IMPORTANT FROM EUROPE.

(From Rio Papers). London Oct. 3rd.

Tremendous explosion on the other side of the Thames this morning, in a factory; 10 persons killed and five wounded, one mortally; building blown up and damages enormous.

Berlin papers say there is no longer any danger of a rupture with Denmark, as the Parliament of that country is going to study the Schleswig Question.

Tone of Copenhagen press more moderate. St. Petersburg advices say that China is marching in force to Central Asia, it is supposed to confront the Russians.

Strike of Scotch miners over; masters granted a slight increase of wages.

London 4th. Immense sensation here when it was known that General Mitre headed the revolution in Buenos Ayres.

Another Loan for South America spoken of. Profits of Western and Brazilian Telegraph Company already reach 6 per cent per annum.

London 5th. Public agitation in Copenhagen; renewed demands that Prussians be expelled from Denmark.

Times reviews financial situation of England unfavorably, and says that the Budget for the year will show an excess of expenses over income, a result that no one could have anticipated.

The builders of the Brazilian frigate Independence ask for £30,000 more to finish her. They offered the policies of insurance as security, but the Brazilian Minister had no instructions to settle the question, and the works on the ship are stopped.

A mansion is being prepared in Piccadilly for Bazaine, who is going to settle down in London.

Madrid, 5th. Bolsa more animated. The Iberia says that if things don't go better soon with the Army of the North, Serrano himself will assume the command.

Sublime Porte going to recognise Spain. Virginus question settled. Damage done by storm in Catalonia over ten millions reals.

Battle imminent at Navarra. Carlists fortified Urgel. Government troops reinforced by 12,000 men. Italian Minister expected to-day.

English and French Ministers received yesterday by Serrano. Berlin, 2nd. Empress Eugenie ordered to Italy. King Victor Emmanuel ordered magnificent fetes in his honor.

Para, Oct. 5th. Chief of Police arrived from Macapa with the assassins of the two Portuguese and their accomplices in custody.

Montevideo, Oct. 13th. Entered—Rubens from London, Brazilian gunboat Mage, and German brigantine Aleda from Bremen.

Denda Interna 60 for end of month, 61 end of November, 62 December. Exchange the same. 2,000 dry hides classified American sold at \$9, and 4000 at 81 dispatched. Telegraph wires again interrupted at Yaguarun.

Rios, for some time editor of the Nacional, a very fine fluent speaker and writer.

War—Dr. Adolfo Alsina, late Vice-president of the Republic, previously Governor of Buenos Ayres, son of the Oficiado de Cambios, author of Dr. Valentín Alsina, who made the Rural Code. He fought under General Mitre at Cepeda, and is the only one of the new Cabinet who has visited Europe.

During the absence of Don Felix Frias the portfolio of Foreign Affairs is to be held by Dr. Pardo, brother of the gentleman who owns a delightful quinta at Caballito, being a doctor by profession.

The Rosario papers contain a Laguna Larga, Thursday night (8th inst).—We are marching on Cordoba.

Arredondo has left that city. Arredondo has taken Rio Cuarto.

Arredondo's garrison fled from there. Baigorria is marching on Rio Quinto.

Arredondo is probably gone to Mendoza. Baigorria has sent couriers to Riojas and Mendoza.

Carlos Paz could get no good of the traitors and cowards in Cordoba; he was in hiding.

Governor Bayo of Santa Fe arrived on Thursday 8th at Rosario with 2 battalions and 2 field-pieces. He will make Rosario his headquarters till the war is over.

The steamer Goya conveyed to Rosario 830 saddles or 'recados' for the mobilized cavalry.

When Governor Bayo landed at Rosario he mounted his charger, and with a band of music before, and his aides-de-camp Salva, Rosas, Araya, &c. on either side, made his entry by Calle del Puerto, followed by the battalions of Colonels Bazo and Fernandez, which proceeded to take up their quarters at Sastre's barna, Plaza Lopez.

A band of music will play every evening in Paseo Artega. As the troops have no arms Col. Nelson proceeds to the B. Ayres to procure same from the B. Government.

The Republic publishes a letter from Rufino Elizalde and Captain Magnasco with five boxes of muskets, revolvers and cartridges. General Mitre had established his headquarters at the house of Don Trifon Ordoñez, where all the arms, &c., were deposited.

The gunboat Paraná took in coals by means of Lanus's steamer Gaucho, on the 1st instant, having landed 40 of her prisoners on San Gabriel island, and leaving Colonia again on Saturday, 3rd October. Next day the Saturno again arrived, with General Gelly-Obes, Captain Magnasco and some of Major Winter's cavalry. A whaleboat which plied with stone from San Gabriel to Colonia landed the 40 men of the Paraná captives, who were kindly treated by the people of Colonia.

