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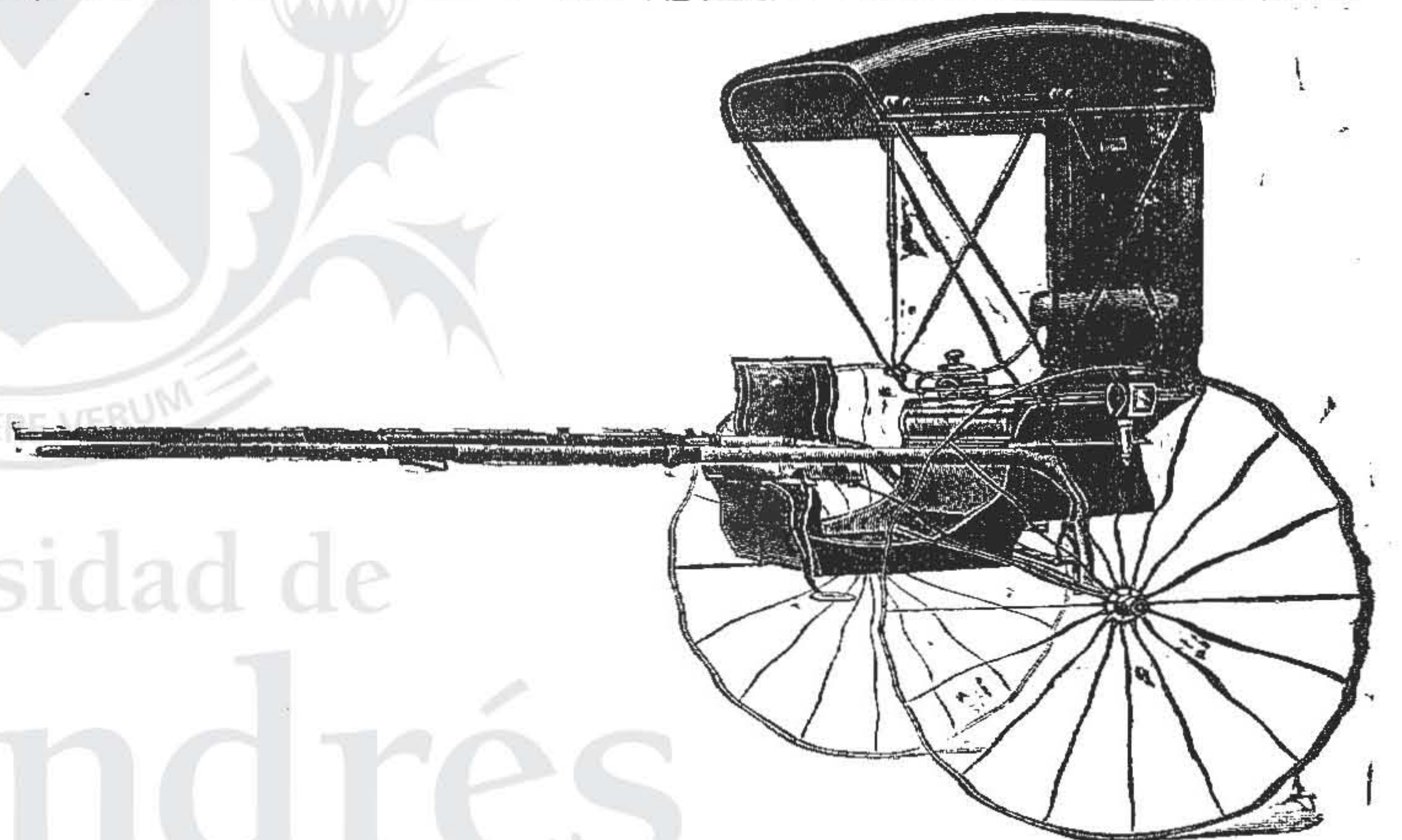
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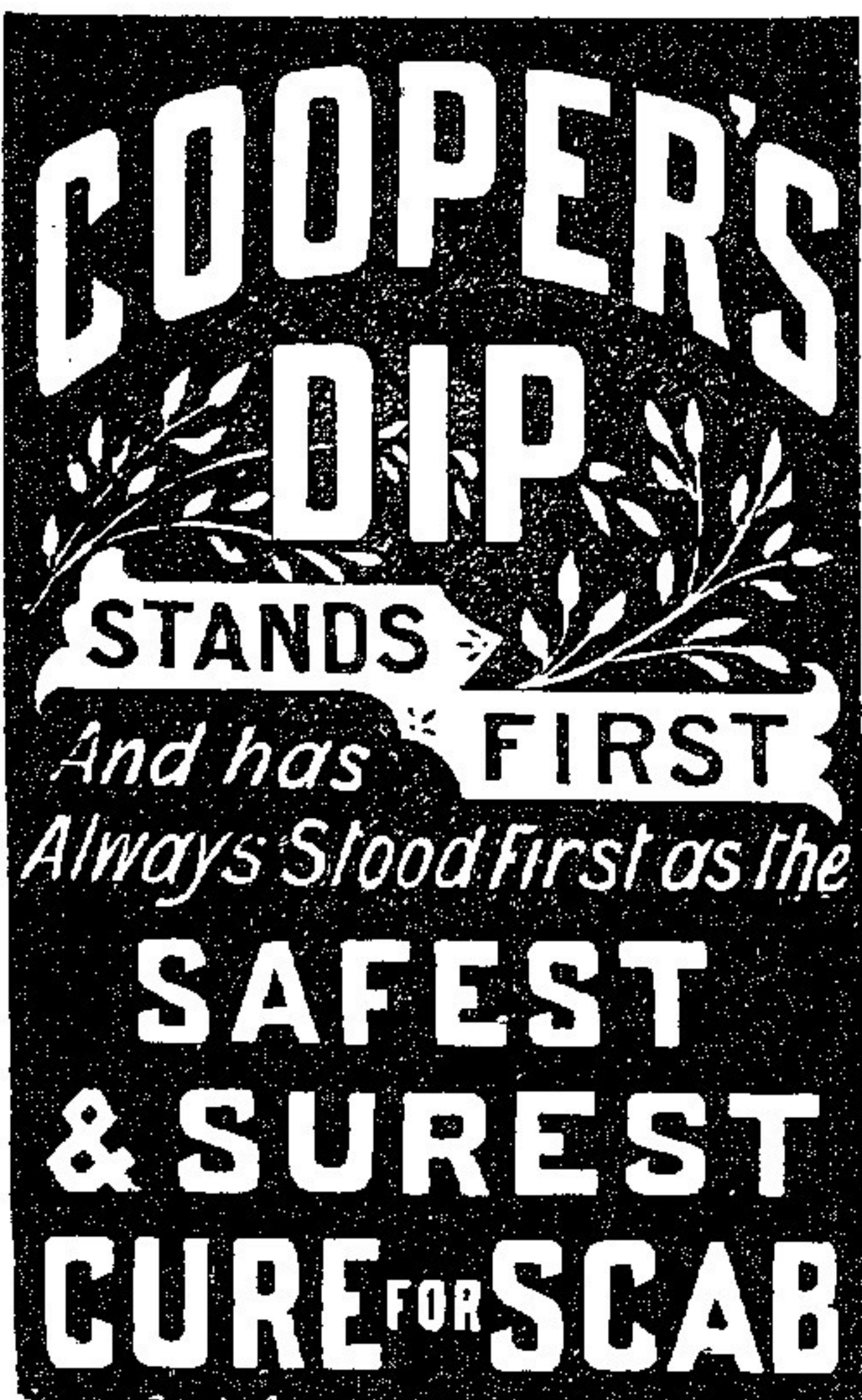
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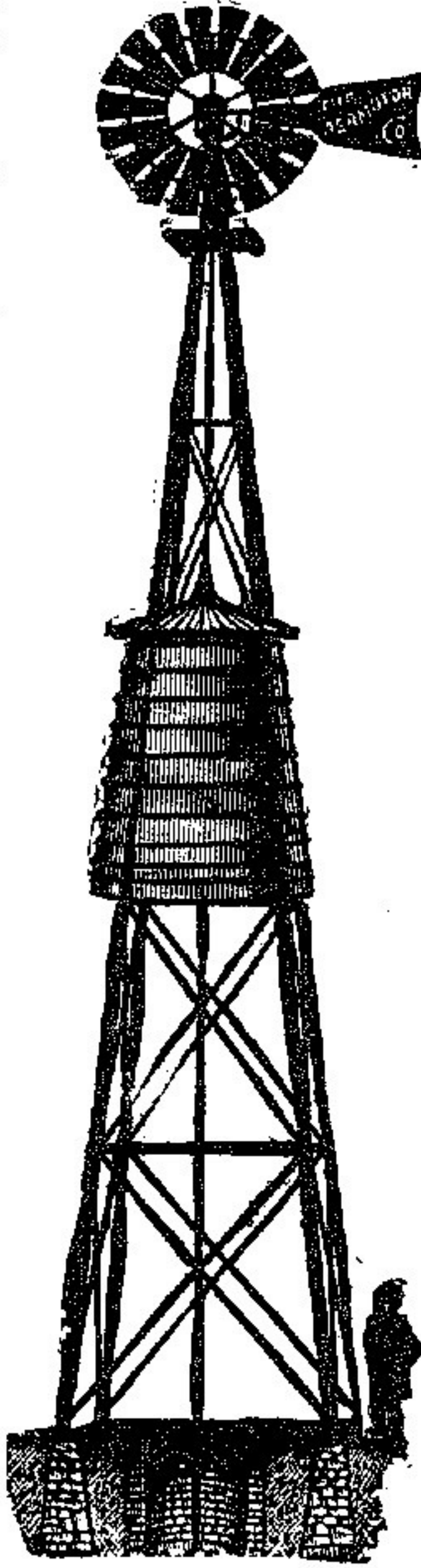
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RACING

