WEST COAST MAILS. LATEST FROM CHILE. THE STATUS OF BUENOS AYRES, AND D. FELIX FRIAS.

Valparaiso, Sept. 29th. Vicuña MacKenna, the Intendente of Santiago, presided at the inauguration of the Santa Lucia Park on the 18th instant, and made a brilliant speech.

Another Presidential Message recommends Dr. Diego de Alvear as Minister to London, with credentials also to the Italian Government.

Governor Gelabert telegraphs from Corrientes, Thursday 15th, that the only body of rebels in the Province consisted of 300 or 400 at Cancaati, and owing to the thickness of the woods the forces could not get at them, but are on the move.

Governor Saño telegraphs from Rosario, 14th, that Colonels Rodriguez and Nelson have assembled 3000 horse and foot with two field-pieces; ready for orders to march.

The order of the day on the 15th removes Colonel Emilio Fulco of the National Guards for neglect of orders.

Minister Alsina, in accepting the resignation of Colonel Bustillos as Port Captain, says the only reason for doing so was, that the Government wishes to give him a post of greater confidence and danger, namely, the command of Martin Garcia.

THE SITUATION. TWENTY-THIRD DAY. The only military news in the morning papers is about some more of Gen. Arredondo's men passing over to the Government Army under Colonel Roca, with their officers.

Colonel Bustillos, so long Port Captain of Buenos Ayres, is appointed commander of the important position of Martin Garcia. Colonel Py, who held the latter post, is now made Admiral, or as the title goes Chief of the Argentine Fleet.

Governor Ocampo telegraphs from Rioja that some bands in arms had submitted. Col. Julio Campos is at Altamirano, on his march southward.

The Nacional says that rice and farina have risen to double price, as if people were fearing a siege and laying in stores.

Congress closes to-day. The Senators and Deputies go back to the Provinces, as well as Dr. Frías, late Minister.

Railway traffic is re-opened to Chivilcoy. It appears Gen. Rivas was never there.

At sunrise yesterday the Government army was 9 leagues from Mercedes, halfway to Navarro.

Dr. Rawson arrived at Montevideo; also the editor of the Correo Español, the latter aboard a war-steamer.

Colonel Almeyra has arrived in town, under arrest. He says it is not true that Iwanowski was murdered.

The fleet is under steam, getting ready for sea.

The Nacional says the Parana and two other rebel steamers may shortly be expected.

Pres. Avellaneda in his Message to Congress, asking for Dr. Sarmiento to be made a General, repeats his services thus:

In 1852 he was Lieut.-Colonel at the Battle of Caseros, which overthrew Rosas.

In 1859 he commanded the Reserve of B. Ayres during the campaign of Cepeda against Urquiza.

In 1861 he was Chief of Staff to Gen. Paunero in the army of the Interior, against Pres. Derqui.

In 1863 he was Director of War in four Provinces against the Chacho, Gen. Peñaloza.

In 1870 he brought the Paraguayan War to a conclusion.

In 1872 he suppressed the first Entre Rios rebellion.

In 1873 he terminated the second Entre Rios war, repairing in person to that Province, and being powerfully aided by Gen. Ganza.

THE NEW ENVOY TO ENGLAND. PRES. AVELLANEDA'S MESSAGE. B. Ayres, Oct. 14th. To the Senate of Congress, The National Government solicits your approval to the nomination of Dr. Diego de Alvear as Minister Plenipotentiary to Great Britain, accrediting him at the same time to the Italian Government until a special Legation be recognized to Rome.

Everybody recognizes the convenience, or rather necessity, of establishing a Legation in London, and Congress has already voted, in the Budget for 1875, the funds necessary for the purpose.

We have great interests to protect in London, and these will increase everyday as our mercantile relations become more multiplied with the world's great metropolis, and as new enterprises are started on this side of the water, seeking the requisite capital in England.

All our stocks and loans are quoted in London, giving the gauge of our national credit in the eyes of the universe; and there also are situated the Boards of Directors of our various Railways and other great enterprises.

Under present circumstances it is doubly urgent to have a Minister in London, to protect such important interests. A profound sensation has been caused there by the news of the recent events; and the Senate cannot fail to see the expediency of removing such unfavorable impressions at once, by giving to the course of affairs their true meaning.

No less weighty are the reasons for accrediting a Mission to Italy, seeing the important commercial relations with that country, and the growing tide of emigration from Italy to the Argentine Republic.

For the above reasons it is requested that you despatch this matter during the present extra session.

