time unproductive.

offer of \$30,000 profit on the land was held by the Committee subject to the determination which might be arrived at by the General Meeting. Those of the subscribers who disapproved of the manner in which the Committee of 1872 invested the funds of the Hospital ought either then to have expressed their opinions or to have ever held their peace. The best considered investments may possibly prove disastrous, but I still trust that the one in question will not prove so.

SANTA FE.

Santa Fe, August 8th. Mr. H. Nolan and Mr. A. Fisher have arrived here from the Alexandria colony, which they report as still in difficulties. Mr. Balfour had an altercation with Mr. H., who threw him over a "barraica," but he is now recovering. He also had a difficulty with Mr. S., whose dog he shot, the transaction winding up in an altercation. It is not true there are now 417 colonists, hardly half that number. There is no Consul or Sub-consul to protect British subjects here. Could you do anything to forward the appointment of Guillermo E. Coelho, Inspector of Colonies, a gentleman speaking English, French, Italian and Spanish, an English subject, educated in the U. States and in every way fitted for such a post, and from whom we have received attention and kindness not easily forgotten. This state with its fertile soil and large agricultural facilities, under a new Governor, and awakening from the lethargy of ages, will probably during the next ten years do wonders, if we only follow up the action of Sarmito in extending telegraphs, railways, schools, public libraries, &c.

ON CHANGE.

These telegrams from London, this day's date, were received to-day, and 13 telegrams sent from here to London on Saturday, to which already 10 answers have been received. This shows pretty clearly what is doing in this line. We heard on "Change" that the managing partner of a leading English house received a most important message from London to-day, but of course we refrained from asking its import, since parties who go to the expense of a message have a right to be the exclusive owners of the news. Respecting market news the most conflicting news were current; we, however, can state for the information of those who are interested in the market, that a leading exporter who holds a message from London of Saturday's date showed us same; it gives hides the same, tallow good, wool firm, but inferior wools down to 10 cents.

The rise announced in the Bank of England rate has apparently affected this market inasmuch as discount brokers report money a shade stiffer, and it is not so easy as last week. National Bonds show another improvement, but Cédulas are very flat, and it looks as if the bears are working the market. Up to 3 o'clock the Provincial Bank board was in session, however at a later hour it was announced that the bank draws for Douro's mails at 48. Amongst exchange brokers it was said that the raising of the Bank rate at home, will put exchange down here.

It was said on "Change" to-day that Queen Victoria's reply to the President's message came through yesterday. The message was:— "I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 21st Dec. 1873, and to thank you for the information it contains. I have the honor to inform you that the Government of the United Kingdom has the pleasure to accept of the loan of 10,000,000 francs, and to guarantee the interest on the same."

Mr. Edward Madro, Bank Commissioner, leaves for Europe this week; he takes with him the new law, which authorizes the sale of the National Bonds and Hypothecation of Provincial Bonds.