PALERMO—JUNE 27.

In spite of a stiff and cold breeze, Sunday last turned out to be a bright and cheerful day, nevertheless the attendance was certainly not up to the mark, though by no means poor.

The first event on the programme was the Premio Imperio, for which all the seven entrants came to scratch. Rodin was made favourite, and this confidence turned out to be quite justifiable as he got home by a neck after a very pretty finish with Sorpresa.

Eight of the eleven that coloured on the card turned out for the Premio Gladiador, and of these Dorrego was made a hot favourite. Julius Caesar, however, from the start never allowed the final issue to be in doubt, as after making all the running he won comfortably by a clear length.

The classic produced a field of thirteen, of which the Petite Ecurie's representatives were the most sought after, though there was plenty of money for both Pillito and Ail. In spite of a vigorous challenge from Alarife, who was rather neglected, Pillito won cleverly by a clear length, Dobleto being a good third while Ail ran into the fourth position.

The Premio Acacia, of 2500 metres, gave that excellent horse Brick, another opportunity of showing us what he is really made of, for he took command at the start, and retaining it to the end, won comfortably by a length from Oriol, who made a plucky attempt to secure first honours.

A field of nine contested the Premio Neron II., and of these Hipolito was the most fancied, while Ortegale and Gavroche were also well backed. The race, however, fell to the top weight, Daza, who, in spite of the extra three kilos, finished strongly, more than a length to the good. Ortegale certainly made some show in the first part of the race, but the favourite was nowhere and finished last.

The Premio Florida attracted ten, of which Eureka was made favourite with Daine and Damara second and third favourites respectively. The result was a surprise, however, as the winner turned up in a rank outsider, Little Darling, while the favourite's running caused much discontent, as he never appeared to be really set going.

The Premio Artigas brought the day's racing to a close. Eight faced the starter, Minerva being installed favourite though neither Eureka nor Humo were neglected. The winner, however, turned up in Chaipuel, who after a fine race with Pichincha secured the verdict by a neck.

Brick took the lead immediately the flag fell, and running very strongly was some lengths to the good when passing the stand, Mundial lying next with Policeman and Laurel heading the rest. On arriving at the lower bend, the leader was steadied and the others came within a couple of lengths, but never looked dangerous until coming up the straight, when Oriol made a final effort, but was unable to get on terms with Brick, who won a really fine race by a length, Oriol being two lengths in front of Policeman with Stamboul fourth.

PALERMO—JUNE 29.

The Jockey Club were again favoured with fine bright weather on Tuesday last and the attendance showed a marked improvement. The racing was well up to the mark, and the only incident that rather spoilt an enjoyable day's sport, was the great dissatisfaction expressed at the placing of the second horse for the Premio Patria. There can be no doubt that Pompeyo did finish second, but the judge ruled Abrojo in that position, hence the trouble and discontent that was caused.

The classic was a grand race and one well worth seeing, and the fact that there was only a length at the finish between the first four in a race of 2000 metres, speaks for itself.

The day's sport opened with the Premio Gaviota, for which thirteen faced the starter, of whom Hermit and Bettina were the most fancied. But Sorpresa brought a surprise by just getting home a head in front of Voltigeur, with Flecha II. a head behind him. The winner paid the useful dividend of \$30.60.

The Premio Py, in which the three favourites all obtained places, attracted a field of eleven. Gavotte was the most fancied, but Nobleza and Oplencia were also well backed. The race fell to Nobleza, who finished comfortably a little more than half a length in front of the favourite.