PARIS GOSSIP. (Our Own Correspondent.) Paris, and by this term France is understood, is commencing to rapidly regain influence where it was asserted she had lost it for ever.

Strangers like, people and enriched Paris, enjoy all its facilities for pleasures, which they enhance by the prices they pay to share them; it is on returning to their chimney corners that such moralists discover Paris to be the 'cloaca maxima' of the universe—that they have assisted to form.

The Parisian is distinguished by his mutability of character; he will run to see a new toilette, to witness a uniform; he never misses an original piece at a theatre, a military review, or even a horse race, the last thing in the world he understands; but obliging as he is by nature, he endeavours to learn some of the mystic jargon of the race-course because it is fashionable to know how to express correctly the relations between man and the horse.

Grave pleasures, those which address themselves seriously to the mind, leave him absolutely indifferent; conferences, lectures etc. which in other countries render real services, have been dead failures here. Could they be made but fashionable they would take.

The Parisian who would resist a philosophical axiom, or a religious dogma as far as death, will submit to wear the most detestable of shaped hats, provided it be only the 'mode'.

When duels were in vogue 4,000 persons were killed in fifteen years. On the other hand, have not the wigs of Louis XIV. and the 'poudre' of Louis XV. made, like the tricolor, the tour of the world. At present crinolines and chignons are ridiculed, but there was a time, under the 'Directoire,' when it was the correct thing and the proof of being well-bred to wear an eye-glass? Rostopchine, who burned Moscow, said—"I recognise in Paris the mistress of Europe; for while good society will speak French and the ladies will form the fashions—while good cheer will form one of the delights of life, and spectacles will always amuse them—Paris will ever influence other countries. Then there are one hundred different people in the people of Paris. View the wine shops—they are full of sots; look at the workshops—they are full of industrious people; the barracks—they are a people of soldiers; the laboratories—they are a people of savants; the opera hall—they are a people of acrobats. Infatuation is a malady essentially Parisian: every one believed in Cagliostro, and took his place around the tub of Mesmer; citizens rushed in suffocating crowds to the Zoological Gardens to see the giraffe—but this enthusiasm is sudden, and not enduring. The crowd applauded.

ed Lafayette and Lamartine, but these worthies getting old were pushed aside; like Diogenes, the crowd seeks a man, never weighs his merits, but paints him according to his desires; if he bend under the burden, if he fail to perform miracles every day, he will be dismissed and accused of treason. It is its nature to be unfaithful and ingrateful; it wished to tear to pieces the corpse of Colbert, and over the residence of Sully, inconspicuous for the assassination of Henry IV., it wrote, "a lalet to let!" Parisians have a disdain for what is derived from birth, but seek with ardor that which springs from merit; in politics they have no fixed ideas; they are devoted to institutions—so long as they do not possess them, and when they exist they no longer desire them; they know not how to manage liberty, they wish not to brook authority, and would be ungovernable only they respect whoever can impress them with fear. Idle curiosity is a Parisian defect; during the Commune I have seen shells falling in the Champs Elysees, sent by M. Valerieu; the crowd left the Guignol shows to observe the shell explode; this over, they returned to the charms of Polichinelle. Also, pending the combat of Montmartre, the curious by paying two francs to a Communist gunner, was allowed to fire off a cannon, not thinking whether or not he killed a soldier, but of the happiness of having made a noise, and having been amused during five minutes. A general leading an army of Parisians might accomplish extraordinary and unexpected triumphs, but in case of defeat he would not have to direct a retreat, but a rout. The Parisian is short-sighted only in what relates to the future; he is blind when he turns towards the past; he is deaf when he interrogates history. He never reasons, he feels; he never discusses, he is carried away, and falls into 'insouciance' when the allies occupied the city in 1815, they invited Parisians 'to aid in settling the peace of the world,' conquerors taking the vanquished for arbiters! Paris has reason to be proud, because she is flattered even by her foes, but she has intrinsic merits also; she has a grand past that each step recalls; each street corner is almost a fragment of history, and she has in three ages of such men as Moliere, Voltaire and Diderot, put into universal circulation an abundance of ideas not to be found united elsewhere. She has further a powerful elasticity, has an indefinite ability for productiveness, and knows how to remain rich, when ungenerously fined five milliards.

