he deserves to be so. We believe him to be an Argentine of North American origin, and brother of Mr. Hudson, an able member of Mr. Junor's staff of teachers. He is a naturalist in the most pleasant acceptance of the term. In common with Audubon, White and other writers on Natural History, he manifests great tenderness and sympathy for the animals whose nature and habits he is given to study. To judge from his writings, which are even somewhat voluminous, he is, as should be all men of his class, patient and persevering to a degree. He will spend days and nights, nay weeks and months, to acquire some unknown fact as to the habits and nature of the birds of his native land, and expresses the knowledge thus acquired in a language clear and simple, but which is remarkably fascinating and pleasant to read. There is no need of entering into details, let the curious reader for themselves by perusing his sketch of the 'bisbecha' and his notes, or rather treatise, on the 'Procreant Insects of the three Species of Molothrus' found in Buenos Ayres," taken from the proceedings of the Zoological Society of London, of which he is a corresponding member.

In conclusion, we would recommend both authors not to forget their native tongue, especially Moreno, for Spanish will be in time a language much more generally spoken than French; their present renown must be made subservient to future fame, as Hume remarked to Gibbon on a more celebrated occasion.

If these remarks will be taken as incentives, then what is written will not have been written in vain.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The mails from Europe by the Royal Mail Company's steamer Minho are important. The Russian Bear is again causing the British Lion uneasiness by an intensely grizzly joke which has just come to light. Russia, it will be remembered, like most civilised countries, sent several expeditions to observe the transit of Venus, and one of them found its way to the frontiers of that intellectual potentate whom London went mad about last year, the 'Shaw' of Persia. Lo and behold! the great Ba-Shaw awoke one morning lately to discover that the savans sent by Russia to look after Venus were nothing more or less than sons of Mars in disguise—staff officers, very 'savans' in their own line—ordered to survey the Shah's frontiers instead of Venus. Naz-er-ed-din jumped out of bed quicker than ever he did in his life before, and at once sent word to London of the state of the case. The poor Shah is evidently frightened out of his wits, and well he may be. The news has created an unpleasant sensation in England, where the annexation of Kibria is now believed certain. The Arun trial has ended in a sentence of three months' imprisonment for the Count. Spain is boiling still; and, on the whole, Europe had no prospect of passing a particularly merry Christmas.

Christmas Day passed off merrily enough in spite of a thundering shower in the morning which damped people's spirits lest their day's enjoyment should be spoiled. The clerk of the Weather, however, was kind, and the afternoon turned out very fine. There was a goodly number of excursionists to Flores, Belgrano, Tigre and other places. We hear that the shops did a splendid business throughout the week in Christmas presents, on which a couple of millions currency is estimated to have been spent. In some of the leading English and German families the splendor of the Christmas trees was quite unique.

We hear by letter from the Mount that the Perez revolution is over, and its leader trying to get out of the country. There was a royal auction in the Chamber of Representatives on Thursday, when the 'recusor' question was being discussed. Messrs. Vedia and Velasco began it. The *Telegrafo* says that the language used by some honourable members during the shindy was so offensive that it did not care to publish the debate.

We have Rio papers to the 20th by the R. M. S. Minho. The disturbances in the North continue, and the *Globe* announces fresh demonstrations in other parts of Alagoas; but Government is taking all the measures the case demands.

An interesting letter from Bolivia will be found in another column.

Shipmasters trading to Rio Grande should take notice that official announcement is made of the bar there having shifted to the southward during the recent gales. Its bearing is now N.E. to S.W.; and at high water there are 17 hands, instead of 14, in its former position.

The masked balls at the various theatres on the eve and festival of Christmas were in some cases well attended, but the 'verve' and animation of former years were wanting; most of the dresses were anything but brilliant, having a three, if not four-year-old look about them. Of course the 'can-can' was in the ascendant everywhere.

For original ideas and wit peculiarly their own commend us to our North American cousins. They have now hit on an unfailing plan for making little boys attentive to their lessons, though it has the drawback of offering a premium to little ladies for being quite the reverse. In case any of the numerous directors of schools in this city should like to try it we give this new feature in training the young idea. An Idaho schoolmarm has introduced it in her school. When

any girl misses a word the boy who spells it gets permission to kiss her. As a result, the girls are fast becoming poor spellers, while the boys are improving. I would I were a boy again."

Mr. Pompey Moneta, chief of the National Engineers Department, has resigned that post, and the President of the Republic has accepted the resignation.