A field of twelve turned out for the classic. The Stud Paris representatives carried a lot of money while Sebastopol was also much sought after, and Alacran was by no means neglected. At the fall of the flag Frouvette took a strong lead, which was later on increased. But Alacran came up strongly towards the end, and a fine race ensued between the last named Sebastopol and Ney, a most exciting finish ending in favour of Sebastopol, with Alacran a head behind, and Ney third a similar distance from Alacran, while Pergamino was only a half length behind fourth. It was a very fine race indeed and, moreover the running was true. The winner paid \$13.68.

Minerva scored a clever win in the Premio Murature, many thinking she would be unable to stay the distance with so good a field. She, however, proved these fears to be groundless and won with comparative ease.

Nine of the twelve that coloured on the card turned out to do duty for the Premio Espora, and of these Daza was made a very hot favourite. The winner, however, turned up in Oriente, who won after a good finish with Mignonnette.

Eight came to scratch for the Premio Patria, Abrojo carrying the weight of public money, with Pompeyo and Glicina as second and third favourites respectively. Pompeyo made all the running to the stand where Rosalvina challenged vigorously and just got home on the post. Pompeyo, who finished second, being placed third.

Only eight stripped for the Premio Thorne, which terminated the day's racing. Of these Meteoro was much fancied, but Hipolito turned out an easy winner, after Independiente had made nearly all the running.

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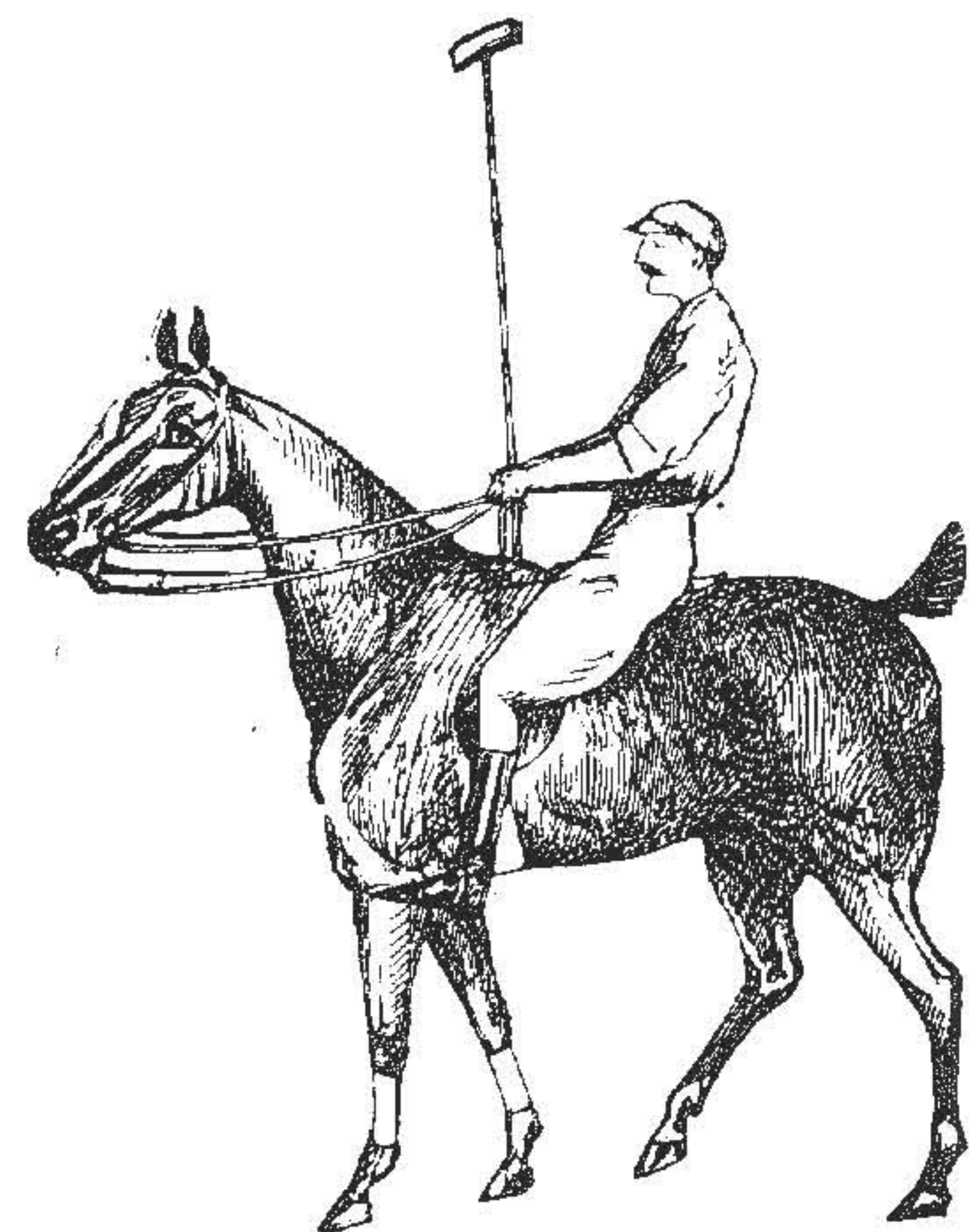
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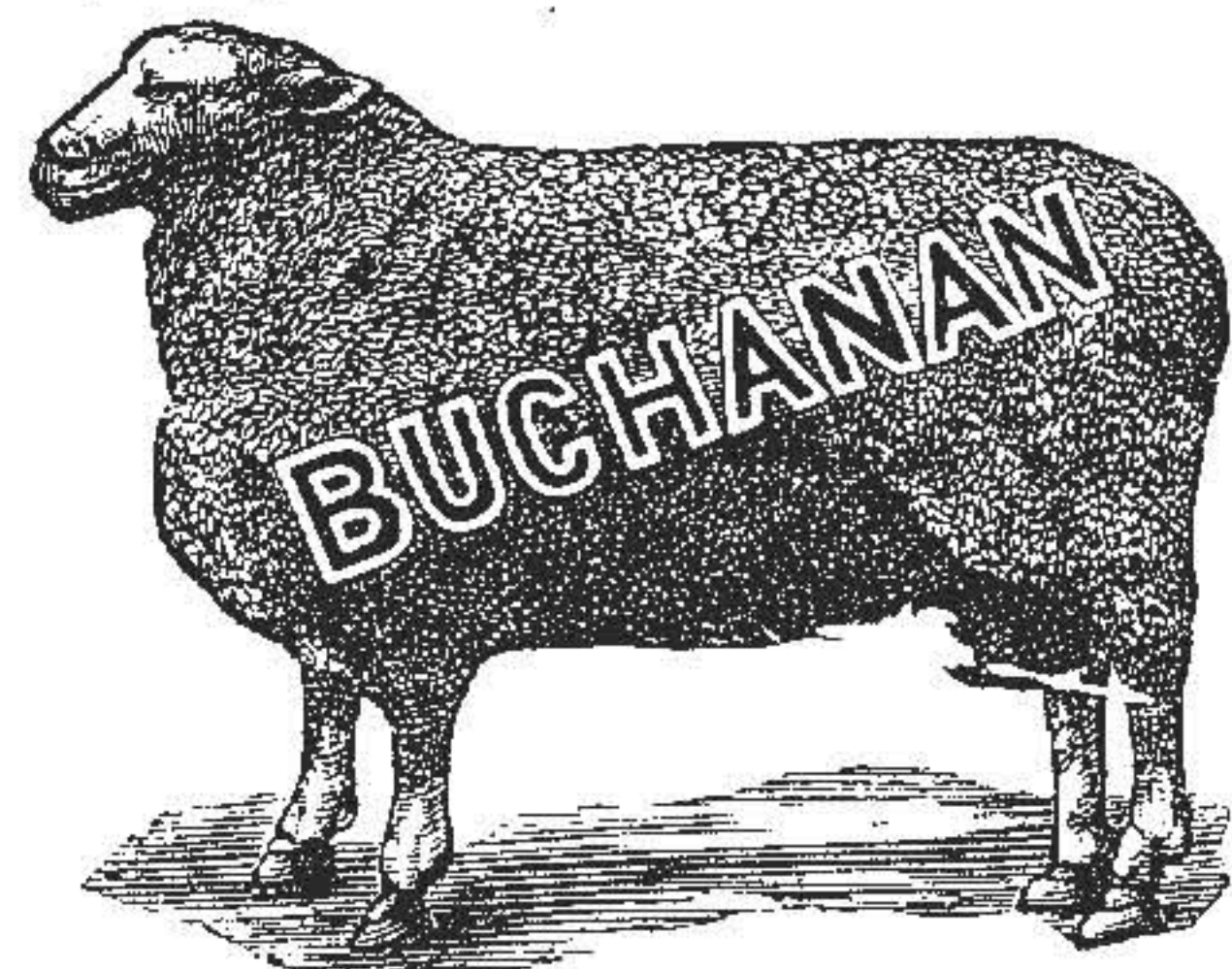

