The Standard. "Nil falsi uobis, nil veri non audiam dicere." CECERO. FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 20, 1874. EUROPE. DON CARLOS GONE TO ENGLAND. SIEGE OF PAMPLONA ABANDONED. EVACUATION OF ESTELLA. CONCLUSION OF THE CARLIST WAR.

PARIS, Nov. 10th.—Changes in the Cabinet are confirmed. Chabaud Latour resigns the portfolio of Interior, Grivart that of Agriculture, and Tailand that of Justice. It is said General Cissey will also resign the War Department, and that M. Borel likewise retires. The divergence in the Cabinet was upon MacMahon's proposed message to the Assembly about the Septennate and constitutional powers. Don Carlos arrived at Bayonne, and the authorities had already orders to notify him that he must not remain near the Spanish frontier. He is said to be en route for England. The German Parliament is opposed to the resolutions of the Postal Congress at Berne, as a national condemnation.

MADRID, Nov. 10th.—Don Carlos had fled from Spain and taken refuge in France. The Carlists are retiring from before Pamplona, and have completely abandoned Estella; their main army is at Puente La Reyna, but the men are disheartened by the retirement of Dorregaray and their best leaders. Peace negotiations are now on foot. NEW YORK, Nov. 10th.—Gold 110, exchange 4.85. LONDON, Nov. 10th.—Consols 93.

The Iberia Mails. LATEST FROM ENGLAND. London, Oct. 23rd. Early on Thursday morning the Duchess of Edinburgh gave birth to a son at Buckingham Palace. A salute was fired by the Park guns in honour of the event. Five hours after the birth of the young Prince the Empress of Russia arrived in London. Whatever may be the cause of it, the Foreign Office is at present in an unusual state of activity. Lord Derby has been continually at the office since his return from Scotland, and he has had several interviews with the Russian and French Ambassadors. The body of Lady Dilke was subjected to the process of cremation at Dresden. Seventy-five minutes after introduction to the furnace the coffin and body were consumed, leaving six pounds of dust to be deposited in the urn. It seems she herself left distinct directions in her will that her body was to be burned 'as a scientific experiment.'

There is a probability of Home Rule, in a partial form, being conceded to Alsace and Lorraine. A Berlin telegram states that the question of establishing a representative assembly for the two provinces is under discussion. There is now no doubt that there have been serious defections from the Carlist ranks. It is said that Dorregaray and other Carlist chiefs who have deserted their cause were "got at" by the Republican Executive. Don Carlos's cause is decidedly on the wane. The universal cry now is "Peace and the Fueros!" The Carlists lately received an important supply of warlike stores. Certain measures recently adopted by the Turkish Government have been regarded with apprehension. Two hundred soldiers ordered the Armenian Catholic Church at Broussa, and committed shocking acts of desecration. The Bishop was also seized in his house, and grossly assaulted. If this is true, it may bring the Porte into trouble. Dr. Krueger, president of the Berlin Municipal Court, has published a declaration in reference to the arrest and imprisonment of Count Arnim. It is briefly to the effect that the whole proceedings were in strict accordance with law.

The Bavarian Protestants, who form about one-third of the population of the kingdom, are said to be deeply affected by the conversion of the Queen Dowager to Roman Catholicism, and, if report be true, another grief of a similar character awaits them. The Chief Councillor of the Consistory, and head of the Protestant Church in the nation, will, it is said, shortly follow the Queen's example. The Prince of Wales on Wednesday visited Marshal McMahon, and the interview is reported to be of a very cordial character. There is a wild rumor afloat to the effect that during his stay at the chateau of the Duke de la Rochefoucauld-Bisaccia he will have an opportunity of "throwing himself into the arms" of the Count de Chambord, otherwise "Henri V." by Divine right. The Grand Duke Constantine of Russia's presence in Paris was found to be so embarrassing that he was suddenly instructed to return home. When in the French capital, he evinced his unmistakable anti-German feeling by patronising a benefit at the opera on behalf of the Alsatians and Lorrainers, and by contributing ten thousand francs to the benefit fund; and as St. Petersburg has special reasons just now for remaining on friendly terms with Berlin, proceedings of this sort had, of course, to be summarily checked. The Grand Duke had promised to attend a dinner to be given in his honour by Marshal McMahon, but had to hurry away before the event was due.

