RACING

PALERMO—OCTOBER 31.

The thunder shower on Saturday night came at a most opportune moment, as the temperature of Friday and Saturday would have spoiled the two holidays, and though the rain was scarcely worth counting, and did not even lay the dust, the atmosphere was completely changed and the fresh breeze made a very enjoyable day. Unfortunately Sunday's programme, one of the most meagre of this year, was further clipped by desertions, one race of three horses, one of four, and two of five being something almost unheard of at Palermo. The attendance was not bad, the public being drawn out more by the fine weather than by the sport, and the winners of the other three races gave in each instance more than \$20, so that something was to be gained by the lucky ones.

All interest was removed from the Premio Primavera by the absence of Balcarce and Pillito as nothing else entered could hope to stretch Yatagan. Flageolet gave the favourite a tolerable run and received \$500 for it, and Siton galloped after them and came in fifty lengths behind.

The only other races worth mentioning were the Premio Mar del Plata, won by Redoutable in fine style, and the Premio Mercedes, in which Amelia had all she could do to keep off Gonin. The other races were easily won and uninteresting.

From a good start Galatea jumped off in front followed by Esfinge and Dante. At 200 metres Esfinge went up and made the pace a cracker to the straight, when she was done with, and Lavalleja passed the leaders to win easily by a length. Dante kept second place, beating Helecho by half a length. Crucero, who came late, was fourth.

PALERMO—NOVEMBER 1.

Another beautiful day with crisp, bracing air and less wind than yesterday, so not much dust. This, with a much better programme than the previous one, brought out a numerous crowd, and as it was more or less a favourite's day probably more people went home contented.

The Classic, though spoiled by the nonappearance of any of the three-year-olds, was well supported by the past generation. Argentino, Alacran, Pergamino, Blue Boat, Colombia, Purran and Orsino formed the field and by no means a bad one. Though the win was tolerably easy, it was by no means a run away victory and the result might be well reversed on another occasion. Pergamino who was left out in the betting came with a rush that shows an improved form and he will probably be heard of before long. Colombia, who was expected to make a good bid ran disappointingly, and by no means in her proper style, and Purran has gone backward in an extraordinary manner.

The meeting began with a strong attempt by Reserva who was going for the double event, but was foiled by Tiradentes and Margot, the former winning easily enough.

Validé nearly ran away with the mile for fillies, but Hidalgo was good enough to catch her at the stand.

Stamboul should evidently have won the Selling Plate with ease had he not been ridden in such outrageous fashion, to be kept 50 metres behind the other horses in an 1,800 metres race being beyond criticism.

Reserva fairly slipped his field in the long distance to the great delight of the multitude and had the race won from the start.

A lucky get off assisted Hidalgo to secure the double event, and Don Gonzalo finished a good day's sport by winning the 2,000 metres easily under the welter weight of 63 1/2 kilos, a splendid performance.

The lot went half way in a group headed by Dante and Orleans, Margot and Tiradentes whipping in, then Reserva came up and after a struggle with Dante took the lead. Margot, who had improved her position gradually, looked like winning in front of the stand, but Tiradentes, who had followed, challenged, and getting the best of a good finish, won by a neck. Reserva third three parts of a length off.

From behind the bushes the lot came in view together. After 300 metres Oxiacanta got in front and kept there to the bend where Validé took command and came into the straight two lengths ahead. Here Hidalgo, who had never been far off came up to the leader and won a good race by half a length, Ceniza third a length away.

At a slow pace Monk made running from Salteador, Stamboul remaining so far behind as to appear out of the race. An excellent programme for Sunday, and an even better one for Thursday should make a satisfactory week for Turfites. The Mile Handicap is a very difficult one to choose from, but for once, Ortegá may be able to keep in front to the end.

There seems to be nothing to push Tántalo in the 1800 metres, and Reserva should be able to win the long distance against Don Gonzalo with 64 kilos.

Thursday's Meeting begins with a mile which has another mediocre lot and very heavily weighted at 58 to 63 1/2 kilos. Lavalleja should be able to carry this impost better than the others. 24 losers are still left for the 1200 metres. The 200 more will be too much for Usura, and Saint Brise if a winner on Sunday will have to put up 3 kilos extra. Among the others Ceniza and Tamberlick look the best.

The Mile Handicap may give Margot an opportunity of avenging her defeat last week.

The Classic 3000 metres a \$5000 Prize for three-year-old colts and fillies offers little interest as Yatagan can only have two dangerous adversaries, Gonin and Tántalo.

In the Premio San Antonio, Oriel if he win the previous day will have to concede 3 kilos to Brick whose chance I prefer in consequence, but the result may be just the contrary as Brick might win on the first day.

The Mile Handicap for three-year-olds is very open and may go to Palermo.

The Consolation 2000 should wind up the meeting with an excellent race, the average class of the horses being much better than usual. My preference for Lince and Minerva.

NOTES ON HOME RACING.

(FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.)

The Autumn Campaign at Newmarket this week was interesting in the extreme, and big fields were seen out each day, the interest, of course, being centred on Thursday's Jockey Club Stakes, in which the opposition numbered eight. Velasquez was installed favourite, though he was conceding twelve pounds to Chelandy. Lord Rosebery having decided to run them both on their merits, and so madeno declaration; she and Love Wisely were next in demand, and though it was generally thought that any return of the latter's form, when the son of Wisdom and Lovelorn fairly made St. Frusquin gallop coming out of the dip, in the 2000 guineas last year, would make him a dangerous opponent to the favourite, few, if any, were prepared to see him gallop away, make all the running and never be caught. Whoever gave Rickaby his instructions could not possibly have given better as there was no fear on the score of his not staying, but danger appeared to come from Velasquez's speed, and one might say he had come to the end of his tether when the time came to turn it on. It must not be forgotten that Love Wisely had nine pounds the best of the weights with Donovan's son, but he gave all that back in the beating he gave him, as though he was being driven along from start to finish, Velasquez never appeared really dangerous, and the winner of last year's Gold Cup scored a most meritorious victory, and was promptly installed first favourite for the Caesarewitch, for which his impost now brings him to the top of the list of probable starters with 9 st 2 lb. With all his big burden he will be a competitor to be reckoned with.