The race-going public at home were kept very busy at Epsom for the first days of June. The weather which opened dull and threatening cleared afterwards and enormous crowds found their way to the course. On the Oaks day the attendance was considered by many to have been a record one.

The Woodcote Stakes looked such a certainty for Perthshire, who started 11 to 4 on, that only four others could be found to oppose him and yet of these one beat him.

The Epsom Plate looked a good thing for Bradwardine, who was made favourite at 9 to 4. The issue was confined to him and Court Ball some way from home, and after alternately having the best of it the judge was unable to separate them at the finish.

Derby day opened in a most discouraging manner, a terrific storm having passed over Epsom and district the night before, but the weather cleared as the day wore on and a very large crowd attended.

C. Wood added another win to his already long list of successes by placing the Stanley Stakes to the credit of Galinthia, to whom the race was awarded, on account of Heir Male, who just got home by a neck, being disqualified.

All minds had been made up that Galtee Moore was to win the Derby, so that no one seemed to care about "places." The Prince of Wales and other gentlemen by coming to the rescue secured a field of eleven. The favourite, as our readers already know, won easily by two lengths, but Velasquez ran very well, and proved himself undeserving of the abuse that had been lavished on him.

The card on the third day contained three interesting events, the Surrey Plate, the Royal Stakes, a six furlong handicap, and the Durdans Plate over the Derby course. Strange to say, Bittern was made favourite for the first of these, and this good looking colt won easily, though our Queen made him go for the last furlong. The winner of the Royal Stakes turned up in an outsider, Royal Flush, who won by three parts of a length from Amandier.

Quarrel confirmed the good opinion formed of him by winning a nice race after giving everything lumps of weight in the Durdans Plate.

The Oaks day was well nigh ideal as far as the weather was concerned, but the result of the great race was a damper in ever quarter and among all classes, for, as the Derby, it looked like a one-horse race, for Chelandry. The race was, however, a genuine surprise, the favourite being beaten by Limasol, whose price was 100 to 8, and who may be described as a sort of unknown quantity, and it seems incredible that Chelandry's running could be true.

The last few months have brought about many changes in our small sporting community, and several whom we have seen for seasons past sporting their "footer" apparel are now to be found on the golf links, or enjoying some other pastime of a less violent nature than football. In other words, the Benedicts' ranks are swelling with amazing rapidity. On Thursday next the wedding of one of our best known and keenest cricketers here, in the person of Mr P. L. G. Bridger, will be solemnized at Lomas, where the good wishes of all River Plate cricketers will follow him.

Mr Bridger has been for many years one of the most active and energetic members of the Lomas Athletic Club, and the position the club holds today is in no small measure due to his energy. From 1892 to this past season he has captained the Lomas cricket eleven with marked success, and his enthusiasm has had much to do with the many victories the Southern Suburb have been able to claim during that period. He was also a member of the Association eleven who were returned at the head of the League for three successive years. I feel quite sure that in wishing Mr Bridger every success and happiness for the future, I am but echoing the sentiments of his numerous friends and well-wishers in the River Plate.

The building of the new cricket pavilion at the Kennington Oval will be commenced about the end of next August. The whole of the present building will be pulled down with the exception of the large dining hall, which will be enlarged, and with dressing and club rooms form a wing of the new pavilion.

Our next mails will bring us news of the doings of the Philadelphian cricketers at home. They have sent ever fourteen players and they arrived in London on June 2, and commenced practising at Lords the following morning. Their tour was to have been opened on June 7, at Oxford, against the University. They are a strong batting eleven and given good wickets should compile some big scores.

The wet weather experienced at home during the latter part of May and early part of June, put a stop to the high scoring that has been so much talked of. The County Championship seems likely to prove of a far more interesting character than it has done for some time past, both the crack counties having already been defeated, Surrey by Gloucestershire, and Yorkshire by Essex. Surrey have lately been showing such in and out form that their loss did not come as a surprise, but Yorkshire have such a powerful all-round eleven that it is difficult to account for their defeat.

Nottinghamshire, who of late years have fallen upon evil times, I am glad to say, seem to be looking up again. For some time past their committee have worked hard to try and unearth a new bowler, and at last their efforts have been crowned with success, and in the young professional Dench, they appear to have discovered a real treasure. He began well in the colts match and has since fulfilled the expectations then formed of him. In the match between Notts and Lancashire, which had to be abandoned through rain, he took five wickets in an innings of over three hundred at a cost of only sixty-two runs.

