SILK GROWING.

Mr. Oldendorf, the indefatigable director of the Department of Agriculture has addressed a circular to the principal agriculturists and officials in the Provinces, calling their attention to the importance of growing silk in this country. He has drawn up with much care a printed form of instructions, which can be obtained gratis at his office, detailing in full the nature of silk-worms, their treatment, food &c., and the manner of obtaining the silk.

The climate is found by experience to be most favorable for this industry, which is extremely lucrative and only requires delicate and constant care, besides a regular supply of mulberry leaves or castor oil plant. Messrs. Botet and others of Barracas used to have hundreds of silk-worms some 15 years ago, and probably many of our readers know of small collections of these useful insects in one or other part of the Republic. In Lombardy a woman or couple of children is able to look after thousands of silk-worms without interfering with their ordinary occupation of cheese-making. The same care that you would bestow on a canary or a pet rabbit would suffice to bring in a valuable addition to the household revenue by means of silk-worms. It is only 20 years since they were first introduced into California, and last year when an epidemic occurred in Lombardy shipments of cocoons or caterpillars were made from San Francisco to a great value, as they were cheaper and better than those brought from Japan to Europe.

Private enterprise in B. Ayres is so accustomed to follow in a beaten track that we can hardly expect to see a joint-stock company for Silk-growing established. Some months ago we heard that Mr. Gentili's institution at Palermo was doing well, the silk worms turning out very healthy and giving a good return of silk. It was even stated that one of our wealthy capitalists had Argentine silk sent to Paris and made into a dress for his wife.

The political excitement of the past twelve months has thrown into oblivion such quiet workers and unselfish manufacturers as silk-worms, but we should be glad to see this new class of immigrants receive the kindest attention and hospitality in B. Ayres. We cannot expect that Government will take them by the hand, or pass special laws to assist their introduction in large numbers; they have, however, one advantage in their favor, that although the most active and industrious inhabitants in the country they pay no taxes and their produce is free of export duty.

Silk will never be able to compete with wool as an article of general use. Hence the sheep-farmers need not feel jealous if half the silk-worms of Lombardy come out to B. Ayres. If the Government were to set apart the old mansion of Santa Catalina for their reception the place would answer admirably for such a colony. Many of the idle boys who at present infest our streets might be trained up to this useful occupation, and learn from the example of the silk-worms that labor is happiness, that a community of such industrious workers require neither alcaldes nor policemen, and that each of us in quietly attending to our business, like the little silk-worms, at the same time produces much benefit to society at large.

The simple mention of this project causes a thrill of horror among all who lost friends or relatives during the dreadful plagues of 1867 and 1871. The Riachuelo in those periods poisoned the waters of the River Plate, covering the shore from Palermo to Buenos Ayres with putrid fish, and contaminating our population by the unhealthy water supplied for city use. No wonder 20,000 people died, and when the Government closed the saladeros it was only in obedience to the united demand of the public and the unanimous decision of scientific men. Since then we have not had more sickness. The bank of corruption at the mouth of the Riachuelo which was formed of saladero offal has been gradually carried out to sea, and the river at Barracas is as free from 'agua de cola' or blood as it

was twenty years ago. If ever the Government allow it to be otherwise, or suffer any manner of filth to be thrown into the Riachuelo, we may confidently count on another epidemic.

Mr. Senator Lanus has presented a bill in the Provincial Legislature to allow saladeros to be again established on the south side of the river at Barracas, provided they throw nothing solid or liquid into the Riachuelo. The discovery of patent guano, as practised at Silveira's saladero at Moron, making an article of export worth £11 a ton what was before a source of pestilence; takes away the only great objection there can be to saladeros, the immediate locality of which is notoriously salubrious. Moreover Mr. Lanus provides that it shall be always permitted to convey all solid or liquid residua out to sea, say as far as Capo Corrientes, thus avoiding all possibility of infection. Inspectors will be named and heavy penalties decreed, to prevent the killing-ground in each saladero from infecting the neighborhood, all the process of killing, drying and packing being subjected to rigid health regulations. No pigs to be allowed within a league of Barracas. The Riachuelo is to be dredged and canalized, out of the money lying in Bank and intended for the Bateman port. The law of September, 1871, is to be repealed, and Mr. Lanus then thinks that the killing of cattle in Buenos Ayres which used to average 500,000 head, and has fallen to one-half, will recover its former figure, a conclusion which we very much doubt after the recent mortality of cattle in the camp.