Not many people witnessed the finish of the Welter Handicap on Thursday, but assembled to see the start, and the trial of the starting machine, and opinions were very much divided after the stickiest sort of start I have ever had the pleasure of seeing. The horses didn't jib, but there was a decided pause before they got away, and many there were that were not "on their legs." The winner, Mediation, who had been practised with it, dashed off as if used to the game and won. Robinson on Luscius was well left, and King's Head, having been kicked by Confessional, retired from the competition. Personally I consider a good start firstly consists in all the horses being "on their legs," secondly in perfect line, but how often does one see a perfect line at the start and then one stride from flag fall three or four horses right behind. Those three or four are in a good position of body to start, otherwise not on their legs. If it came to virtually starting horses from a stand still, I would back Mr. Coventry, but his aim is to get all the horses moving in line in such a manner, and at such a pace, as to bound forward equally quickly at flag fall, and beautifully he does it. There are mistakes, and so

there are and will be with a starting machine, but when the starts in both cases are good ones, I consider Mr. Coventry's method is the fairest for the horses.

On Sunday Winkfield's Pride fairly romped away with the Prix de Consul Municipal in Paris. Personally I never heard of such a certainty in racing. The stake is worth £4,000, and the son of Winkfield was handicapped within one pound of Telescope, and took 13 lbs. from Omnium II. Now Love Wisley gave Omnium II a 10 lb beating at Ascot last year and has improved since that day, and Winkfield's Pride is also a much better horse. That 10 lb beating at weight for age would make Omnium and the son of Wisdom about equal, and he had to give Winkfield's Pride 13 lbs. though he had easily defeated Love Wisley this year at even weights. So much for one of the fancied candidates. The other was Masque II, who by his Ascot performance was 2 or 3 pounds better than Earwig, and I don't think he would start in a handicap if he had to receive only eleven pounds from Winkfield's Pride, this, and added to the meritorious win of Love Wisley the week before pointed to the victory of the English horse, and what, in my opinion, pointed to it more decidedly was the fact that he "begins" fast, in fact almost bolts at flag fall. Paris racing is always very fast indeed after the start, and this seems to choke our horses, but here was a horse who can stay a great deal farther than the course, and who dashes off, and keeps going at a great speed. It was indeed a nice sight to see Watts half a mile from home come right round the outside of the horses, (remembering no doubt, the treatment sometimes accorded to our jockeys on an inside position) and, with his horse pulling and striding over the rest come right away by four lengths. It was, indeed, a fine performance, and not the last by any means that he will make in the hands of his clever trainer Robinson.

The Caesarewitch market has opened out considerably, and a lot of horses that I considered had a great chance to start with have been scratched or are walking. Chit Chat numbers among the latter, and if Love Wisley wins with 9 st. 2 lbs., Mr. Gubbins will be sorry Galtee More was scratched, as he could have certainly given him one pound. No horse, not even Persimmon, has beaten Velasquez with such consummate ease as he does from five furlongs to any distance.

A horse that took my attention at Newmarket in his gallops was Mr. Jersey's Merman and he goes all the way being driven which makes it look as if he were beat, but he sticks to it resolutely, and undoubtedly stays the course.

Kempton finishes the week with two valuable prizes: the Imperial Produce Stakes which Cyllene should account for, and the Duke of York Stakes in which Court Bail has a nice weight, but I will leave that till next mail.

FRANCIS-CO.

The once celebrated horse Peter died in Belgium last month, at the stud farm of M. Wittouck, where he had been located since 1892, when Lord Rosslyn parted with him. The son of Hermit and Lady Masham was bred by Lord Glasgow in 1876, and as a yearling was bought on behalf of General Peel for 360 guineas, at the Doncaster sales. As a two-year old, he won three times out of four, inclusive of the Middle Park Plate. Next year, when the property of Mr J. T. Best, who had bought him for 3000 guineas, consequent on the death of General Peel, Peter won the Stewards' Cup at Goodwood, under the big weight of 8st; and the next season also performed successfully, whilst the year following, as the property of the late Sir John Astley, he started favourite, and won the Royal Hunt Cup, carrying 9st 3lb, under most extraordinary circumstances. About a furlong from the fall of the flag, the horse (always a curiously tempered beast) stopped, and began to lash out right and left, whereby his chance for the race appeared to be extinguished. However, Fred Archer, trying kindness in preference to punishment, soon had Peter going again, and, getting on to terms with his field, he eventually won in a canter. At the same Ascot meeting Peter won the Hardwicke Stakes. Changing hands once more, Peter was sold to Mr Combe for £6000, and, after a few seasons at the stud, went to Belgium. With the exception of Houndsditch and Papyrus, respectively winners of the Great Yorkshire Handicap and Goodwood Stakes, his stock has only been moderate, though it is perhaps within the mark to describe him as the best of Hermit's sons.

SPORTING NOTES

The coming week will be a busy one with the Tigre Regatta and the Championship Athletic meeting at Lomas on Thursday, the dog show on Monday and Tuesday, the Handicap Polo Tournament at Hurlingham, racing at Palermo, and several good cricket fixtures. It will be difficult to choose between the many attractions offered the sporting public.