France is a sort of human property, wrote Victor Hugo last week; she belongs to all, as formerly did Rome and Athens. When the Emperor of Germany decided to bombard Paris, the Prince of Wales remarked, "how can he do such a thing; if Paris be destroyed, where can Kings go to amuse themselves for a while?" Indeed Paris must always remain the grand resource for royalty to throw aside their crowns and cares for a few days of free and easy life. It is here that monarchs generally select to live to copse themselves for the loss of their subjects, or to pass their vacation, where the current coin carry an Imperial or a Republican image and superscription. The best pages of the 'Almanach Gotha' are at present represented in France. The Grand Duc Constantine, the advanced and silent guard of Muscovite policy, is on the borders of Spain taking note of Don Carlos and his opponents. At Biarritz also is the ex-King of Hanover and his eldest daughter, aged 26, devoted entirely to her blind father; she is one of the most educated and distinguished ladies in Europe. "I see better by her eyes than if I had my own," her father constantly observes. The less a remarkable perspicacity; though blind he can admire the shades of wool employed in the manufacture of Gobelin tapestry; with him the sense of touch is developed to an extraordinary degree; he can appreciate the exactness of busts of those persons whom he knew before afflicted with blindness. His present visit to France is chiefly to purchase a property in the Bois de Boulogne. The Tribunal has condemned Moreau, the herbalist and forger merchant of St. Denis to death, for poisoning his two wives with verdigris. This substance was found in the remains of both women when exhumed; after his first wife's death, he married in the course of a few months his second wife—in April last—the mistress of a merchant, and buried her in the following May; the doctors in attendance only knew the cause of death when upwards one are pound of verdigris was extracted from the remains of their once patients. Cupidity, to possess the humble fortunes of his victims, was the motive. He alone gave the sick women their food and drink, and a work on poisons was found in his home, the chapter on Verdigris being dog-eared and thumbed.

There is this psychological phenomenon connected with the dying Guignol: his intelligence comes and goes like clock work. Madlle. Falcon, the famous operatic singer, had only her voice from six in the evening till midnight; after which hour it disappeared till the following afternoon.

the monkey imitated the raising up of a pair of spectacles. Just like his late master, and with one of its most amiable grins, clasped the cook around the neck. To avoid having anything to do with a mother-in-law—never get married.

EDITOR'S TABLE. Appalling scare! The STANDARD lion on the loose! On Thursday evening about 7 o'clock p.m., the weather being fine, and nobody present to prevent him, the noble denizen of Paraguayan thickets presented to us in the morning by Dr. Newkirk, slipped his chain and went for a stroll down Calle San Martin. His first visit was to the 'Baños Publicos' next door, probably with the intention of having a wash after the heat and worry of receiving so many visitors during the day. There were half a dozen persons at the door of the establishment. Their yell of horror as they recognized their visitor and bolted like madmen for the upper stories of the premises will be remembered to their dying day by those who heard it. A savage growl from his lionine Majesty added wings to their flight, and the banging and locking of doors as they gained their rooms pale, with terror, was like 500 thunder claps. Meanwhile the cry "theo STANDARD lion is loose" spread like lightning, and 'savva qui peut' was the order in the street, where the lion was in two minutes a quiet, peaceable brute when not vexed he resented this desertion of him by the public with a terrific roar that shook the Rock of Tandil (known by telegraph). He then took a stroll at the Bolsa gate, but finding it locked, he gave another growl—as it to say "Fee-Paw-Fun, I smell the blood of a broker man"—and trotted down to the hair-dresser's opposite the Hypothecary Bank; and with one spring leaped on the counter, holding up his head as it to say—"I want to get shaved." The 'peluquero' had a frightfully narrow shave of being eaten alive; he shut himself into his inner sanctum, his luxuriant hair on end, and trembling in every limb. Fortunately there was no Bear's Grease in the shop, or the smell of it might have been fatal to the whole place and everybody in it. The noble animal, finding nobody to attend to him, left the shop, and crossing over to the Hypothecary Bank, explored the premises. Fortunately for Mr. Balbin he was not at home. On emerging from the Bank the brute looked decidedly hungry and, oh! horror, he sat himself down between the tramway rails, with a look on his muzzle that said as plainly as lionine 'loaf could,' "I'll dine on the first man that passes!" Most happily for the neighbours the first man was a Paraguayan in our employment, as plucky as all his countrymen are, and he saw the situation at a glance; he seized the end of the lion's chain and persuaded him to move a little, but could not get the animal into the Court, so determined did it seem to have its dinner, though patriotically averse to eating its own countryman. Just then a tram car approached and pulled up: the lights and jingle of the bells disturbed the brute, as he had never seen a tram car before; he growled awfully, and the passengers in the car got a fit of fever and ague on the spot at his hungry look. Our Paraguayan, who saw that in two seconds more every soul in the car would be eaten alive if he did not act, gave the chain another vigorous tug, whistled in the purest Guarani in the brute's ear, gave him a stunning blow on the head, and in he bounded into the Court; the door was slammed to, and Buenos Ayres was saved. When we think of all the widows and orphans our pet lion might have made had he extended his stroll through town we tremble to our soul and the soles of our boots. He might have eaten half our subscribers before returning to bed. We feel now a stern conviction that we have a 'white elephant' as well as a lion in our back patio. The museum is dead! Long live the STANDARD menagerie!