LA PEST FROM U. STATES.

Nathan Isaacson of Chicago has been arrested for the recent fire. It seems he had the day before offered \$100 to one Wolfson to set fire to a house. The total loss by the fire does not exceed 6 million dollars, whereas the great fire of 1871 cost 150 million.

Pres. Grant attended the regatta at Saratoga, which was won by the Columbia college (N. York) out-rigger. Mr. W. Draping of Brooklyn fell on a circular saw and was cut in two. Mr. Carman of Long Island was struck by a flash of lightning. Mrs. Dehart died at Harrisburg, aged 102, leaving 130 children and grand-children; she had been blind 20 years. Mr. Buckner of Brooklyn went out shooting on the 17th to Coney Island, and brought home his wife and children, but getting off the wagon his gun went off, killing him. A collision occurred on the Erie railway, 11 killed or wounded. Another on the North Columbus line, 10 sufferers. Mrs. Sarah Jones of Georgia has died aged 94, regretted by 400 of her posterity. In Philadelphia a little boy named Charlie Ross aged 4 years, has been stolen and the robbers demand \$20,000 or they will send the child's remains to his parents; the city is in consternation at so daring an outrage.

Capt. Thomas has received the Gold Medal of the Royal Humane Society, and his officers and men silver medals, for saving the passengers of the Europe steamer. The New York Herald has put on a special express train for delivering its papers on Sundays on the Saratoga route by 10 a.m. The comet is disappearing. The number of mad dogs has given great trouble lately. The Mexican Budget for 1874-75 is as follows:—

(This is the same amount as the Argentine Budget with the sole difference that in Mexico the army absorbs half the revenue, while our heaviest expouditure is in railways.)

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The weather mended yesterday forenoon, after a fearful night of cats, dogs and pitchforks, and every one cheered up. It is most fervently to be hoped that we have seen the last of the 'agua' for this season, as any more of it will ruin everything. In many parts of the camp inland seas have formed, and it will take a month for the water to disappear. Nevertheless, the rain storms of the past fortnight have proved a great blessing to the River Plate, as, if they had not come, the country would have gone to the dogs.

Next Tuesday, the Feast of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin, will be a strict holiday. Our German colleague the Zeitung says that Buenos Ayres is infested with more of the rat tribe than any civilized city on the face of creation, and recommends the inhabitants to take measures for destroying them. The Zeitung gives cogent reasons for its very good advice, viz, that it has lately been discovered in Germany that rats frequently carry the worst diseases from one house or district to another. In one Austrian town 600 persons recently died from disease of the spleen, proved to have been imported by a colony of rats from another neighborhood, the animals themselves also dying in hundreds and thousands from the same malady. Our colleague recommends, as the simplest way of poisoning the 'rat-ones,' the administration of bread pills, in each of which an 'anguis in herba' in the shape of three lucifer match heads should be put. The question is, if we poison the rats

wholesale, will not their carcasses rotting under ground help to start more fatal diseases than spleen?

The whole town was talking yesterday of how Mr. Benjamin Garcia, like Shylock, 'did dream of money bags to-night,' and his prodigious slice of Standard luck in its coming out true. Editors never dream, or we might have retired long ago on the 70,000 ounces. This wonderful piece of luck of Mr. Garcia's has set all the 'Bulls,' 'Bears' and brokers dreaming, not exactly of lottery tickets, but of the ebb and flow of Cedulas and other professional matters. Very matter-of-fact people pool-dream, but Mr. Garcia's is by no means the first or most extraordinary which has proved true to the letter: he did well to 'trust the flattering truth of sleep,' and the numerous friends who congratulated him yesterday on his good fortune saw with pleasure that his 'bosom's lord sat lightly in his throne.'

It may interest those of our Scotch readers who have not yet received late papers from home to learn that the Bill for the Abolition of Lay Patronage in the Church of Scotland passed its third reading in the House of Commons on the 3rd of August, having previously passed the House of Lords, in which Chamber the Dukes of Richmond and Argyll made eloquent speeches in its favour.