The Gymkhana at Hurlingham on Monday was an unqualified success, with perfect weather, plenty of entries, and the right sort of people present to see the fun. The meeting went off so well that everyone wanted to know after it was over why it is the only one at the club during the year, as there seems room for at any rate one other.

As I anticipated last week there was very great interest in the final match for the Bat Fives Open Championship at Flores on Monday last, and five games had to be played before Mr Hancock beat Mr E. L. Rumboll. Though he won the first and last games fairly easily, Mr Hancock only scored 77 points to Mr Rumboll's sixty. In the club singles Mr Foster and Mr Hancock had a still closer tussle, the former, who was receiving one point from Mr Hancock, scoring 64 points to the latter's 59.

I see that Pio Torterola has left England for this country, but he leaves behind him at Newmarket his sons and nephews with Leandro Alvarez. Castouche II. and Imperio will not return till the end of the year.

The good people of Quilmes are once more going to make the attempt to form a cricket club, and a meeting for this purpose has already been held. How it is that no club, except the Lawn Tennis Club, can be kept going in such a place as Quilmes has always been a matter for wonder. Perhaps this time the new club will have better support and success than its forerunners.

The annual Championship Athletic Sports will take place next Tuesday at Lomas, when in spite of the counter attraction of the Regatta at the Tigre a large crowd is sure to be present. It will be remembered that the committee had to postpone these sports on account of the bad weather, and since the reopening of the entries a large number of others have been received and everything points to a thoroughly successful meeting.

The sports will be held on the new ground of the Lomas Athletic Club which is looking in excellent trim and the track is also in good going condition besides being very much superior to the old one. The racing itself will probably be better than ever, and I hear of one or two very good chances of existing records being broken. The new ground and pavilion alone are well worth a visit, so I shall expect to see a record attendance next Thursday.

The Montevideo Athletic meeting has been arranged for the 8th of December, on the Montevideo Cricket Club's ground. The meeting will be held under the rules and auspices of the Amateur Athletic Association of Uruguay, and the Secretary is Mr. Adams, whose address is Calle Solis 57, Montevideo. Entries close on November 25th, the fee being a gold dollar for each event up to four, over which number fifty cents will only be charged.

The Central Uruguay Railway Cricket Club held their annual meeting the other day at Peñarol for the election of office bearers for the ensuing year. The election resulted as follows: President, Mr. F. Henderson; Vice-President, Mr. S. Hudson; Captain, Mr. R. C. F. Moore; Vice-Captain and Captain of Tennis, Mr. P. Sedgfield; Hon Treasurer, Mr. H. G. A. Craven; Hon Secretary, Mr. A. R. Roebuck.

An extraordinary meeting of the members of the San Martin Athletic Club was held last week at which it was decided to liquidate the Club and form another to be called the San Martin Tennis Club. The election of the Committee of the new Club resulted as follows:—President, Mr H. S. Robinson; Hon Secretary and Treasurer, Mr J. D. Mace, with Messrs R. Paton, and C. M. Turner as members of the Committee.

I understand that the Curumalan Company are practically giving up their thoroughbred stud, and amongst other sales they have lately made I notice that the well known mares, Mariana by Chivalrous, and Rosa by Wisdom and Pigue by Chivalrous have been purchased by the Haras Nacional. Mariana is celebrated for being the dam of Amianto, the best horse of his year, whilst Rosa is the dam of Bolivar and Suere.

The St. Honorat's are just beginning to do well, not only here, but in Montevideo and Chile, whilst I am told that one of the two fillies sent over to South Africa this year with the Government horses has been sold at a very large figure. The colt by St. Honorat out of Delicada finished second in the Premio de Honor at Montevideo on Sunday, so on the whole the break up of the Stud is to be regretted.

Malakoff, by Whipper-In out of Vera, has just been sold by Sr Zubiaurre to Sr H. N. Espinosa to go to the Stud at Gualeguaychu, Entre Rios, where he will serve six thoroughbred mares this season. Malakoff has been a most successful horse on the turf here, and during his career has won over fifty thousand dollars, most of which amount, however, he netted when a two and three year-old. He is one of the most likely sons of Whipper In to perpetuate his sire's fame in this part of the world.

The starting machine was tried at the Newmarket First October Meeting but does not seem to have given a very satisfactory result. I have seen photographs of the start for the Welter Handicap on September 30, but it must have been a very indifferent one, only two horses are shown as "on their legs as the line was raised," whilst the rest are either standing still or have their tails turned towards the finish.

As a contrast to this photograph some others have been published showing the starts for one or two of the races on the same day, and though the fields were all much bigger than in the Welter Handicap the horses evidently got off well together. Of course it is impossible to judge of the machine by one trial only, and especially with horses unused to it. At all events it will be sure to take longer to come in to general use in England than in other and younger countries.

The principal reason that the machine proved a failure in its trial was that a gentleman who understood the machine, but not how to marshal a field of horses for a start, and who naturally had no authority over the jockeys, took Mr. Arthur Coventry's place on this occasion. A good starter is just as much required with the

machine as without it. The machine is merely a help to him, and used as such I think there is no doubt about its excellence.

Sr. Correas has lost his valuable stallion Saumur, by Dollar out of Finland by Ion. Saumur was foaled in France in 1878 and imported here in 1887, and has of late years stood at the Haras Las Ortigas, Moron, with Neapolis. Almost the only classic winner he has sired is Pergamino.