The French steamer Girondo entered Montevideo yesterday; she brings telegraphic dates from Europe to the 11th inst. Under the influence of the mad news from Buenos Ayres Argentine Bonds fell to 87 on the 8th inst. on the London Stock Exchange; on the 9th they recovered 4 p.c. and were quoted at 92 and on the 10th again fell to 91. The most important news of all is that Spain has raised a Loan of 150 millions of 'pesetas' in Berlin, handing over as security her Customs receipts and Tobacco duty. A battle at Estella was hourly expected.

The news about the Situation yesterday was the same old 2s. 6d.—nothing new, no fight yet, Roca after Arredondo, and Rivas nowhere and everywhere. A gentleman who came in from Navarro reports Colonel Campos's advanced guard, there on Thursday, and main body marching on, with a good supply of artillery and a splendid 'caballada' of 10,000 horses. There ought to be some news soon. Town is recovering its spirits, shearing is going on in the camp everywhere, and all that is waiting now to give things a smart restorative flip is the resumption of goods trains on the railways, to bring in the produce outside. In town there is now a decided disposition to make the best of the situation; its novelty is rapidly wearing off, and we shall not be surprised to see things more lively before long, as people cannot afford to remain idle, and must do business, no matter under what drawbacks.

It is a remarkable coincidence that the last Argentine Envoy to England was Valera, the new one being Alvear, and both are written with the same letters, merely transposed.

The War Office has called for bids to supply the Navy and Marine Corps with provisions during the year 1875. Most of the Congress men will leave for home to-morrow morning by the first train from the Central Station.

The Situation is beginning to tell on our colleagues. We see the melancholy Barge case, the last dividend of the Central Argentine, the ad interim dividend of the Mercantile Bank, and other intelligence as old as Methusalem's cat now used as filling stuff.

ON 'CHANGE.

There was very little done in Cables to-day and nothing whatever sold cash, the market looks slightly firmer than yesterday. The stock sales were— Cables: For end month 30,000 78, do 25,000 78, do 20,000 78.

There was some little exchange passed on Genoa to-day at 6.18, and bills on Montevideo are offered at par and 2 discount. Mr. Edward Madero telegraphed to the Provisional Bank to-day that he had sold his Liverpool 11th at 9.

To-day there was a meeting of 'Almancenares por mayor,' and the result is that they are now all signing an agreement amongst themselves to the effect that henceforward they will not sell except buyers give a 'conforme' payable in 14 months, or a 'paguro' payable in 3 months.

A new Brazilian mail steamer called the Count D'Eu, has been launched at Glasgow. She is built for the Rio Grande mail service and a very fine vessel; the old steamer Count D'Eu was sold at auction the other day in Montevideo.

Yesterday there was a sale of old wool at the Plaza Once, about 1200 ar. middling wool sold at 78. There was nothing done in the Piazas this morning, a parcel of sheepskins offered but not sold; things moustroously dull, still we think we notice signs of a slight business revival in produce circles.

Mr. Kennedy reports that to-morrow morning (Saturday) he expects the first lot of new wool in the Plaza Once, it will come in by rail, as the Western Railway is now bringing in produce from the camp. We hope the next week to have the same news from the South.

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Men's minds were in the neighbourhood of Chilivley to-day, every one seemed to think that the great battle with Rivar was to-day; some few who very attentively study currents, think quite the other way, and are slow to believe that Rivar will risk a battle if the numerical odds are against him; however time will tell; meanwhile money is beginning to get plenty in the camp districts, armies were always expensive companies, and the soldiers pay finds its way into every hand; and plenty in the camp, and from thence back to town.