We find the following paragraph in a recent exchange from home:—'Memento and relic-hunters across the Atlantic are as indefatigable as Old World tourists to Egypt or Rome. The visitors to Mr. Sumner's house have become so unparading that it has become necessary to close the house to save it from being carried off bodily. One day the person in charge of the house had all the buttons cut from his dress coat by a party of ladies and gentlemen, who found the coat lying on a bed, and supposed it to have been Mr. Sumner's.'

The first announcement on the Bolshal at Montevideo of the Lavarello steamer North America, with 600 immigrants, after a magnificent run out of 20 days. This go-ahead steamer is worthy of her name; in fact, in point of fast trips the Lavarello line is now first on the list. Six hundred new hands will pull up the Immigration returns a bit.

The Anales de Agricultura for this month is very readable. In its leader, on Combing Wools, it recommends River Plate sheep-breeders to devote more of their attention to raising that class of wool, predicting that they would soon run Australia, the Cape and every other country, out of the great wool markets of the world. It also recommends those who intend exporting horses to England to send a good proportion of mares, as the prejudice against using them in this country is quite unknown in Europe.

The first performance of the second 'temporada' at the Colon Theatre was given on Thursday evening; El Guanyay was the opera-chosen; and Sr. Mariani was in splendid voice, fairly electrifying the audience by her beautiful rendering of the music in the early part of the second act. Sr. Bultrini requires rest; no voice, however fresh it may be, will resist the continued strain that this singer places upon his. The company possess another and most efficient tenor in Sr. Piccoli. Why don't we see more of him?

The Argentine Navy is beginning to cut quite an imposing figure, at least on paper. A morning colleague gives the following list of its ships:—'Two ironclads, 6 gunboats, fourteen steamers, four brigs, two barques, and several launches—in all over 30 vessels. It is right to add that the two ironclads and four of the gunboats are still only 'building,' and that some of the other vessels are classed as useless.

The recent storms have done but little damage in port or on land. Nevertheless, we perceive that the rains have washed away part of the funeral Bernejo station, and left the rest of it in a dangerous condition. Everything connected with the burial of departed citizens seems out of gear just now. The Obacarita Cemetery is dangerously overcrowded, yet the P. G. takes little heed of the matter, in spite of the repeated communications of the Lord Mayor on this very grave subject.

Our sporting readers will learn with regret that the Races announced to come off at Lanuz on Tuesday next have been postponed. A 'chef-d'orchestre' out of place has counted the number of notes in Meyerbeer's opera of the Huguenots. He says they amount to 43,720, excluding the overture.

The Prensa published some extremely unpleasant figures yesterday respecting the state of Education in this country. There are, according to the census, 468,987 children in the country, and of these only 97,687 are at school. After all the efforts made and money spent to push on education in recent years, the result is rather lame; but we suspect it is more the fault of the people themselves than of their rulers.

Rossi, the great actor, is now performing at Prague. He created a tremendous sensation one night by introducing a song—La Calunnia, from Rossini's Barber—which he sang with a perfection that astounded the audience.

A new prima donna, destined, say the New York papers, to 'take the shine' off Patti, Alhapi and all the other 'Queens of Song,' is a young native of the Sandwich Islands, a member of one of its oldest and most illustrious cannibal families. She is studying at Milan, having the most wonderful soprano voice ever heard

on earth, and an equally wonderful name—Kurukapukupukukukukurukuriky, which, in English, signifies Solitary Bird.

The new Provincial Bank of Santa Fe was opened at Rosario on Tuesday last. The Gete Politico represented Governor Bayo on the occasion, and made an appropriate speech, to which Mr. Ledesma, president of the bank, responded with a few remarks; he referred in felicitous terms to Providence, the Province, peace, patriotism, 'el pueblo,' 'el pais,' and prosperity. There was a champagne blow-out in the saloon parlour afterwards, and 'various señores' went in for oratory.

The most important thing out in Rosario is a project for a railway between that place and the capital of the province, running through the colonies. It is said that Mr. Fermin Laprade, when last in Europe, made arrangements with some financial houses to take up this and other projects. Another piece of news from old Rosario is the kicking out of that time-honored coin, the 'Boliviano,' from mercantile transactions, 'la-haute commerce' having signed an agreement that all sales shall in future be made in patacons: All the world aid his spouse intend going to the Athletic Sports at Roldan on Tuesday next. The local Inspector of Colonias has sent in his report, which, the Capital says, isn't worth a fig, nor encouraging for the future of the colonies.