Sir Henry Rawlinson, the President of the Royal Geographical Society, has invited Lieut. Payer, of the Austrian North Pole Expedition, to attend the opening meeting of the society. Should the invitation be accepted, Lieut. Payer will replace Sir Samuel Baker as the geographical lion of the season. On Saturday morning August Frederick Fitzgerald, third Duke of Leinster, died at Maynooth, in his eight-fourth year. The duke died in great agony. He was the third duke the dukedom being created in 1766. The deceased nobleman was a resident on his estate and a general favorite in the county. He is succeeded by his son, Charles William, Marquis of Kildare, born 1819, and who married in October, 1817, Lady Caroline Gower, third daughter of the Duke of Sutherland, who has made him the father of eleven surviving children. The funeral took place on Wednesday at Maynooth Church. It is stated in Roman Catholic circles that Monsignor Capel is about to be appointed coadjutor Bishop of Birmingham. The State elections in America, so far as known, have resulted in a gain for the Democrats. This means, that

General Grant's candidature for a third term is unfavourably received. A New York telegram says half the tobacco crop in Kentucky, and Tennessee has been killed by frost. The North German Gazette publishes some particulars of the proceedings of the German war-ship Arcona against the Navigator Islands. The object was to enforce the payment of an indemnity which the inhabitants had promised to pay in 1872 on account of outrages committed upon German residents there. Only a very small portion of this indemnity had been paid, and the amount remaining due was \$15,000. On the arrival of the Arcona a third of this sum was paid. The German captain promised that when he arrived home he would advocate a partial remission of the indemnity. There has been no intention of occupying the Navigator Islands. The interference of the Germans in Samoa is by no means strange. Nearly the whole of the Samoa trade, as well as that of the more remote islands, is at present in the hands of Germans. The great house of Godefroi, of Hamburg—the Kings of the South Pacific, as they were formerly called—has for years exercised almost undisputed control in Samoa, and its agents are to be found in every corner of Polynesia. Samoa has of late been examined by an American who is anxious to induce the United States Government to annex the group, but it would seem to be the opinion of the majority of his countrymen that they have enough colored men on their hands already. The United States war vessel Tuscarora has been sent to the Navigator Islands. General Garibaldi has consented to his nomination as a candidate for Rome. The Governor of Albania telegraphs that a Moslem named Jousout was murdered by a Montenegrin at Podgoritz. The populace cut the assassin into pieces and killed six more Montenegrins. The Montenegrin version is that 16 unarmed Montenegrins attended the market at Podgoritz, among whom was the Archimandrite of the Convent of Piperi, and all were massacred by Turks without provocation. The Prince of Montenegro has asked the Italian and Russian Consuls to join into an inquiry into the circumstances. This is refused by the Porte. Count Brandenburg, German Ambassador in Lisbon, is in Paris to-day, on his way home upon leave. Upon the journey from Lisbon to Madrid Count Brandenburg had an unpleasant adventure. At the Spanish station of Castada, near Ciudad Real, the train was stopped by 12 brigands, who despoiled the travellers of their money and watches, taking from the German diplomatist £20 sterling, his own watch and that of his servant. A Prussian paper complains that English ships condemned as unseaworthy are being sold to foreigners hoisting the German flag. The Estimates of the German War Department of 1875 are calculated at 320 million marks, against 269 million marks required last year, an increase of 51 million marks. The New York papers publish intelligence from Mexico asserting that Germany is intriguing to obtain a tract of land for Colonial purposes, offering the Mexican Government a loan of money in compensation. The Spanish Government has paid the Virginia indemnity to Great Britain. It is expected that the American claim will be made subject to arbitration. The Austrian Reichsrath was opened. The Minister of Finance presented the Estimates for 1855; expenditure estimated at 381,000,000 florins, the revenue at 369,000,000. General Concha, the Captain-General of Cuba, has decreed that all insurgents captured in the field shall be shot. He has signed a Treaty of Commerce and Extradition between Spain and San Domingo. The rumoured assassination of Americans by Carlists, and the shooting of two Englishmen by the Republicans, is, says a special telegram from Bayona, devoid of foundation. Montreal has suffered from the effects of a 'big' fire, not perhaps so damaging as that which occurred at Chicago, but still of sufficient magnitude to destroy a block of houses and cause an estimated loss of \$200,000. General Mitre is advancing on B. Ayres, which was being defended by ex-President Sarmiento. It is also stated that several war vessels have gone over to the insurgents.