The Flores Athletic Club have arranged to have an athletic meeting on the new track they have lately laid down on December the 8th, entries for which will close about the end of this month. The list of events will be published shortly, and besides the usual programme there will be two races for ladies, one on bicycles, two for boys and a consolation handicap for boys.

What I have been hearing during the past week regarding the qualification of competitors for the bicycle races at Rosario and Lomas it seems to point to there still being something wrong or rather wanting in the rules of the Amateur Athletic Association regarding cyclists. Unfortunately the Cycling Association here protects professionalism, and I think I am right in saying that the only two cycling clubs affiliated to the A.A.A. are the Club Ciclista in Rosario and the Southern Cross Cycle Club.

As matters stand at present any cyclist who goes in for racing cannot really help breaking the amateur rule, as almost every man he meets in a race is a professional according to the Amateur Athletic Association, and he cannot help knowing it, so unless some special rules be framed for bicycle races, I do not see how an affiliated athletic club can have them on their programme without running the risk of disputes, objections and all that tend to take away from the successful issue of an athletic meeting.

Since our last rowing notes appeared Mr Mateo Kay has had to give up his place in the Tigre Boat Club's Senior crew owing to indisposition. This means that the whole crew has had to be altered and their chance in consequence of winning what we still like to call the International is not nearly so good as it looked last week. The whole of the entries for the regatta will be found under "Rowing," and as will be seen from them the programme for Thursday is exceptionally interesting, whilst as far as one can judge from the present the weather promises to be settled.

The Buenos Aires Canine Association have secured more entries for their show on Monday and Tuesday next than the most sanguine of their members expected. About two hundred and thirty different dogs will be shown, and so Messrs Bollini's yard will be well filled on both days, as a big entry list means a big attendance, besides which the Association have done all that is possible to make the show a success in every way.

An enormously attended bicycle meeting was held last Monday at Palermo under the auspices of the Club Ciclista Argentino, at which a long distance championship of twenty-five thousand metres was run. This event attracted a very large amount of interest and was eventually won by Sr. A. Castro, who rode a "Rambler" while Mr B. Brice on a "Colombia" was second. The latter would certainly have won except for bad luck, as he had three spills owing to smashes in front of him. Sr. Venturi, from Italy, was third on a "Prinnetti."

Whatever the result of this meeting was it certainly did good in one respect and that was in opening the eyes of those in authority to the danger of the present track and in clearly demonstrating the necessity of pushing forward the project of making a new one. In the race already referred to above there were four bad spills and there were many more during the day. The angles at the corners of the track require to be at least as steep again.

The Belgrano supporters were very sad at their representatives only totalling 70, and it was generally considered that the home club had a very easy thing before them with the batting they had at their command. The uncertainties of cricket, however, were never better realised than in the 15 minutes play that followed, for much to the surprise of everybody, the joy of the visitors and the consternation of the B.A. supporters, four good wickets fell for 11 runs before the luncheon bell sounded, and the aspect of affairs was completely changed. ATHLETICS

ROSARIO ATHLETIC SPORTS.

With the exception of a slight wind at times during the day, which was not conducive to record breaking, delightfully fine weather favoured these sports and it is a pleasure to record that the meeting was a success financially and otherwise. Plaza Jewell, on Monday, was looking at its best, with the trees in their spring garb, and although perhaps the "gate" was not quite so large as in some of the best years it was by no means small, as the takings amounted to over \$1300. The jovial faces of the usual crowd of pleasure seeking camp people were conspicuous by their absence, doubtless the near approach of the harvest accounting for such a few being present. The number of Buenos Aires visitors was also below the average, but notwithstanding this falling off the ground presented a gay and animated appearance and the grand stand, which was well crowded with the youth and beauty of Rosario, was likened by one of the Committee to a huge bouquet.

The awning raised over the stand by the thoughtful and painstaking committee was a great acquisition, and judging from overheard remarks, was much appreciated by the seatholders and no one on the ground looked happier than the energetic Hon. Secretary, Mr D. O. Le Bas, who has done much for the success of the festival and has been well supported by the following officers and members of the committee:—

Two bands of music enlivened the proceedings, the Municipality band, kindly lent for the occasion by the Gefe Politico, and that of the 2nd regiment of the line, by the courtesy of Col. Reyes. The selections given included some of Fregoli's airs, and the Washington Post, which was much appreciated by the visitors.

After the conclusion of the Sports the prizes a (splendid assortment) were gracefully presented by the Lady President, Mrs J. J. C. Daniel.

Turning to the races, some of the events produced excellent finishes chiefly amongst the limit men, the number of dead-heats being quite phenomenal. The scratch men, however, in the majority of cases, were asked to do too much, the result being that only in three cases were they able to be in at the finish. The hammer proved an easy thing for Glover with his 20 ft handicap, only three men being anywhere near his actual throw. The 100 yards did not produce anything startling, Glover, from the limit, again proving successful. The shot was only a moderate performance. Salvadielli, with 3½ ft, being the winner. Although only four started in the hurdles, it produced a good race between Clark and Elliot, the two finishing together. In running off the dead-heat, Elliot, who was conceding four yards to Clark, caught his opponent at the second hurdle, and a neck and neck struggle ensued, Elliot just getting the verdict. Time 19 secs. According to one of the gentlemen in charge of the pistol, Elliot was three yards away before the signal was given, but the attempt to nullify the race was overruled. The 220 yards members race resulted in another dead-heat between Cooper and Boxall, but the latter walked in an easy winner in the run off. The final in the 100 yards for boys under 10 was won by A. Colson, with A. Angel second, after a hard struggle. The limit man (A. T. Boxall) in the half mile, had again an easy task set him, as after making all the running, he suiled in 30 yards in front of his nearest opponent. Both the bicycle races were tame affairs, the only interesting part being the last 100 yards in the five miles, when Grasso overhauled Gerstenberg. A lap prize would probably prevent a great deal of the hanging back which takes place in these races.