The Cordoba papers say that it is almost certain that President Sarmiento will go up there to inaugurate the first section of the Tucuman Railway, adding that the President elect and other high personages will accompany His Excellency. The trial trip along the section now completed will take place to-morrow, and the official inauguration in the course of the week.

We read of a desperate scuffle between two Irishmen in a shop at Carmen de Areco on Monday last. Blood flowed like water, but only fists were used in the affray. Mr. Duffy gave a grand 'tertulia' at the 'Good-humoured Club' on Sunday. Smashing street-lights is now the favourite nightly diversion at Areco.

An Italian living in San Telmo parish has discovered a new coin, in which to pay lawyers. The Ligurian in question employed a hub of law to procure him a divorce from his wife. The case failed, but the lawyer sent in a bill for \$3,500 mg. The Italian, having no 'tin,' offered to give his wife instead, which was accepted, and the poor creature taken away by the man of quibbles. The police heard of it and made him surrender the injured woman, who is now suing in her turn for a divorce, and we hope she will get it.

A Missouri paper says that it has been proposed in the Legislature of that State to pass an Act punishing by fine any pauper who shall inflict himself upon a town where he does not belong, and suggests that in case such an Act be passed, it shall provide that the salaries of the legislators will be paid out of the revenue derived from the payment of the fines levied on the paupers.

We had a visit yesterday from an old friend and subscriber, Mr. Boden, of the remote Province of Salta, who has been recently home to Germany and arrived here per Niger. He says the climate of the Salta valleys is delightful, especially near Palermo, the estancia of Mr. Letter of Alpaca celebrity. There are not many foreigners in the Province. Mr. Patrick Fleming and his nephew reside in the city of Salta.

An amateur 'Marionette' performance got up by private families and admission to which was by invitation only was to come off at the Recreo Theatre last night.

Dr. Iriart of Montevideo, one of the most eminent physicians of the day, says that 'acido fenico' is a certain remedy for group and mild diphtheria. The doctors in the sister city have held most interesting discussions on the new remedy.

No steamer from Montevideo yesterday, no Letter, no papers, no news. Indeed there was nothing new from any quarter yesterday, and the day was rather a dull one. The news from Europe to Sept. 1st was not generally looked on as serious, though some say that the resuscitation of the Schleswig Holstein question will lead to trouble sooner or later. Our readers may remember that Prussia annexed Schleswig in the war against Denmark (1864), the pretext having been that the school-masters taught the children Danish instead of German. The telegram announces that Germany has now expelled the Danish inhabitants, who form two-thirds of the population. Schleswig comprises a territory 100 miles long by 75 wide, being bounded on the north by the Konge A river and Jutland, and on the south by the Holstein canal. The country is well dammed and wooded, abounding in dairy-farms, beautifully sluiced and irrigated. The inhabitants are a mixture of nationalities, who talk Danish, Frisian and German. The capital city of Schleswig has only 11,600 inhabitants: it was for 600 years the greatest port of Denmark, but got blocked up with sand. The King of Denmark was Duke of Schleswig, the duchy being exactly the size of the County Cork, and having 396,000 inhabitants, now added to the German Empire.

IMPORTANT FROM THE CAMP.

General Lavalle and Partido of Ajo, Aug. 15, 1874. To the Editors of the STANDARD, Dear Sirs.

It is upon the slender chance of your ever receiving this, through the medium of that wonderful pay-your-money-take-your-chance institution mis-called the General Post-Office of the Argentine Republic, that I indite these lines, giving you a few of the passing events in this far off corner of the Province. It is very seldom that we see, in the few and far-between of your interesting impressions that come our way, any communications from this locality, which, considering its comparative importance to others which appear more frequently represented in your columns, is much to be wondered at, and at same time deprecated. In the meantime I would endeavour to initiate a correspondence, from time to time according to the state of the newsmarket, by giving you at present a few of the most interesting details incidental to the camp and town life of the Far South.