TRADE RETURNS. We resume to-day the comparative study of the trade with foreign countries in the period beginning 1870 and ending 1873. Having already gone over the trade with Great Britain, we take the other countries in their order. FRANCE. Our imports from France rose 50 per cent since 1870 (the year before the war), shewing what wonderful vitality and recuperative power that country possesses: the figures are: 1870 \$1,122,666,374 1873 1,800,535 The consumption of French wine increased 1 million fies., sugar nearly 2 million, preserves and wax matches 1 million, while we find an aggregate increase of 3 millions in shirts, perfumery, hats, tiles, and silks. The growing luxury of Buenos Ayres is shewn by the fact that carriages and jewellery have risen 3-fold, and silks have doubled. Meantime books have also increased 3-fold, machinery has quadrupled, arms and gunpowder doubled, and farming implements

(probably of immigrants) increased 12-fold. Among minor items it is worth remarking that cigars, bitter and candles have declined one-half, while soap shews an increase, and cheese has been almost stationary. Our export trade to France has grown in still greater ratio than the imports, rising from 5 1/2 to 8 1/2 millions. Wool shews an increase of 3 millions, sheepskins have doubled, hides are stationary, tallow and hair have declined one-half. Among minor items we note that goatskins reached nearly 200,000 in 1872, but have fallen about one-third, while ostrich feathers shewed a corresponding increase. There was a shipment of 50 tons of preserved beef in 1871, but the French people do not seem to have liked it, for we find no subsequent shipment. The balance of trade as regards France is strongly against us, since we consume more than double as much as she takes from us: it was the same in 1870, and the proportion is exactly as it is with England, two to one, of imports over exports. This country takes from us 5 times as much as we import from her. The finance Minister paid on Wednesday \$12,000 to the Western Railway for carriage of troops. The Nacional publishes a letter from Tapalque, yesterday, that the troops arrived there expecting to overtake the Mitrista forces next day. The writer says Carriel and his Indians have gone home. Dr. Alsina and Colonel Luis Campos are gone ahead in pursuit of General Mitre, who is supposed to be going towards La Blanca or Saladillo. The camps are covered with water. The Order-of-the-Day for Wednesday says:— "Whereas Ensign Sosa has beaten a foreigner with his sword he is hereby degraded and put last man in the battalion." Colonel Obligado writes from Goya, 12th Nov., to the Governor of Corrientes that the rebels reached Concepcion closely followed by Colonels Aguirre and Reguera. He adds that Col. Azcona committed a perfidy, and he has put him under arrest; the rebels do not now exceed 500 men and he expects soon to send back the militia to Curuzú-Cuatiá. The Nacional says several mutinies had occurred aboard the Parana and Itivas, and were put down by Obligado and Magnasco shooting some of the men with their revolvers. Lastly Gen. Gelly and Dr. Garcia went to Maldonado and recommended Obligado to hand over the Parana as he has done. When she entered port on Wednesday evening she had only Captain Meymo and 11 men aboard, having landed Obligado and his officers at Port Ingles. The men were in a lamentable state of weakness, but the vessel perfectly even to her Remingtons; only the revolvers had been taken. The guard sent on board found her shockingly dirty.

The great topic is the surrender of the Parana on Wednesday evening to the National authorities. There was considerable excitement in town when the news ran that she was entering port with a white flag displayed. Numbers of people rushed to the mole and beach, and the important news was soon known all over the city. The question now is, what effect will the event have on the duration of the war? There are some who say that the beginning of the end is at hand; others think not. In any case all chance of seeing a naval battle in the Plate is up. Take care! The fruit season is producing its usual results. Too many strawberries have given rise to several cases of Cholera in the city, and it behoves people to be cautious. Manching fruit at all hours of the day, a practice common amongst all classes here, is most pernicious. The time honoured saying that "fruit is Gold in the morning, Silver at noon and Lead at night" should be acted on by all. Within the last few days small-pox has taken an unpleasant start in some quarters of the city, and fatal cases have been more numerous than usual. The following paragraph may interest any readers who take a particular interest in hides and bones—"The immersion of hides per hour in a two per cent solution of carbonic acid, and then simply drying them, has, says the Scientific American, been recently substituted for the tedious and expensive process of salting them for transportation from South America and Australia, and with most satisfactory results. Bones have been similarly treated for transportation. A scheme for a new Port at Buenos Ayres has been placed before us, by Mr. Treum. Punta Lara is his 'point d'appui.' Belona is so much in the ascendant now that Port schemes can scarcely expect a fair hearing till the Temple of Janus is closed again, but Mr. T's project has merits which will no doubt meet with the consideration they deserve when 'War's alarms' shall be exchanged for 'the piping times of Peace,' which we hope may be soon.