The quarter mile was one of the most interesting contests of the day. Dorning and Fones were running an exciting finish when the former unfortunately slipped and fell. The high jump was the only event in which a record was broken, H. Middleton clearing 5 ft 5¼ in, in fine style, thus entitling him to the A.A.A.'s gold medal. The long jump fell to G. F. Elliot, with a jump of 18 ft 3 in, and he beat H. Middleton, the scratch man, by half an inch. The 350 yards, member's handicap, resulted in another dead-heat between A. Boxall and F. Clark, and in the run off the judges were again unable to separate them. The toss of a coin decided the matter in favour of Clark. The 220 yards, open handicap, for boys under 14, resulted in a win for A. Le Bas, R. Le Bas and C. Robinson making a dead-heat for second place. Only four starters turned out for the mile, which proved an easy win for E. Clark, the scratch man. Unfortunately no time was taken for this race. The obstacle race again saw H. Middleton a winner with R. Dorning second. Carman made all the running in the Consolation race, and furnished an easy winner, H. Hopper being his nearest attendant.

PAVILION GOSSIP.

Although we had two holidays together at the commencement of this week no club had thought fit to arrange a two day's cricket match, and last Sunday was almost an idle day for our cricketers. No first eleven games were played at all, and it seems a great pity that some really good two-day match is not always arranged for these occasions. The opportunity for it only occurs about twice during the cricket season, and we cannot afford to throw such chances away, especially as a meeting between two first elevens here so seldom allows of the match to be played right through.

On Monday, however, there were several games, principally second eleven fixtures, and only one important match that between the first elevens of the B.A.C.C. and the Belgrano A.C. This game was played at Palermo, and resulted in a most exciting struggle, the premier club having to fight very hard to win by seventeen runs. The fielding all round was excellent, the catching, picking up and throwing in all being very smart, and the frequent bursts of applause from the spectators showed how much they appreciated the capital work accomplished in the field by both teams.

It was a most curious game in many respects and until the winning hit was actually made it was impossible to foretell what the ultimate result would be. Belgrano batted first but were all out for 70, out of which Harvey played a plucky innings of 33 not out. Naturally the home team were very confident of winning with such a small total to bat against, but this confidence was changed to dismay when four of their good wickets fell for 11 runs, only during the twenty minutes play before lunch.

After lunch two more good wickets fell for an additional six runs, the state of the game being six wickets for seventeen runs, leaving the home club fifty-four to get with four wickets to fall. The excitement can better be imagined than described as the score gradually mounted, but it was soon to be even more as at fifty-two a separation was effected, and at fifty-eight the eighth wicket fell. Messrs R. H. Morgan and A. S. Willes, however, rose to the occasion and the former soon put all doubts and fears out of the question by placing the bowlers to the boundary twice in quick

succession. "Thus the B.A.C.C. came out victorious after one of the keenest games that has been played here for a long time.

Of the other matches none were of a particularly interesting character. The Banfield second eleven caused some surprise by defeating the Belgrano second eleven at Belgrano, so if the first eleven follow their example to-morrow against Lanus they will make a good start in the championship. Lanus played a team under the title of "The Shipping" whom they easily defeated, the bowling of the sailors being conspicuous by its absence. The English High School proved too much for the second eleven of the Palermo A.C. The weather was beautiful on the two days and all the wickets were as fast as one could wish.