The house of Ordoñez commands a fine view of the River Plate, and General Mitre used to sit in the balcony, smoking.

Dr. Adolfo Alsina, as Chairman of Congress, addressed the new President when he had taken the oath, in a lengthened speech of which the peroration was as follows:—

"The situation imposes serious duties: to restore public order, suppress anarchy, and re-establish the blessings of peace. You must seek the necessary elements only in the Constitution, resort to penal laws, punish traitors, and put down rebellion.

Congress will stand by you, and vote the necessary supplies. Public opinion will strengthen you. The hand of Divine Providence will guide you. The Republic will be saved, and the edifice of our nationality unshaken.

And when happy times come again will be able to turn your attention to railways, telegraphs, harbors, and international questions, getting the locomotive of the State again on the right track, developing the resources of the country, with God for your light, the Constitution in your safe-keeping, and your own conscience as your guide."

The Judge of the Comandante of Lincoln has joined the revolution, as well as a gentleman named Henestrosa who is at the head of 100 of Coliqueo's Indians. Several people have arrived at Rojas, much alarmed.

Colonel Angel Plaza Montero sent a letter on Monday to the new President, by Major Bonorino, assuring His Excellency of the cordial wishes of the San Vicente division.

Colonel Alvarez, Chief of Police at Rosario, had 2,000 men on parade who fired a feu-de-joie the moment the telegram arrived from Buenos Ayres that Dr. Avellaneda had entered the Congress-Hall to take the oath as President.

Among the persons who sent congratulatory telegrams to Pres. Avellaneda on Monday were the following:—Governor Bayo of Santa Fe, Governor Espelera of Entre Rios, Col. Gordillo of Villa Maria, Col. Roca, from Zavalla, Vice-Governor Zavalla of Sta. Fe, Col. Monteseo of Belgrano, Col. Plaza Montero of S. Vicente, Col. Candoreo of Rosario, Col. Nelson of Rosario, Dr. Moreno, Mayor of Rosario, Judge Alvarez of Rosario, Dr. Turque.

Attorney-general Barco of Cordoba, Captain Apolinario Ipola of Cordoba, Colonel Vivanco, Gefe of Frayle Muerto, The Justice of Peace of San Vicente, The Captain of the Port at Tigre, The Rector of the National College, Rosario,

—Major Carnicero of San Lorenzo, —Calzada, Port-captain of Rosario. —Lopez, Chief of National Office, Rosario, —Mendez, Port-captain of Goya.

Colonel Roca telegraphs that 21 of Lacoche's battalion have left Arredondo and joined his forces near Villa Maria.

(From the Nacional) The new President, Dr. Avellaneda, sent a bill before Congress to make the late President, Dr. Sarmiento, a Brigadier General.

The Montevideo Government has sent forces to Colonia to prevent any breach of neutrality by Argentine refugees.

Gen. Arredondo, by latest accounts, was somewhere in the Sierras de Cordoba, in direction of Rio Cuarto, at Tegua.

A battalion of Nat. Guards was kept to-day under arms at the Cabildo, by way of precaution.

One of Arredondo's men arrived at San Nicolas with news that he was crossing from Rio Cuarto to the frontiers of B. Ayres, but that he was badly off for horses.

The gunboat Parana put into Rio Grande for repairs, but was ordered to leave by the Brazilian authorities.

One Montevideo paper, the Siglo, says General Mitre has left Colonia since last week; the Democracia says he is still there.

Don Florencio Escardó, the author of a Birds-eye View of Buenos Ayres, is named private secretary to General Mitre.

The University students are forming a battalion of 150 youths, under the command of Dr. Alem.

General Rivas's vanguard arrived at Proyer, Western Railway, on Monday evening, and this morning Colonel Campos marched out from Mercedes to fight him.

A Plenipotentiary is to be at once accredited to Montevideo.

Messrs. Querencia, of Montevideo, contradict any alliance between General Gelly-Obes and Lopez Jordan to invade Entre Rios.

Pres. Avellaneda's first telegram was to England (probably informing the British Government of his installation), after which the wires were busy conveying news to other parts.

Dr. Adolfo Alsina left this morning for headquarters at Mercedes, and will return to-night.

Two field-pieces have been mounted in front of the Nat. Government House.

Gen. Arredondo writes from Mercedes, 24th ult., as follows:—

"The forces on this frontier as well as the people of Rio Cuarto, San Luis and Mendoza have had to mutiny because the President sent an order to imprison their commanders.

"The rising was not to take place till October 12th, but now they proclaim me their leader.