A new Italian paper, the *Gazzettino*, is announced to appear on the 1st proximo.

The Government of Mendoza intends to erect on the battle field of Santa Rosa a magnificent marble monument to the memory of the officers and soldiers who fell there on the 20th of October and 7th of December.

A colleague gives some interesting incidents of the battle of Santa Rosa. So badly off for food were the National troops that on the night before the battle they had scarcely anything to eat, and the order was given to kill some artillery mules next day. General Roca and his staff dived off a writhed piece of jerked beef, and had to drink water in which the soldiers had bathed. Before they rose from Mess the purveyor sent in a solitary bottle of Muscatel, as a present to the Head Quarters Staff; a tin cup was passed round with the precious liquor, and every officer drank to Victory on the morrow; poor Colonel Paz was the jolliest of the lot, and his toast was that he might be able next day to drink to the health of General Roca. During the march that secured the victory the troops were not allowed to speak or smoke. The battle began at 5 a.m., and was over at 8. Commander Racedo's regiment fired the first volley of Remingtons, and then a cloud of skirmishers, French fashion, preceded the attack on the enemy's position. But for their too headlong valour Colonels Paz and Timoteo would have been spared, as almost the last shots from the enemy killed them.

We are requested to state that the Revd. James Smith, will preach tomorrow (Monday) at the estates of Messrs. Krabbe and Shennan; he will leave town by the first train.

To the Heights of Belgrano this evening all who value their temporal welfare ought to go. A small plot bought there, on which the humblest man can start a house and his own tree, may be a small fortune to the lucky possessor in a short time. As an example of how land increases in value in new countries, we may mention a case that occurred a few years back (not many) in Australia. Three gentlemen bought a large sheep run for £1500, each contributing a third, making the extraordinary agreement that any two of them could sell the property if a third happened to be absent. It did so happen that one of them went to Europe, and the others sold the land at a puny profit of £500. The absentee returned in a few months to find his property sold, and marked out for a railway; with two stations on it, and its value increased 10,000 fold. One way or another it is now returning £630,000 a year to the lucky purchasers.

We have to thank our colleague *La Republica* for its flattering critique on our Handbook, which we translate in another column.

Telegrams to Rio from New York speak of the probability of an import duty on coffee being put on.

We received yesterday copies of the *Sur-American*, a paper lately started in New York, to keep our cousins up to date. It is a small plot in this market, and spite of all our efforts for immediate improvement, it might appear inviting to put it in a list of all the firm names and private names removed from the market within the last 12 months, but it is certainly worthy of note that, if not all, at least 2 of the long list of heavy borrowers in the market is marked out, and the enormous interest rates which firms ranking the strongest in the Plate paid to it, later on their credit, or carry on the wild speculations will no longer reflect our money market to the prejudice of legitimate trade and business. With 2 banks alone we find 2,800,000 pesos as the figure representing protested bills and accounts under collection. Some 2 or 3 creditors have held their whole time taken up for months with the protest of bills, while in most cases, suspensions and moratoriums, until at last the great general firm of the market has given up the right of having 5 million pesos, surplus assets. The money crisis is certainly a capitalist crisis, in which the largest property holders are the most embarrassed. The point to consider is how will the market stand with all these semi-borrowers eliminated, and how it is likely that there is room to look for improvement. The long pending liquidation has come, and whether in the shape of a failure or a moratorium it is immaterial, since the number and character of our borrowers is diminished. For the last 2 years firms have been paying 18 and over 21 per cent to keep their credit afloat, these enormous interests have made money dear for ever since the simple business transaction and it is in the hope that the week's troubles will stop at this, that we see the signs of a sound and healthy market improvement. There is no money in the River Plate to carry on that has been attempted here within the last few years, if we want all the schemes, enterprises, companies and speculations begun to be carried on successfully, we must bring capital from abroad; the thing has been tried and failed; had our National Bank been placed in London instead of Buenos Ayres and Rosario how different would be the standing of the bank and its relations with the market to-day? Credit has been pushed to far, men have been led to regard property the same as money, a very grave error. The largest property holders are the weakest, the lesson is a severe but a necessary one, and let us hope will not be lost sight of.

The American mails were delivered on Christmas morning, much to the surprise of the American merchants. Owing to the late telegrams we receive now from New York the mails pass very slight interest in a now-a-days, but the circulars are important.