An incident that occurred in the match between the M.C.C and Leicestershire, at the end of May last should serve as a warning to all umpires to be careful to call the over instead of walking from the wicket as I have seen many umpires do in our matches here, after the five balls have been delivered. It is not very much more trouble to call the word "over" distinctly so that the batsmen may hear it, while it makes it quite impossible for any such unpleasant incident to occur as the one I am about to relate.

In this case the batsman, who was the well-known Sussex professional, George Bean, had made twelve runs by good clean hitting, and then returned the fifth ball of an over sharply to Woodcock, who rolled it back to the other end, and West, the umpire at the bowler's end, moved away, which evidently impressed Bean with the belief that the ball was dead, and he, in consequence, moved out of his crease. As it turned out, however, Woodcock hit the wicket and the umpire at the other end gave him out, an action which was naturally freely discussed. So far as concerned the other umpire he had no alternative, but it was certainly hard lines on the batsman, though West averred afterwards that he gave Bean no reason to think that the ball was dead.

3rd Race—20,000 metres (open to members of the C.C.P. only). 1. Montigaud-Hayton—2. Fontan-Dartiguelongue—3. Lazzarini-Butti. Won easily by about 20 metres, 30 metres separating second and third.

### UNION VELOCIPEDICA ARGENTINA.

The races organized by the the above association came off at Palermo on Tuesday the 29th inst., in the presence of a large and enthusiastic number of spectators.

The first race, which was the Championship of the Argentine Republic over one kilometre, was run in two heats owing to the large number of competitors, the three first in each heat running in the final, the results being: 1st heat—1. Radó—2. Linares—3. Montfort; 2nd heat—1. Montigaud—2. Spofford—3. Hayton. Final heat—1. Radó—2. Hayton—3. Linares.

In a race of this nature, where the fifth of a second makes a great difference, we were surprised to see such men as Brice, Peró, Tallibart and others lose so much on the start. They all seemed to hesitate as if each wished the other to lead, and meanwhile the more wide-awake made the most of their opportunity and got away.

The second race was a handicap of 3000 metres, open to members of the Tandem Club, and resulted in an easy win for Dartiguelongue, who ran from the 50 metre mark, Castro scratch being second, and Spofford (who by the way is a professional recently arrived from Brazil) also scratch, being third.

The next race was for the Argentine Championship, over 25 Kilometres, some 15 men starting, the number gradually decreasing as the race progressed.

Two or three times during the race, when on the back part of the track and out of sight of the Judges, Monfort and Spofford, who both ran very unfairly throughout, made several attempts to foul Brice, fortunately without gaining their end, but in the last 800 metres Monfort distinctly fouled him on two occasions, the last time when about five metres from the tape. Had it not been for this Brice would undoubtedly have won, as after all, he was only beaten by about six inches!

It is greatly to be regretted that the judges thought fit to over-rule the appeal which Brice immediately made, but we hope that the Union, to whom the case has been carried, will reverse their decision, and have the race run over again.

These kind of tricks will be rendered impossible on the new racing track which we hope will be constructed during the next six months, when the system of pacing teams will be instituted, and then we may hope to see the best men come in first.

We have since been informed that Brice challenged Monfort to a race over any distance, with, or without pace-makers; but the challenge was not taken up.

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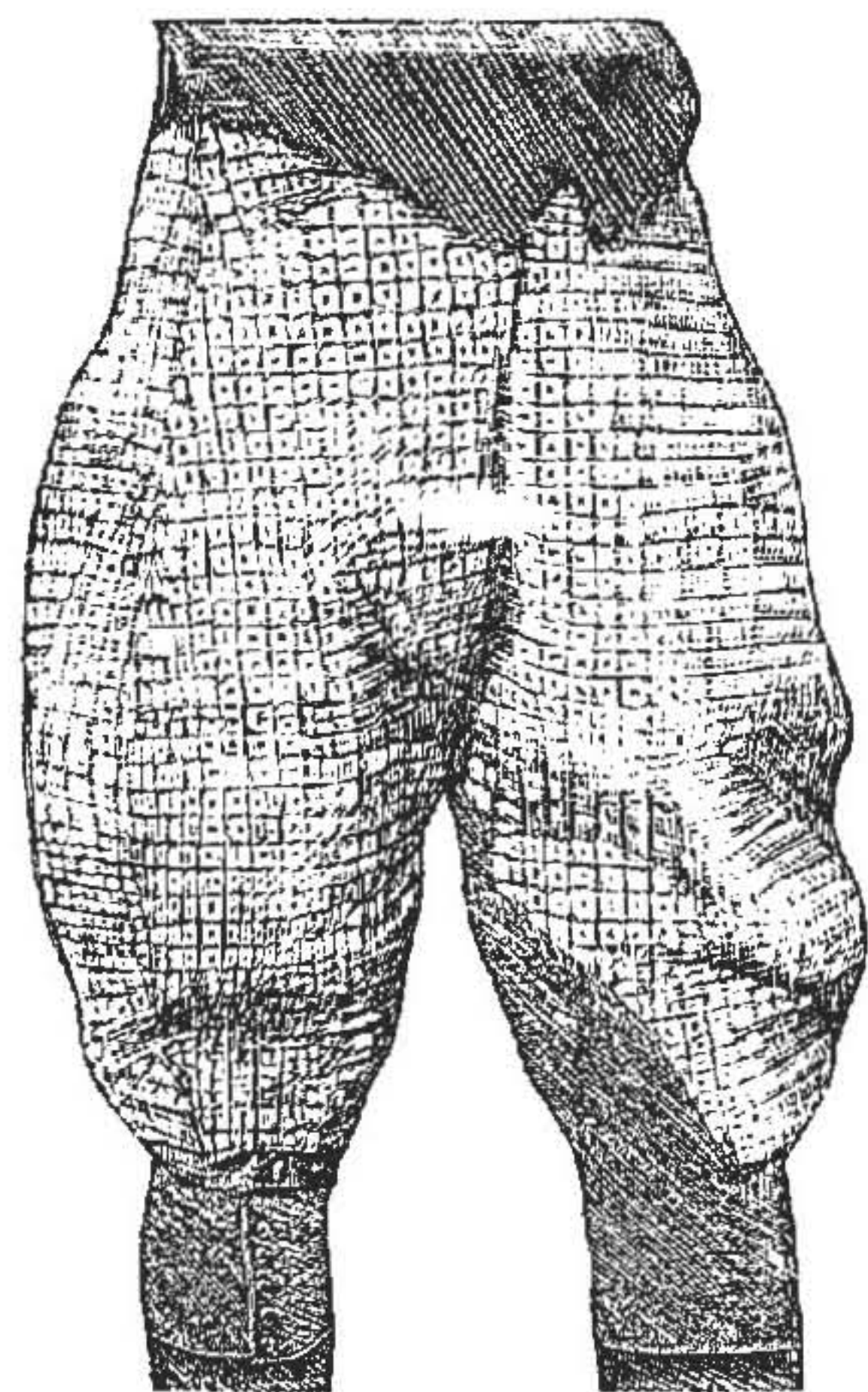

**ESTANCIA AND COLONY.**

The growing of the peanut in the Banda Oriental has met with most satisfactory results, the soil being very good giving forth sand and healthy plants. Messrs Olascoaga and Jaime have just sent into Montevideo 150,000 kilos of nuts from their estancia Stago, on the banks of the river Yi. These nuts will be manufactured into oil.