Ivanowski and Pano have been arrested and are in keeping of a trusty officer. I also directed Roca to be tied, and word sent to Sarmiento that he was shot, to make the old man crazy.

If Roca escape me I go to Cordoba to be there on the 12th for 5,000 men that Taboada has promised me.

There will be no fighting, and before the end of October we shall meet in Buenos Ayres."

DEPARTMENT OF ENGINEERS.

The public of all nationalities and shades of opinion will learn with satisfaction that the Senate of Congress has revoked the hasty decision of the Chamber of Deputies abolishing the Department of Engineers.

Such a step could not have been attempted in any monarchy of Europe, and it would be a strange exemplification of Republican liberties if a body of eminent scientific men and public servants could be suddenly dismissed, without any trial, with an imputation upon their honor, and a badge of infamy in the very decree of Congress.

It has indeed been the habit for some years in B. Ayres to circulate all manner of damaging reports against all and every person connected with the Government. Most people are impressed with the idea that jobbery pervades every department of public service, which is manifestly incorrect; although it is impossible to make, as Pres. Sarmiento says, an administration of purely saints and philosophers.

There are numbers of men who have been either Ministers of Finance, Accountant-Generals or the like, who have barely enough to maintain a decent livelihood, and who neither spend money freely nor have accumulated a fortune, although for years in the public service.

It is not to be wondered if similar reports are constantly circulated regarding the Department of Engineers, and possibly with as little foundation as against the general run of Cabinet Ministers. At all events it is, according to law and common-sense, unjust to condemn any man or body of men without trial, and nothing can be easier than to arraign Messrs. Moueta, Lindmark, Dahlquist and the other engineers, if there be any well-founded charge against them.

The Chamber of Deputies seemed to reverse the usual order of things, and would condemn them first, then try them afterwards.

Governor Castro said very truly, that engineers are the hope of a new country, and we might almost afford to do without Deputies rather than without Engineers. It is by all means essential that they be men of high standing in their profession, and of at least average integrity. Meantime it is not by casting wholesale aspersions upon a Department that we are likely

to get first-class men to do our public work, and until Buenos Ayres can count twenty eminent native engineers we cannot consider ourselves independent of such men as Moueta, Lindmark and their subordinates.

The decision of the Senate is an act of justice that retrieves the reputation of the Argentine Congress and people.

BUENOS AYRES CRICKET CLUB.

The half-yearly general meeting of this Club was held at the headquarters of the Amateur Fencing and Gymnastic Club, 123 Calle Florida, on Thursday, the 8th inst., Mr. Donald Bridgett, the Vice-President, in the chair.

On the minutes of the previous meeting being confirmed and the report of the Committee being read, Mr. W. White proposed, seconded by Mr. Pilling, that the latter be approved and adopted, which, on being put to the meeting, was carried unanimously.

It was further proposed by Mr. Turner, seconded by Mr. White—That, in face of the recommendation of the committee, as set forth in the report just presented, the subscription of playing members be raised from \$250 mpc to \$200 mpc per annum, taking effect from the 1st July last, which also received the unanimous assent of the members.

The election of officers for the ensuing cricketing year next engaged the attention of the meeting, resulting in the following being invited to serve:—

President—W. Duguid. Vice-President—Donald Bridgett. Committee—T. Belton, A. Clarke, E. Lace, H. E. Oxenford, E. T. Simpson, E. G. Turner, and Walter White.

No further business offering, a cordial vote of thanks to the outgoing committee, as well to the chairman, terminated the proceedings.

Half-Yearly Report of Committee.

The Committee, whose official life, the members will recollect, was extended in April last until the present month for the purpose of the more convenient observance of Rule III., have during their brief term of office little with which to supplement their report, excepting two matters of interest—the one affecting the ground at Palermo, the other the subscription of members.

The recently expressed intention of the Government to convert the waste land at Palermo into a public park, in which it was understood, would be the Club ground, at the moment somewhat excited the tears of the committee, that the execution of such a project would necessitate a removal of the headquarters of the Club. But from the very friendly manner in which the representatives of the committee have been received, they have every reason to hope that the authorities, in their final adoption of the plans, will not fail to recognise the many claims the Cricket Club can fairly advance in support of their retention of the ground. Among the principal of these considerations are: the amusement the game affords to a wide circle of residents of Buenos Ayres, the many years of undisturbed occupancy enjoyed by the Club, the improvements effected on the ground, and lastly, the additional attraction it will prove in itself to the proposed park; all which surely should induce the authorities to allow the property to remain intact, and devoted to the same purpose as heretofore.

In respect to the subscription of members, the committee have for some time been strongly impressed with the necessity of proposing some advance, in order that the obligations of the club might always be fairly met, and after due consideration that have agreed to recommend that the annual subscription of playing members be increased from \$200 mpc to \$250 mpc, taking effect from the 1st July last.