Measres Fontana & Co. of Chile have applied to the Chilean Government for an exclusive privilege for 25 years to ply steam tugs in the Straits of Magellan; the enterprise is one that commends itself to commerce, would prove a great boon to shipping trade, and we hope to see it executed. We trust the Chilean Government will grant the concession asked; after the expiration of the 25 years, the tugs &c. revert to the Chilean Government.

Now, however, being supplied from "hand to mouth," and at a considerably lower rate than in 1873. They were also paying lower rates of freight for the conveyance of that coal abroad; so in that respect the future of the company was very satisfactory. Of course, they will understand that the result could only make itself felt some months hence, because there remained the coal on the West Coast, which had to be sent out many months before it was required, and that had to be used up before the cheaper supplies came into account.

As there is some question as to the wording of the resolution respecting the Argentine Government's representative, and its shares held in the Central Argentine Railway Co. we give the following extract from the minutes of the last meeting held in London. It will be seen that Mr. Gilmore, Government representative, could not give no guarantee that the Government will not sell the stock. We may add that about 2 miles back fall powers came out to Mr. Armstrong, Resident Director, and Mr. Rios, to find out with the Government for the sale of the road. Now however, on account of the resolution this last project must stand over for a while; the following is the extract referred to, which settles the question— "So long as the Government of the Argentine Republic shall be entitled to £2,000 or upwards in nominal amount of share capital or stock of the company, the said Government shall be entitled to appoint, any person, and from time to time to remove him, and reappoint any other person, to be a director of the company, and the person so appointed shall have all the powers and position (subject as hereinafter mentioned) of a director; provided that Mr. William Hodgkin Gilmore, the person now holding a general power of attorney to act for the said Government, and any other person (if any) hereafter holding for the time being any such general power of attorney to act for the said Government in respect to their shares or stock, shall be deemed to be so appointed in the absence of other express appointment by the said Government. The additional directors so appointed shall hold office so long as the said Government shall continue entitled to a qualification in shares or stock entitling them to make such appointment; or until his power to act on behalf of the said Government shall be revoked or determined; and all the regulations contained in the articles of Association of the company with respect to qualification, retirement, re-election and removal of directors, shall take effect with respect only to the other directors, and not the director appointed by the said Government were not a director. "Mr. Biddicombe—second that."

Mr. Seal said he could not agree with that resolution. The object of the resolution was to give the Government the right of nominating hereafter a director of the company, which was quite right as long as the Government held the large interest which it then did; but to say that they should have that right if they only held £2,000 was a great mistake, because the Government might throw their shares upon the market, and so depreciate the value of the stock. He would move as an amendment that the words, "to be entitled to hold the amount of stock which they at present held," be inserted in the place of £2,000. There was another clause in the resolution he thought might be omitted, "and any other person (if any) hereafter holding for the time being any such general power of attorney to act for the said Government in respect of their shares or stock." There would be no necessity for retaining those words, because the earlier part of the resolution gave to the Government the right to nominate a director so long as they held a certain amount of stock. He was satisfied the time would come when they would see the error of limiting the qualification to £2,000. "The chairman said they were anxious that the Government should be represented on the board, because they were the guarantors of the interest, and the amount of the proposed qualification was the same as an ordinary director. He did not believe the Government would exercise any undue influence at the board, their representative having only one vote. He hoped the shareholders would pass the resolution as suggested by Mr. Seal. The board had no objection to the words referred to being struck out. "The chairman said if Mr. Seal's suggestion was adopted the Government would be precluded from selling a single share. "Mr. Seal said that was his object. "The chairman said the shareholders must not be misled by the fact that when they were raising the capital of the company they were materially assisted by the Government, who came forward and took 17,000 of the shares at par when they were at considerable discount. They must not forget benefits they had received. "Mr. Seal inquired whether Mr. Gilmore, the present representative of the Government, would give an assurance that the Government did not intend parting with the shares held by them. "Mr. Gilmore said it was impossible for him to do so. "After some further discussion, the resolution was altered by striking out the words "and any other person (if any) hereafter holding for the time being any such general power of attorney to act for the said Government in respect of their shares or stock," and was carried unanimously."

OF CHILE have applied to the Chilean Government for an exclusive privilege for 25 years to ply steam tugs in the Straits of Magellan; the enterprise is one that commends itself to commerce, would prove a great boon to shipping trade, and we hope to see it executed. We trust the Chilean Government will grant the concession asked; after the expiration of the 25 years, the tugs &c. revert to the Chilean Government.

There was nothing done in the Piazas this morning, a parcel of sheepskins offered but not sold; things moustroously dull, still we think we notice signs of a slight business revival in produce circles.