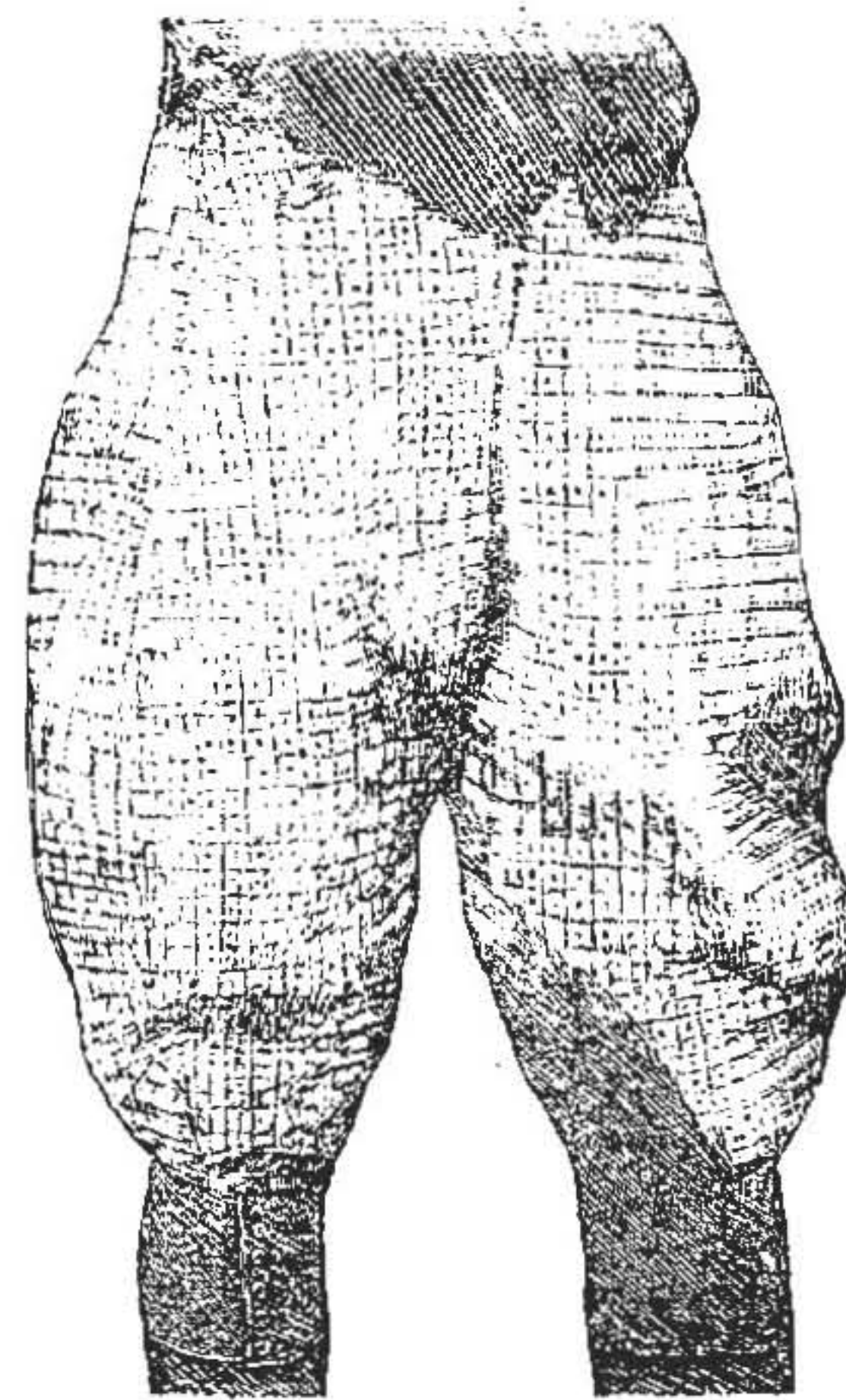

A new field was tried for the occasion and proved a great success. The Single men gained a decisive victory in the end, after a pleasant match which was witnessed by a large number of interested spectators. In addition to playing twelve-aside I hear that there were actually nearly a dozen more quite ready to offer their services to their respective sides.

This fact and the general interest manifested in the above game has had an excellent result for it has again set the Quilmeros thinking as to whether a cricket club could not be started. A meeting was held last night to discuss the advisability and possibility of this, but too late for me to hear the result of their deliberations. With several promising young cricketers and plenty of good keen sportsmen now residing at Quilmes there should be no difficulty in forming a cricket club, especially as the field they have now discovered is most conveniently situated in the very centre of Quilmes. I feel sure that if they decide to start a club at once, all the others will do what they can to help them in the way of fixtures etc.

The two cricket bats kindly presented to the Argentine Cricket Championship Committee by Mr. D. Kingsland, for the best batting and bowling averages obtained this season in championship matches, have arrived and may now be seen in this office. They were made by Warsop, and this well-known maker has evidently taken special care in selecting the wood, as I have rarely seen such beautiful grain in any bats. They have been well and regularly oiled and look quite ready for immediate use, though another season's rest won't harm them.

Last cricket season an average list was published each week and many diverse opinions were expressed as to the expediency of this course. Personally I consider that it keeps up a keenness and interest in the game which would not otherwise exist, and I don't believe that we have many in our midst who would think of playing solely for their averages at the expense of their side. The majority agree with me, so that this season the averages will be published as usual, this time in two separate lists, namely general and championship averages.

The second entertainment to be given by the now celebrated "Lomas Lilies" will be held at the Odeon Theatre, on the 13th inst. when a full house is expected. The proceeds of the performance will be devoted to paying off the debt on the new pavilion of the Lomas Athletic Club, so that footballers and cricketers should be present in full form. I hear that Mr. R. H. Morgan has taken the troupe in hand, so that we may confidently look forward to a real good show.

"CHARLEY'S AUNT."

This well-known farcial comedy was given by the Buenos Aires Dramatic Club at the Opera House on Tuesday and Thursday evening, and proved a complete success, reflecting the greatest credit on all those concerned. The house on the first night was a very brilliant one, while that of Thursday was not far behind and was certainly more appreciative, the laughter and applause being continuous after the first appearance of the assumed Charley's Aunt. The piece is too well known to require any description, and although I consider it hardly fair to ever criticise amateurs, as an old critic I cannot help giving a few impressions.

To begin with, the scenery and staging was distinctly good, and the acting in general far above that of ordinary amateurs.

Most of the work fell on the shoulders of Mr. Harry Thompson, who both as Charley's Aunt and Lord Fancourt Babberly really acted. He was very good indeed in the comic situations, but somewhat missed an important point in the piece of pathos that fell to his lot towards the end of the third act, when he found himself in a hopeless dilemma regarding his own love affairs. Mr. J. O. Anderson looked and acted the undergraduate to life, but appeared rather afraid of the piece dragging in the first act, and somewhat rushed and exaggerated his part in consequence. Mr. H. Plews as Jack, hardly made as much of the part as he might have, and at times was a little inclined to be stogy, but the general result was good. Mr. H. Mills as Spettigue was very good, his first entrance being real acting, and the only fault to be found was that he gave one the idea of being really rather a benevolent old fellow instead of the irascible and rude guardian. Mr. Lee as Brasnet, was a perfect "Scout" and did not exaggerate a part that distinctly lends itself to exaggeration. Mr. R. H. Morgan looked aristocratic but was hardly military. His acting was good but his delivery was decidedly jerky, and his voice was somewhat unnecessarily gruff and coarse.