To begin with the camp, as being the vital source from which must spring the prosperity or adversity of land, I might expatiate at length on the terrible losses experienced by all the Stockholders in sheep and cattle, of the many who have been brought to ruin, and various other incidents relative to the dreadful two years passed, two such years as have never been experienced in these southern camps, but it would only be a waste of time and space to do so, seeing how universal the epidemic has been this year; enough to say that the hard times are apparently happily drawing to a close. Within the last month or so we have been mercifully visited by frequent and copious showers of rain, followed by unexpected and extraordinary mild weather for the season, thereby giving good promise of a genial spring. So mild has been the weather of the past week as to induce nature to deceive itself and put forth bud and blossom, and even little mischievous mosquitos to bite. The camps are recovering somewhat of their faded glories, and are now in good condition, plenty of pasture, sufficient water for present purposes, with every prospect

put in, but it was requisite to have a few more opportunities to wet their parched throats before the contract was finally given to a relative of one of the honorable corporation.

The upshot of it is, that the dry season, when the job could have been done with the greatest ease, was allowed to pass and nothing done, and now that the wet weather has set in, nothing can be done. Everybody who has an interest in the town has become quite disgusted with the manner in which the Municipal Affairs are carried on, the authorities being, from the Justice of the Peace down to the poorest paid policeman, all of a bunch, each and all apparently endeavouring to do the least they can for the public benefit.

Our honorary Justice of the Peace Mr. Ezekiel Real de Azua is, as our American cousin would say, "all gas," but it is seldom that he allows his light to shine in our Justice Hall, as being too small for his illuminating qualities, he prefers to hide it amongst the other luminaries of the capital. His present substitute, though a thorough gentleman, is, in public opinion, quite incapable for the duties of a Justice from his over mild disposition, as he would rather pay a disputed debt out of his own pocket than sit and listen to two litigants call each other rogues.

There is, however, not lacking one, who in singleness of heart no doubt, but with an eye to business, has graciously offered to relieve him of his onerous duties, proposing himself as a fit and proper "man for the wheel" of municipal affairs. He hides his time.

Apart from all judicial or municipal affairs, the present hard times have been sorely felt in the commercial interests of the town, several houses of business having had to suspend operations, and there is no saying how many more may have to follow suit. The saladeros (five in number) with the exception of the two belonging to Sr. Luro, have been in settled idleness for some length of time, thus affecting to the utmost the welfare of the town, for on them alone can it depend for its subsistence, and though now a "free port" little advantage has as yet accrued to it as such, from the great dearth of saladero produce. Communication with the capital has sensibly slackened with the hard times from want of traffic in goods and passengers, and in respect of the "galeras," from want of horse flesh. Where formerly we had three "galeras" per week, now we have only one about once a fortnight; but with the brightened prospects we look forward to a steady improvement, and hope soon to be in daily communication with your city, seeing how far advanced the Dolores extension of the Southern Railway is towards completion.

Finding that I have protracted this letter to an unintentional length, and fearing to encroach any further on your valuable space, I would here close, trusting rather at some other time to give you a continuation of the same.

the point jutting out from this mainland, wish to convey our most grateful thanks to yourself, as well as to the officers of your ship, for the orderly and energetic manner in which we were landed under the most trying circumstances, and released from apprehension of danger.

"At the same time we cannot let this occasion pass without expressing our most sincere thanks for the unwearied care and attention that has been paid to everyone during the three days we have been encamped waiting for assistance from Montevideo; not only for our personal comforts that have been individually cared for, but also for the attention paid in the handling and guarding our baggage since the accident.

ROBBERIES. To the Editors of the STANDARD, Gentlemen, I have always been of opinion that the numerous robberies committed in this city are owing more to the manner in which the policemen are placed than to the want of vigilance on the part of the latter: a "vigilante" has to watch a whole "manzana," which he cannot do in a proper manner, hence the facility for committing crime. While he is going his rounds, thieves may very easily find an opportunity to stop and rob a passenger; nay, even, a house may be broken into and its valuables disposed of before the peeler, who has been detained round the corner by some disciple of Bacchus, has time to come to the rescue, and very frequently before he knows anything at all about it!

How often do we walk in the evening ten or twelve "cuadras" without meeting a single policeman! yet, there is one on every block; but by some curious coincidence they are all just then in another street. As this happens but too often, we must not be astonished that people are robbed in the most frequented streets, and that the thief makes good his escape. Now, I don't pretend to be acquainted with the management of the Police Departments of any of the countries whose customs we are so fond of imitating here! but methinks that simpler and more efficacious measures might be adopted, and which would require very few, if any more, men to carry out.