\*\*\*

Dr. Maciá, the Governor of the Province of Entre Rios has made a gift of one million olive plants to the Concordia and Federacion districts in said province, the growing of olives for oil in those districts promises to become of great importance.

\*\*\*

The linseed harvest in Santa Fé has already been gathered in. The results are less than last year owing to growers not being able to give full attention to their plants on account of their having to combat the locusts.

\*\*\*

If, as be expected, that the coming harvest of wheat and linseed which has been sown, gives good results, it is calculated that it will bring in no less than between sixty and seventy million dollars.

\*\*\*

We learn from Cordoba that due to the cold weather which has at last come upon us, the malady amongst cattle, known by the vernacular name of "tristeza," has nearly disappeared, and it is hoped that if the cold continues the disease will completely die out.

\*\*\*

Messrs Souberan and Co. have sold to the committee of Santa Fé, named for the distribution of seed by the National Government, 115,000 bags of wheat at prices from \$10.40 to 10.50 per bag, the operation realising \$1,201,750.

\*\*\*

The Provincial police have discovered on a puesto of an establishment in Juarez a flock of Lincoln and Rambouillet sheep which had no less than fifteen marks (señales), and for which there was only one certificate. At the same place there were found 57 sheepskins, with ten different marks, and all of them without certificates. The puestero is in prison.

\*\*\*

By order of the Public Lands Office some sixteen chacras situated in the neighbourhood of the town of Suipacha are to be put up to auction. The base of sale is \$45 per hectare, and the payment is one-sixth in cash and the remainder in five yearly instalments.

\*\*\*

Mr Raul Sanchez has sub-let half a league of camp in Bahia Blanca to Mr Martin Ubiria at a yearly rental of \$4200. Two months ago Mr Sanchez hired this camp for \$3500 per annum.

\*\*\*

In spite of the cold weather recently experienced we learn from many parts that the locusts are still doing much damage. From the Ceres Colony in Santa Fé we hear that notwithstanding the heavy frosts the locusts seem to have taken up a permanent residence there, and have already devoured nearly all the linseed.

\*\*\*

We read in the "Live Stock Journal" for June 4 that the red Shorthorn bull Berwick, the property of Mr. R. Claud Hamilton, Killeshandra, that won second prize in the two-year-old class at Belfast, has been sold to Mr. Hughes, for this country. He will leave England this month after fulfilling his engagement as a Queen's Premium bull at Drummany House, Killeshandra.

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## EN PASSANT.

Sugar is selling in Salta at \$1.80 the ten kilos.

Chile is annoyed because we are stationing 4000 troops in Neuquen.

Sugar cane in Tucuman at present is worth only \$1.15 the ten kilos.

Bismarck, the man of iron, is again to have a voice in the state affairs of Germany.

Mendoza intends to proclaim Tiburcio Benegas as candidate for the vice-presidency of the republic.

Fregoli, who has taken the place of Frank Brown in the San Martin, is drawing crowded houses nightly.

The foundation-stone of the tabernacle of the first Jewish Synagogue in this city was laid last Sunday.

The income of the Province of Buenos Aires for the month of June, from all sources, reached \$1,478,819.40.

A French chemist has invented a blue soap which renders unnecessary the use of bluing in laundry work.

A ball will be given on board the U.S.S. Castine, by United States citizens, to commemorate the Fourth of July.

Cotton seed is being distributed in Cordoba. It is thought that cotton growing in the province will give good results.

A gold mine called Inca, in Peru, discovered lately by Mr Adam Hilliker, is said to give twenty ounces of gold per ton of quartz.

The Radical procession to the tomb of Alem, on the first anniversary of his death on Thursday last, numbered about 2000 people.

The Water Works Commission intend abandoning the idea of putting meters in the houses to register the amount of water used.

For the first six months of this year the Custom-house of this city collected \$27,446,067 paper and \$1,769,692 gold for import and export dues.

The unemployed in the salitre works at Iquique and Tarapaca are receiving free passages to Valparaiso by order of the Chilean Government.

The returns for the month of June of the Civil Registry of this city give 2626 births, 526 marriages, and 1113 deaths, producing \$14,880 in fees.

Graven upon the tombstone of a jockey who has just been buried in a New Zealand cemetery are the simple words, "He has passed the post."

The highest quotation of gold on the Bolsa during the month of June was on the 3rd, when it reached 298.50, and the lowest was 285.50 on the 30th.

The revolutionists in the Banda Oriental are now in possession of the north of the republic, and have installed their provisional government in Rivera.

The sale of public lands in Section 19 of the Pampa Central, held on Thursday last, averaged \$3600 the square league. The sale continues to-day.

It is rumoured that we are trying to buy an ironclad of 9600 tons which the Messrs Armstrong are constructing alongside the new Chilean ironclad O'Higgins.

In Labrar, Province of Atacama, Chile, twenty-two miners have been entombed owing to the sides of the mine caving in through the recent inundations.

Due to the low state of the river for the past week there has been a blockade amongst the shipping, vessels not being able either to sail from or come into port.

The adorning of the Plaza Mayo for the Ninth of July will cost \$15,000, and \$1650 will be spent in fireworks in the Plaza Colon, the site of the old Custom-house.

To have an invention protected all over the world it is necessary to take out 64 patents in as many different countries, the estimated cost of which is about £3500.

At a meeting of the creditors of the insurance company La Porteña, held on Wednesday last, there was only one vote against granting the company a moratoria.

The Czar of Russia plays on the cornet, it is said, with such utter disregard to time and tune that someone once hinted that it entirely accounted for the existence of Nihilists.

The aggregate traffic receipts of the Anglo-Argentine Tramway, from January 1 till April 29 this year, were £68,273, and for the corresponding period in 1896 they were £62,709.

The only satisfaction that Argentina has received for the violation of her territory by armed men belonging to the Oriental navy is the imprisonment of a lieutenant and four sailors.

Counterfeit silver dollars are in circulation in Montevideo. They contain a mixture of copper, pewter, and silver, which gives nearly the true "ring," while the weight is almost exact.