The Custom-house daily receipts continue at a very satisfactory figure, considering the row going on. On Wednesday they reached 73,000 Patos. The heat yesterday was pretty stiff; a little over Summer heat. Many predict that we shall have a broiling Sunday, and that Celsius and Seltzer water will be in the ascendant for months to come. The fine steamer Pouton sailed for Europe yesterday, and took a fair number of passengers. The latest scientific advices from Europe lead to a belief, at least a well grounded hope, that that great desideratum, a substitute for Steam, has been at last discovered, and by a Dutchman, Dr. H. Beins, of Groningen, who, assisted by his brother, Mr. J. N. Beins, manager of the Netherlands Soda Factory at Amstardam, has been engaged in experiments, with a view of transforming heat into mechanical power more advantageously than is done in the steam and other engines at present in use. In one of these experiments they sought to find what degree of tension the carbonic acid given off by bicarbonate of soda would have, and were surprised and pleased to find that this sodium salt (or the corresponding potassium salt) in a dry pulverised state, or in an aqueous solution, when heated in a closed place, gives off a portion of the carbonic acid, which is condensed at the cold end of the space, so that at a temperature of 300 to 400 C. liquid carbonic acid can be distilled out with a tension of 50 or 60 atmospheres. Dr. Beins has shown the experiment to several scientific men in Holland, and has found that the liquid acid, which

he calls 'carbolum,' supplies an excellent motive power under certain circumstances. The invention has been examined by an official commission in Holland, which, it seems, agreed with the inventor regarding the main points; but, for reasons independent of the project itself, the Government has not yet resolved upon its immediate adoption. Dr. Beins asserts that freezing machines, working by evaporation of carbolum, produce ice at less cost than any existing freezing apparatus; and that, as regards this general usefulness of carbonic acid, an inexhaustible store is obtainable from common chalk. The Western Railway has asked the Municipality to "let it off" paying the Lighting Tax, on the ground that it is a public establishment. Don't do anything of the kind, my Lord Mayor! Struggling editors and numerous other humble but industrious classes have to pay through the nose in the way of taxes, while a rich and powerful company wants to get off. If the W.R. had based its demand for exemption on the ground that it was asked to pay Light Tax when there is really no light worth speaking of, the application would be reasonable, but as it is it won't hold water. The little Dorado theatre in Plaza Lorea will shortly reopen its doors. The weather is getting too hot for the sock and buskin business to pay. The average public will be intensely gratified to learn that a grocer in Calle Belgrano (please remember the number, 194) was fined a thousand paper dollars some days ago for selling vinegar of a quality admirably adapted for taking the paint off a hall door, or for a summer drink for an astringent, but in no way suited for the human stomach. Rarely can an opera company, or a Variety Show attract 2000 people. Yet the sport is 'sumamente' barbarous and degrading. There is a Fat Men's Association in the United States, the members of which annually compete for superiority in the possession of adipose tissue, and whose challenge cup or champion belt takes the form of a 'great cane'—such a stick, we presume, as was used by the late Mr. Daniel Lambert when he took his walks abroad, and which an Irish parvour even wanted to borrow from him for the purpose of raming down some refractory boulders. The president of the society, who, for the present year, holds the baton of corpulent command, is Mr. W. Perkins, a young gentleman of twenty-two summers, who has attained the respectable weight of 369 lbs. avoirdupois. There were ninety-six honourable and obese members who made the beam to kick at 300 lbs.; and the aggregate weight of the association is estimated at 25,527 lbs. How this remarkable club grow fat is not stated; but it is probable that a judicious diet of oil-cake, pork and beans, hominy, succotash, clam-chowder, gumbo soup, roast squabs, fish-balls, and New England cider may have something to do with it. The Americans have always entertained a deep and a well-nigh superstitious reverence for Fat Men, and speak of them in tones of subdued respect as 'fleshy.' In a General Order of the day published yesterday an Ensign of the 1st Battalion of the 6th Regiment is degraded to the ranks for having struck with his sword a foreigner who was taken to his 'cuartel' on the night of the 14th inst. Such rigorous action on the part of the military authorities is much to be applauded. This case is the exception which proves the rule that the officers at the 'cuarteles' are in general most polite to those their duty obliges them to interrogate. We have had personal experience of this.