Among the ladies Miss Reddall looked magnificent as the rich widow, and although evidently suffering from nervousness at first, her acting in the last act was almost perfect. Mrs Mills and Miss Foster both made very sympathetic lovers and did the best they could with such small parts. Miss Plews did the little she had to do carefully, but her enunciation was not very clear and she was evidently troubled considerably with nervousness.

These criticisms may appear harsh and indeed they are when it is considered that the performers were all amateurs, but it has not been done in an unkindly spirit, but having been asked for my opinion I have given it. In conclusion I should like to be allowed to congratulate the Buenos Aires Amateur Dramatic Club very heartily on their really capital production which was a thorough success in every possible way, and far above the ordinary productions of amateurs. **CRITIC.**

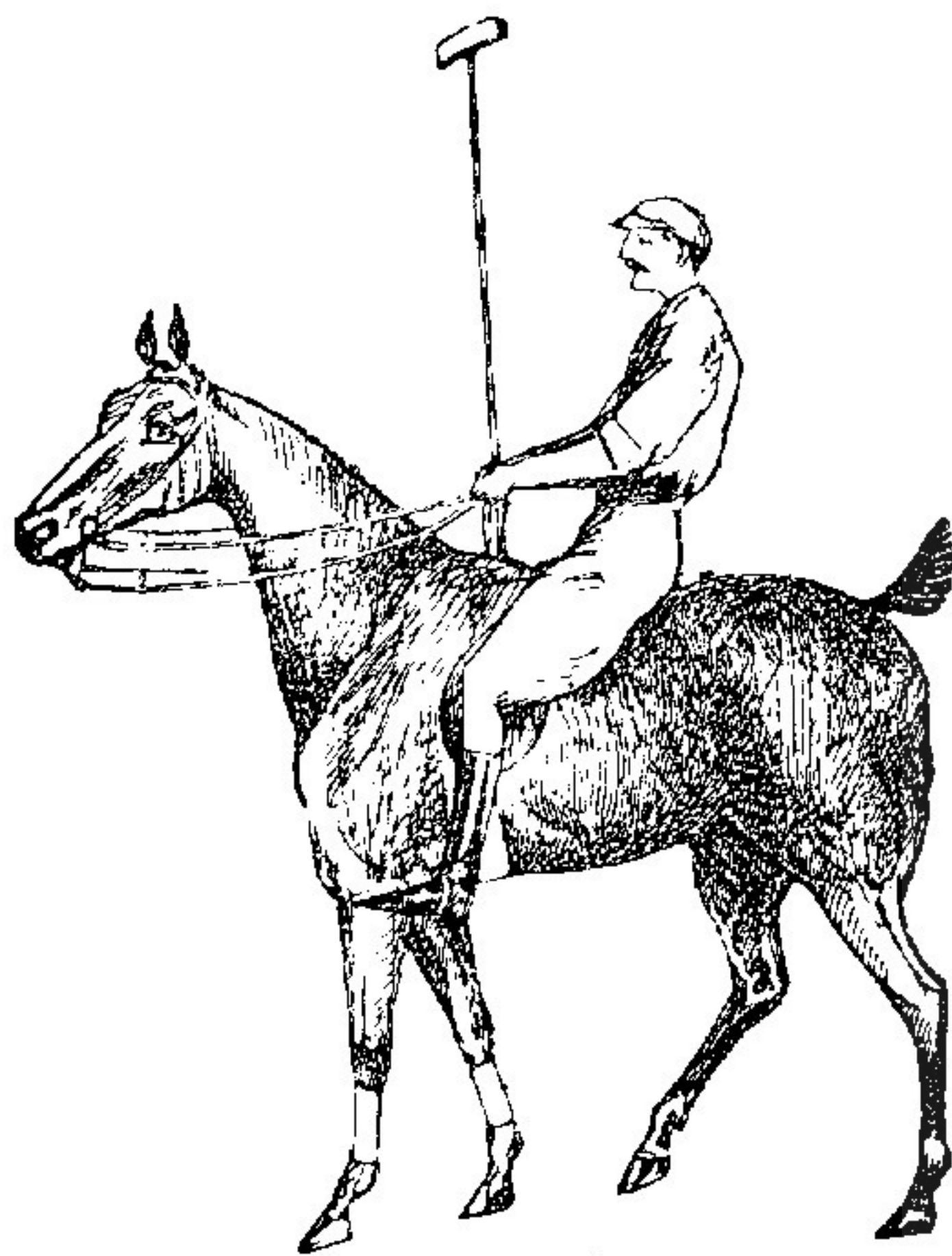

ESTANCIA AND COLONY.

The recently issued report of the Bureau of Animal Industry, published by the United States Department of Agriculture, refers to England as the "Great Stud Farm of the World," and states that the British Isles are resorted to by all the great stock-producing countries for finely-bred animals with which to cross and improve their native breeds. It is possible that in no branch of industrial enterprise has any country ever reached such acknowledged pre-eminence as England has done for the excellence of her studs, herds, and flocks.

The latest new breed in the United States is the "Polled Hereford." Writing of his experiments, Mr. W. W. Guthrie, a Kansas farmer, says—"I have now about fifty head of these animals, starting with a 'freak' from a cross of a Hereford on a Shorthorn cow, and of course I had to breed out and in to prevent in-breeding. The original bull is now eight years old. I am more than pleased with the results so far, and feel certain of finally establishing a hornless breed of as well marked 'white-faces' as the original in two or three generations more. So far as I know, not a calf this year has had horns, and but one last year; and of the calves got by my bull on horned cows there been fully 75 per cent. hornless. I call them Polled Hereford because of the larger preponderance of Hereford blood. Two heifers had their first calves at sixteen and seventeen months respectively, in September, 1896. They were milked until May, 1897, when they had their second calves. April 20th, 1896, the heifers respectively 1,097 and 970 lb., and with their last calves in the third week of their milking gave each 26 lb. of milk daily. I think next spring when my stock cattle are going to Chicago I will put in a bull calf to show 'doubting Thomases' that there is a breed of Polled Herefords."