An American committee has been formed to work conjointly with the English committee in deciding upon a memorial of Sir Isaac Pitman, the founder of the popular system of shorthand.

Oranges and other classes of fruit coming from Paraguay are admitted here free from Customs duties, yet it appears that vegetables shipped from Argentine ports are subjected to heavy taxes in Asuncion.

The Postmaster-General has been vested with power to enforce the Southern, Western, Rosario, Central Argentine, Ensenada, Gran Sud de Santa Fé y Cordoba, and Oeste Santafecino railways to reduce their tariffs for telegrams to the same rates as charged by the State lines.

For the first four months of this year the aggregate traffic receipts of the Buenos Aires and Belgrano Tramway were £16,104 15s 1d, and £14,731 5s 5d for the corresponding period of 1896.

The rumoured offensive and defensive alliance between Japan and Spain, for the purpose of trying to force the United States to see things from their point of view, turns out to be incorrect.

Sir Henry Irving and Miss Ellen Terry will visit Paris next summer, in order to give a series of performances at the Renaissance Theatre. This will be the first professional visit paid by Sir Henry to France.

At the conclusion of the fourth race in Maroñas (Montevideo) last Sunday there was a free fight with whips between the riders of the horses Caton (the winner) and Chana, in which the public took part.

The Spanish troops in Cuba have more than the revolutionists to contend with—yellow fever, typhus fever, smallpox, dysentery, etc., are ravaging the island. In the Province of Havana there are 20,000 cases of sickness.

It has been discovered that there is no dry dock of sufficient size and strength in the United States to accommodate battle-ships of the Indiana type, and the government will probably have to send the Indiana abroad to be docked.

The elections for Deputies to the Provincial Legislature of San Luis take place on July 4. Everything points to scenes of bloodshed on that day, and it is reported that even schools have been turned into barracks for armed men.

The Indian cacique Juan Andrés, of the tribe of Califucurá, wants to be good and settle down to a quiet life, and for that purpose asks the National Government to grant him and the members of his tribe some public lands to the south of the Neuquen territory.

We are requested to state for the information of the Yacht Club members that advices just to hand from Moore, Tudor and Co. report the shipment of the Doris from London on June 5 by the Castilian Prince, and the Daphne from Liverpool by the Cyrene on June 26.

Natives of the Province of Corrientes residing in this city have formed themselves into a committee to collect subscriptions for purchasing a flag to be given to the torpedo catcher Corrientes when she arrives here from England. The idea seems to be very popular with all classes of Correntinos.

Squatters on the public lands near the port of Bahía Blanca are in a bad humour because the National Government has rented the lands to a company. They want the land to be rented in lots, saying that it would produce more rent, and that then their rights as first settlers would be taken into account.

The Bolivian authorities levy a tax of \$5 per head on cattle, horses and mules that are taken from Argentina to that country, while on the contrary live stock coming from Bolivia to here are free of all imposts. It is now proposed to put a tax on, for the protection of cattle-breeders in Oran and neighbouring parts.

The number of mountain railways in the world in 1895 was as follows: Switzerland, 17; Germany, 14; Austria, 10; Italy, 4; France, 4; while four were distributed between Spain, Portugal, Greece, and Madeira. In Asia there were three, one in Sumatra one in Japan, and one in Syria. In North America there were three, in Central America one, and in South America four.

The costliest crown is that worn by the Czar of Russia on ceremonial occasions. It is surmounted by a cross formed of five magnificent diamonds, resting upon an immense uncut but polished ruby. The ruby rests on 11 large diamonds, which in turn rest on a mat of pearls. The coronet of the Empress is said to contain the most beautiful collection of diamonds ever massed together.

During the last few years nearly 150,000 Jews have entered the Holy Land, and the arrival of another host is said to be imminent. If this report is correct, a revolution in the politics of Mediterranean Asia may be anticipated. Already the railways are opening the country between the coast and Jerusalem and Damascus, and a Jewish migration on a large scale may cause Syria to become once more of vast importance in the East.

The extent to which the foreign trade of Japan has developed may be gathered in part—but only in part—from the figures submitted by Takaaki Kato, the Japanese Minister, to the London Chamber of Commerce. He gave the exports of Japan in 1896 as £57,800,000, as compared with £16,200,000 ten years ago. It would not be easy to parallel such a development in commercial history, and yet the commercial expansion of Japan has only begun.

New Zealand journalists are making much of the reported fact that the Prince of Wales has sent for a piece of Mosgiel tweed. The millowners are said to have sent enough for a full suit. "The sight of the Prince clad in colonial tweeds made on colonial looms should," says one journal, "send every colonist to go and do likewise." According to the same authority the Princess of Wales has had various dresses made from New Zealand tweeds.

Frozen poultry from America is now sold wholesale in large quantities at Leadenhall Market, London. Large orders for the frozen birds have been executed, and the trade seems to be one with great possibilities. The inferior sorts go at 6d per lb., while the best realise 9d. There have, of course, for some time past been quantities of Australian frozen chickens on the market, but the rate of freightage is so heavy that the Americans gain a great advantage in this respect.

From Winnipeg comes the news that a band of Indians who have lately been giving serious trouble have been completely wiped out at Prince Albert. Under their chief, named Almighty Voice, the braves offered such a desperate resistance that it was necessary to bring up a light field gun and shell their entrenchments on the top of a bluff. This done, the position was charged, but only one man was found alive, and, as he still showed fight, it was necessary to kill him.

Mr Oscar Wilde is assured of an income for some little time to come. Several gentlemen of the highest respectability, who used to be in his circle, were of opinion that it would be only humane to give him a fresh start in life, and, putting their subscriptions together, raised over £500. They did this without condoning the past in any way. It is understood by the friends of the family that Mrs Oscar Wilde, who has a private income, intends to make her husband a small allowance as long as need be.

As showing the rapidly-increasing popularity of long-distance pigeon-flying as a sport, it is computed that upwards of 30,000 birds were liberated at Worcester alone on May 15, two special trains, composed of twenty-eight vans, being required to convey them from Manchester and the surrounding districts. The liberation of the birds was witnessed by large crowds of people, and as some of the "tosses" numbered 6000 birds at one time, the sight was a remarkable one. Similar scenes were enacted at Swindon on the 22d, and the station was completely blocked by panniers of pigeons for liberations.

The two wine-producing provinces of Argentina—San Juan and Mendoza—give an annual production of a million hectolitres of wine. San Juan has 8000 hectares of land under vine cultivation, Mendoza 17,000 hectares, and in the rest of the republic there are 5000 hectares. These 30,000 hectares give a total of 1,200,000 hectolitres of wine, so that we have to import yearly 1,300,000 hectolitres, as it is calculated that the consumption of wine per head throughout the republic is 50 litres, which is inferior to that of other wine-producing countries (France, Spain and Italy consuming 100 litres per head).