The mails from Ghile announce the total loss on that coast of the Delfina, formerly well known in River Plate waters as the Charrna. While going at full speed she ran on a sunken rock, and went clean down in half an hour. Nineteen persons were drowned. The catastrophe was awfully sudden, and the despair of the passengers dreadful. The second mate and engineer had escaped the lamentable America disaster in these waters: the latter was drowned in the Delfina. She carried three boats, but two of them were worthless. This is the most lamentable marine disaster that has occurred on the West Coast for years. The Montevideo papers are not over full of news. Minister Bustamante has bankers and capitalists with him every day 'engulfing their brains for some way out of the Pecuniary Muddle. A frightful free fight took place in Calle Agosto on Monday night between four civilians and the police: two of the civilians killed, and all the policemen under arrest. Mr. Twite is still pursuing his explorations in Minas. Lead, copper and iron pyrites are the principal minerals he has found there. Another letter on the subject of the Boating Club Regatta, from a Montevideo subscriber, will be found in another column. 'Hex,' 'Fair Play' and 'Putney' seem to have a strong case. Has the other side nothing to say? Now that war news has become un fashionable we have space for animated discussions on any mortal subject, from Boating to Ballooning, politics, theology and fixed currency excepted.

THE SITUATION. FIFTY-SEVENTH DAY. The Official Bulletin says the gunboat Parana entered port on Wednesday evening with a white flag, having on board Captain José Meymo, Chief engineer Alfred J. Hall, and 17 men, with a letter to the Government as follows:— "November 18th. "The bearers Captain Meymo and Mr. Hall, whom I have kept prisoners on board, will hand over to you the gunboat Parana, no longer required for the revolution. "I have not wished to destroy any of the vessels that were in my power, as I consider myself above all a good and loyal Argentine."

Erasmio Obligado. At 7 p.m. the Government sent to take possession of her, and found her intact. President Avellaneda has given her in charge to Captain Urbue. His Excellency had a long conference with Captain Meymo, whom he then sent to his house, as well as the men who were with him. The Minister of War has received a telegram from Las Flores, Nov. 18th, that Messrs. Rodriguez and Quesada arrived from Tapalque and reported Minister Alsina and Col. Luis Campos as pursuing Gen. Mitre towards La Blanca. Cols. Julio Campos and Lagos were close after him, and report baggage &c. abandoned by Mitristas in their flight. Advances from Rioja, Nov. 6th, report that Col. Concha with 50 men attacked and routed Loyola's force of 500, taking several prisoners, besides 200 of the rebels passing over to Concha. Loyola had fled to San Luis. General Navarro was shortly expected with a division at Rioja. The battle occurred on the San Luis frontier, and letters of the 8th say that of Loyola's 300 men fully 200 passed over to Concha. Telegrams received in Rosario say that when Gen. Arredondo entered San Juan not even the Mitristas joined him. Advances from Rosario, Nov. 18th, announce the arrival of the Faunty with the La Paz battalion. Rioja telegrams, Nov. 17th, state that Major Ponsalida occupied Vallo Fertil, Province of San Juan. Don Juan Gazzano is gazetted Port Captain at Rosario.