Why not place a policeman to watch two "cuadras" in a straight line? By this means he would have his charge continually under his view; and it would be impossible for any robberies to be committed without his knowledge; at least, it would put a stop to some of the daring outrages, the reading of the accounts of which strikes one with horror.

Thus the policeman in charge of the caring of Standard Court, would then, instead of having to go down Calle San Martin, up Cuyo, round Florida and down Cangallo to San Martin again, have to walk from the corner of Calle Piedad to that of Cuyo. But as I have already taken up too much of your valuable time, I shall close this by saying that as the system speaks for itself it needs no commenting.

In last night's Standard there appeared a very stiff article respecting the Mortgage Bank, and the right of the directors to restrict the mortgage to twenty five per cent of the property offered. The question is an open debated one on the Bolsa, and it looks very like, after all, as it will be carried by the legislature, since there is an immense interest at stake in the question at issue, and should it so fall out that the legislature interposes in the matter and orders the Bank to advance in Colóns 50 per cent of the value of real estate offered, the price of the stock on the market will be very materially affected.

The new Spanish colony that has arrived in Entre Rios comes with land belonging to the Estero de San Juan. The Provincial Government has extended the time for the payment of the Contribution Directiva in the camp for the term of fifteen days, which really amounts to nothing, in so much as it is impossible for the estancieros to move about for the next two months; horses are a scarce on the estancias as meat was in the market here a month ago, and as we mentioned in our last, even the bullock carts are at a stand-still throughout the camp. The bullocks having all died, everything is carried now to the railway stations in horsecarts, and the horses are so weak that two leagues a day is considered a journey. With things in this state in the camp, of a course fifteen days time for the payment of Contribution amounts to nothing; at least six months should be granted to estancieros.

The Havas and Reuter Telegraph Agency has opened Offices in the Argentine Passage, and has adopted a new system of secure custody, by enclosing in Europe all the houses out here through their correspondents in the different European cities and markets; thus the houses here are receiving circulars from that agency of their having been enrolled by their agents at home, and "notions volantes" are registered as belonging to said agency. The present prices charged are simply monstrous, and the cheapest message that can be sent to Europe by this telegraph agency is 16 patacons for two words. The first word costs 13 pata, and stand, for the address, whilst the second word taken from the second code may embrace a long message.

Congress has passed a law for the payment of all claims arising out of the war with Brazil in 1825. The claims, when proven, will be paid in National Bonds, but as far as we can gather, there will be no necessity of any new emission, since there still exist in the Treasury some two millions, voted last year but never emitted. There seems no truth whatever in the rumor that Brazil has lent, or is about to lend, half a million of patacons to Paraguay; at least the Minister in Rio said so in the Chambers the other day. A very long debate took place in the Brazilian Parliament on the subject of the Church Bolivian Railway. The House rejected the proposed guarantee.

The Provincial Senate has at last taken up the long pending question of the Parana islands. It seems that they number from 300 to 400, and the House is in favor of granting the fee simple title to all the present occupants, which is certainly about the right thing to do, as all those poor people in the islands have had to undergo immense hardships, suffering every privation, and whatever they have, they have indeed well earned.

It was rumored on "Change to-day" that an important contract for new wool has just been concluded, but the terms etc. are so reserved that we are in doubt to believe the business amounts to nothing. Extreme reservation in business matters is a very objectionable, unless the business is of a nature to suffer by publication. Generally speaking, a regular business transaction is in nothing injured by being published in the newspapers.

It was freely said this afternoon that to-day or to-morrow Governor Acha's resignation, and Colonel Alvarez Buroc's resignation, as governor "Pro-tem." The change is a most important one for politicians. Colonel Alvarez was last year a broker on the Bolsa, so the gremio has reason to be proud of the change.

Some shares of the Hygienic Company are offering, also of the Popular Argentine. Both stocks pay good dividends, and were at a handsome premium, still no buyers are offering. The model of a wire tramway is now on exhibition at the warehouse of Messrs. D. C. Thompson & Co., Reconquista. The invention is certainly most ingenious, and as well as we can recollect a privilege for running a wire tramway out to the outer roads was granted some years ago, but no action was taken in the matter. The model is very nice, but suggests queer notions about going out to the outer roads in a ponderous basket; what a prospect is certainly preferable.
