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any definite guiding principal laid down, for only in this view of the case can an adequate excuse be found for the partial and defective decisions which they have arrived at.

At foot I hand you an analysis of the awards: a glance at this will show that the committee lead the van in the lists, for out of a committee of 9 active members (omitting the President) 6 of them monopolize 16 chances in the programme, and 5 prominent members of the club take 12 chances between them; or say 11 men altogether take 28 chances, or nearly 3 chances a piece all around; in addition to this, many of the 11 men intend competing in the canoe race the entries for which are still open—if these 11 men had been content with one chance each, then 17 eligible chances would have remained for distribution among other members, and certainly it does appear obviously fairer that all competitors should receive one chance each in the lists, before allotting any members a second entry.

As the committee's public announcement in the first instance invited all the members in common to enter the lists of competition upon payment of \$50 mpc. per entry, the inferior rowers equally with the leading oarsmen had a right to a common chance of competing in the regatta. The payment of the fee was to buy a chance of winning a prize in fair and open competition; but the committee's programme shuts out the inferior rowers, and makes it next to impossible for any but the leading oarsmen to come in winners.

If the committee had preconceived their programme it would have been fairer to have announced their objects on the preliminary public notice, and thus have spared the minor members the trouble and vexation of applying for entries in races which were not intended for them. The minor members desire to share in public competition with perhaps as much emulative spirit as the best rowers of the club, and unless the committee sees the means of fairly arranging the competition for the future, it may be worth while to consider the expediency of dividing the club into two distinct classes of rowers—the Upper, and the Lower Class—so that public competition may take place in the respective classes. Certain it is that the large body of minor members shut out on the present occasion will not permit themselves to be passed over a second time.

It would be difficult to imagine that the committee had pre-arranged their course of action on Tuesday evening, for their proceedings were characterized by a marked want of foresight, and a conspicuous absence of judgment and management. That they had a difficult task to carry out I will readily admit, and I can only regret that they handled their task in so unfortunate and so unpopular a manner.

high is an astonishing piece of credulity, even for a French journalist. The Marshal walked out of his prison a little before daylight on Monday, and yet there was no one inside the fort who was privy to his act or who played the traitor to the Government. Before daybreak, about 4.45 a.m., the gates of the fort were opened as usual, and some of the garrison, as is their custom, went beyond the walls. The prisoner was dressed in a laborer's blouse to hide his bulky figure, and carried on his back a huge sack of rubbish, as if he were going to throw it into the sea.

Once outside he had merely to walk down to where the boat was waiting, get into it, and be rowed to the steamer which his wife had hired ready to take him away. The rope stained with blood was hung over the parapet very late the night before, in order to put the authorities on a false scent, and most effectually it did so. In the boat he found a near relative and his brave wife, the latter holding an oar and helping to keep the boat in its place. The rest is told. On board the steamer they were watching for the boat, and when the latter put off from the island the steamer came slowly towards it. In a quarter of an hour he was on board, in two hours he was on Italian ground.

When the prisoner's flight was discovered on Monday morning no one was more surprised than his faithful aide-de-camp, and true friend, Colonel Villetto. It is not often that a man who is no relative, who is himself fifty years of age, and who has a wife and children of his own, would volunteer to pass his days in captivity with an old chief. The Colonel did this. Since May, 1872, when the Marshal was first made a prisoner at Versailles, this gallant officer has never left him.

When urged by his wife to join in the scheme for his rescue, the Marshal would only consent on the condition that neither his aide-de-camp nor any of his servants should be implicated in the matter. As to his wife, when we remember that she is only twenty-five years of age, the condition she is in, and the fact that she was brought up as delicately as the daughters of wealthy Mexicans ever are, her conduct will be appreciated in England, where pluck is so much admired.

Bazine and his wife will find some difficulty in living in England, save in the most humble manner. Her fortune was large when she married, but when Maximilian was shot Juarez confiscated all he could lay his hands upon, and she was left with barely 10,000 francs (£400) a year. Bazine himself had not a shilling beyond his pay as Marshal, and that he has of course lost entirely. He sold his house in the Avenue d'Byland before he was tried, and that brought him about £4,000, which he was wise enough to put out of harm's way with friends in England.

The eighth week of the war, and fifty-second day of the Mitro revolution, we close to-day. During the last 6 days there has been some military activity though precisely, due perhaps to the fact that the Minister of War has put himself at the head of the vanguard, and is making forced marches to come up on Rivadavia. Almost every day during the week we had some more or other chronicle, and to-day we close the chapter with a bulletin from the Nacional giving the report of a fight at Las Flores in which the rebels were defeated. From the general tenor of the news it seems that the Mitro army is marching North-West, and has one or two days start of the Government army. There is nothing however in the week's history to afford any prospect of a wind up, the six days experience being only another lesson showing us the great errors of judgment when this war broke out. The market reflects the hapless situation of the country, and although our wools are entering and selling at high prices, and exchange keeps rising, still things are not what they seem: we have had one or two failures, and the judicial summonses in the native papers, calling upon parties who owe banks to pay up, show what is going on behind the curtain. The streets are certainly more crowded and fine carriages and horses are again seen in Calle Florida, ladies again crowd the sidewalk, and the "tendores" report few sales during the week. The tramways and railways still show a great falling off of traffic, and the traffic restorers will find in the diminished traffic a return to the effect of the war. Yet spite of everything it is surprising that the market has resisted the pressure so well and so long. The losses so far have chiefly fallen upon the wealthy and parties who are well able to bear them. The chief demand for wool at present comes from the wool places, and for the last few days gold has been felt more plentiful than paper which has led to the exchange of much specie for paper at the Oficina de Cambios. The value of this year's wool clip is roughly estimated at six millions sterling, which in other and happier times would mean much for the country, the new wool arrivals up to the present only reach 200,000 ar. against 570,000 ar. arrivals some time last year. Mr. Barraguer Durand in his circular for the mail supplies the following wool statistics showing the business done for each of the following years from 1st Nov. to end of October for each year:—