The motor car competition for prizes amounting to 1110 guineas, offered by the "Engineer" has been unsuccessful, and the proposed run of motor cars from the Crystal Palace to Birmingham has been abandoned. The judges—Sir Frederick Bramwell, Mr J. A. F. Aspinall, chief mechanical engineer to the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway, and Dr John Hopkinson—have decided that they cannot award a prize to any of the cars exhibited. Although the judges could not see their way to award any prizes, yet the steam cars of the Liquid Fuel Engineering Company and the Bushbury Electric Construction Company (Wolverhampton) were highly recommended.

The Victoria Convalescent Home Ball held at Prince George's Hall on Wednesday evening last was a brilliant success in every possible way. The beautiful scene will long be remembered by those who were fortunate enough to have witnessed it. The decorations were magnificent and most tastefully arranged, while the uniforms of the naval officers present all tended to make the scene a very brilliant one. The music, under the able direction of Sr. Furlotti, was excellent, and the floor was as nearly perfect as possible. The supper arrangements were also very good, and all present expressed themselves delighted with them. The thanks of the public are due to the hard-worked committee, who may truly be said to have surpassed all previous efforts in this direction.

The newest form of entertainment for our young friends has been the arrangement of a series of Afternoon Dances at the Prince George's Hall. The dances take place from 4.30 to 6.30 p.m., and are likely to become the rage of every lover of a good floor, excellent music, and good company. The committee is composed of Mrs J. Drysdale, Mrs Nuttall, Mrs Heriot, and Mrs Roberts, with Mr F. M. Still as hon. secretary. The first of the series took place on Friday last, and everyone present voted the two hours spent at the hall as most enjoyable, and the committee are to be congratulated on the success of their enterprise. The next dance takes place on Tuesday next, the 6th, and it promises to be one of the brightest "baileitos" of the season.

One of the European squadrons that are doing police duty in the waters of Crete and neighbourhood has suffered a serious mishap. According to telegrams the Italian cruiser Giovanni Bausan had five men killed and ten seriously wounded by a boiler explosion. Disasters to merchant and passenger vessels are also rife this week. The steamer Aden, on a voyage from Japan to England, struck on rocks off the Island of Socotra, and out of a passenger list of thirty-four only nine have been saved, while three Europeans and thirty-three coolies of the crew are all that are accounted for. A collision has occurred between two German steamers in the Dardanelles, causing the foundering of one with the loss of thirteen lives, and an Austrian vessel which went to the rescue lost two men by the capsizing of a boat.

The inter-Parliamentary chess match, conducted by cable between players representing the British House of Commons and the United States House of Representatives, took place on May 31 and June 1. The tournament resulted in a tie. The draw for play, with the result, is as follows:

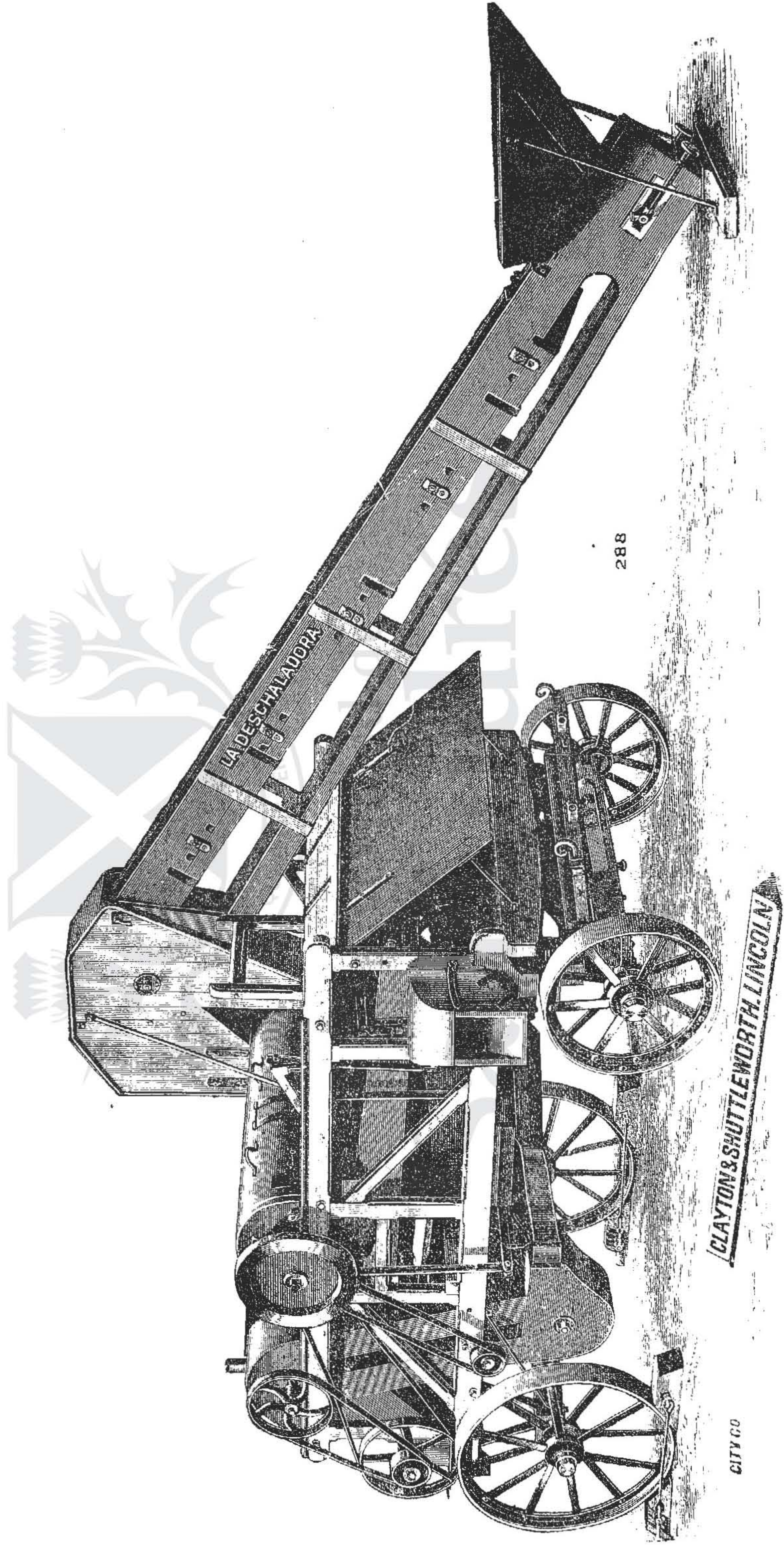


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
