The Douro took an inordinate quantity of specie (£100,000) from Montevideo. We had a laconic letter from a passenger on board. "Douro splendid ship. All well. Rain, Rain, Pours. Will keep my weather eye open. Oriental full. Advise strangers to telegraph for rooms?"

The beet crisis was in full swing yesterday, and everyone falling back on mutton. The Provincial Legislature have taken the matter up, as the discontent amongst the working classes is rising to a dangerous point. A 'capon' can still be bought for \$40 m/c, but beef is now out of the question—\$30 for a small piece that formerly cost \$10. It is believed that the measures to be taken by the Legislature and Municipality will put an end to the beefsteak squeeze before the week is over, meantime there is nothing for it but to fall back on mutton chops and kidneys.

Our Montevideo Letter gives an account of a splendid lecture delivered there on Natural Philosophy by Mr. Gepp, the well known broker. A broker lecturing on Natural Philosophy is a sign of the times, and a good sign too. It is most refreshing to see a member of the 'genio' rising in his leisure hours above Bouds and Pometos, and soaring to the sublimities and wonders of Nature. We should like to see Mr. Gepp's example followed here. There must be many a Newton blushing unseen and wasting his fragrance on the desert air of Cedulas, Bonds, Gas Shares and bills of exchange, in the daily struggle for existence. Alas and Alack! Mammon and that indispensable thing called Daily Bread have clipped the wings of many a genius.

The Cedula market opened very flat this morning, caused by the alarming news from Montevideo. Cedulas were sold to-day at 82 1/2, when but a week ago everyone thought it was easier to put them at 85 than 82 1/2. But the truth is, the news from Paris startled the who's market. Later on in the day when the news was discussed people began to doubt and question the telegram, and at 2 o'clock it was announced that a telegram had come up stating that the message was false; it was even said by some English merchants that the message had been taken down at the Club. The most suspicious circles in Buenos Ayres or Montevideo had received a telegram, and some parties observed, "How could it be possible that French houses here would receive nothing if there was a revolution in Paris?" A well-known exporter received a business message from Europe to-day, but he said that there is not a word about politics, and there is a missing code word in the message which he puzzled his head to supply. It was finally rumored on August 10th that a balance sheet for July has not been published. We hear that Mr. Cuyar is not to blame, having long since sent it in to the Provincial Government.

In the liquidation nothing much done, the sales during business hours reached \$25,500. There is much talk of the National Mortgage Bank project now before congress and its possible effect on the market.

Exchange rate of the day: draws on England at 83 1/2, and something done on Antwerp at 8 1/2. On France, owing to the new business at the moment is still at 100.

The *Piton* entered to-day at Montevideo crowded with passengers. The *Europa* takes, we hear, 1,000 passengers. This will make much cheer.

From the camp to-day we saw several parties who have just come in; they report the camps now in splendid condition; it rained all day on Saturday outside. It is considered that fully half the horned cat of this province is dead, and the cows still are dying. On y at Silito can fatian's be found. The meat question threatens dangerous dimensions.

Thanks to the attention of Mr. Allen, we received to-day the first through telegram from Diores. This is a camp to be regretted.

The number of wagons asked from the North is (railway) by the San Fernando Wharf Co. last week was 44, of which 31 were received.

Notice was posted on 'Change to-day calling for a meeting to-night at Coliseum of the creditors of the Italian retail alcazarrero who failed last week.

Salt. Cargo per Mag Helena sold at 12 1/2 for her.

Cow. A Cañal cargo of Martha sold at 15 1/2.

Pine. No sales. Two cargo arrived to-day.

Butchers are offering 60 m/c for fat capones in the camp, and fat cattle none to be had—700 m/c for fat lean novillos.

In the Plaza some impetuosa sales of sheepskins this morning: 2,000 dozen, various lots, from 20 to 25 c/s. A lot of dry hides, 5,000 lbs at 15. A lot of horse hair, 100 ar at 14. One lot lamb's wool, 500 ar, for 70, and a small lot of mestiza wool, 20 ar, for 75.

In d'subjects there is nothing very new to offer, from the very diminished applications at the Provincial Bank one can judge how very little is doing, first class trade paper the brokers report most scarce.

Mr. T. C. Bennett has opened offices in the Argentine pa sago, for the sale of Stetsons now on sale, the invention is quite new and for its great simplicity of a arrangement, much preferred to the office stamps hitherto in use.

We note by the Montevideo papers that the *Acacia* brought out 300 passengers; from what we see of the arrivals it seems most probable that Mr. Wilcock's prediction respecting the emigration to the Plata this year will be fully verified, that is to say, 10,000 new arrivals in the year. It people want to see anything of the crush of new hands in this city let them go to the most notorious before 8 a. m., (there one can form an opinion of what is going on to-day in B. Ayres).

The week opened with the most stunning news from Paris. The telegram will be found in our telegram column. This news, as far as we can

gather, came to one of the telegraph agencies in Montevideo on Friday or Saturday. All the news in town this morning came from Montevideo. We could see no one who had a direct telegram from Europe, which in presence of such great news seemed strange.

This morning news from Europe has had a decided effect on this market, and people seemed an hour ago to have been in a state of feverish expectancy on any new transaction. Most brokers and merchants think that the news, if true, will rather elicit money in London than otherwise, as the gold market in London has probably probably go over to England for safe keeping, but there are others who look at the affair in a different light, and consider that a revolution in France will disturb everything.

The heavy rain on Saturday checked all the auctions advertised for that day. The rain, however, although bad for auctioneers was good for the farmers.