As a result of the exhibition sales in the Rafaela Colony in Santa Fé a society has been formed with the object of caring for the interests of colonists all over the province. The headquarters of the society will be in Rafaela itself, but it will have branches in all the other principal colonies. The society proposes to make the following programme for itself:

- 1—To watch over the interests of the colonies and extend help to those which may suffer from bad harvests.
- 2—To encourage all industries.
- 3—To encourage the importation of machinery and pure-bred stock.
- 4—To introduce all seeds and plants which will be advantageous to grow.
- 5—To organise fairs and exhibitions.
- 6—To encourage spontaneous immigration.
- 7—To advise colonists on the best means they should adopt to avoid spread of diseases amongst their stock, and to indicate the most efficacious way to destroy those insects which do damage to their crops.
- 8—To advance money to industrial societies, agriculturists and stock breeders.

9—To arrange discounts, collections, bills and other business.

The capital of the society will be \$2,000,000, divided into four series of fifty thousand shareholders each.

The estancieros of Pergamino have just formed a Rural Society with the object of encouraging the breeding of good stock, agriculture, and of holding an annual show and fair such as are held in other camp towns throughout this province.

The cultivation of Ramie promises to become so important an industry in this country now that satisfactory machines have been found to strip the bark off the stems of the plant, and satisfactory processes discovered for making it up and manufacturing it in Europe. On paper the plant certainly gives a wonderful return, and shows a better result than any other crop can give whilst it is claimed for it that locusts and drought cannot injure it to the same extent as most other plants.

With the object of encouraging the cultivation of ramie and of showing how best this is done, Mr. Russell Christian of 441 Piedad has just published a most useful little book on the plant, the manufacture of which into all kinds of textiles by the Gormess process promises to revolutionise the whole industry. We cannot do better than recommend all agriculturists and owners of land to obtain Mr. Christian's book and at any rate to try growing the plant on a small scale to make the experiment.

In some parts of the country ramie flourishes in a wonderful manner and grows to three or four times the length it does in India, and that there is a demand for the fibre is shown by Mr. Christian, who tells us one house here is prepared to produce up to fifty thousand tons of it annually if it can be produced. Perhaps few of our readers know that the sails used on the American yacht in the last great cup race were made of ramie fibre and they were found much lighter and stronger than any ordinary canvas could have been.

Amongst the many good qualities possessed by ramie as a crop are that it can be cut from three to six times per year, and it practically lasts for ever, some of the plantations in China being a hundred years old. The profit on paper is shown as being \$116 per square each cut, or \$41 the ton of 1000 kilos, which, of course seems good enough to encourage land owners to grow ramie. The bark will be purchased on the chaca itself, at the uniform price of \$60 the ton, by the house we have referred to.

Course wools have not improved in price during the past week, and unless in good condition are almost unsaleable. This being so, and the arrivals principally of this class, there is a big stock of it in the markets.

Fine wools on the other hand have been selling well, and readily. Messrs Gibson Brothers quote the price for the week for long wools as \$5.70 to \$6.80 and for fine wools as from \$7 to \$7.50.

The sales of National Lands in Santa Cruz have been realising good price. The sales have been held at the Land and Colonies' offices and have reached better prices than were expected. One league sold for \$3,250, and the average at Thursday's sales was \$5,016 the league. Tomorrow fifty-six leagues will be sold in Tierra del Fuego.

In Mendoza the provincial government have just voted \$200,000 to be spent by a committee in purchasing locusts eggs which are to be delivered in a proportion to the number of hectares occupied by vineyards. The whole province is now invaded by the insects, but it is hoped that if properly administered the new law will be the means of stamping them out.

During the past week the auction yards have been busy with daily sales of imported stud stock, but prices have not been very high on the whole. The Lincoln rams imported by Sr. Tejeiro averaged the good price of \$616 for twelve, but this was a good deal more than was realized for most of the others sold. Bulls have been making about from \$1,000 to 1,200 each on the average.

The best news from the camp this week has been that the crops are now practically saved, both from damage by locusts and from drought, whilst the rains have been so general that there is almost without exception no district complaining of shortness of pasture for live stock. The saltona locusts are making their appearance all over Santa Fé, but they are at present doing no damage and cannot do so now to the crops before they are harvested.

Messrs Kingsland and Cash made a big purchase this week of 990 steers from Sr Berravichi, of Marcos Paz, at \$80 each. The cattle are intended for export to England.

We see from the "Live Stock Journal" that Dr Alexander Edington, Bacteriologist to the Government of Cape Colony, claims to have invented an effective rinderpest. He found that the blood of animals affected with the disease, when treated with citric acid, and kept long enough to ensure the death of the contagium, conferred immunity upon animals injected with it. Bile treated in the same way, with half its quantity of glycerine mixed with it, acted equally well. Animals injected with 20 cubic centimetres of either preparation proved immune from infection in a great majority of cases when virulent blood from rinderpest was afterwards injected. Dr. Edington, after experimenting on a small scale with perfect success, practised his preventive method upon a number of large herds, and the highest mortality in any herd been a little over 3 per cent. His protective preparation is now being used in the colony instead of that of Dr. Koch, as being both more certain and cheaper.