EDITOR'S TABLE. The great topic is the surrender of the Parana on Wednesday evening to the National authorities. There was considerable excitement in town when the news ran that she was entering port with a white flag displayed. Numbers of people rushed to the mole and beach, and the important news was soon known all over the city. The question now is, what effect will the event have on the duration of the war? There are some who say that the beginning of the end is at hand; others think not. In any case all chance of seeing a naval battle in the Plate is up. Take care! The fruit season is producing its usual results. Too many strawberries have given rise to several cases of Cholera in the city, and it behoves people to be cautious. Manching fruit at all hours of the day, a practice common amongst all classes here, is most pernicious. The time honoured saying that "fruit is Gold in the morning, Silver at noon and Lead at night" should be acted on by all. Within the last few days small-pox has taken an unpleasant start in some quarters of the city, and fatal cases have been more numerous than usual. The following paragraph may interest any readers who take a particular interest in hides and bones—"The immersion of hides per hour in a two per cent solution of carbonic acid, and then simply drying them, has, says the Scientific American, been recently substituted for the tedious and expensive process of salting them for transportation from South America and Australia, and with most satisfactory results. Bones have been similarly treated for transportation. A scheme for a new Port at Buenos Ayres has been placed before us, by Mr. Treum. Punta Lara is his 'point d'appui.' Belona is so much in the ascendant now that Port schemes can scarcely expect a fair hearing till the Temple of Janus is closed again, but Mr. T's project has merits which will no doubt meet with the consideration they deserve when 'War's alarms' shall be exchanged for 'the piping times of Peace,' which we hope may be soon.

The Custom-house daily receipts continue at a very satisfactory figure, considering the row going on. On Wednesday they reached 73,000 Patos. The heat yesterday was pretty stiff; a little over Summer heat. Many predict that we shall have a broiling Sunday, and that Celsius and Seltzer water will be in the ascendant for months to come. The fine steamer Pouton sailed for Europe yesterday, and took a fair number of passengers. The latest scientific advices from Europe lead to a belief, at least a well grounded hope, that that great desideratum, a substitute for Steam, has been at last discovered, and by a Dutchman, Dr. H. Beins, of Groningen, who, assisted by his brother, Mr. J. N. Beins, manager of the Netherlands Soda Factory at Amstardam, has been engaged in experiments, with a view of transforming heat into mechanical power more advantageously than is done in the steam and other engines at present in use. In one of these experiments they sought to find what degree of tension the carbonic acid given off by bicarbonate of soda would have, and were surprised and pleased to find that this sodium salt (or the corresponding potassium salt) in a dry pulverised state, or in an aqueous solution, when heated in a closed place, gives off a portion of the carbonic acid, which is condensed at the cold end of the space, so that at a temperature of 300 to 400 C. liquid carbonic acid can be distilled out with a tension of 50 or 60 atmospheres. Dr. Beins has shown the experiment to several scientific men in Holland, and has found that the liquid acid, which

he calls 'carbolum,' supplies an excellent motive power under certain circumstances. The invention has been examined by an official commission in Holland, which, it seems, agreed with the inventor regarding the main points; but, for reasons independent of the project itself, the Government has not yet resolved upon its immediate adoption. Dr. Beins asserts that freezing machines, working by evaporation of carbolum, produce ice at less cost than any existing freezing apparatus; and that, as regards this general usefulness of carbonic acid, an inexhaustible store is obtainable from common chalk. The Western Railway has asked the Municipality to "let it off" paying the Lighting Tax, on the ground that it is a public establishment. Don't do anything of the kind, my Lord Mayor! Struggling editors and numerous other humble but industrious classes have to pay through the nose in the way of taxes, while a rich and powerful company wants to get off. If the W.R. had based its demand for exemption on the ground that it was asked to pay Light Tax when there is really no light worth speaking of, the application would be reasonable, but as it is it won't hold water. Having read in your excellent paper two letters signed, 'Flex' and 'Fair Play' complaining (in my opinion very justly) of the manner in which the crews for the coming Regatta of the B. A. R. C. have been chosen, and having been for years a member of several London Rowing Clubs, I would offer a few suggestions with regard to Regattas and the choice of crews; which I trust will not seem obtrusive.

In the first place, the B. A. R. C. being a young Club, and this its first regatta, why should not all the members be considered as junior oarsmen and be treated alike? The question of seniors and juniors could be discussed at a later period, and a competition instituted for the honor of wearing a Senior's badge.

Secondly—Why was a general meeting convoked at all for the purpose of choosing crews? But when called why were not all the members present consulted? In most of the Clubs on the Thames such matters are left totally in the hands of the Committee, who in my experience have always managed in the following manner.

The names sent in for competition are placed in a box provided for the purpose, and should there be one, two or three entries more than can be accommodated the names of those who are drawn first are withdrawn until the proper number of oarsmen to form whole crews is arrived at; this gives every individual competitor a fair chance.

Permit me in conclusion, to remind the committee that in advertising a regatta it is customary, should there be any restrictions as to boats, to state them and also under what rules the rowing will be conducted; this prevents mistakes and consequent unpleasantness.