The committee believe that all the members will readily admit the moderate character of the yearly contribution they have hitherto been called upon to make, and that on hearing of its insufficiency to keep the club in a satisfactory position, they will at once be prepared to accept the recommendation of the committee.

The cricket term was commenced on the 8th of September last, a match being arranged between the first 11 against the next 22; and from the very encouraging muster of old and new members, every promise is given of a successful season.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The 'beautiful Boyne' will sail to-morrow afternoon. Our Packet Edition is issued to-day at noon.

Before Sir Roger left Buenos Ayres we presented him with the choicest articles in our then flourishing museum, viz.: the paddles of the Paraguayan canoe that attacked the Brazilian ironclad, and a piece of the chain which Lopez had stretched across the river at Humahuá, to prevent the ascent of the allied fleets. We wonder where those paddles and that chain are now; probably in some marine store dealer's back parlour at Shorehitch. 'To what base uses we may resort, Horatio!'

On the same day Gainsborough's portrait of Mrs. Hingeston, a very beautiful picture, his last work, sold for £504.

A doctor of medicine while on his way to or from a patient on Saturday night last was fired at by a patrol of National Guards, in Plaza Lorea. A ludicrous incident is recorded in connection with the Grand Duke Constantine's visit to Paris. The moment H.H.H. arrived, every man in the Russian Embassy who had whiskers rushed to his barber to have them shaved off, as Muscovite etiquette allows only the moustache to be worn in presence of a Prince of the Blood. High Russian officials never wear any beard or whiskers except when abroad, as they might stumble upon the Czar or Grand Dukes any moment, and the mere outline of a whisker or 'goatee' would send them to Siberia.

There was a brisk business in Cedeiras to-day, owing to one broker having bought no less than 200,000 for the end of the month to close up transactions for his client; this imparted a new feeling and many parties hoped to see a further rise in the liquidation, but prices ruled weaker late in the afternoon. "The Statutes of the Bank of the province of San Pedro de Rio Grande do Sul, established at Porto Alegre, and of the Rio Grandense Bank, at the city of Rio Grande do Sul, have been approved, with alterations. "By decree 5,726 Thomas Dutton Junior has been allowed two years longer to explore mines of magnetic iron etc. along the Puna, in Espirito Santo. "The British sailing three-decker London, left for the Zanzibar station. "In leaving port, owing to lack of wind, fouled with the United States frigate Lancaster and carried away two of the latter's boats. She was then taken out by the Amethyst. "The entrance of the new government dry dock in the Ilha das Cobras was successfully blown out on the 22nd of Sept. "Of the 2,608 immigrants sent by the government to Barra de Pirahy, to be kept there from reach of the yellow fever epidemic, only 4 died, one from yellow fever, caused by his remaining some days in the city. "The report says that without exaggeration the yellow fever epidemic was almost confined to the districts which have been a sewer, sparing to some extent the unwashed ones, and committing most ravages where the sewerage system works most imperfectly. "The 1873 census of the City of Rio de Janeiro gave the population at 277,735, of whom 31,667 were slaves; and that of the whole Municipality of Rio at 274,962, of whom 158,776 were males, 116,266 females and about 60,000 slaves." "The Provincial Bank discounted on Monday about 3 millions currency. "The law authorizing the bank to advance to the Provincial Government 20 millions of pesetas is passed, published and promulgated. We suppose the bank will pay to the Government special notes. "The Democracia publishes further news about the Argentinian Bank; it says that owing to the rumor that money had been drawn out of the bank for the revolution; the books were 'thrown open for inspection and the report proved false; with regard to the large credits to Messrs. Lanús only a week before, these bills were all guaranteed by real estate to the value of 2 millions pesetas. "The Orinoco left crowded with passengers, but took no gold; still French gold for the passengers is always in demand and at premium. Amongst her passengers we hear were Mr. Fredrick Florent and family who go for a short trip to Europe. "Advices from the camps to-day report the rain unrelent, the whole camp one vast sea in many parts. Sharing as a matter of course is brought to a complete stand still for a week if not more. "Thursday will be the last day for mortgagors to pay up the quarter's interest to the Mortgage Bank, after that date defaulters will incur a fine prescribed by the bank law. "The following are the numbers of the Municipal Bonds drawn for amortization on 7th inst. being for the 3rd quarter of present year, the amount to be amortized is 81 bonds of 2000 m/c each, and are they now payable since 9th inst.

Reports about leather continue favorable from Germany and the Leipzig fair, which is the principal one for our leather and begins on 21st, will, it is anticipated, give a very good result.