The beef crisis continues. Meat was just as dear this morning in the market as ever, and spite of all the steps taken, there are hundreds of families in town unable to buy the first present prices; mutation is also dearer than in former times; we hear of a well-known Entre Riano estanciaero who has just made a large contract for the delivery of several thousand head of cattle from Estancia, the contract is one of the best, we have heard of in this line, and some idea of its importance can be gathered from the fact that the estanciaero in question has bought a small steamer to bring over the cows.

The Douro took from Montevideo £100,000 in gold, and the exchange operations in Montevideo for the mail were on a large scale.

The fine Lavarello steamer *Europa* sails on Wednesday for Europe, she is a fast steamer and takes a mail.

Bullari had a C. hold a mail auction to-morrow [Tuesday] at their mart, sheepfarmers take notice.

On Friday a false \$500 m/c bill of the Provincial Bank was presented in this market, and the important feature of the business is that the bill in question is of the new American stamp, with number, water mark, &c. The bank has been duly notified of the forgery, and if the bill is not so well initiated the best plan to adopt is to call up all the \$500 bills; in fact, the public would do well until the matter is cleared up to refuse to take a \$500 Provincial Bank note.

A project for another new Argentine railway is about to be laid before Congress, the line to run from Rosario to San Lorenzo. We question very much if the traffic would be sufficient to support the road. What about the Santa Fe colony railway, begun a year ago?

If any credit is to be reposed in some of the provincial papers, the state of Entre Rios is anything but favourable; the number of Banda Oriental Estancieros living in poverty in the Banda Oriental is so considerable as to inspire suspicion of another outbreak. Why the Entre Riano government does not call all these people back to their homes, and by kind treatment win them from the last Jordan case, we cannot say; but, for, however, a general amnesty, then this constant running fire about impending invasions. The almoncenas and merchants of this city who do business with Entre Rios admit that it is one of the richest provinces in the republic. During the late revolt, with parts closed, and trade cut off, it stopped owing, this market unbroken; yet in only a few months after the war the Entre Riano dealers came down and paid off everything. In fact, Entre Rios now owes nothing in this market. In some Entre Riano districts there has been much of a 'sca' and 'epidemia.' We hear the partido of Gualeguay has suffered something, but not much. The Port Rio Uruguay is now running, which is a great convenience for the people of Gualeguay, the traffic for the month averages about 3,000 tons, which we imagine is sufficient to cover the cost of running the road, but certainly not much more.

To-morrow (Tuesday) the great real estate auction by Don Enrique Rodriguez and Co. will be held at 3 p.m. The promises are about the best in this city for their most central locality, and will be sold without the least reserve.

M. Dudeney, for many years in charge of the French Consulate in this city, will shortly return from Europe. He has been named French Consul to Paraguay, with residence in Buenos Ayres.

Mr. John Oldham, manager of the River Plate Telegraph Co. was welcomed on 'Change to-day, and very warmly congratulated by his numerous friends on his having so successfully terminated the Botini telegraph line, and thus opened communication with Rio Janeiro, and thus with Europe. His telegraph's starting operations we should have had to wait till October messages to Europe, when the missing section of the Platino cable may be expected to be ready for public service.

The last advices from Chile are unfavorable, very constant rains have retarded agriculture to such an extent that the most crops will be in a state of short. The money crisis in Valparaiso still continues, and there were rumors of some large concerns being about to stop; the terrible money crisis in Peru continues and affects the Chilean markets, although the Chilean coast there have been severe storms and numerous small craft went to the bottom. The Pacific telegraph cable from Valparaiso to Panama is a course of construction; once carried out, messages can go from B. Ayres to London over the Atlantic line.

The very fine steamer *Piton*, of the Bannamian line is to sail on Wednesday 19th Aug. She will take a mail and is a fast sailer. She only arrived at the Mount to-day.

To-morrow (Tuesday) at 2 o'clock the bills for the supply of 30,000 capones to the Municipality will be opened, the capon is to be supplied 1000 per day for 30 days. The move is a good one on the part of the board.

Not published paper has attracted greater attention than the petition to Congress by the San Fernando Wharf Co. board; it expresses in a few lines all the serious drawback which provincial industry suffers; and explains the means to remove them; the paper in question has been drawn up with the greatest ability and both Senators and Deputies are said to be of the same opinion as the petitioners, that cheap freights is all that Provincial industry requires to be developed. This will water with first-rate the debate in Congress on the petition.

The Martin Garcia telegraph bill stands over for the present, at the request of a senator who sees in the measure great danger to the Republic should a war take place with the Banda Oriental.

The animals have been bred and reared on Mr. Latham's renowned encamp, and with the special view to supply the sheepfarmers of Buenos Ayres.

In another column will be found the proposed beef and mutton law introduced on Saturday

to the Chamber. The probabilities are that the measure will pass, as there is still much apprehension about our meat supply for the next month. We gather from parts just up from the Mount that beef down there is not so scarce, but a little dearer than last year.

The National Government has accepted the proposal of Mr. Anthony Conolly to construct in the Gran Chaco a lazaretto for the sum of \$12,000,000. Messrs. Fournier Marengo going on a survey. We believe the place for the building is somewhere in front of Corrientes.

The *Boletín Oficial* of Saturday publishes the decree of the National Government approving of the statutes of the Compañia Railway, as presented by M. Boyd Thompson, and specifying that the legal residence of the company must be in Buenos Ayres—where not a single share is held.

The Custom-house authorities publish notice that Messrs. R. Muir and Co. having proven that they paid the duties sought to be recovered, they discharge the claim made against said firm. In Saturday's *Boletín*, however, we notice that the Contaduria publishes notices of various foreign houses that having failed to pay the duties demanded were put, or now about to be proceeded against for the respective amounts. This is most unpleasant Custom-house question seems interminable.
